and such additional members as Mr. Wallace may select. The President said the new Board will formulate the nation's international economic policy, coordinate the economic activities of defense agencies and plan for post-war reconstruction.

Foreign Affairs The President ordered the freezing of all Japanese credits in the United States and extended the order to Chinese assets to protect China against Japanese use of assets controlled from occupied China. The President also placed the Army and Navy of the Philippine Commonwealth within the command of the armed forces of the United States, and named General Douglas A. MacArthur, former Chief of Staff, commanding general.

The State Department protested the dropping of bombs by Japanese planes near the United States Gunboat "Tulbilla," and announced the incident closed after the Japanese Government promised full investigation and reparation. Acting Secretary Welles denounced Germany for its note to the Mexican Government with regard to the black list recently issued by the Nazi Government's report of threats of reprisal.

Aid to Russia Lend-Lease Administrator Hopkins arrived in Moscow to discuss speeding of needed war materials to the Soviet Union and the Russian Military Mission conferred with President Roosevelt and the State Department. Acting Secretary Welles said Lend-Lease aid has been increased because the Russian Government can purchase needed materials with cash.

Tax Anticipation Notes The Treasury placed on sale at Federal Reserve Banks tax anticipation notes intended to help taxpayers set aside sufficient money to meet increased tax bills of the coming year. The notes are redeemable in cash or as payment for income taxes and bear interest up to 1.92 percent. Secretary Morgenthau, in a letter to all banking institutions, said it is important that the taxpayers of the nation become aware of the unprecedented taxes they will have to pay next year on this year's income, and they should be encouraged to set aside funds now with which to meet those later payments.

Army The War Department created three support commands in order to coordinate the activities of aviation units and ground forces. The Department announced the Signal Corps has developed electrical sentries that will warn of invading aircraft "long before they are actually sighted," but said the Army needs five hundred men from the radio engineering field to learn to operate the secret devices.

War Secretary Stimson said 1,000 airplanes and 10,000 Air Corps officers and enlisted men will take part in maneuvers stressing coordination of ground and air strength in the Beauregard, Louisiana, area from September 1-30, in the simulated war between 50,000 men of the Second and Third Armies, and in the First Army maneuvers to be held in the Carolinas, November 3-30.

Oil Defense Petroleum Coordinator Ickes recommended 100,000 gasoline filling stations in the following States to be closed from seven p. m. to seven a. m. every night beginning Sunday, August 3: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, District of Columbia, and "all marketing areas in or east of the Appalachian mountains in the States of New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia." He appealed for a voluntary one-third cut in consumption and said he hoped closing the stations in Eastern States nightly "plus the voluntary curtailment will be enough to put us across."

Priorities Director of Priorities Stettinius issued an order freezing all stocks of raw silk because of "unsettled conditions in the Far East." Mrs. Stettinius announced a new plan to grant blanket preferences rating to projects which must be completed promptly. He issued a limited preference rating to forty manufacturers of mining machinery and to seventy-five producers

record. WPA employment dropped 17,000 and NYA, 96,000, she said. OPM Associate Director Hillman asked airplane companies to employ and train women in defense jobs without lowering wages or working standards.

The Navy, War and Commerce Departments jointly proposed the 60,000,000 Americans born in this country but without documentary proof of citizenship apply to State bureaus of vital statistics and similar agencies for "delayed birth certificates" to break the bottleneck by which native-born workers are barred from jobs in defense plants for lack of such proof of citizenship.

Greens sowing time starts August 1, and may continue well into September. The greens are Seven Top, Siberian Kale, Essex rape, Southern curled mustard, King of Denmark spinach, and Tendergreen, sometimes called mustard spinach.

Sown in the same interval are bleble turnips, Purple Top Globe or Strapless Golden Necklate rutabaga, also the large-growing radishes, Rose and White Chinese and Black Spinach. These, by the way, bear winter storage as well as do turnips.

The sowing sites for all those except Seven Top and kale is wherever (and whenever) a garden row has matured. Seven Top and Kale, being winter hardy, should be put at an edge of the garden where they may be left to make spring greens after the rest of the garden has been broken.

