



College Players Friday Night Magee, Now Math Instructor, Begins Duties At Morehead For Spring Term

Graduate Of University
And Outstanding Student

Professor Frank M. Magee, graduate of the University of Kentucky, began his duties last week as a mathematics instructor at Morehead.

Mr. Magee, an outstanding student at Kentucky, transferred his major to the fields of mathematics and physics. He attained the distinction of Phi Beta Kappa membership for his college career. After receiving a degree of science in 1938 he was offered an assistantship on the university faculty.

Mr. Magee was also admitted to Phi Mu Epsilon, honorary mathematics society, and has read three papers before that group. He received credit for his work at the University of Kentucky under Dr. C. F. Cronen, prominent Kentucky science instructor.

A native of Kentucky, Prof. Magee spent his early years in Covington and then moved for three years to North Carolina, where he attended the University of North Carolina. He graduated from Henry Clay high school at this time and then went to enter the university. At Morehead, the new professor said, "it's a nice friendly place—the people are easy to get along with." He commended the faculty and the Morehead science hall, adding that he was further on his way to the new building at Kentucky and that it is recognized as such by the American University science professors.
