MOREHEAD, Ky.---Pull up a chair and tap your feet to some old-time country and folk tunes for the next performance of Morehead State University's "Americana Crossroads Live" on Friday, May 31, in Duncan Recital Hall on campus.

The concert, which begins at 7:30 p.m., will feature Spit and Polish, Leslie Ritter and Scott Petito, and the Circle City Bluegrass Band. Doors open to the public at 7 p.m. to allow guests to visit the performers' and sponsors' display tables.

Spit and Polish combines the musical talents of Leo Blair and Harvey T. Pennington, two neighbors who began playing together in 2001, performing both old and new folk material on guitar, mandolin and fiddle.

Pennington, a Morehead native and former Rowan County attorney, graduated from MSU in 1966 and the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1969. After retiring from the law profession in 2001, he now devotes more time to the folk music he began playing when he was a college student at the University. He honed his musical talents with "Friends and Folk," a long-running radio program on WMKY. He has even performed live over the years at venues such as the Paramount Arts Center in Ashland.

Blair, who retired as an associate professor of music at MSU in 1998, is now pursuing a full-time career in country music. Raised in West Virginia, he began musical training when his uncle taught him to play the mandolin and harmonica when he was four years old. After receiving degrees in music at West Virginia University and Ohio University, he taught privately as a classical instructor and on the college level for more than 33 years.

He has played with the Nashville Symphony, Owensboro Symphony, Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra and Huntington Orchestra. Blair is currently writing books on violin and guitar methods.

The free concert is presented by WMKY 90.3 FM, MSU's public radio to the mountains, and the University's Kentucky Center for Traditional Music (KCTM). Sponsors include Farmers Mercantile, Morehead Tourism Commission, Poppy Mountain Bluegrass Festival and KCTM.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.—Educational leaders from across the nation will join local teachers and instructors for Morehead State University's first-ever Teacher Educator Academy May 13-16 on campus.

The Academy culminates a successful first year for MSU's Professors in Schools Fellowship, which took more than 40 University educators back to elementary and high school classrooms to learn first-hand what issues face today's teachers.

Beginning at 8:30 a.m. on Monday in 419 Reed Hall, Dr. Michael Moore, MSU provost and executive vice president, will open the four-day event along with Kentucky's Education Commissioner Gene Wilhoit and Deputy Commissioner Lois Adams-Rogers; Marilyn Troupe of the Professional Standards Board; and Jim Applegate with the Council on Postsecondary Education.

The Academy will include daily sessions and roundtable discussions on current teaching issues and methods. Participants in the program also will share insights, notes and new ideas from their yearlong experience.

Guest speakers will include Nevin Brown, principal partner with the Education Trust, on Monday; Kathy Kennedy, nationally recognized teacher and educational consultant, on Tuesday; June Rivers, member of the SAS inSchool team from Tennessee, for Wednesday; and, on Thursday, Mitchell Tolle, nationally known artist and Kentucky native.

Starting last fall, MSU's Professors in Schools Fellowship began with the goal of encouraging all faculty who help train future teachers to go into public schools and participate in the day-to-day instruction of elementary and high school students. Unlike similar programs around the country, this program focuses less on research and stresses the importance of classroom instruction and direct contact with children.

Participants represented every discipline from chemistry and biology to music and mathematics and worked in 20 counties through East Kentucky. Some had teaching experience outside the college level, but others had little or no public school experience.

Plans are already under way for the next year of the program, which begins this fall.

MOREHEAD, Ky.—Holley Bumgardner of Morehead will be the student speaker at Morehead State University's Spring Commencement on Saturday, May 11, in the Academic-Athletic Center.

Nearly 850 graduate and undergraduate students are candidates for degrees which will be conferred by MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin at the ceremony that begins at 10:30 a.m.

Bumgardner, the daughter of Steve and Charlotte Bumgardner, is a candidate for the Bachelor of Business Administration degree. She plans to pursue a master's degree in accounting and become a Certified Public Accountant.

A senior graduating with a perfect 4.0 grade point average in the College of Business, Bumgardner was inducted into the National Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi and Delta Mu Delta Society for business administration students. She was named an All-American Scholar for three years.

Recognized for her mastery of accounting studies, Bumgardner earned first place in the quantitative methods competition at the 2001 Phi Beta Lambda state leadership conference. She had placed second in the event the previous year.

