Chaney Outlines Procedure Of Social Security

Not Necessary To Have School Certificate

It is not necessary to have a school certificate, showing that a boy or girl is of legal working age in order to obtain a social security number. This statement is made by Mr. J. A. Chaney, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Ashland, Ky. Commenting on this subject he said: "Any boy or girl who has an opportunity to get a job during the vacation period may obtain a social security account number by calling at or writing to our office. No proof of age is necessary as social security numbers are issued to persons of all ages who have use for these cards. Employers should remember, however, that the fact a boy or girl has a social security number is no proof of the holder of this card is old enough to comply with provisions of child labor statutes covering the employment of minors."

Jury Gives Postion 15 Years In Pen

Robert Under Bond Postion in Motion For Another Jury Trial

John Postion, 40, of Farmers, father of eight children, convicted of Peckham rape Mrs. Rebecca Vest on the 7th year old mid-wife and sentenced to serve 15 years in the reformatory was released under \$10,000 bond Monday by Judge D. B. Caudill after his attorney, Lester Jones, had filed motion and grounds for a new trial.

Judge Caudill decided to consider the motion following the evidence taken in the trial of Roll Conn, 29, a companion of Postion's at the time the alleged crime occurred. Conn was acquitted by a jury on a charge of detaining Rosa Lee Gibson, 12, who made her home at Mrs. Vest's.

Mrs. Vest swore that at 2:30 a. m. on Sunday, June 18, Postion and Conn came to her home at Farmers, that Postion, giving his name as John Middleton, said that his wife was confined, needed medical attention and asked Mrs. Vest to attend her. The aged lady said that between her house and the highway 60 Postion threw her to the ground, committed the crime of which he was accused and that it was necessary for her to crawl back through the mud and a heavy rainstorm to her home.

Postion, denied the charge, stating that Mrs. Vest's husband slipped and fell and he helped her up and Mrs. Vest was angry when she started yelling for help.

Examination For Postmaster At Clearfield Called

Will Be Conducted Under Civil Service

An open competitive examination for postmaster at Clearfield is now being advertised by the United States Civil Service Commission. The examination was called because Matt Bowne, the present postmaster, recently resigned after being given a life tenure in office.

Applicants will have until July 11 to file with the commission. Entrance blanks may be secured at the Clearfield office or by writing the Civil Service Commission at Washington. The office pays \$1200 annually.

Under the act passed by Congress last year placing postoffices of the first, second and third classes under civil service, the successful applicant will be given a life tenure.

Applicants must have actually resided within the delivery of the Clearfield office for at least one year prior to July 11. They must have passed their 21st birthday and must not be older than 63.

Platform Collapses Following Johnson Speech; Local People Recovering

Mrs. Allie W. Young and Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Nickell, all of Morehead, sustained injuries and suffered sustained bruises, suffered shock at Shelbyville Saturday when the speakers platform at the Keen Johnson for Governor rally collapsed.

The crash of the platform occurred shortly after Lieutenant Governor Johnson had delivered an address opening his gubernatorial campaign. Spectators said that the center portion collapsed as many well wishers mounted to congratulate Johnson.

Governor Chandler had just stepped off the platform at the time. Dan Talbott, one of Kentucky's leading political figures, was one of those most seriously injured. He sustained a broken leg and possibly internal injuries.

Fifty were treated at the Shelbyville hospital, including Mrs. Young and Mr. and Mrs. Nickell, while hundreds of others received first aid on the site.

The three Morehead persons were released Saturday night and have practically recovered.

Group Returns From Camp Meeting

Twentyone representatives from the Church of God, headed by Pastor T. F. Lyons, returned home Sunday after attending the mammoth camp meeting at Anderson, Ind.

City Loses In Paving Procedure

Cost Held Drew Evans Lost More Than Cost Of Payment

The city of Morehead lost approximately \$300, plus interest for 10 years, in another street paving trial before Special Judge J. B. Hannah here Monday.

The case was against Drew Evans and was for \$577, plus interest, on paving in front of a lot owned by Evans between the Citizens Bank Building and the Bruce building. The court held that the lot in 1929 with street paving improvement, was not worth more than \$500. Under a recent ruling of the Court of Appeals Evans will be required to pay only one half of this amount or \$275.

Many other street paving cases are on the docket, but just what others will be tried is not known.

In the Evans case both sides waived a jury verdict and Judge Hannah fixed the value, although a jury heard the evidence.

Judge Jack Kauffman of Lancaster is due here today to serve as a special judge. A panel of jurors for the remainder of the term has already been summoned.

The court today was trying Mrs. Flora Hicks and others charged with maintaining a common nuisance.

