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Tobacco Grower Invited To Show At Mt. Sterling

Tobacco Growers Exhibit Offers Numerous Prizes To Best County Growers

The Mt. Sterling Board of Trade will hold a tobacco show and contest at the Farmer's Warehouse at Mt. Sterling on Saturday, November 18th. This is the first time in history that a special exhibit has been organized for the purpose of featuring the practical tobacco grower from Rowan County and other counties from eastern and east central Kentucky. Rowan growers produce good tobacco, but this is the first class that have had the opportunity to show it at an exhibit, especially for them.

Fifty three premiums ranging from \$2 to \$62 in cash will be awarded at the exhibit. The grower may enter one of the classes with as little as 3 hands or about 1 pound of tobacco, and he may enter every class in the show with 21 hands or about 10 pounds of tobacco. Four premiums for each class are offered for a class of Trash, a class of Lugs, and a class of Bright Leaf. In addition there is a stick class to contain one or two hands of Flying, Trash, Lugs, and Bright Leaf. Four premiums are offered in this class. There is also a Grand Championship class which will include a premium for each class champion.

Rowan growers and their families will profit by spending this day in Mt. Sterling which is the tobacco capital of this section of Ky. There will be a special demonstration in stripping a special exhibit of the various grades. There will be special music and entertainment throughout the day. Many special features are being planned by the various business interests. (Continued On Page Five)

The total supply of Burley tobacco on Oct. 1, 1939 was 1,046,000 pounds. This is the third largest supply of Burley tobacco in history, far above the consumption level, which will mean very low prices if we continue to grow large crops. "Listen" farmers, this is really the first time we have had a chance to defend ourselves against the no sign farm. We will expect you at this meeting as this is our chance. It is now up to you. Two City Tickets Appear On Ballots For Tuesday Election

Voters May Vote Straight Or Select Special Candidate From Both Tickets

In the stress of the big election being held on Tuesday, November 7, citizens of Morehead are likely to overlook the importance of the city council to be elected at the same time.

Eleven citizens of Morehead are making the race on two separate tickets, one the Citizens ticket, under the Arm and Hammer brand, composed of H. C. Huggan, Frank Havers, Ed Fanning, Harry Goldberg, O. P. Carr and S. M. Caudill, the other under the emblem of the Crescent, called the Progressive ticket and headed by Hagan, J. W. Holbrook, Virgil Wolford, Russell Barker, Austin Riddle and Oscar Patrick.

For at least half the citizens who may wish to vote for one on each ticket, voters are permitted to vote for six candidates or for the straight ticket or to emphasize if they prefer. However, they should remember that if they wish to cross from one ticket to the other, they must make the mark in the square opposite the name they wish to vote for and vote for six individuals.

Rodes K. Myers Speaks To Large Crowd

Urges That Democrats Go To Polls And Vote Straight Ticket In All Races

Rodes K. Myers, Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor, addressed a large sized crowd at the court house in Morehead on Monday afternoon, discussing the issues of the campaign. Mr. Myers prefaced his address by stating that he was not talking through any selfish motive but in the interest of the entire straight Democratic ticket.

He noted that Judge Swoppe had his primary campaign belittled to the national administration, but that since the general election campaign had come, the Judge is not mentioning the national administration. He wondered if it were possible that the national administration was more popular than he had at first supposed.

Mr. Myers said that the Swoppe campaign was based on half truths. He said that Judge Swoppe charged that the present Democratic state administration had collected more money than any previous administration, that they had more employees than ever before, and that they had wasted in extravagant expenditures the tax payers money.

"We accept the challenge," said Mr. Myers. "Yes, the number we have collected more money than any previous administrations. But that additional money does not come from increased taxes. The federal government has received of the excess money, over 23 millions of dollars to pay into the unemployment fund. Of the increase in employees, the federal government has increased, but the federal government pays their salaries."

Other moneys raised were spent for increased expenditures, including over 11 million dollars that went for old age assistance. The sales tax was removed, and the real estate tax was left the same, that no actual increase in taxes was made on the average tax payer.

He reviewed the Democratic platform and compared it with that of the Republican ticket. He particularly stressed the fact that they would remove the lien against the homestead and property of those employees who have been laid off. Mr. Myers spoke at Mt. Sterling Monday night, and spent the greater part of this week in Eastern Kentucky. He urged the voters to vote the straight Democratic ticket, emphasizing the fact that it would be used to send representatives to Congress in this section unless they were Democratic. He particularly urged voters to vote for J. J. Thomas, Van Y. Green and J. B. Rose.

General Election On Tuesday Finds Democrats Claiming County By Small Margin As Time Nears

Bringing the Democratic speaking campaign to a close, Congressman Joe B. Bates of Greensport, Kentucky, will speak to the voters of Rowan county at the Court House in Morehead on Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock.

About twelve years ago this custom was established by the then Congressman Hon. Judge Fred M. Vinson. Since that time each year, the Congressman for the Eighth District has made it an unvarnished custom to close the campaign in this county on Saturday night before election. Mr. Bates, in his own race for Congress last year, accepted the precedent and closed his campaign here.

Similar arrangements have been made for him to address the people of his district here at that time. Mr. Bates is said to be the most improved speaker in public opinion among all the candidates in Washington.

This is his own district, and the people of this county are urged to turn out in large numbers to hear the congressman deliver the message to his people.