The seed bed should be well prepared, incidentally destroying the crabgrass and the weeds, preventing their seeding. Thus, besides the real food value these things have, a valuable contribution is made in abating next year's weed nuisance.

Two methods of seed sowing are followed, broadcast and in drills, but drilling is better because insects may be so much better combated. The seed sowing rate is one ounce to one hundred feet, except for spinach and radishes, by these, one ounce to fifty feet.

Two insects almost sure to cause trouble are black flea beetle, at seeding stage, and the plant lice almost any time after. Rotenone dust or spray is the control, applied as and when the insects appear. Showdown, the standard col-

ored Harlequin Bug gives both. Difficult to control, because of its hard shell, hand picking is about the only remedy, but where special rotenone dust of one and one-half percent strength may be procured its use has been found extremely effective. In rare instances, a late-hatched generation of cabbage worms may prove damaging, but rotenone dust, regular strength, will make short shift of them.

A Sheep Record For Flock Owners To Strive For

In August, 1937, O. H. Skeeters put twenty-one ewes on his farm in Grayson County, Kentucky.

In 1938 he sold 114 pounds of wool for \$23.05 and sixteen lambs for \$129.89.

In 1939 he sold 202 pounds of wool for \$62.47 and twenty lambs for \$160.30.

This year he sold 210 pounds of wool for \$98.70 and twenty-one lambs for \$194.69, and has ten lambs yet left for sale.

From this flock in four seasons he has received \$854.81, and has twenty-one ewes and ten lambs.

Tobacco Growers' Incomes Reduced During 1940 Season

Less Acreages And Lower Prices Blamed For Low Incomes

Smaller tobacco acreages and lower tobacco prices reduced the incomes of farmers in the outer bluegrass region of Kentucky last year, according to a report issued by the Department of Farm Economics in the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

For the year 1940 the average income on seventy-six farms studied was \$108 less than in 1939.

"This reduction in income," says John H. Bondurant, author of the report, "was due principally to smaller acreages and lower prices of tobacco."

The average net earnings of the seventy-six farms last year was \$1,204 after all expenses had been paid and five percent interest allowed on the investment. Earnings varied a dramam nonthan and varied from a loss of \$286 to a profit of \$4,323.

As analyzed by the Department of Farm Economics in the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the number of important sources of income from a well-balanced crop and livestock system, the efficient use of labor and capital, including the purchase of lime, fertilized, seeds and feeds.

The farms were located in Grant, Fleming, Marion, Owen, Henry, Shelby and Washington counties.

Burrows Cites Two New Regulations Of Fed. Labor L e w s

Two Orders Cover Employment Of Minors In Hazardous Operations

W. C. Burrow, Commissioner of Industrial Relations, called the attention of Kentucky employers to two new Federal regulations, effective August 1st, governing the employment of minors under eighteen years of age. These regulations are Child Labor Orders No. 4 and 5, issued by the United States Children's Bureau under the child-labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Order No. 5 Commissioner Burrow says, has the effect of establishing eighteen years as the minimum age for employment in occupations involved in the operation of power-driven woodworking machines at these occupations have been declared particularly hazardous for young workers. The following types of employment in connection with woodworking machines are covered by the order: operation power-driven wood-working machines, feeding material into such machines; helping an operator to feed materials into them, having direct contact with superstraps over such machines; and setting up, adjusting, repairing, cling and cleaning them. The order is also covering the operation of circular saws or guillotine-type veneer clippers where such off-bearing is done directly from a saw table or from a round of operation is also covered by the order.

Order No. 4, Mr. Burrow said, has the effect of setting a minimum age of eighteen years in all occupations in logging and all occupations in any sawmill, (with the exception of hand sawing stock mill, with certain exceptions. While Kentucky does not have any logging operations, these regulations are used in a great number of industries in the States.

"I wish especially to call to the attention of employers that a violation of these orders is a violation of the Fair Labor Standards Act, which applies to producer, manufacturer or dealers who ship goods in interstate commerce or deliver such goods by shipment, and heavy penalties are prescribed for such violations," Mr. Burrow said. "Kentucky employers can protect themselves from such violations of the child-labor provisions of the Federal Act by keeping on file certificates of age for all minors claiming to be eighteen or nineteen years old employed in occupations declared hazardous, as well as certificates for all sixteen and seventeen-year-old minors in occupations not declared hazardous, through a cooperative arrangement with the United States Bureau State employment and age certificates are acceptable as proof of age under the Federal Act. Such certificates are issued by the superintendent of schools in the city, county, or independent school district where the minor resides."

