**State Parks Offer Winter Vacation**

Planning a winter vacation? It is now easier than ever before to secure a winter month reservation at any of Kentucky's seven year-round resort parks. Parks Commissioner Robert Gable has announced a new advance reservation policy for the winter months is now in effect. The seven year-round resort parks will accept advance reservations through Mar. 31, 1969. A vacationer may make a State park reservation now in advance for January, February and March of 1969. Formerly, reservations for these early months could not be made until Jan. 1. Parks now accepting advance reservations are: Kentucky Dam Village, General Butler, Carter Caves, Cumberland Falls, Natural Bridge, and Lake Cumberland State Parks. The new reservation policy accommodates those who wish to take advantage of the fall and winter, all expense, \$44 Vacation Package. Since mid-October, 319 adults and five children have used the plan. The \$44 bargain vacation includes lodging, entertainment, and all meals from Sunday evening through Thursday lunch. This plan is in effect through Mar. 27, 1969. The rate of \$44 per person is based on double occupancy in lodge rooms, each with two double beds. The rate for children 12 years of age and under, when accompanied by adults is \$10.60, plus tax. Reservation requests for the period Apr. 1, 1969 through Mar. 31, 1970, will be processed beginning Jan. 1, 1969. Early requests for the summer months of 1969 will be processed on a first-come basis beginning Jan. 1.

DEMOCRATIC MEETINGS**

In accordance with the revised and duly adopted rules of the Kentucky State Democratic Executive Committee there will be held in the 13 precincts of Rowan County democratic meetings this Saturday, December 7, 1968 under the following rules and regulations -

1. Only Democrats living in the precinct who were registered on November 5, 1968, can vote.

The members of the Executive Committee so elected shall immediately meet and elect a Chairman and Secretary thereof who need not be a member of the Executive Committee but who shall have the same powers and duties within Rowan County as the Chairman and Secretary of the Kentucky Democratic Executive Committee have within the State.

**COCOA CANDY DANDIES**

- Makes 2 1/2 dozen
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
  - 2 cups quick rolled oats, uncooked
  - 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
  - 3 tablespoons cocoa
  - 1/4 cup corn syrup (either light or dark)
  - 1 tablespoon vanilla
- Confectioner's sugar
- Stir butter until soft. Combine oats, brown sugar and cocoa, blend well. Work oats mixture into butter, mixing well. Blend in syrup and vanilla. With wet hands, shape to form small balls, about 1 inch in diameter. Roll in confectioner's sugar. Let stand a few hours to blend flavors.

**HOUSEHOLD HINTS**

Press clothes made of metallic fibers as little as possible. Use only a cool iron. Use a thin press cloth during pressing to help prevent tarnishing of the metal fibers.

A quality latex paint is the best thing for the do-it-yourselfer painting ordinary walls and ceilings. It is easily applied and gives a smoother appearance, leaves no lap marks, and dries quickly. Simple soap and water scrubbing cleans it.

Do not press leather or fake leather. If the seams become a bit scrunched, use shoe rubber cement in place of the iron to flatten them out.

Here's help when removing grease spots from concrete patios: use an absorbent such as fuller's earth and lime. This acts as a blotter and may remove the summer's cookout stains without further treatment. Sprinkle it on, leave awhile and sweep it up. Or scrub with a stiff broom dipped in thick detergent suds, remembering to put a little muscle into the scrubbing. If this doesn't work, sprinkle dishwasher detergent on wet concrete, let stand a few minutes and rinse with boiling water.

Want to remove a candlewax stain? Rub with ice and gently scrape. Then place stain between clean white blotters or several layers of facial tissue and press with warm iron to remove remaining stain. Pour boiling water through the spot, if safe for fabric or sponge with an accepted brand cleaning fluid. The directions are for removing wax stains on white cottons and linens. When the stain is on other washable fabrics and colored cottons, follow the same directions. But do not use boiling water. Also do not use a cleaning fluid containing trichloroethylene on Arnel or Kodol.

Wax benefits floors by reducing wear, imparting gloss, easing soil removal and improving stain resistance.

A needle board — a board with thousands of tiny needles — is necessary when pressing pile fabrics such as velvets and corduroys. If you don't have one, a large scrap of the same pile fabric or a thick turkish towel will work. Put the towel on the ironing board, place the right side of fabric on the towel and use a damp pressing setting on the iron. Brush fabric lightly after pressing to restore pile.