A Dean's List student, Bumgardner served two years each as treasurer of MSU's chapter of Phi Beta Lambda and the Accounting Club. She was an assistant in the real estate studies office, tutoring students and assisting with administrative tasks.

Bumgardner, salutatorian of her graduating class at Rowan County Senior High School, attended MSU on a Regional Honors I Academic Scholarship. She also received scholarships from Farm Bureau and the Ohio Valley Accountants Association. She is engaged to Rob Nester of Jeffersonville, also a May graduate, and plans to be married on June 22.

Special music for the program will be provided by Will Young of Lexington. Ricardo A. Kirtley of Versailles will present the processional and Andrea B. Trusty of West Liberty will lead the singing of the national anthem and the University's "Alma Mater."

The Department of Military Science will host a commissioning ceremony at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 11, in the Commonwealth Room of the Adron Doran University Center.

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WEST LIBERTY, Ky.---The opening of Morehead State University's new, \$6 million classroom and laboratory building was hailed as "the beginning of a new and exciting chapter in the history of MSU at West Liberty."

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin also described the new facility as "a brand new community asset for the people of West Liberty and Morgan County and the surrounding area." He said the project reinforced the "good faith of the University in making university-level academic programs available here and in other communities of East Kentucky."

The MSU president said the building would be shared with the Kentucky Community and Technical College System for the offering of joint degree programs to students in Morgan and nearby counties.

Dr. Eaglin praised State Sen. Robert Stivers and State Rep. John Will Stacy for their efforts in securing state funding of the building in the 1998 legislative session. He also thanked Morgan County Judge-Executive Sid Stewart and the Fiscal Court for providing the site and West Liberty Mayor Robert Nickell for assisting with access to utilities.

The MSU president said the two-story building and its technology features were designed to help meet the area's educational needs and to assist in economic development efforts. He invited the public to use the building's 260-seat auditorium as a community-meeting place.

More than 300 persons toured the building to see its high tech computer laboratories, distance learning classrooms and other facilities (May 1).

Dr. Cheryl King, associate vice president of the Council on Postsecondary Education and commissioner of adult education, praised the relationship MSU has fostered in Morgan County. "This exemplifies what can be accomplished when the citizens and the community come together for the benefit of the community," she said.

For the past 15 years, MSU has been providing adult education classes in the area through the Adult Learning Center. As the educational component has grown, the name was changed to the Adult Education and Career Center to better reflect its mission of assisting adults to be better prepared for jobs. Today, nearly 6,000 adults have been served and the program has become a model for the state.

William Parker May, chair of the Board of Advisors at the center, presided at a short program that included a musical performance by Morgan County junior Andrea Trusty, and remarks by Robin E. Dalton of West Liberty, who began taking classes at the center before enrolling in classes on the main campus.

"I was working for a company that moved to Mexico," Dalton said. "I had money for retraining, so I got a GED and am now attending college. For non-traditional students like me, this center has provided us with jobs, assistance with family and community commitment." A sophomore business major, Dalton will complete an associate degree in December.

The University established its presence in West Liberty in 1987 with the MSU-Morgan County Center. The center was renamed Licking Valley Extended Campus Center in 1990. Dr. Jonell Tobin has served as the center's only director.





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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University instructor has authored a chapter in a newly published book on business marketing strategies during the recent economic crisis in Asia.

Dr. Nancy Landrum, assistant professor for management, contributed a section titled "Strategies Just in Time in the Asian Athletic Footwear Industry" which deals with strategies used by firms before, during and after the Asian Economic Crisis of 1997-1999. Her main focus was the footwear giant, Nike.

The book, "Asian Post-Crisis Management – Corporate and Governmental Strategies for Sustainable Competitive Advantage" by Frank-Jürgen Richter, was printed in March by global academic publisher Palgrave Macmillan Ltd. It examines the key issues faced by multinational companies and contains cutting-edge strategies and practices designed to enable managers and policy makers to weather the Asian financial and economic storms.

The 352-page text will be primarily a resource for top management leaders, senior economic analysts, policy makers, academic scholars, and the students of international management.

Dr. Landrum has a Ph.D. degree in business administration from New Mexico State University. She came to MSU in August 2000 and teaches strategic management courses to graduate and undergraduate students.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The newly renovated and expanded Breckinridge Hall on the Morehead State University campus is officially open for business.

The \$14 million project, the most expensive in the school's history, was rededicated with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Friday (May 10).