State Schools Are Active In Defense Training, Says King

W. P. King, Executive Secretary of the Kentucky Education Association, Louisville, Kentucky, releases the following information on the accomplishments of the schools of the country during the first year of defense training. The following services to the nation have been performed by the schools of the country within the year:

1. They have trained more than a million and a half persons for defense industries. This is more than twice the number which education promised to train with funds allotted by Congress.
2. They have mobilized more than 10,000 city and rural schools to give defense training.
3. They have mobilized 142 colleges of engineering (90 percent) to give short-course training to more than 110,000 engineers.
4. They have adopted in more than five hundred communities the motto "we train in peace, in order to use vocational school equipment twenty-four hours a day."
5. They have given training to half of all the workers hired by expanding aircraft industries.
6. They have helped more than 50,000 WPA workers to buy relief rolls and enter defense industries.
7. They have provided vocational defense training at the low average of twenty-one cents per man-hour.
8. They have operated this program at an overhead cost to the Federal Government of approximately one percent.

Trespassing On Government Land A Federal Offense

Forest Supervisor Warns Against Malicious Practices In Some Areas

In acquiring land within the boundaries of the Cumberland National Forest for National Forest purposes, numerous instances are found where areas are being used by local residents for purposes of cultivation and even building sites, announced Forest Supervisor H. L. Borden today. Supervisor Borden pointed out that the Forest Service recognizes that in many cases

it would cause the local residents hardships if they were required to move and in order to permit them to use and occupy National Forest land, they are required to take out an application after which a permit is issued. A nominal rent being collected if the permittee is financially able to pay, otherwise the rent being waived for that

year. However, Supervisor Borden said there are a few occasions when local residents refuse to apply for a permit and occupy and use government land, even removing timber, in violation of the law. In such instance it is necessary to initiate action in Federal Court in order to secure relief. Recently three such cases developed, two in Jackson County and one in McCreary. Mr. Jones Roberts of McCreary, Kentucky; Jim and Pat Brewer of Muncy, Kentucky, and Henry Tucker of Marshes Siding have been permanently enjoined by the Federal Court from further trespassing, using or occupying government land in their vicinity. National Forest land may be used subject to rules and regulations which are prescribed for their administration and as a last recourse in order to prevent damage and unauthorized use, the Courts must be brought into the picture, said Mr. Borden.

Revenue Campaign Launched By State Highway Division

Commissioner J. Lyter Johnson Introduces Current Program

Enlistment of the entire Kentucky Highway Department in a campaign to promote the highest possible standard of service to motorists, was announced last week by J. Lyter Johnson, Commissioner of Highways, in a memorandum to all highway employees. Pointing out that the Department of Highways, in all of its activities, is maintained exclusively by revenue collected from motor users, the Commissioner stated that "the Department is justified only to the extent that it provides service to those who were responsible for its creation and continued existence."

Requesting that particular assistance be given to tourists to provide for their comfort during visits to Kentucky, Mr. Donaldson said, that he would like to have tourists from other states return to their respective homes with the very definite knowledge that the highway department of Kentucky had rendered to them every friendly and courteous service. "During the next few months," he said, "thousands of motorists from neighboring and foreign states will visit Kentucky and this purpose can be best accomplished by the exhibition on the part of the Highway Department of a friendly interest in those who are guests of the State."

Suggesting that employees familiarize themselves with various routes within the State and best available highways leading to Kentucky's many attractive points of interest, Mr. Donaldson requested that the recently published highway guide entitled, "Kentucky Highways" be made avail-

able to out-of-state visitors in every possible instance, particularly at points of entry into the State.