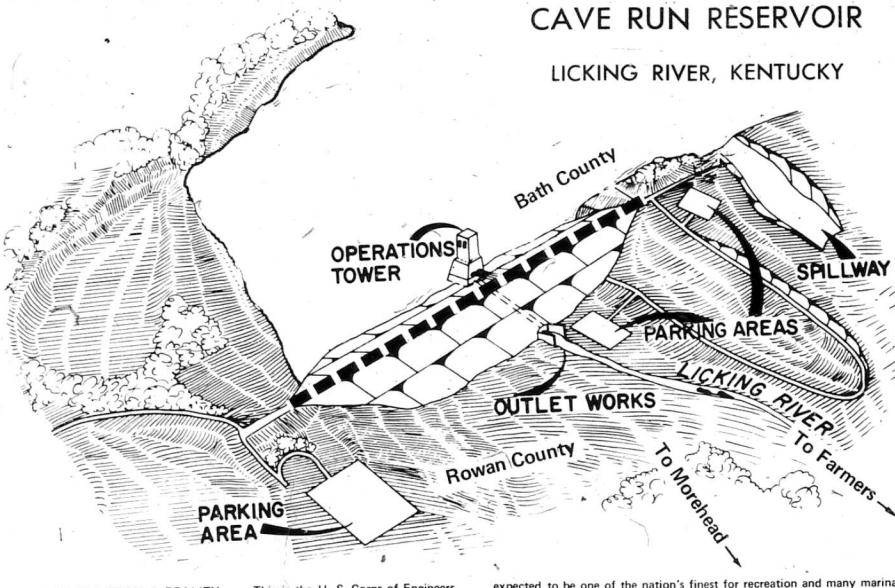

NOT FAR FROM A REALITY . . . This is the U. S. Corps of Engineers sketch of Cave Run dam which will be completed by Oct. 3, 1971. (See story page one). The heavy dotted line marks the center of the dam which will be crossed by a highway. Morehead is 12 miles from the dam site, but much nearer to parts of the lake. This will be Kentucky's fourth largest water impoundment, costing upwards of \$30 million. The reservoir is

expected to be one of the nation's finest for recreation and many marinas, plus a state park, are planned. The publicized "Model City" lies about three miles below the dam site. The dam and spillway will be 3,400 feet long. The Rowan County (Farmers) airport is two miles away. The dam is also close to Interstate 64, U.S. 60 and the C&O Railway. A million visitors are expected the first year after the reservoir is opened to the public.

**Travel Briefs**

**Tennessee Park**  
NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Tennessee is adding 50 campsites at Warrior's Path State Park, Kingsport, tripling the present camping accommodations of the park.  
All the sites will have water and electrical hookups, paved roads and paved access roads. They are to be completed by the spring of 1969.

**Greek Travel Outlook**  
ATHENS (UPI)—Based on announcements by foreign travel bureaus, the outlook is for increased tourist traffic in Greece in 1969, says the National Tourist Organization of Greece.  
Two U.S. airlines, Overseas National Airways and Capital International Airways, already have asked approval of the Greek Government to carry out 120 charter flights to Athens during 1969, according to the government travel agency.

**Spain in St. Louis**  
ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The Spanish Pavilion, once a feature of the New York World's Fair, has been reassembled in downtown St. Louis near the Mississippi riverfront. It will be ready for visitors in April, 1969.  
The Pavilion was donated to the city by the Spanish government but cost of dismantling, transportation and reconstruction will run over \$5 million. The Pavilion, near the 630-foot Gateway Arch, a national monument, will serve as a downtown center for the visitors.

**Breck Downs Grayson To Even Season's Record**

Breck evened the season at 2-2 Tuesday night at Grayson — downing the Yellow Jackets 89-80. This was the first time in seven years that Breck has been able to beat Grayson on their home floor. This was also the last opportunity as Grayson consolidates with Hitchens next year to form Carter County East. The Eagles won by hand by 2 in the first period, 18-16 before knotting the game for a 38-38 halftime score. The blue and white managed a one point 60-59 advantage at the end of the third frame. The Eagles finally pulled away with a 24 point fourth quarter while holding Prichard to 21 for the final 89-80 outcome.  
Jackie Adams, after being off the first half came back the last 16 minutes and canned nine of 11 shots from the floor, adding four free throws for 22 points giving him a game high of 29. The six foot junior forward also proved to be the work-horse on the bench as he pulled off 20 missed shots, Drew Lane, another six foot forward responded to his first starting roll by gathering in nine rebounds while adding nine points. Carlos Hill added 24 points while picking off 8 rebounds.  
These three men up front were fed with numerous passes from the guards for easy buckets against the smaller pressing Grayson team. However, Jim Tom Holbrook found time to add 12 points between assists while his running mate, at guard, Crowley Caudill, contributed 11 points and seven rebounds.

is leading the scoring parade with a 20.7 average and 13 rebounds per game, while hitting on 64% of his shots. Jim Tom Holbrook is second with a 16 P.P.G. and 85% on free throws hitting on 24 of 28. In 1969, they will support the U.S. Brewers Association's anti-litter campaign in 25 areas in Kentucky. This program has already achieved success and won public acceptance in Virginia and North Carolina.

As an outreach of the executive committee, 16 sub-committees will be formed throughout the state to study various areas and determine what needs to be done to implement a total clean-up and beautification program.

