In 1940, seventy-five Rowan County children were examined and advised and forty-six of these cases received treatment by the Crippled Children Society. Only one county in this district had more cases receiving treatment than Rowan County.  
A series of radio programs will be presented to tell the story of Kentucky's work for crippled children. The series, entitled, "Captain Pluck" will be presented on all Kentucky radio stations, including WHAS on Saturdays at 7:30 A. M., and WAVE on Tuesdays at 2:15 P. M.  
The Captain Pluck series, based on true stories of young Kentucky cripples, was written by Mrs. Virginia Shirley, and produced under the direction of Mrs. G. Moss Patterson, through the courtesy of the University of Kentucky Radio Station, Lexington.

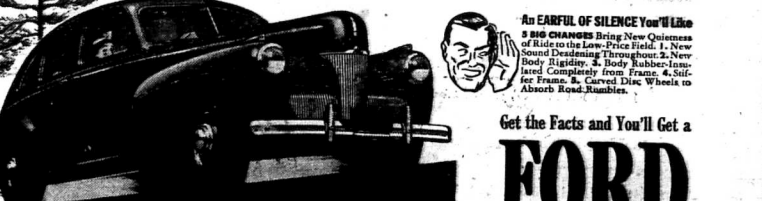