Kentucky's Share Of Conservation Funds Would Be \$10,070.00

If the proposed Buck Bill, H. R. 3361, to provide federal aid to state fishery restoration projects and a companion bill recently introduced in the Senate by Senator Bennett Champ Clark, of Missouri, as S. 1614 should be enacted by both branches of Congress, Kentucky would be in line to receive \$10,070.51, according to information received by S. A. Wakefield, Director of the Division of Game and Fish from Charles E. Jackson, Acting Director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Apportionment of funds to states for fish restoration and management projects under the proposed Buck Bill, with an appropriation of \$1,000,000, is based according to land area and number of fishing licenses sold. Kentucky with an area of 40,395 square miles would receive \$4,800.92 and having sold 75,025 fishing licenses (figure based on licenses sold during year of 1939) would be apportioned \$5,270.08 on the basis of licenses sold. These two items

would make the total Federal apportionment to Kentucky \$10,070.51.

In order to receive this fund from the federal government, Kentucky must put up the full amount on approved projects and upon their completion the Commonwealth is reimbursed seventy-five cents on every dollar by the Federal Government.

Three years ago Congress passed the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration under which Kentucky has been allotted a total of \$50,125.76. But due to lack of sufficient funds which are available for the Division of Game and Fish for the money set up by the Pittman-Robertson Act for Kentucky has not been completely matched and therefore Kentucky has been unable to fully benefit from the Federal Assistance.

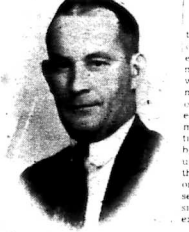

Frank Daugherty Addresses Local Merchants Club

Explains Activities Of Brewers And Beer Distributors Committee

Members of the Morehead Merchants Club heard an outline of the plans and aims of the Kentucky Brewers and Beer Distributors Committee here this week when Frank E. Daugherty, former Kentucky Attorney General who now directs the activities of the Committee addressed the group.

Explaining that the Committee conducts a "clean up or close up" program designed to eliminate the few law-violating licensed retailers of beer in the State he said: "The vast majority of licensed beer dealers in Kentucky operate wholesale orderly outlets. Unfortunately there are a few who, apparently in the belief that their license to sell beer is a shield behind which they can hide to conduct objectionable practices, operate in that way. The Committee is endeavoring to clean up or close up this minority through its self-regulation program and by so doing remove any causes for unjust and unfavorable criticism of the entire industry."

He went on to say that in pursuing this policy the Committee had assisted law enforcement and licensing authorities in the State to cause eighteen dealers to lose their licenses through revocation or suspension; seven license permits were suspended and two roadhouses padlocked.

"The illegal brewing industry in Kentucky is an economic asset to our State," he said adding "it is conservatively valued at \$20,000,000, it contributes approximately \$1,000,000 each year to our State Treasury in licenses and revenues; the Federal government also receives more than \$1,000,000 each year from it and it gives honest employment to about 14,000 Kentuckians."

Launched in May, 1940, the Committee is in its second year of operations, he explained.

Seven licenses were cited, at the request of the Committee, and the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board ordered revoked these licenses. Ours is a long range program and will be continued. The United Brewers Industrial Foundation co-sponsor of our Committee with Kentucky brewers and beer distributors, also co-sponsor thirteen other Committees in that number of States. Many of these other self-regulation organizations are operating for their third year. You can readily see from that that our program is a permanent campaign and will be carried on and on."

