 err ewes. They are deep, long bodied, and in good condition. They are the type that will produce good lambs and wool. They are three years old, having had two lambs.

(b) Breeding.
 I will have my sheep on good pasture three weeks before breeding time. If the pasture is short, I will feed them some grain. I will let the ram run with the sheep at night. During the day he will be kept up and fed grain.

(c) Feeding and Care of bred ewes.
 1. I will see that ewes maintain good flesh during pregnancy. I will feed and care for them in order to have them gain fifteen to twenty pounds of flesh during pregnancy. I will feed impediza hay and grain, starting feeding hay about December 15. I will start feeding corn about fifteen days before lambing time. I will feed at the rate of two pounds of hay per day and one-half pound of corn.

(d) Saving the lambs.
 1. I will bring the ewes to the barn about fifteen days before lambing time. I will be on hand during lambing time to aid the ewes in lambing if necessary. I will have the lambing quarters clean and well bedded. I will see that the lambs nurse soon after birth and care for the lamb and ewe in any way needed.

(e) Housing.
 1. I will keep the sheep in the stock barn. It is roomy and comfortable for ten sheep. During fair weather they will be kept in the field across from the barn, south of the barn.

(f) Feeding and Care for Ewe and Lambs.
 1. After lambing, the grain will be increased to one pound per day. I will feed the ewe twenty-one pounds of hay per day until grass comes. When weather is suitable the lambs and ewes will be put on the pasture.
 (g) Docking and Castrating:
 If the lambs are in good condition, I will dock and castrate at ten days old. All lambs will be docked and rams castrated; I will

(b) Shearing and Caring for Wool: 1. I have power shears to shear my sheep with. Shearing will be done after a few more days have passed and the yolk has come out in the wool...

(1) Controlling parasites and diseases: 1. The pasture where the sheep are kept has never had sheep on it. I will watch the sheep closely and determine ailments as soon as they occur...

(2) Providing Pasture: 1. The sheep will be grazed on ten acres of pasture seeded with Red Top and Orchard Grass. For winter pasture, I will sow rye for pasture...

(3) Marketing: 1. The lambs will be marketed at the Morehead Stockyards about the first of June. The wool will be sent to Louisville. Curt Hutchinson will haul my lambs to market...