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin described the facility as "an academic showplace." He challenged future students and faculty to continue the "tradition of excellence" established during the 51 years the building housed MSU's laboratory school, known first as Breckinridge Training School and later as University Breckinridge School.

Dr. Eaglin recognized former President C. Nelson Grote for making the first request for the Breck project to the state legislature in 1988. He noted that the project originally was estimated at \$8 million but had increased to \$14 million when it was funded 10 years later.

He also thanked Sen. Robert Stivers, Reps. Rocky Adkins and John Will Stacy, and Gov. Paul Patton for their support of the project.

Dr. Eaglin also expressed gratitude to the Breckinridge School Society, comprised of laboratory school alumni, for "untiring efforts to preserve the legacy of a great school" and for its generosity in establishing a major scholarship endowment for MSU students. Lexington attorney James C. Clay, chair of the Breck Society, said the achievements of Breck students and their loyalty to the school stemmed from a family atmosphere and rigorous academics from a devoted and loving faculty.

Dr. Eaglin also cited the importance of the faculty members in communication, theatre and foreign languages who made suggestions for design and equipping of the new facility to create a state-of-the-art teaching and learning center.

The building will reopen for classes this summer.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University sociology professor, whose provocative dissertation gained national attention last fall, is now publishing her research in a forthcoming book.

Dr. Bernadette Barton chose to study the lives of exotic dancers for her doctoral studies at the University of Kentucky and is working on her book, "Inside the Lives of Exotic Dancers."

Dr. Barton's special research and teaching interests include sexuality studies, feminist theory and popular culture. In addition, she is a former ballet dancer, so her doctoral dissertation on exotic dancers "fulfilled those interests," she said.

"Sex workers of any kind are understudied," Dr. Barton said. "Exotic dancers break the taboos of respected femininity." She explained that the performers are either thought of as promiscuous and stupid, or as victims of society's abuses.

"Even feminists are really polarized about exotic dancing," she continued. "On one hand, there are those who think it's degrading to women. And then there are those who believe it's empowering for women, getting money from these adoring men.

"So that's what I write in this book – that the answers are more complex than advocates of the sex wars theorize," she says, as to whether exotic dancing is humiliating for womanhood, or a source of feminine power.

In her research for the dissertation, Dr. Barton conducted interviews for two years in clubs and strip bars in Lexington, San Francisco and Las Vegas. She spoke not only with the strippers, but with club owners, customers, disc jockeys, bouncers and other persons working in the business.

"I began (this study) more sympathetic with the feminist perspective that argues that it's empowering.

"But I found that my own journey studying the sex industry resulted in my discovery that these women were often victims of physical abuse and rejection, and they were encouraged to drink and use drugs (on the job)."

Dr. Barton said the longer she was there, the more unhappy and exploitative the situations seemed to be.

"The whole environment felt toxic," she said.

Her research caught the attention of the producers of a nationally-televised daytime talk program, the Ananda Lewis Show, and in October, Dr. Barton appeared as a guest/expert. The episode featured women employed in the sex industry as dancers, along with a pornographic film star, who all shared their experiences and views about their work.

Dr. Barton and a "conservative" woman were there to discuss various observations about the lives of strippers.

On MSU's faculty since August 2000, Dr. Barton received a bachelor's degree in English from Oberlin College in Ohio, a master's degree in sociology and her doctoral degree in sociology from the University of Kentucky. Additionally, she earned a Women's Studies Certificate from UK and has done master's work in Women's Studies at San Francisco State University.

She has made numerous professional conference presentations about exotic dancing and gender issues, and has authored several articles for professional journals. Her most recent articles include those published in "Sexuality & Culture" (Fall 2001) and one due out in the fall issue of "Gender & Society."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Agricultural and Human Sciences are selling, "pick your own" strawberries at the Derrickson Agricultural Complex (University Farm) until the season ends.

The strawberries are an ongoing experiment to produce "annual" strawberries for commercial production in the state of Kentucky. The berry plants were planted last October on black plastic mulch, similar to how vegetables are grown. Between the raised black plastic beds of strawberries, rye grass was planted to reduce soil erosion and make picking easier.

"I have been in horticulture for almost 20 years and these are the cleanest, highest quality berries I have seen produced locally," said Mike Pettit, horticulture supervisor. "None of the berries grown touches the soil surface, making a higher quality, cleaner berry. Some of the berries are one-fourth the size of an average man's fist. It is hard to believe," he added.