Later—the jury returned a verdict of not guilty in both the Hicks and Proctor cases.

The entire case was so obviously a political frame up, according to Attorney Johnson, that it was clear that considerable resentment had developed among the citizens. It was no however a BrownHoods political frame up, as Mr. Wilson and Mrs. Ford had always been a friend of both Mr. Wilson and Mrs. Ford.

Cap Proctor, Dick Clay Battle To Draw

Former County Attorney Says He Was Justified In Hitting Official

Former County Attorney Wm. Proctor yesterday filed a motion for a new trial before Circuit Judge D. B. Caudill, setting out five allegations, reasons why he should be granted a new trial.

One of the reasons assigned by Proctor why a new trial should be granted was that "there was a violation of the law by the sheriff on the deeply upholstered par of the anatomy of said Clay which cushioned and prevented any man appearing therefrom—set out the five reasons as follows: Proctor why he should be given a trial were as follows: 1. Because he was tried on an affidavit before the grand jury in which he stated the present term of court and over his objection on the same day allowing three days to intervene, and the judgement for that reason is void.

"2. Because it was not supported by sufficient, or any, evidence."

But Court Holds Proctor At Fault As Fists Fly In Courtroom

Proctor sustained a slight cut on his nose and a few scratches, while Clay came out of the fray with a small bruise or two. Commonwealth Attorney W. C. Hamilton, Sheriff Ben McBrayer and others separated them.

Immediately after the fight Judge D. B. Caudill placed both men under bond to answer any charge that might be brought against them by the grand jury.

Sheriff Ben McBrayer made an affidavit before the grand jury in which he stated that the trouble started when Proctor asked Judge Caudill when the case of Flora Hicks v. Proctor was to be tried, stating that 40 witnesses had been summoned that day for (Continued On Page Two)

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Written Each Week By H. H. ALLEN
Pastor Of The Baptist Church

Subject: SOLOMON: A RULER WHO BEGAN WELL 1 Kings 3:15

Golden Text: "Give therefore thy servant and understanding heart—that I may discern between good and evil." 1 Kings 3:9

This quarter we are going to study life as revealed in some important characters of the Old Testament. This week we begin with the study of Solomon, especially his choice in the beginning of his reign.

Adonijah, David's oldest living son, had planned to get the throne since his father was declining in age and health. When David learned of this plan, he immediately had Solomon crowned king, and humbled Adonijah to obedience.

The outstanding feature of Solomon's early days was his remarkable prayer for wisdom. His prayer was answered and so during a reign of forty years he attained prominence in four respects; as a scholar, for he was an expert scientist and man of letters; as a builder, for he erected the great temple; the palace, and many strong fortifications throughout the country; as a business man, for his fleets and caravans brought him wealth and treasure from the ends of the earth; and as an international figure, for his alliances with Tyre and Egypt and other nations brought him into place as an influential world figure.

This Solomon became the wisest man of his age and of all ages because in early life he sought wisdom as the highest goal and main essential to usefulness.

Read the text of the Bible indicated above. It tells how God appeared unto Solomon and told him to name what he desired more than anything else. Solomon's prayer requested wisdom to rule the people. It is hard to think of a man of politics these days turning to God for wisdom to direct the people who have elected him. Rather they turn to the leaders of their party and the political leaders who put them in office, and divide up the privileges of their office to the financial and political advantage of their "friends." They don't want any advice from God, for God would tell them to fire off some of their political dead-beats and appoint men of character and purpose to carry on the government. Then these men would turn against their leader and elect somebody else next time.

The government of Israel was supposedly under God's direction, and it was in order that a king should seek God's wisdom. But even then it was unusual for God to turn down political advantages, money, power, and everything else

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to ask for wisdom. If we had some rulers in our world of nations today there might be no thundering of war. More than anything else in this world we need wisdom today we need men who seek God's ways.

Righteousness exalteth a nation, says God. Anything else will drag it down. True we need not more money, not more soldiers, not more politics, not more power, but more righteousness. Everything else would come to a nation, just as it has come to Solomon, if we would seek righteousness. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you."

The man who votes for unrighteousness is just as guilty as those who perpetrate it. We are all parties to it. We are all guilty. We are all those who will permit and promote it. Money is our goal, not wisdom. We don't want government, we want gold. So, we vote where we can get the most.

No nation like that can expect blessings from God.

