## Heart Attack Fatal To H. L. Roberts, 62

### Funeral Services Held Wednesday At Church Of God In Morehead

Hiram Lee Roberts, 62, succumbed Tuesday afternoon, April 22, to a fatal heart attack at the Johnson Boarding House on Carey Avenue.

He had served for the past two years as Chief of Police of the City of Morehead. He had been on the City Police force for the past five years, and had served as Sheriff of Rowan County from 1922 to 1926.

He was born and reared in Rowan County, the son of Isaac and Mary Roberts, and was well known throughout this section of the State.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Ellie Roberts, five months ago. He is survived by one brother, Frank Roberts, of Frankfort, Kentucky; one half-brother, Chester Roberts of Frankfort; two children, Mrs. Howard Goodman of Morehead and Glenmore Roberts of Winchester, Ohio, and a host of friends and relatives.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 p. m. at the Church of God; the Reverend Abel Tackett officiating, assisted by the Reverend T. F. Lyons, pastor of the Church of God. Interment followed in the Brown Cemetery with the Masonic Lodge 654 of Morehead in charge of services at the grave.

## Eagle Nine Will Open Six Game Season Saturday

The Morehead Eagle baseball team will open their six-game season at Payne Memorial Stadium Saturday at two o'clock with the starting line-up as much a mystery to Coaches Ellis Johnson and Len Miller as the final outcome of the season in the Greater East Division.

\$3,300,000 Federal Aid Obtained For Conservation Work

Kentucky Allotted \$50,125 Since 1937

Forty-four states throughout the country have received more than \$3,300,000 from the Federal Government in the last three years for the wildlife-restoration projects designed to benefit the States' resident and migratory birds and mammals, according to information received by S. A. Wakefield, Director of the Kentucky Division of Game and Fish from Walter A. Gresh, Regional Inspector, Fish and Wildlife Service, United States Department of the Interior, in Washington, D. C.

Kentucky has been allotted a total of \$50,125.78 since Congress passed the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act in 1937. But due to lack of sufficient funds which are available for the Division of Game and Fish the money set up by the Pittman-Robertson Act for Kentucky has not been completely matched and henceforth Kentucky has been unable to fully benefit from the federal assistance, Wakefield pointed out.

Under the Federal Aid Program, the State pays twenty-five percent of the cost of wildlife restoration projects and the Federal Government seventy-five percent. Wakefield said. He added that the Federal government does not request the projects, since under the wildlife restoration set that is the responsibility of the Game and Fish Department.

"Each state decides what work is most needed to meet its conservation problems," he said. "and the Fish and Wildlife Service looks over the proposed work to see that it is a valid project under the Act. Congress that set up the program and that the costs for the accomplishment of planned work are reasonable." When the Service approves a project, the state hires its own personnel and does its own work. All lands acquired, structures erected, and equipment purchased become the property of the state.

Appointments are made on the basis of the number of licensed hunters and the acreage of the state. Projects fall into one of three categories: Land acquisition, to purchase lands to be used for refuges or game management areas; development work on established wildlife areas; and research designed to obtain factual information about wildlife to insure better administration of this resource.

Of the seven Federal Aid projects approved for Kentucky, three were for land-acquisition, and four were development projects. (Continued On Page Six)

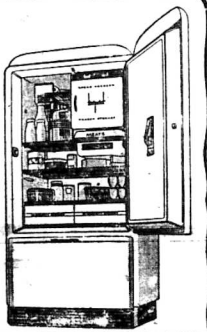

Although the states have known what should be done to protect their wildlife populations, lack of money prevented them from doing necessary work.  
"Now the states have financial assistance," he continued, "and, as always, have the benefit of the advice of the Fish and Wildlife Service, which has spent more than half a century gathering knowledge on all phases of wildlife management."

Section III. That it shall be unlawful to repair any wood structure that has deteriorated more than fifty percent that now standing within the limits of this prescribed zone.  
Section IV. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to make repairs on any wood structure that is now standing or erected within the above prescribed fire zone, the cost of which repair exceeds the sum of \$100.00 exclusive of painting and decorating.  
Section V. That it shall be the duty of any person, persons, firm or corporation, before the erection of any building anywhere within the corporate limits of the County of Morehead, to first secure a permit from the City Council and before any such permit shall be issued by said officer, who is authorized to issue same, that the person, persons, firm or corporation proposing to erect such building, shall file with the City Council a statement, in writing, containing a brief description of said building, giving the height and dimensions as well as the material of which it proposes to erect said building.  
Section VI. Any person, partnership of any person, persons, firm or corporation liable of any violation or sections of this ordinance, shall be found guilty of any violation or sections of this ordinance, or who shall obstruct or disobey any officer in the discharge of his duty imposed by this ordinance on any day or days shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$25.00 for each offense, and each twenty-four hours of maintenance of prohibited condition or persistence in prohibited conduct, shall be and constitute a separate offense.  
Section VII. The provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any of its provisions or any penalty provided by this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid such provision or the particular penalty held to be invalid, shall be rejected without affecting the remainder of the ordinance or such part of the penalties as are not held to be invalid, and the decisions of the courts shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this ordinance or any of the other penalties anywhere in this ordinance provided.