Sales of the first strawberry crop in more than 10 years at the university farm are ongoing from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. All berries are "pick your own" at a price of \$1 per quart. One-quart containers will be provided.

Containers may be filled to a reasonable level that includes all berries that will stay with normal moving. The strawberries experiment is the result of student activities and experimentation. Proceeds from sales go back to the department to fund future activities.

Berries will be sold and can be picked "rain or shine," Monday through Friday, while supplies last. The strawberry season usually lasts three to four weeks.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The College of Education at Morehead State University has a secondary teacher certification option with its new Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) degree.

Full time students may complete the program in as little as one year and a summer. Others may take as long as two years to complete the program. Candidates will be required to spend a minimum of 60 hours a semester in public school classrooms for two semesters, or be employed as a teacher on a temporary provisional certificate. Once all requirements are met, the Master of Arts in Teaching degree will be awarded and the student will be recommended for high school teaching certification.

The program was designed to prepare those with a baccalaureate degree who have completed the content requirements for a certification area as defined by the Kentucky Educational Professional Standards Board.

Currently there are openings for the fall semester for those who have completed majors in biology, social studies, English or math. To enroll, candidates must apply to MSU's Graduate School. Applications are available online at www.moreheadstate.edu/units/Graduate/ or from the office in 701 Ginger Hall.

To gain admission into the program, each applicant will meet with a three-person Program Entrance and Design Interview Committee where a check sheet will be developed. This will serve as a contract for the program of study.

Qualified applicants must have a baccalaureate degree from an accredited institution; have earned at least a 2.75 grade point average for undergraduate work or at least 3.0 GPA for graduate courses; receive an acceptable score on the Graduate Record Exam (GRE) or achieve a composite score of 21 on the ACT.

The certification applies to those teaching in grades 8-12. Some applicants may receive a temporary provisional certification, which would allow them to teach two years while being enrolled in the program.

Details on the secondary certification option will be provided at a special session on Tuesday, June 4, at 6 p.m. in Room 206 at the Morehead State University at Ashland center; and at Morehead State University at Prestonsburg on Wednesday, June 5, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Carter County family has found that teaching is not just a profession; it's a family tradition.

Seven of the eight children born to Clatis and F. Louise Walker of Tick Ridge in Olive Hill have chosen teaching as a career and they are all graduates of Morehead State University's teacher education programs.

Apparently, doing things together started at the literal beginning for the Walkers, according to Glenna Walker Ison, Morehead State University's teacher-in-residence, who was sixth of the eight siblings.

"We were even all born at the same hospital in Ashland-King's Daughters Medical Center, and the same doctor, Harold Keith Bailey, delivered all of us," she said. "So with our family, consistency was there if nothing else."

Ison, of Mt. Sterling, is on the faculty at Fayette County Schools in Lexington, where she usually works as a professional staff assistant (similar to an assistant principal, says Ison). Her most recent position in Fayette County has been with Glendover Global Studies School. But for this academic year, Ison has been MSU's teacher-in-residence, and has recently learned she will be returning in August for another year. In this role, she teaches courses and supervises student teachers, among other duties.

Frances L. Walker Johnson, as the eldest of Ison's siblings, was the first of the Walker family to attend college. Her parents for the sake of geography initially made the decision for her to attend MSU, Ison said.

"Because we had a large farm, they picked Morehead because it was close to home." Ison said their father was a brickyard worker and their mother was a quality inspector in the clothing manufacturing industry. Farming was a vital part of their lives.

In subsequent years, the other Walker children followed Frances' footsteps to MSU, and like her, earned degrees in the education field.

Frances retired from Jefferson County schools as the librarian at Fairdale High School in Louisville. Faye E. Walker Barber retired from Greenup County High School, where she was the school's guidance counselor. Helen L. Walker Stevens retired from teaching with the Workforce Development Cabinet at Ashland Technical College and has begun a new job as a Head Start Training and Resource Specialist (HSTARS) for Northeast Head Start in Olive Hill.

Her brother Clatis Walker works with the Special Education Cooperative in Lexington, and H. Keith Walker is the principal at Carter County Technical Center in Olive Hill.

Next in line was Ison, who admits she wanted to go somewhere other than MSU.

