MOREHEAD, Ky.---Some Morehead State University students experienced another culture when they traveled to Germany on an educational excursion.

Through an information grant from the German Academic Exchange Service, 11 students were accompanied by Dr. Robert E. Frank, assistant professor of speech, and Dr. Roma Prindle, associate professor of music, on a visit to Munich, Erlangen and Frankfurt am Main. The grant, which totaled \$3,551, covered the students' plane tickets, in-country travel, hotel rooms, museum and concert admission fees and some meals.

The student participants, who are majors in a variety of fields, were: Mary Ellen Gill, **Coshocton, Ohio**, senior; Jacquelyn R. "For some of the students, it was their first time to leave the country, so it was fun to see their reactions," Dr. Frank said. "It also is nice for our students to see the culture, values and respect for the arts and how engrained that is in other societies," Dr. Prindle added.

While in Munich, the group toured the city and its museums and attended a concert by the Munich Symphony. They also walked through the English Tea Garden and visited the Olympic Stadium.

At the next stop in Erlangen, the students visited the Friedrich-Alexander-Universitaet, an alma mater of Dr. Frank's. "This gave the students an opportunity to see a smaller city and to visit and be exposed to a German university," Dr. Frank said, adding that he is exploring the possibilities of an exchange program with this school.

While touring Frankfurt, the group attended a concert by the St. Petersburg String Quartet and a performance of "The Barber of Seville" by the Frankfurt Opera. They also toured museums, a zoo and a monument to peace.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Brandi Lee Dent of **Jeannette, Pa.**, will be the student speaker for Morehead State University's Winter Commencement on Saturday, Dec. 16, at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center.

Approximately 400 graduate and undergraduate students are candidates for degrees to be conferred by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. Also during the ceremonies, the honorary Doctor of Public Service degree will be presented to William R. Seaton of Ashland, a retired chief financial officer of Ashland, Inc., and Janet L. Stumbo of Prestonsburg, the first woman elected to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

Dent, a dean's list student, is a candidate for the Bachelor of Arts degree with an emphasis in special education P-12 from the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences. She is currently completing her professional semester of student teaching in the fourth and fifth grade resource room at Olive Hill Elementary School.

After graduation, she hopes to attain a teaching position within the Westmoreland County (Pa.) Intermediate Unit.

Recognized for her achievements, Dent was named an All-American Scholar, an Alumni Leader of Tomorrow and the Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education's Outstanding Undergraduate Student this year.

A member of the University's Honors Program, Dent has made presentations and participated in panel discussions for conferences at the state and national level. She also was active in MSU's Leadership Development Program and, with two faculty members, made a presentation at the Kentucky Council for the Social Studies annual conference.

Active in various academic and professional organizations, she is a member of the Kentucky Education Association, Kappa Delta Pi international honor society in education, Phi Kappa Phi honor society, Phi Sigma Pi national honor fraternity and the Council for Exceptional Children where she served as vice president during her junior year.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---In just three years at Morehead State University, Yan Duan, assistant professor of nursing, has compiled an extensive record of supporting international projects.

Her first involvement came in 1997 when she was a translator for a visiting group, and most recently as the organizer for a nursing seminar. A delegation of 20 nursing administrators from the Guangxi Province in southwest China traveled to MSU for a two-month study of the health care system in the United States.

While the group was visiting the University, she presented lectures on the role of nurses in community health care. They also were instructed on various topics by her colleagues in the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences, Dr. Freda Kilburn, professor, and Lucy Mays and Teresa Howell, assistant professors.

Classroom time was spent comparing Chinese and American health systems, including laws, continuing education and management.

In the region, the delegates toured St. Joseph Hospital and the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington and King's Daughters Medical Center in Ashland. The nurses also worked closely with nursing and home health units of St. Claire Medical Center in Morehead.

"The nursing administrators particularly enjoyed seeing the equipment that is available in this country," Duan said. "Among their questions were the ratio of doctors and nurses to patients and the duties of the American medical teams."

A graduate of Hua Bei Coal Medical College in China, Duan earned a master of nursing degree from the University of Manitoba in Canada and received a family nurse practitioner certification from the University of Kentucky.

A member of the Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing, she is active in MSU's Nursing Honor Society. She has been named the first-ever Honorable Visiting Professor at China's Guangxi Medical University, where she has a standing invitation to conduct research, lecture and collaborate on projects.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Marching, launching hand grenade assaults and setting up rope bridges were all part of weekend activities for some Morehead State University students enrolled in the ROTC Program.