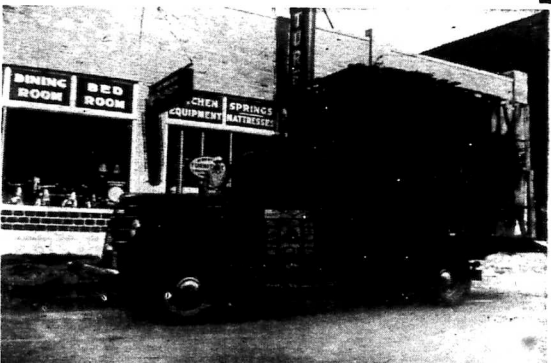

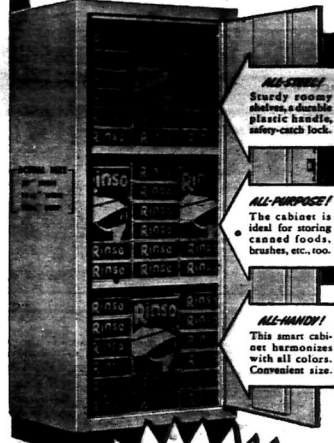

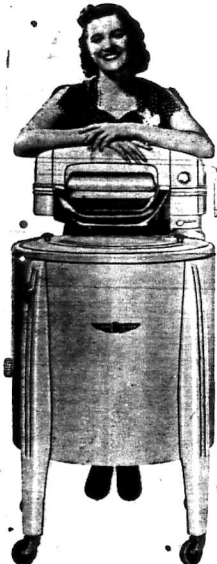

Celebration To Be Held At Blue Licks State Park, Aug. 19

Commemorating the 159th anniversary of the Last Battle of the Revolutionary War, a mammoth patriotic celebration will be staged at Blue Licks State Park in Robertson County August 19th. The annual observance of the date this year will be devoted to a review of "Kentucky's role in national affairs, both past and present and to a recital of advances of Kentuckians to American institutions," according to plans being arranged by I. B. Rose, Carlisle, James M. Wilson, Lexington; W. J. Curtis, custodian of the park, and others.

Marking the burial place of some sixty Kentucky pioneers, who fell in a brief, but bloody battle with an overpowering number of Indians, on August 19, of 1782, Blue Licks State Park is today recognized as a national shrine. A monument bearing the names of pioneers, who were engaged in the battle; a museum containing hundreds of historical relics and other features of historical interest combine with scenic surroundings to make the park one of the most attractive spots in the State. It is expected that many persons from over the entire State and from other States will attend the annual ceremony this year.

Large Peach Crop A Buffer Against Price Raises In Ky.

With the second largest peach crop in ten years, Dean Thomas P. Cooper of the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics believes families on farms, and in towns and cities, will take advantage of the big crop and can, dry peaches or otherwise preserve large quantities of this fruit.

Kentucky is blessed with a million-bushel peach crop. By canning and drying, families can in a measure protect their food budget and at the same time help growers dispose of their peach crop, Dean Cooper pointed out. The Markets Department of the college is helping arrange the widest possible distribution of peaches. Surveys are being made to determine the amounts of

peaches families can use, and the statekeepers are being asked to bring truckloads of carloads to sell in bushel lots. It is believed that several hundred thousand bushels can be sold in this way. To encourage the preservation of fruit, county home demonstration agents, assisted by members of homemakers' clubs, are holding

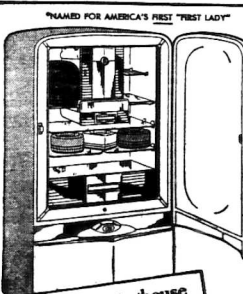

Motor Truck Club Endorses Highway Revenue Campaign

Director Says Load-Limit Laws Hinder Program Effectiveness

A campaign to increase the revenue from Kentucky's highways by encouraging more travel has just been started by State Highway Commissioner J. Lyter Donaldson, the Associated Press reported July 26. Mr. Donaldson pointed out that a hard-surfaced road, carrying two hundred-fifty cars per day, shows a net profit to the state in receipts from gasoline tax and various license fees.

The Donaldson campaign has been endorsed by the Motor Truck Club of Kentucky. It is announced this week by Lew Ulrich, Managing Director of the Club.

The Motor Truck Club supports the program because its statistics prove that in other states primary highway profits from increased transportation have been used for building more highways and particularly to construct secondary "farm to market" roads. However, Mr. Ulrich said, "Kentucky's present weight limit of 12,000 pounds gross on a truck plus its load actually stifles Mr. Donaldson's program from the standpoint of motor transportation. Many interstate trucks by-pass Kentucky because of the load limit since no other state in the Union has a limit of less than 30,000 pounds per truck plus load. "Elimination of this antiquated law, and fair, reasonable new truck legislation would be certain to show an important profit to the Highway Department besides resulting in lower hauling costs for all material imported into and exported from Kentucky by truck. Reform legislation in addition would eliminate the serious bottleneck in Kentucky that now caused by Kentucky's truck transportation laws."