"I really wanted to be a physical therapist and to go to the Cincinnati Bible Seminary," she said. "But my mom said if Morehead was 'good enough for the rest of them, it's good enough for you.' However, since I've gotten into education, I haven't wanted to do anything else."

The next Walker sibling, Noreen Walker Flannery, is the only one who is not exclusively in the teaching profession but she too is involved in education as a school nurse at Olive Hill Elementary School.

"I never really thought I wanted to be a teacher," she said. However, she has taught classes, primarily in health education and safety, dental and health awareness programs for the OHES students.

From working in the school system and having two sons in school, Flannery says she has learned the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) fails to address what she believes is vital for students.

"It's lacking in health issues," she said. "The focus of KERA is on the portfolios and doing well on testing." But schools need to focus on education "for the long haul," according to Flannery, suggesting a school-wide health curriculum (grades K-12) that is built on each year.

Flannery says that while she is not a teacher like her siblings, by working as a nurse at a school, she gets "the best of both worlds."

The youngest sibling, Dorothy A. Walker Callihan, rounds out the Walker teacher roster as the intermediate teacher at OHES.

Ison received her first MSU degree in 1975, a Bachelor of Arts in special education and physical education. By 1977, she had earned her master's degree in special education and by 1991, her Rank 1 in supervision of instruction.

Among her additional certifications earned are: physical education grades 7-12, special education, trainable, educable and neurologically impaired; elementary, middle and high school principalship, special education teacher consultant, special education directorship and superintendent certification.

She says that after all, she is glad her parents encouraged her to go to MSU, because she knows she received a quality education, especially in the leadership area.

"A lot of my teachers gave me the confidence I have today," Ison said.

A strong benefit of attending MSU, according to Ison, was the knowledge that faculty guiding her academic career were clear in directing her.

"I knew if something happened, I could go to my adviser for assistance. I knew exactly what I had to take and when I needed to take it.

"Some of the instructors were hard on me and demanded hard work," Ison continued. "If I couldn't do it, they taught me. They helped me make my education sound. They were hard, but they were there to get the education to me and they helped me find my focus."

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# **FAMILY TRADITION**

Family ties are strong in Kentucky. Seven of the eight children of Clatis and F. Louise Walker of Olive Hill chose teaching as a career. The eighth Walker is a school nurse. MOREHEAD, Ky.---Visit a mysterious, ancient traveler from the depths of the universe when Morehead State University offers a select group of students the unique chance to "Rendezvous with a Comet."

Designed for children entering the 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> grades this fall, the MSU Space Science and Exploration Camp will prepare 60 students for an exciting role-playing mission to The Challenger Space Center in Hazard.

MSU's Office of Continuing Education and Kentucky GEAR UP are sponsoring the weeklong program, which runs June 17-21.

During the first four days, students will train from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on campus to work as scientists, engineers and astronauts for Friday's daylong field trip and simulated mission to explore outer space. Participating students will successfully plot the course and simulate a mission to a comet, gain experience working in a team environment and learn about recent sightings and research into the study of comets.

A future NASA mission, called Project Stardust, is scheduled to rendezvous with Comet Wild-2 in December 2003 then return to Earth with dust and material collected from it.

Comets, thought in ancient times to signify the coming of evil and disaster, are small, irregularly shaped lumps of rock, dust and ice that orbit the sun in periods of up to tens of thousands of years. They become heated as they approach the sun and burn off debris in long, luminous tails arching across the night sky for days or even months. The most famous of these objects, Halley's Comet, is visible from Earth for a few days every 76 years.

Registration for the camp is \$75 per student and applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. All students must have a permission slip signed by a parent or guardian along with proof of insurance in order to accompany the group on the field trip to Hazard. Completed applications must be submitted by **Friday**, **June 7**.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A lifelong devotion to preserving the traditional music of Eastern Kentucky has earned Sandy Knipp the 2002 Appalachian Treasure Award.

The longtime musician and former educator will receive the honor during Morehead State University's annual Appalachian Celebration, slated for June 23-29.

To earn the Appalachian Treasure Award, recipients must be recognized for quality work and prominence in art, crafts, music or literature representative of Appalachia and must be willing to share their talent with others.

Knipp, a Morehead native, has gained notoriety as a fan, promoter and performer of Bluegrass music. He became interested in the genre at about 12 years of age when friends asked him to pick up a guitar and join them.

