Miss Richards and all the case workers are widely experienced in this relief work. They plan on visiting every registered applicant during the next few weeks. They will investigate thoroughly and justly every case. The purpose of course is to take absolute justice or as nearly absolute justice as is humanly possible, in every instance. In the past, it has been the experience of local workers, that numbers who are not entitled to receive anything for the sake of getting something for nothing. These people do not stop to realize, or if they do, fail to care, that they are robbing some person who actually needs help. It is the duty of such persons that the Red Cross finds it necessary to investigate every applicant carefully, as well as to relieve suffering.

Red Cross Not To Aid Everybody Who Lost Home

This is not true. Red Cross authorities stated that they will meet the needs such as repair to home, household goods only of those who are unable otherwise to help themselves. It is a good fortune if they are able to find a good self, either with cash in hand, or by means of loan and credit, they will be required to do so.

Red Cross Will Give Garden Seeds To Those Who Lost During Flood

Packages Will Be Delivered By Investigators At Time Investigation Is Made

Red Cross has made arrangements to supply flood sufferers who lost their gardens in the great flood with a supply of garden seed of various kinds, sufficient to plant a garden of from one-half acre to one-half an acre. The seed is of those varieties which will mature a crop between now and harvest time, and is calculated to furnish ample garden food to a family until harvest time and to leave a surplus for canning.

In the mad scramble following the flood, most citizens Morehead have overlooked the excellent work done by the Morehead Fire Department on the morning of the first fire which completely destroyed the City Hotel.

The fire, one of the most disastrous in the history of Morehead, completely destroyed the City Hotel and seven school buses, an estimated loss of \$75,000 to AIF Caskery. The fire when the department arrived made astonishing headway, and spectators were convinced that the entire block would go in the flames. The outstanding work of the firemen confined the blaze to the one building.

Property owners whose buildings were threatened are unanimous in their praise of the work done by the volunteer fire department under the leadership of Lon Farris.

Letter From Dept. Give Garden Information

The following letter to County Agent, Chas. L. Goff, and written variety is Pe Tsai. I doubt whether Chinese cabbage is being sold generally, but your salesmen or grocer have plenty of time to stock it, as it need not be sown until August. Mark off for the row after having chopped in chicken manure or highgrade fertilizer, the latter at the rate of one pound to 25 feet, spread over a strip about 15" wide. Teams Working Through Out County For Funds As Quota Nears End

Red Cross authorities of the Morehead Flood relief, called to the attention of the Rowan County News in an interview Monday, that it would require at least \$100,000 to finance the relief program of the American Red Cross for Kentucky. Of this sum they stated that approximately \$30,000 had been raised, leaving a balance of approximately \$70,000 yet to be donated.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUBJECT: ASA - A LIFE OF TRUST. 2 Chronicles 15:16. Golden Text: "Help us, O Lord our God; for we rest on thee" (Chron. 14:11).

We have studied the choice of Solomon for wisdom, the opportunity of Jeroboam which he refused, the unwise course of Rehoboam, son of Solomon, and the complete division of Israel from Judah making the Northern and Southern Kingdoms. Now we come to study King Asa, whose life was a true in God.

He not only wanted to do right, but "Asa did as the eyes of the Lord his God." Notice some of the things he did. Solomon and his son had led their wives come to idolatry, setting false gods before them. The high places were places on hill tops, in the open fields, and prominent places where images of gods were set up to be worshipped. Altars here and there were erected for sacrifice of these gods, and the gods of idolatry bowed before their chosen gods.

The first thing Asa did was to take away the altars of Baal, and the high places, and broke down the images and cut down the groves. Then he commanded the people of Judah (Southern) King Asa, and to be "of one heart" and to be "of one mind" in the high places and images. Then the Bible says, "the kingdom was quiet before him." When people turn to the true God there will come a quiet and a calm of peace never known from any other source. Other gods produce confusion and unrest.

