Morehead's fast moving Eagles drew first blood in the 1939 football race, defeating a highly touted West Liberty, W. It did happen, but on the right side of the ledger.

The first touchdown of the game came in the second quarter, when Glenn Stanley booted a punt into the West Liberty end zone, which the safety man fumbled, Morehead falling on the ball for a touchdown. Stanley then kicked the extra point and the Eagles were out in front 7-0.

In the same stanza, Benny Vanzell Jr., Eagle halfback away for 30 yards, scored the second touchdown for the Eagles. The point was missed and the scoring for the day was over, with the Eagles leading 13-0, ample to win the game.

The game was rather unexciting and was marked by numerous penalties on both teams, with the Eagles drawing the greater number of fouls. The game being the first of the season could be expected to produce just such results. Practically the entire Morehead squad took action, as the coaches were anxious to try out all possible combinations, in preparation for the big game on the schedule this coming Saturday at Bowling Green. It will be remembered that the Eagles met Western on that day at that place.

Incidentally the Western boys are last year's Kentucky champions and from the score in their first game last Saturday against Ohio University, they are starting out hot this year. The Westerners defeated Ohio No. 14 and if that means anything, it means that they defeated the champions of the Buckeye Conference. That just naturally puts a real job up to the Eagles when they journey to Bowling Green this coming Saturday.