Two teams, composed of 20 MSU students took an active role in the Ranger Challenge Competition held at Fort Knox. More than 30 universities, with 40 teams, participated.

"These are the kinds of activities that help build cohesiveness among our students and enhance retention in the program," said Dr. Michael R. Moore, MSU's executive vice president for academic affairs.

Morehead State's teams finished 11th and 37th overall, 2nd and 9th among the field of universities from Kentucky. "This was MSU's best showing in at least 10 years," said Lt. Col. John H. Karaus, department chair.

The students competed in eight events, including a 10-kilometer road march, packing 15 pounds of equipment; rifle marksmanship; physical fitness test; weapons qualifications; patrolling; and land navigation. "We started preparing the first week of school with physical training such as running, push-ups and sit-ups," said Master Sgt. Michael Campbell, chief instructor.

Some of the schools train year-round for the competition. "We think it's more important for the students to get an education," Campbell said.

Training for and participating in the Ranger Challenge "helps cadets develop teamwork," said Sgt. 1st Class Jerome Hughes, training NCO. "They learn some of the basic leadership skills that are necessary in the military."

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A former chief financial officer at Ashland Inc., and a Kentucky Supreme Court Justice will receive honorary doctoral degrees from Morehead State University on Saturday, Dec. 16, as part of the University's Winter Commencement exercises.

William R. Seaton of **Ashland** and MSU alumnus Janet L. Stumbo of **Prestonsburg** will be presented Honorary Doctor of Public Service degrees during the ceremony which begins at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center.

More than 400 graduate and undergraduate students are degree candidates. Brandi L. Dent, **Jeannette, Pa.**, senior and an honors graduate in the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, will be the student speaker.

Seaton held a variety of managerial positions at Ashland Inc. during his nearly four decades with the state's largest domestic corporation. Joining the firm in 1949, he was named an executive assistant to management in 1960, elected vice president in 1967, administrative vice president the next year, and became a director in 1969. Moving up to a senior vice president in 1970 and vice chairman in 1972, he was given the additional role as chief financial officer in 1982. He retired in 1988.

Appointed to MSU's Board of Regents in 1986 to fill an unexpired term, and re-appointed in 1988 and 1994, Seaton used his boardroom finesse to bring prestige and stability to the University at a critical time in the history of the institution. He was appointed board chair in 1989 and continued to lead the Regents until 1996.

While volunteering his time to MSU, Seaton is remembered for his sound judgment and business acumen which have benefited the University. His commitment to quality education has helped attract quality administrators and faculty members and raise the University's academic standards.

When he left MSU's Board earlier this year, the Regents honored Seaton for his 14 years of outstanding service in a special presentation. He was commended "for his breadth of experience and training in fiscal management, high ethical standards and deep, personal commitment to academic excellence."

A strong advocate for higher education, Seaton is a graduate of Yale University with a bachelor's degree in engineering. He and his wife Suzanne are the parents of four children.

Justice Stumbo, who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from MSU in 1976, has devoted her life to public service. A 1980 graduate of the University of Kentucky College of Law, she served as a staff attorney to the late Judge Harris Howard of the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

In 1982, she went into private practice with the firm of Turner, Hall & Stumbo, P.S.C. Her practice emphasized workers' compensation, federal black lung claims, dissolution of marriage and personal injury.

During that time, she also served as assistant county attorney in Floyd County and sat on the Board of Directors of Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc., from 1983 through 1989, serving as board chair beginning in 1984.

She became a partner in the Stumbo, DeRossett & Pillersdorf law firm in 1989. Later that year, she earned the distinction of being the first woman from the Seventh Judicial District to be elected to the Court of Appeals of Kentucky. Only the second woman on the court, she was the first female to be elected without first having been appointed.

In 1993, she became the first woman elected to the Kentucky Supreme Court; she was re-elected to an eight-year term in 1996 and currently is chair of the Civil Rules Committee.

Justice Stumbo serves as chair of the Family Court Consortium, a statewide committee appointed by the Chief Justice to devise a pilot project of six family courts, spread across the Commonwealth. Legislation implementing the pilot project and funding nine family courts was passed by the 1998 Kentucky legislature.

