## 3 Morehead Men Make All-State Team

### Western Only Other Team To Place Three On Squad; Others On Second String

Three weeks ago the Rowan County News predicted that Morehead State Teachers College would have three men on the All K. I. A. S. team. Last week the team was selected and published, and Morehead placed three men on the All-State as well as additional men on the second team and some honorable mentions. All of which supports the contention that the Rowan County News is just a trifle ahead of the parade.

The only other college to place three men on the mythical team was Western which defeated Morehead by two points, 20. Eastern gained two positions, Murray, Louisville and Transylvania one each, while other colleges in the state failed to place a man.

Morehead men on All-State were Rajunas, guard, Bennie Vanzell, back, and Paul Adams, center. Rajunas was rated as the outstanding guard, and received more votes for the team than any other man with the exception of Thurman of Eastern who topped them all with a unanimous vote. The Courier-Journal said about Rajunas: He played sparkling ball all season and was especially outstanding against Murray and Western.

Of Adams it said: He was rated as the perfect passer and was great on defense. He tackled hard, and was in half of Morehead's tackles. Vanzell is a hard-running, consistent ground gainer and an excellent passer.

Rajunas, according to our information, was also selected for an additional honor, placing as guard on the Little All-American team. Rose at tackle and Varney at guard placed on the second All-State team, while Sagady, end, Robertson, end, Ruchinsky, guard, and Lusick, back received honorable mention.

The playhouse will compare favorably with any pool room in much larger centers of the restaurant and lunch counter.

Outstanding for the Eagles was Musmann, who was the only Eagle who tried his wings, or showed any stuff worthy of mention. He was all over the floor, grabbing loose balls and fighting a scrappy game all the way through. Wiggers at center showed considerable improvement over his early season form, but does not appear to have struck his stride as yet. At times he showed up well, but in the main has a long way to go before he reaches his peak.

The Michigan boys showed up with a fighting team of good ball players. They were big and fast and they could hit the bull-eye. That spelled, the difference in the two teams, Michigan, hitting, while the Eagles missed. That of course is not unusual.

The Central Michigan go closed the pre-Christmas season for the Eagles, the next game being scheduled against Cedarville, Ohio College on January 5.