Mort May Announces For Representative

TO THE VOTERS OF ROWAN COUNTY: After many solicitations by the voters of Rowan and Bath counties, I have decided to enter the race for Representative from the Bath-Rowan District. I feel that I do not need any introduction to the voters of Rowan County, having had the pleasure of serving as your sheriff from 1934 to 1938. And I deeply appreciate the honor you have here-to-fore shown me. And upon entering this race, I do so with but one aim, and that is, that I may be of some aid, and to the people of the District. Up to now we do not have a candidate for either the house or the Senate running from Rowan County, and realizing that the future welfare of the county and this degree upon the success of our Teachers College. I feel that Rowan County should have at least one member of the Legislature to see that this school has an opportunity to carry on, at least on a level with the other Teachers Colleges of the State, and to that end I hereby pledge my whole heart and efforts. For the past few years the Automobile Drivers License Law, has been used as a revenue measure only. Should you elect me to serve you in the Legislature I shall support a bill allowing all members of an immediate family the right to drive the family car on one drivers license, and thereby eliminating the necessity of each member of the

family purchasing a drivers license in order to drive the family car. For the various candidates for the legislature to campaign on a \$20 per month payment of old age pension, and then forget the pledge immediately, has been a popular pastime recently. But I hereby pledge myself to vote for a \$30 per month pension to all who deserve old age assistance. And also to blind persons and widows and mothers with dependent children to conform with the Federal Law. And to support the Federal Government see fit to raise from \$15 to \$20 their grant to the States. I shall vote to have the State match this amount with a dollar same, which would make the pension \$30 per month. I will vote at all times for any legislation helpful to the farmers and laboring man, and will be glad to have any suggestions from either group, as to just what laws they deem to be most helpful to them.

Being an ex-soldier myself, I would naturally favor any legislation which would in any way benefit the ex-serviceman.

Just before we needed revenue to meet these obligations with the present state income, and the proper administration of State funds, there should be sufficient revenue. But should it be necessary to raise more, we could, and should raise the present production tax on liquor. At present in this State we are producing millions of gallons of whiskey annually, and most of the distilling business in the State is owned and operated by the New York Corporation. Only the revenue the State realizes from this source is 5 cents per gallon, or just a fraction of 1/2 cent per gallon. New York Corporation pays 13 cents per pint on the whiskey consumed in the state, but on the tens of thousands of gallons shipped out each year only receives 1/2 cent per gallon. With 5 cent per gallon whiskey tax, we would have adequate revenue to pay the maximum old age pension, raise the present rate to \$15 per month, pay the teachers retirement fund, and yet not be taxing a man, woman or child in the State.

With this platform before you, I leave my case to your good judgment. And assure you that anything you may say or do in my behalf will be highly appreciated.

(Continued From Page One) "3. Because it is against the law and in violation of the Constitutional rights of the defendant. 4. Because the indictment herein charged a breach of the peace, which the Judge of the court did not witness and consisted merely of an exchange of a few weak blows between the defendant and the County Attorney, Hon. Richard M. Clay, and there was provocation for those struck by the defendant

on a deeply upheld part of the anatomy of said Clay, which cushioned and prevented any marks appearing thereon and, if any pain resulted, it may have resulted in a realization that there is a moral responsibility in the discharge of official duties and that moral turpitude follows an individual in office. "5. Because the court refused to give defendant a jury trial heretofore, after it had been demanded and the punishment inflicted by the Court by fine amounting to \$25 was excessive and unreasonable as compared with that inflicted on Denzil Foster during this term of Court, which was one cent, is a gross discrimination against the defendant. The Denzil Foster jury referred to in the motion was tried by jury at this term of court, charged with knocking Proctor down on Main Street some weeks ago. Proctor was fined one cent and costs in that case.

Judge Caudill has not acted on Proctor's motion, but closed Thursday afternoon Judge Caudill, who is a brother-in-law of Proctor's issued a bench warrant for Sheriff McBrayer reported back to the court that Proctor said he couldn't come to court as his back was wrenched and he was sick.

"Bring him in, even if you have to carry him," Caudill ordered the Sheriff.

Appearing before the court a few minutes later, Judge Caudill told Proctor that he was fined \$25.

Proctor objected to the fine, declaring that he stood upon his constitutional rights and demanded a jury trial.

"This is a fine for contempt of court," Judge Caudill said. "You can either pay or go to jail."

Proctor refused to indicate of paying the fine and Judge Caudill ordered the jailer to place him in

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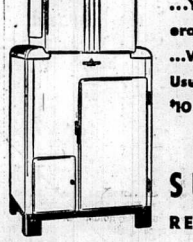

1. ALL-BAY—round trip on any Chesapeake and Ohio train, at special low Pullman or coach fare. This "Travel Package" includes 3 night accommodations at hotel of your choice in New York and two souvenir admission tickets to World's Fair.