Accolades from her alma maters, Justice Stumbo was inducted into the University's Alumni Hall of Fame in 1990 and UK's Hall of Fame in 1999. Among other honors she has received are the Justice Award from the Kentucky Women Advocates in 1991; Outstanding Just Award from Kentucky Women Advocates in 1995; Bull's Eye Award by the Women in State Government Network in 1995; and the first Women Lawyers of Achievement Award from the Kentucky Bar Association in 1996.

Justice Stumbo and her husband, attorney Ned Pillersdorf, are parents of three daughters: Sarah, Nancee and Samantha.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—The teachers of today will be better prepared to teach the students of tomorrow, and have a greater understanding of various information resources, thanks to a grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

As the lead partner in a unique educational consortium, Morehead State University has received \$1.4 million for a special program, entitled “Preparing Tomorrow’s Teachers to Use Technology” or the PT³ grant. The money will be matched by an additional \$1.4 million from the consortium partners which include Carter, Morgan, Elliott, Fleming and Rowan county school districts; the Kentucky Department of Education Region 7 Service Center; Teacher Education Institute (TEI); Ventana East Corporation; and the Kentucky Educational Development Corporation.

The three-year project allows partners to share ideas among themselves as well as with others across the nation who are engaged in similar partnerships. Three other Kentucky universities, Eastern Kentucky, Murray State and Northern Kentucky, received similar grants.

To begin the process, MSU teamed with TEI to offer a special class, titled “Technology Integration,” which allows faculty, current and future teachers, and principals and superintendents, to learn new ways to infuse technology into their specific content areas.

For the first time, MSU faculty members had the opportunity to take a class online. Upon completion of the course, they will become eligible to apply for release time or up to \$1,500 grant support for projects to integrate technology into the curriculum.

Students in the teacher education program who enrolled in the class receive college credit as well as a free textbook. The rewards increased for those completing their professional semester, as student teachers and their supervisors enrolled together, allowing them to immediately incorporate technology in classroom experiences.

“Our teachers must be well prepared to use that technology effectively to enhance teaching and learning,” said Dr. Elizabeth Regan, chair of the Department of Information Systems. “Information technology and digital networks have changed the way we think about teaching and learning.”

Dr. Regan, along with Dr. Michael R. Moore, executive vice president for academic affairs, and Dr. Michael Seelig, interim dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences, are co-directors of the project.

“The PT³ program is a critical part of MSU’s initiative to transform teacher education for the 21st century,” Dr. Moore said. “This grant, combined with other planned changes, will have a major impact on the future of teacher education.”

Technology was the impetus for making the changes in the way we teach, Dr. Regan said. “The world keeps getting smaller as students learn more about other cultures and enjoy opportunities that were not possible even a few years ago. They can interact and correspond with other countries and share an exchange with students who speak a different language,” she said.

“Students may now enjoy a simulated ride on a spaceship and experience the feeling of ‘floating in space’,” Dr. Regan added. “They are actual participants, not just reading about science in a textbook.”

Thirty-nine faculty members, including MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin and Dr. Moore, are enrolled in the class, sharing ideas and learning from teachers in the field as part of their training. “Increasingly, technology is requiring the teacher to be not only an expert, but also an expert learner,” Dr. Moore said.

“Our goal is to have students exposed to the best teaching possible,” Dr. Eaglin said. “We want to take advantage of all those tools that would make us better.”

As part of the classroom instruction, faculty members will learn to increase computer literacy, to integrate technology into the curriculum, to access information and complete research via the Internet, and to evaluate student projects that incorporate multimedia. Both faculty and students will be able to access a variety of pioneering ideas, such as materials from the George Lucas Educational Foundation, to enhance both teaching and learning.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Preparing students, for a career and also for life, has been Kozy Hamilton's goal during her 25 years at Morehead State University.

When the time comes, retirement will not be an easy decision for Hamilton, whose students often ask her to stay until they graduate. For the past 10 years, she has told her husband that she would retire "next semester."

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
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



MOREHEAD, Ky.---Several Morehead State University nursing faculty members are collaborating on a project that may enable Chinese-speaking nurses to better assist their English-speaking patients.

The group is developing the "English/Chinese Language Instructional Video," which will help fill a need expressed by 20 Chinese nurses, who visited the campus this summer. It will facilitate communication between Chinese nurses and English-speaking patients, and vice versa.

Video participants include MSU faculty Ruth Huffman, associate degree in nursing campus lab coordinator; Yan Duan and Teresa Howell, assistant professors of nursing; Peggy Gray, MSU Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing campus lab coordinator. They are being assisted by Kun Mo, director of nursing at Teaching Hospital of Guangxi Medical University in China.

