next season. It may well be that the "Mouse" will be fighting a much more important battle for service, and that, as we all know, is vastly more important than playing any sort of game. But we are bidding for the future rather than for the present, and are looking forward to the day when victory is won. We know that Zechem will prove a valuable asset to our team, and will prove to be as capable a performer with the Philadelphia Eagles as he was with the Morehead Eagles."

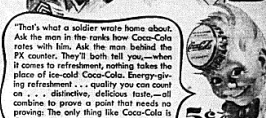

14. Securing Federal aid for education to the end that the state be able to pay for education for their children may not be handicapped in their efforts to provide the necessary education for children in a democracy.

15. Transference of the administration of the House of Reform from the Board of Charities and Corrections to the State Board of Education.

16. Transference of the administration of the School for the Deaf from a separate board to the State Board of Education.

17. The appointment of a State Planning Board made up of outstanding citizens to plan for the longer growth of Kentucky.