ORDINANCE  
An ordinance prescribing the type of building that may be hereafter constructed on certain streets and regulating the nature of building permits, and providing penalties for violating any of the provisions of said ordinance.  
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Morehead, Rowan County, Kentucky:  
That hereafter all construction of new buildings within the following described territory:  
Of the City of Morehead, Rowan County, Kentucky, beginning at the intersection of Bridge Street with Main Street on the East side of said Bridge Street and extending Westward with the Main Street to Hargis Avenue. The territory included being 125 feet south of said Main Street which territory extends between the two intersections above mentioned, that is, Bridge Street and Hargis Avenue to be included in this territory the North side of Main Street, extending from Hargis Avenue to a point on the East just opposite the West side of Bridge Street, at its intersection with Main Street. This territory shall include a strip five feet in depth extending from the aforesaid point on Main Street opposite Bridge Street to Hargis Avenue.  
Shall be either brick, stone or concrete, or other fire proof material to be approved by the City Council, and no construction of any building structure on premises shall be lawful within the boundary above described except such as may be authorized by this ordinance.  
Section II. The above ordinance applies to buildings that border on the streets and no building shall be erected anywhere within the above blocks of any material except as above stated which con-

The War Department announced seniors in accredited medical schools would be given an opportunity to obtain commissions as first lieutenants in the Medical Corps Reserve. The Department also announced that 2,300 enlisted men would be trained each month for Reserve officers' commissions.  
The Navy, expecting to bring its strength to 532,000 men by 1947, announced recruiting in special ratings by the Naval Reserve of qualified cable company employees, seamen, signalmen, radiomen, machinist mates, aviation mechanics and electricians.

**Air Raid Spotters**  
War Department announced plans to enroll between 500,000

and 600,000 civilian volunteers to cooperate with the Army in a nation-wide network to warn against air attack. Groups such as the American Legion, its women's auxiliaries, the Coast Guard, forest fire wardens, weather observers, and the CCC, will be included in the network, the Department said.

**Selective Service**  
Selective Service Headquarters announced a program calling for the physical standards of the Army and the correction of defects by local dentists and physicians before the registrants are called to service. The program will be guided by the SS Medical Advisory Council and an appropriate committee in each State.

Headquarters also announced that all information concerning registrants, except that which the regulations specifically define as confidential, is a matter of public record open to anyone making a legitimate inquiry.

Federal Security Administrator McNutt, coordinator of health and welfare activities announced the United Service Organizations are planning to set up 239 service club facilities in crowded defense areas. Quarters for the clubs will be provided by the Federal Government. Operation will be financed through voluntary contributions, with \$10,765,000 to be sought for the first year, Mr. McNutt said.

The USO, representing national, religious and welfare organizations, will attempt to tie together the services of existing organizations, Mr. McNutt said. "Its purpose is to meet leisure-time needs of men in our armed forces and in defense industries," President Roosevelt said. "... cannot emphasize too strongly my conviction that this work... is of utmost importance."

**Lease-Lend Activities**  
The President named Harry Hopkins to supervise all purchases under the Lease-Lend program. The President announced that machinery for aiding China is in existence and a list of China's needs are being studied.  
Mr. McNutt said. "The U. S. Secretary Knox told his press conference the Navy is giving Great Britain war materials 'almost daily' from U. S. supplies on hand. He also said British warships in need of repair would be arriving in American shipyards in increasing number. U. S. Maritime Commission announced transfer to the British of four American cargo ships, first to be loaned under the Lease-Lend Act."

urged farmers to increase egg production during the next fifteen months by about 6 percent and announced a program for increasing tomato production for canning by fifty percent. Both moves, the Department said, are to assure ample food supplies for the United States and Great Britain, to meet probable demands under the Lease-Lend Act and for distribution by the Red Cross, for school lunches, and relief.

**Free Speech**  
President Roosevelt told the American Society of Newspaper Editors, in a letter read at their annual meeting in Washington, that there would be no Government control of news, except that involving vital military information.

The President said that so far as he was concerned free speech will remain in the undisputed possession of publishers and editors, of reporters and Washington correspondents, magazines, motion pictures, and of the radio, "for that is where it belongs."

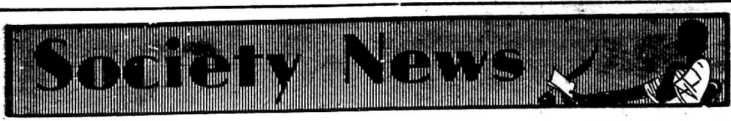