"Bluegrass music is contagious and I caught it," he said. "Around that time, I saw a concert at the Rockdale Jamboree," Knipp recalled. "It was the Osborne Brothers from the Grand Ole Opry and I started learning some of their songs."

After graduating from Rowan County High School in 1967, Knipp spent the summer in Mansfield, Ohio, working in a steel mill. "That's when homesickness set in," he says. "That's when I bought my first Ralph and Carter Stanley album and that made the homesickness worse."

He returned to Kentucky to begin work on his education degree at MSU, where a faculty adviser at his freshman orientation gave him some advice.

"I wanted to get into radio but I was told I probably wouldn't be very good at it because of my Eastern Kentucky accent," he said.

Ironically, Knipp later found success as the longtime host of the popular WMKY Radio program "Bluegrass Diversion" which airs each Saturday from 11 a.m. – 2 p.m.

After completing his bachelor's degree in education in 1971, he earned his master's degree in 1974 and his Rank I in 1981.

From the early years in his teaching career, Knipp pursued his musical interests, writing and performing with his now former wife. The pair frequently traveled to Nashville.

"We recorded four or five albums of country – leaning toward Bluegrass music," he said.

Among their songs was "You Don't Have An 'S' On Your Chest."

"That was a big hit for us. A prominent female country music artist recorded it," Knipp said, explaining that due to contract problems, it was never released on her album.

Other successful songs followed for Knipp including "She Breaks So Easily," which received the Twitty City Award for best written song, and "It is Jesus," which was recorded by Don Rigsby on the Sugar Hill record label.

During this period, Knipp continued to teach, first at Upper Tygart Elementary School in Carter County, then at his alma mater, Haldeman Elementary in Rowan County, where he later served as principal. He finished his education career at the Even Start and High School Equivalency programs in the Rowan County school system, before retiring in 1998.

Knipp has been involved in MSU's Appalachian Celebration since 1976, booking music acts for the popular Noon Concerts and Traditional Music Night events.

"I started probably 30 years ago carrying a banjo around campus when Bluegrass wasn't cool," he said. "It was my overall goal to make traditional music more acceptable."

Working with the Appalachian Celebration helped Knipp meet that goal.

"MSU serves students in a vast area and many of those students are from the areas that play and perform Bluegrass music," he said. "I thought it was necessary to serve that area with traditional music. So through the Appalachian Celebration, we could do that."

An accomplished guitarist, Knipp also plays the electric bass, and to a lesser degree, the mandolin. He says the banjo was formerly his instrument of choice, but he no longer plays due to health problems with his hand.

Knipp also has won music lovers' hearts with "Bluegrass Diversion," which he has hosted since 1990.

"The show has grown from two to three hours and has made Bluegrass music available in WMKY's listening area," he said. "It is an all-live request show and there are lots and lots of fans."

Knipp continues to perform, with Darvin Sturgill and Willow Creek, a Bluegrass group, and the White Horse String Band, an acoustic ensemble that includes Leo Blair on fiddle, Steve Rigsby on bass, and Dr. Ron Dobler on dulcimer and banjo.

The White Horse String Band does a three-hour professional development workshop in conjunction with the Appalachian Celebration. The workshop, which instructs teachers on how to take traditional music into their classrooms, is part of the educational component of the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music, of which Knipp is the founding director and part-time education coordinator.

Knipp and his wife Debbie attend the First Church of God in Morehead, where he plays bass guitar in a praise band and she sings in the choir.

Despite some health problems, including a kidney transplant in 1999, Knipp continues to broadcast, promote, support and perform his beloved traditional music. He says he was flattered by the news that he is this year's Appalachian Treasure.

"I think it's among, if not the top honor, I've ever received by the public," he said. "All my life, my work has been for someone else. I never dreamed someone would recognize my work like this."

Knipp will be presented the 2002 Appalachian Treasure Award on Monday, June 24, in a ceremony on the lawn of the Laughlin Health Building. During the program, which is free and open to the public, selections from his music compositions will be performed.

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

## New partnership in the War on Drugs includes MSU police

In a groundbreaking move in the War on Drugs, the Drug Enforcement Administration and the National Foundation of Women Legislators (NFWL) have kicked off a nationwide partnership. As a Hutchinson, DEA director, and Robin Read, NFWL president and CEO, made the announcement on May 23 in Washington, D.C.

