Mrs. Elizabeth Maxey Dies At Age of 80; At Clearfield Home

Was One Of Heroines Of July Flood When She Saved Her Bedfast Husband

Mrs. Elizabeth Martin Maxey, widow of James M. Maxey, departed this life December 9, 1939. She was born January 8, 1859, in Morgan county. On the 21st of December, 1881 she was united in marriage to James Mount Maxey. To this union was born two sons, John D. Clyde N. Maxey and late Dr. H. Maxey.

Her husband, James Mount Maxey she leaves one son, John B. Maxey, one sister Martha Ann Ellington and a nephew, Mort Ellington to mourn their loss.

Mrs. Maxey was true, loving and devoted wife and mother. Even though frail in body she constantly waited on her invalid husband.

Mrs. Maxey became one of the outstanding heroines of the community, when, aged and weak as she was, she held her husband who was ill in bed at the time, up off the floor, saving his life. All the time she was standing in the water, feeling it rise, up, not knowing that the next wave would engulf her. Steadfastly she stuck to her post, saving the husband who was unable to help himself, forgetful of her own danger, thinking only of the one she loved. When one remembers that at that time she herself was 80 years of age, and weak and not well, she can only be accounted a heroine of the first rank, worthy to take her place among the immortals of the world.

Funeral services were held at home Saturday, December 9, at 2 p. m. with Rev. T. F. Lyons and quartet from the Church of God. She was buried in the Caudill cemetery.

After applying the topic under discussion to the war situation, Dr. Miller concluded: "The law of dictatorship to the intellectual is a simple one; it bids him to pass life on his knees. But an intellectual is not a slave. He is a free man, whether in Europe, in America, in America."
