ties, surgical treatment and hospitalization in a special orphaned children's ward, are provided for hundreds of youngsters.

To facilitate its service to children, the Commission has divided the State into districts, each under supervision of a graduate public health nurse, who work in the case and visit crippled children in need of treatment, to promote clinics in her district, and to follow up cases after their discharge from hospitals. Ashland, Lexington and Louisville are chosen as treatment centers because of their location beside the orthopedic surgeons who treat the Commission's patients, Mrs. Rhoads explained.

 Act, or if he expects to work at a
 rate of pay lower than that which
 he has been receiving.

"If this worker does not file his
 claim until April 1 or thereafter
 he will have what is known as an
 other "elapsd quarter" without
 earnings. The months in this
 additional quarter will be figured
 in calculating his monthly check,
 with the result that the average
 monthly pay may be reduced and
 the benefits in proportion.
 "In certain cases the workers
 who reach age sixty-five and re-
 tire become eligible for State un-
 employment compensation. The
 fact that this compensation is be-
 ing paid each week from the State
 treasury should not prevent the
 worker from filing his claim for
 monthly checks under Federal old-
 age insurance. The worker will
 receive a fixed amount from the
 State, based on his benefit rights
 under unemployment compensa-
 tion. This in no way affects the
 worker's rights to his monthly
 checks from the Federal govern-
 ment old-age insurance, however,
 under State unemployment com-
 pensation laws amounts individu-
 ally receive under old-age insur-
 ance are deducted from the job in-
 surance benefits. The old-age
 insurance checks are entirely sepa-
 rate from unemployment com-
 pensation payments.

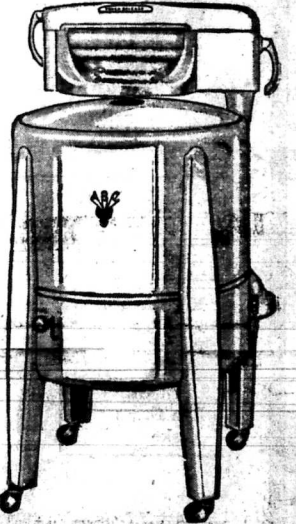