Current nurses, nursing faculty and students may all benefit from the 60-minute training video, said Duan, who received the first-ever title of Honorable Visiting Professor from Guangxi Medical University. The instruction is in three parts with each part running 20 minutes:

- *Session I, which depicts patient-nurse interaction in an emergency room;

- *Session II, elaborates on the first part, teaching medical vocabulary, pronunciation and sentence structure; and

- *Session III, provides a practice session for the viewer.

Financing for the project came from a \$2,500 MSU Campus Partnership Fund grant. Established in 1998, the fund is governed by a board of stewards, comprised of nine faculty and staff members elected from contributors. The MSU Foundation, Inc. matches all gifts 50 cents to the dollar.

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

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's five-year effort to improve fire safety in its residence halls is on schedule but the work is proving to be twice as expensive as expected and those costs are being passed on to students who are required to live in campus housing.

As a result, the institution's Board of Regents is concerned that forcing students to pay is not fair and that the process may discourage students from coming to the University. The Regents learned at a recent meeting that cost projections on the five-year project have climbed to \$6.3 million from the original estimate of \$3.6 million just two years ago.

Board Chair L. M. (Sonny) Jones of Versailles was directed by the Regents to request that the Council for Postsecondary Education (CPE) consider making such projects eligible for state capital construction funds in the 2002-2004 state budget. Jones said that he and Vice Chair Buckner Hinkle of Lexington would submit a written request to CPE Chair Charles Whitehead to put the matter on that group's agenda.

"There is a basic question of fairness here that has not been adequately addressed," Jones said. "Today's students and their families are being required to pay for improvements to state-owned buildings constructed more than 30 years ago."

Fire safety in public university residence halls became a statewide issue in September 1998 in the aftermath of a fire at Murray State University that claimed the life of a student. Two months later, the CPE was advised by its staff that fire safety was an institutional matter and should be funded by each university from its own resources. The most expensive fire safety feature, in-room sprinklers, were not required when most of the state's multi-story residence halls were constructed in the 1960s and 1970s.

Morehead State has been adding surcharges to its residence hall rental rates each year to finance bonds issued for the purpose of paying the construction costs for the 13 projects. Five projects have been completed and the others are scheduled to be finished by the summer of 2003.

Vice Chair Hinkle expressed frustration that the school's efforts to keep its tuition and student activity fees at "reasonable levels" were being offset by the rapidly escalating rental fees for residence hall rooms.

"We offer the state's best tuition value but must charge the highest room rates to pay for fire safety improvements which should be the responsibility of state government," Hinkle said. He noted that rent surcharges had been \$70 the first year and \$92 the second year with the third year expected to top \$100.

“At the rate we are going, the add-on charges for students living in our residence halls could hit \$200 a year before these projects are finished, ” he stated.

Jones said the University did not agree with the decision to let institutions use their own resources to correct the deficiencies but had acquiesced at the time because it was apparent that the CPE would not support a request for state capital construction funds for that purpose.

“What we saw two years ago as a difficult but perhaps manageable problem has ballooned out of reason and now must be addressed by those who make policy for postsecondary education,” Jones added.

In other business, the Regents learned that fall enrollment had increased slightly. The final figures showed a head count of 8,327, an almost two percent increase over the fall 1999 figure of 8,171. The growth was attributed to improved recruitment of new students.

To meet the needs of the region and healthcare projections over the next decade, the Regents approved reactivation of an associate of applied science degree in respiratory therapy in collaboration with Rowan Technical College. The agreement makes Rowan Tech responsible for offering the respiratory care courses and selecting and supervising the faculty with MSU teaching general education courses and awarding the two-year degree.

Initially, a maximum of 30 students will enroll in the new program in the spring 2001 semester with a minimum of 10 from the University. MSU previously offered a respiratory therapy degree but it was suspended in 1993 because of fiscal constraints.

The Regents also approved a \$100 per semester increase in tuition and mandatory student fees for the 2001-2002 school year. Tuition and fees for resident students and those from selected out-of-state counties will be \$1,355 for undergraduates and \$1,467 for graduate students per semester. The per semester costs for non-resident undergraduate students will be \$3,602 and graduate students will pay \$3,932.

In his discussion of the increase, President Ronald G. Eaglin cited a rise in operating expenses related to facility improvements, operating costs, employee health insurance, faculty and staff salaries, and planned new academic initiatives as the basis for the increased charges to students.