Then he fortified the cities of Judah with walls, and war ended. "Because the Lord had given him rest." It must be remembered that we are continually in war or in constant fear of war. But one true God, war will cease. God is not a God of strife and fighting. "Righteousness exalteth a nation," and wherever God is worshipped and honored peace will reign. They built and repaired for nations was great fear of God and a large army. Such combination is necessary in a land where the enemy dwells. The Christian must be able within to resist evil, but pure within to good.

Such preparation of righteousness in the nation made it possible for the people to resist aggression with a heart. Here came the Ethiopians against them with a large army. Did Asa say, "We are invincible. Our army is sufficient to quail any enemy?"

No! He knew that arms were not the strength within themselves, but only as they were used for right purposes. So he called on the God whom he trusted. "Help us, O Lord our God; for we rest on thee, and in thy name go against this multitude." If we fight battles with spiritual understanding we shall never fight except for the sake of oppressed humanity. And we must be careful when we try to interpret our mottoes into war. For this reason, those who have spiritual understanding should be relied upon to interpret our cause.

Brown Gives 11 Points In His Platform

Promises Farmers Equality In Legislation Passed If He Is Elected. Outlining a constructive eleven point farm program for Kentucky, John Young Brown, candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, told an Ohio County audience at Hartford Wednesday, it would be the goal of his administration to "bring a halt in every home and in Kentucky."

Speches at Lawrenceburg, Nicholasville, Danville, Columbia, and Bowling Green, the candidate told of his endorsement by the Railroad Brotherhoods of Kentucky, and the support of J. Gallagher, Legislative Representative of the Brotherhoods. In the letter, Mr. Galagher stated the Brotherhoods were supporting Mr. Brown because of his "excellent record as a member and Speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives and as a member of the U. S. Congress."

URGES BETTER USES OF PASTURE AND HAY

Pasture is Kentucky's lowest cost and most valuable feed, says the farm economics department of the State College of Agriculture. If pasture and hay crops are well managed, sheep and cattle make profitable gains with small amounts of grain. A plea is made not to over-crop, to mow small grain nurse crops to prevent the land, and to rotate pastures. Pastured small grain prevents leaching and erosion and provides pasture.

Next to pasture, hay is Kentucky's most important forage. It is cheaper to provide shelter for hay than it is to bale it or leave it out in stacks or ricks. Saving of feed and sheltered fodder is emphasized. The man labor required for cutting, shocking and haying amounts to about 10 hours per acre. The cost of haying returns for the 10 hours of extra labor it is declared. A study which the Kentucky experiment Station made of raising beef calves showed that the most successful farmers-kept feed cost low by more fully utilizing pastures and cow-grass roughage. In determining the cost of raising calves to weaning age, it was found that the cost of feeding the cow was 76 per cent of the total cost of the calf, in the Bluegrass region, and 71 of the gross cost in Union county.

jus. Both of these are hardly enough to permit harvest up until Thanksgiving, and the roots will persist. I would suggest making a sowing in the last week of July, and another one two weeks later, and another one two weeks after that so as to be sure to hit. The seed of each of these can be sown separately, or in a mixture, and to this mixture I would add table turnips, Purple Top Glob, about one third of each. Sow broadcast, it will take four pounds of this manure for an acre; 1 ounce to 200 feet of row.

Your people may also sow lettuce,

August 1 and continuing until
September 15, easily. The same is true of radishes. Of these they might use the radishes of the Chinese type, rose or white colored. These radishes become quite large and can be held over in the rows they grow by mounding up with tree leaves, or they may be stored in the same manner used for table turnips.

You see this list is not a complete
one, but such things as tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant take more than it appears from the calendar we have.

This is an all-weather raising
crop of almost any variety that is grown, planted no later than July 25, but such varieties as Early Adams and possibly Hickory King can be held over in the rows 10, with more than an even chance of success.

"That completes the list. I hope
it will help your people to make at least partial recovery.