### Fall Soil Samples Will Save Time

If you are going to spend money for fertilizer - then spend it efficiently, says Harold Miller, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service soils specialist.

Soil tests provide the base for efficient fertilizer-spending. Properly taken soil samples show you what's needed on the land - and save you money. Fall is a fine time for sampling soils. Soil and weather conditions are ideal, while spring wet weather may hold you back.

Testing laboratories have more time to handle samples and make recommendations. If limestone is needed, fall is good time to apply it; the limestone has all winter to react in the ground. Phosphate and potash can be applied safely during fall and winter months on most soils.

If you know in the fall what you'll need, the fertilizer dealer will have more time to supply you.

Recommendations from soil samples taken in the fall are just as good as those made on samples taken next spring. You also have saved time.

Area extension offices in the counties have full instructions on how to take samples, process them and use them.

### Alaskan Slopes Prepare For Super Skiers

GIRDWOOD, Alaska (UPI) — Young super skiers more than 300 strong face the challenges of Mt. Alyeska this winter for the 1969 U.S. Junior National ski championships.

The majestic Alyeska, straggled in the heart of the Chugach range, was the site of the 1963 senior national Alpine ski competition. Taking on Alpine and Nordic events for the juniors, aged 12-18, all at once is a bigger step. But officials here say snow, weather and terrain conditions are superb and that they'll be ready for the races March 14-22.

Gary King, 38, a veteran ski instructor and the race chairman for junior competition admits there are problems and hard work ahead, "but when we had seen national competitors said then . . . and since then . . . we have the best run competition in the U.S."

"We have terrain steeper than Aspen and Vail," King said. "Wind is not a problem either, for the jumpers, since the bottom of the mountain is sheltered by trees."

Mt. Alyeska—its name is derived from the Aleut word meaning "great land of white to the east"—has a vertical drop of 2,850 feet, primarily rolling terrain, and a race trail much steeper than average.

From its base at this community of about 100, just 300 feet above sea level, Alyeska stretches upward to a forever snow-capped glacial crest. The upper half of the mile-long chair lift, which does not even go to the top, is above the timber line.

The biggest problem so far has been keeping down expenses for the skiers and their coaches.

With Alaskan prices way over those in the "lower 49," local officials are being challenged to cut corners and to push the cost below the original package offer of rooms, meals and transportation to and from the ski area for about \$150.

King said he would ask the more than 80 Girdwood-area, chair-lift owners to provide lodging during the meet, although the same persons are also asked to cut corners and to push the cost below the original package offer of rooms, meals and transportation to and from the ski area for about \$150.

Chris von Imhof, 29, German-born official of the Alyeska ski resort, mentioned the price problem, but maintained "from the interest in registration, everyone is really looking forward to coming up here."

"So far as slopes and terrain are concerned, we're on the same level as some of the major ski areas in this country . . . and some of the major ski areas in Europe," he said.

"It's not any little back yard ski area. With the snow conditions . . . the powder conditions . . . we feel it's a little more superb . . . and it's not so overrun."

Most of Alyeska's winter ski crowd comes from Anchorage, 40 miles to the northwest in comparison with the hoards of skiers that come miles by plane, car and train to other ski areas throughout the nation. Most of those bound here take the Seward highway, the only road from Anchorage to this tiny community.

Von Imhof brought up another factor . . . the weather. "One thing people immediately think of is cold weather, but our average temperature is no colder than any other ski area. Especially toward spring, it's mild weather, mostly 30-50 degrees," von Imhof said.

During the winter, sub-zero temperature readings are the accepted norm for the Anchorage and Girdwood areas. But residents of Fairbanks, in the interior of Alaska, refer sarcastically to this area as "the banana belt." The mercury never dips to 40 below zero, and colder . . . here, as it does in Fairbanks.

**Avid Collector Has Timetables On His Hands**

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Collecting railroad timetables is more than a hobby to Donald A. Sarno, a St. Louis stockbroker. It's a theory of history.

Sarno, 27, has amassed about 40,000 rail timetables over a 12-year period, most of them prepared for rail employees. Employee timetables, in contrast to those printed for the public, contain speed restrictions, length of passing track, schedules of freight trains and other related information.

"These timetables show you how many sleepers went through a town, and even whether a town has a station," Sarno told UPI. As a result, he said, "I know practically every mile of track that runs through Missouri, and some little-known information about railroads throughout the United States and in several foreign countries."

Sarno said his 40 tons of timetables, including those of railroads that no longer exist, tell the story of a country's progress.

"I think that entire socio-economic studies of growth of various regions can be based on transportation requirements of a given area," he said. "And these requirements are best shown by timetables."

Sarno said railroad fans know "that the lines were responsible for developing the nation."

"Some parts of it have been left out but there is a great field left," he said. "A wealth of previously unpublished facts and incidents is given away by data from timetables."

Sarno plans to write a book based on the timetables.