The Board accepted the 1999-2000 financial audit report completed by Kelley, Galloway and Company of Ashland. Audit Committee Chair Hinkle reported that the CPA firm had deemed that MSU “is fiscally sound.”

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has been recognized by the first-ever America Recycles Day "Who's Who of Recycling in Kentucky" award.

"Out of all of the businesses and school systems in the state, we have been recognized as one of the best," said April Haight, recycling/energy conservation manager. "I think it says a lot for our program." MSU previously had been recognized with the Governor's Environmental Excellence Award for Energy Conservation.

To qualify for the award, Haight submitted an application that outlined MSU's recycling efforts. The America Recycles Day committee recognized 10 entities in Kentucky.

"MSU recycled 392,190 pounds of material in 1999 and the calendar year of 2000 looks as if we will surpass that," Haight said. The recyclables include everything from aluminum cans and paper to compact discs and toner cartridges.

In November, through a joint venture of Morehead, Rowan County and the University, a new Community Recycling Center was opened on Triplett Street. The 6,000 square feet building has a covered loading dock, chutes for depositing recyclables and classroom space that may be used during student tours.

The University's recycling program, which has been in operation since 1991, implements educational programs to inform the community about the benefits of recycling. Other efforts include replacing wooden benches on the campus with ones that are made from 100 percent post-consumer plastic and using recycled tires for a portion of the new football field turf.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---We are all teachers and role models and must assume this great responsibility was the emphasis at Morehead State University's Winter 2000 Commencement held Saturday (Dec. 16) on the campus.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin conferred graduate and undergraduate degrees on nearly 400 students before an audience of friends, family members of the graduates, and members of the University community.

During the exercises, honorary Doctor of Public Service degrees were presented to East Kentuckians William R. Seaton of Ashland, a former chief financial officer at Ashland Inc., and Justice Janet L. Stumbo of Prestonsburg, an MSU alumnus and the first woman elected to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

A strong advocate for higher education, Seaton is a graduate of Yale University with a bachelor's degree in engineering. In accepting the honor, he noted he was "deeply honored and grateful."

In his comments, Seaton described the occasion as "most heartening to see the number graduates that are the first time recipients of college degrees," he said.

Seaton, a former chair of MSU's Board of Regents, is credited for using his boardroom finesse to bring prestige and stability to the University at a critical time in the history of the institution.

Justice Stumbo, who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from MSU in 1976 and a law degree from the University of Kentucky in 1980, has devoted her life to public service.

Acknowledging the honor, she offered her thanks with "I am humbled by it."

In her comments, she spoke of conversations about the recent court battle in Florida. "So many have asked if I was glad that I was not there," she said. "No, I would like to have been there. I can't imagine any more exciting time. I know how difficult this has been for the judges as well as the Supreme Court. The critics, analysis and deconstruction will go on for decades and the judges' every movement will be analyzed and criticized," she said. "It demonstrates the importance of being impartial and apolitical."

Justice Stumbo recalled her walk through the University's graduation exercises some 25 years ago. "I thought I would be an English teacher, then I deferred to law school. But my years at MSU prepared me well because now all I do is read and write," she said.

In 1993, Justice Stumbo became the first woman elected to the Kentucky Supreme Court; she was re-elected to an eight-year term in 1996 and currently is chair of the Civil Rules Committee. She was inducted into the University's Alumni Hall of Fame in 1990 and UK's Hall of Fame in 1999.

The student speaker, Brandi L. Dent, a senior special education major from **Jeannette, Pa.**, reminded her classmates that they would have an impact on the children of the world. "Whether it is directly, by becoming a nurse that helps heal or indirectly by becoming the environmental conservationist who works toward preserving the world, your actions will affect the lives of many," she said. "As a community, we must all work together to maintain a productive society."

Dent, who recently completed student teaching at Olive Hill Elementary School, described today's youth as "searching, looking for someone to imitate. They model what they see and when they leave my classroom, it is you they will see."

She also encouraged her peers to "never let the fact that you have become the head of a corporation, a teacher, a parent or whatever career, stop you from learning. Take the approach of a child and question until you find the answers, and even then, question those answers."

Stephen Brashear, **Jeff** senior, sang the national anthem and led the graduates and audience in MSU's alma mater. Following the exercises, Joyce LeMaster of Morehead, president-elect of the MSU Alumni Association, welcomed the new graduates into the MSU family of more than 44,000 degree recipients.




