Cincinnati Reds Take To Road

The Roaring Reds have now embarked on their second swing through the East, having catapulted to fame in their long home stay.

By winning all ten of their home games, the Reds, for the first time in the memory of the oldest trooper swept an entire home stay. In their first eighteen games at home, the Reds won fifteen, for the amazing percentage of .833.

The Reds are now en route to Boston for series of three games with Casey Stengel's fighting Reds, starting Thursday. On Sunday they shift to New York to meet the Giants in a three-game em-broglio at the Polo Grounds.

The Reds play in Philadelphia on June 7, and on June 8 they meet the Phils in a night game. This will be the first night game ever played by the Reds in Philadelphia.

The tour will conclude at Brooklyn, where the Reds are scheduled to meet the Dodgers in three games, with a double-header on Sunday, June 11.

Baseball celebrates its 100th anniversary on June 12, and Johnny Vander Meer and Ernie Lombardi have been selected to represent the Reds at Cooperstown, N. Y. where the game was born.

Returning to their native soil on June 14, the Reds will meet the Phils in a ladies' day game at Crosley Field. On June 15 the Reds and Phils will tangle in the first night game of the season at Crosley Field. Mail reservations for this game are now being accepted at the Redleg office.

Democratic Candidate For Governor, Will Speak At Morgantown, June 3. Choosing his native county, John Brown, candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, will open his speaking campaign at Morgantown, Union County, Saturday, June 3. It was announced by his Headquarters in the Seelbach Westmays. The address will be broadcast over WHAS, Louisville from 2 to 3 o'clock and will be preceded by motorades, the announcement stated.

He returns seeking the Governorship with a brilliant record as a lawyer, legislator and champion of the rights of all people.

and Political Science Department at Morehead, in order to serve as the Director of Public Assistance in Kentucky. During this period he has had the responsibility of administering the distribution of approximately twelve million dollars to Old Age Assistance recipients over the entire state. His work as Director of this Social Security program has been highly complimented by both state and federal officials.

Dr. Lloyd stated that, while he would not announce his coming to a platform until later, he is in a position to state definitely that he will advocate the following:

1. That above all things the State Department of Education should be the servant of the Public School system instead of the schools being the servants of the State Department of Education. Under his leadership the Education Department will become a professional department in the State Government.
  2. He proposes, when elected, to sit down with the next Governor and discuss the school program and work out in cooperation with the Governor the very best type of educational program needed to advance the cause of education in Kentucky. He is particularly interested in providing more adequate salaries, greater security of tenure, and a practical retirement system for the school teachers of the state.
  3. He favors an equalization fund based upon the principle of need. He added that he would favor whatever provisions were necessary to make such an equalization fund legal under the State Constitution, but under no condition would he favor a system that would penalize the better schools. Dr. Lloyd said that this was not necessary to provide aid for the poorer school systems.
  4. He favors voluntary consolidation where that will improve the efficiency of the school system and opposes forced consolidation from the State Department of Education. He stated that under his leadership the Department of Education would encourage the transportation of school children in their respective communities where road conditions and community spirit were favorable to it. He stated that he would encourage the Department of Education to cooperate more fully with District and State Educational Associations, both white and negro, in the interest of a state-wide educational program. He also pledged cooperation with private and public colleges through out the state.
  5. He pledged himself to encourage and cooperate with the Parent-Teacher Associations over the State in the splendid work which they are doing.
  6. He stated that, under his leadership, the Department of Education would cooperate and help in every way possible the fine educational programs sponsored by the American Legion and the Legion's Womans Auxiliary.
- Dr. Lloyd is, as stated before a citizen of Morehead and Rowan county, having cast his first vote in this city and never having cast a vote elsewhere. He is well and favorably known in this entire section.
