State Income Tax Blanks Available At Clerk's Office

April 15th Is Deadline For Filing Returns
A limited supply of State Income Tax Return blanks and Farm Schedules for 1940 has been to county court clerks, the Department of Revenue announced today. It was suggested that persons required to file returns who had not obtained the necessary blanks might receive them at the county court clerks' office. It was pointed out that single persons having a gross income of \$1,500 or a net income of \$1,000 and married persons having a gross income of \$3,000 or a net income of \$2,500 are required to file state income tax returns by April 15th.

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State Employment Service To Begin Skill Inventory



All British Women Are Included In Labor Draft

Labor Minister Ernest Bevin, who holds almost absolute power over the lives of Britain's working men and women, declared today that registration of women for the labor draft would apply equally to drawing rooms and laundry rooms.

The only exemptions, the bulky, dynamic labor minister told a press conference, will be for girls already serving as auxiliaries in the armed auxiliaries and nursing services.

He announced by radio Sunday that April 5 had been set for the nation's first registration of civilians for war industry. Men 41 and 42 years old who are not employed in certain industries will be the first called, he said.

The national registration of women, he also announced, will begin April 19. Girls 20 years old will be the first group called and 21-year-olds will be enrolled soon after.

43,000 Ky. 4-Hers Will Again Join In Conservation Work

Assisted By League Of Ky. Sportsmen And U. Of Ky. Dept. Of Agriculture

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

State Department Of Revenue Nabs Nine Moonshine Stills

Nine moonshine stills, with a total daily capacity of 380 gallons, were found and destroyed by the State Department of Revenue field representatives during February, it was announced by Dist. Spirits Administrator, George T. Stewart.

"These stills represented a potential tax loss to the State of a little over \$100 per day," Stewart said. In addition, field men destroyed 119 gallons of moonshine, 1625 gallons of mash, and 55 gallons of "doggings" retrieved from empty barrels from distilleries.

Confiscation of whiskey which was either unstamped or illegally possessed amounted to 260 cases. Stewart pointed out that such whiskey would be sold for over

\$2,500 to Kentucky wholesalers and rectifiers under sealed bids.

7,500,000 Chicks To Be Raised In Kentucky In 1941

More than seven and one-half million chicks will be produced in Kentucky this season under the supervision of the Kentucky Poultry Improvement Association and the National Poultry Improvement plan. For the most part they will be Kentucky U. S. approved pullover-tested chicks. More than seventy percent of chicks raised each year are hatched in incubators rather than under hens, according to J. E. Humphrey of the College of Agriculture of the University of Kentucky. A list of Kentucky hatcheries may be had by writing to the college at Lexington. It is considered good business to buy chicks near home, so they will not be shipped long distances.



British And Axis Editors Interpret Roosevelt Speech

To both British and Axis editors President Roosevelt's Saturday night broadcast means that the United States is in the war. The British cheered his exhortation to Americans to give unstintingly to "all-out aid" to nations fighting aggressors. Axis powers denounced it and warned of repercussions. From the Axis press came such expressions as "plainly it is now a World War" and from the British, "here is the final pledge America is in this war with us." These were comments from Axis capitals.

Berlin—"President Roosevelt, said the well-posted Deutsche Diplomatische-Politische Korrespondenz, "has not the courage to say openly what he actually wants. He conceals aggressive and offensive intentions by the pretext of protecting democracies against dictators x x x x (He) is not so much concerned about 'the security of the democratic system' as for satisfying his own lust for power. He designates his nation today as the arbiter of democracy, but he obviously means a dictatorship of the whole world."

Tokyo—"By alarmist oratory employed with force and flower," contended the foreign office-controlled Times, the President "disclosed an attempt to unite under one banner all democracies. Plainly it is now a world war of the totalitarian nations with the Axis on one side and the democratic totalitarianism on the other."

London—"The London News-Chronicle said the speech indicated 'America is all out to win. In a technical sense she still is not in the war, but in every real sense she is in it up to the hilt.' The London Daily Mail commented 'here is the final pledge America is in this war with us.' Elsewhere around the world there were these comments: The Greek radio said Roosevelt's words 'officially and irrevocably signed the death warrant of the (new) order.' 'America has entered the war,' declared the Turkish newspaper, Yurt Sahabi. 'Her decision will save humanity. There can be only one end of Germany' and that is to be trodden over."

Symphonic Choir From Ohio State To Be At MSTC Mar. 25

Organization Rated High In Music Circles

Few college musical groups are so well known nationally as the Ohio State University Symphonic Choir which comes to Morehead for a concert on Tuesday, March 25. This choir, directed by Professor Louis H. Kiercka, came into national prominence in the Spring of 1938. It had already been delighting Ohio musical groups by its unusual performances. In 1938 the Columbia Broadcasting System announced its "Choral Quest," a search for choirs of unusual merit. Ohio State's Symphonic Choir was invited to compete, along with twenty-nine other choral societies of the United States. The Ohio State Broadcast of thirty minutes over the Columbia System was on April 1—but it was no "April Fool's Day" for the Buckeye singers. After all of the choirs had been heard and recordings studied carefully by the judges, the Ohio State group was voted unanimously the best of all. The judges were all well known musical authorities—Deems Taylor, Frederick Schang, and Davidson Taylor, all of Columbia Broadcasting System, and John Finley Williamson, director of the Westminster Choir School. The immediate award was a silver cup and a recognition broadcast. But the following year Columbia invited the Symphonic Choir on a trip through five states, with public concerts in the CBS Theatre on Broadway, at Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va., and at the Westminster Choir School, Princeton, New Jersey. Another result was that the following year Ohio State's department of music was invited to give a series of five one-hour broadcasts over the coast-to-coast Columbia network.

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

Ordinance

An ordinance levying a tax on trucks delivering soft drinks and beer in the City of Morehead and the Revenue to be derived from this tax to be placed in the General Fund of the City of Morehead for the purpose of defraying the General Governmental expenses of said City.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY:

First: That any person, persons, firms or corporation delivering beer or soft drinks within the City of Morehead shall first procure a license from the City Clerk and pay a fee of \$25.00 for any truck delivering beer in said City.

Second: That any truck delivering beer and soft drinks within the City, in addition to procuring a license, shall also be required to deliver the same shall procure a license authorizing him to deliver soft drinks within said city for which a contract shall be made by the license to deliver beer of \$25.00.

Third: Any person, persons, firms or corporation engaging in the business of delivering beer or beer and soft drinks in said city shall first procure a license and any truck failing to do so shall be fined the sum of \$25.00, a n d each delivery of same shall be considered a separate offense.

All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

It is now ordered that said ordinance be repealed and the following ordinance be enacted: WHEREAS, Be it enacted by the City Council of Morehead, Kentucky:

First: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to bid, trade or exhibit horses or any other livestock on the streets of the City of Morehead except on Rowan Street on the South side of Railroad Street.

Second: Any person offending this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25.00 nor less than \$10.00.

Third: This ordinance shall take effect on and after its passage and publication.
