Army Opens Office Here For Nine Days

(Continued From Page One) For the two reputable citizens to sign will be mailed to them. Response to the order of the President of the United States raising the enlisted strength of the Army has caused a wide spread recruiting campaign. In the past enlistments have been limited due to no vacancies and with a large waiting list for vacancies that are filled. Enlistments at the rate of every effort is made to provide with all the up to date trucks, radio operators, motor mechanics, and various specialists of the Air Corps. Certain schools are conducted in all Army Posts to train clerks and typists. A school for Baker and Cooks is conducted to train cooks and bakers for the Army. An enlistment in the Medical Department provides a splendid opportunity to qualify as an X-ray, dental, or general laboratory technician. An enlistment in the Field Artillery provides many splendid opportunities for young men to become first class motor mechanics. This branch of the service is equipped with all the up to date trucks, messenger cars and the latest word in shop equipment. Athletics form a great part of the soldier's life. There are excellent schools to provide wholesome athletic amusements. Games are arranged between the units and the records are maintained. Practically all posts have football

football, boxing, wrestling, soccer, track and basketball teams. Some of the best professional baseball players have been developed in the Army. Excellent instructors are available. If a man shows interest in a sport every opportunity will be given him to become an expert in the sport of his choice. Soldiers who do not participate in post athletic competitions have the opportunity to witness the games and to accompany their post football, baseball and basketball teams to distant playing fields. Also there are quiet, restful pastimes at hand in organization of recreation rooms and post libraries. All recreation rooms contain radios, reading material, pool or billiard tables and card and writing tables. Furloughs and passes are afforded men so they may visit home. Furloughs are granted at the rate of one month a year. Passes are given at frequent intervals and are not charged against furlough time. Religious services are conducted in all Army Posts. Attendance is not compulsory, but every inducement is offered the soldier to attend church services. For men of certain faiths which have stated holy days, the Government offers furloughs, if necessary, so that these men may participate in their observances. The Army trains men mentally, morally, and physically, so that they will be better soldiers and better and stronger physically when returned to civil life. The Army maintains schools, shops, etc., where a man may learn a trade which will help him in later life. Most of these schools are not compulsory, but qualified men are encouraged to attend whenever opportunity permits. There are many opportunities for qualified men who possess musical talent. This includes both the skilled musician and the man who is seriously interested in music. If you desire further information, do not hesitate to call at the Army Recruiting Office located in the City Hall, and ask for it.