In Kentucky, State Rep. Ruth Ann Palumbo, State Sen. Katie Stine and DEA Special Agent in Charge Gary Oetjen announced the "Shoulder to Shoulder" initiative in Lexington that same day. Representing Morehead State University at the announcement was **Doug Brown**, police chief.

The initiative is a model program aimed at forging a new era of responsible citizenship by strengthening our children, our families and our communities. It will highlight the link between illegal drug operations and terrorism.

"Since 9/11, the War on Drugs has developed into a War on Narco-Terrorism. Drug trafficking has become a national security issue because it is often drug money that finances terrorist operations," said Hutchinson. "This 'Shoulder to Shoulder Campaign' will combine the DEA's extensive knowledge about the links between drugs and terror with these legislators' commitment to take this message to the country."

The effort will also focus on the dangers of club drugs like ecstasy that are becoming increasingly popular among teens and youth. "On another front is a battle facing our youth who are led to believe 'club drugs' like ecstasy are harmless. The grim facts show otherwise," he said.

As part of the new initiative, Oetjen, Rep. Palumbo and Sen. Stine will work shoulder to shoulder with public safety and law enforcement officials to promote the 'demand reduction' message in the school and communities of our commonwealth.

"For this class, you can use your own creativity to make the dolls from found items laying around the house," she said.



MOREHEAD, Ky.---To help maintain a safe and adequate supply for the Rowan County community, the Central Kentucky Blood Center (CKBC) will hold a summer blood drive Tuesday and Wednesday, June 4 and 5, on the Morehead State University campus.

The drive will be held in Button Drill Room from 11 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

While blood supplies were replenished quickly after terrorist attacks on the United States last September, poor weather plus colds and flu can contribute to dangerous blood shortages and donations are needed.

According to the CKBC, 300 donors are needed daily to serve patients in 70 hospitals in clinics located in 56 central and eastern Kentucky counties. Donating a pint of blood takes less than an hour and the blood can be separated into red cells, plasma and platelets to aid up to three different patients. Only about 5 percent of Americans who can donate blood actually do so.

Donors must be at least 17 years old and weigh a minimum of 100 pounds. Taking prescription medications will not necessarily rule out a person as a potential blood source. All contributors must bring a form of identification with Social Security number or birthdate. Each donor will receive a free CKBC T-shirt.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky.---For nearly 115 years, Morehead State University has been providing educational opportunities for students in the region. From meager beginnings, the school has survived and grown, through the Depression and war, to become a recognized leader for today's workforce.

With advances in technology, the Internet and numerous cooperative agreements, MSU's boundaries have extended across the nation and the world. Expanded programs and new initiatives have increased course offerings for degree-seekers.

The University experienced a record enrollment for the spring semester with 8,700 students and had 9,027, the second highest in history, for the fall 2001 term. First-time freshmen enrollment was the highest ever, at 1,590, and graduate students at 1,770, the highest in 21 years.

Providing an environment to enhance learning has remained the eternal mission. Earlier this year, dedication ceremonies were held for two newly-opened facilities: the new Morehead State University at West Liberty center with its new offices, distance learning technology classrooms and computer laboratory; and Breckinridge Hall, with a 51-year history in service as a training school for teachers, will house the Department of Communication and Theatre, foreign languages, MSU's public radio operations, television studio and offices for the student newspaper, all in a state-of-the-art teaching and learning center.

Things are changing, improving and advancing at the University, according to MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin, but "we have new and exciting programs in the works."

Later this year, the University will begin a \$10 million renovation and expansion of the Adron Doran University Center. "This facility is the lifeblood of student activities and once the work is completed, we will benefit from an expanded University Bookstore, more facilities for meetings and a building that is more functional for student needs," says Dr. Eaglin.

Since coming on board in 1992, the University's CEO has worked for improvement of campus facilities and services for current and future students. A new meal plan program goes into effect this fall. This followed the implementation of the EagleCard, which allows students to access vending machines and copiers through the use of one card.

This year saw changes in several areas including the College of Education where agreements were signed for programs at school districts in the region. Various programs were initiated including the Professors in Schools program and a new position of teacher recruitment coordinator was established.

Among the MSU family of more than 1,000 faculty and staff members, professors gained support for research through a variety of grants and others accepted appointments to national and local professional organizations.

A host of students, as individuals and as part of a team, were recognized for accomplishments in academics and sports, as well as their work with community service projects.

"We have had a busy, but productive year," said Dr. Eaglin.
