MOREHEAD, Ky.---Former Morehead State University Lady Eagle bowler Kelly Kulick lived out her dream on the first day of June. The MSU graduate won her first professional tournament when she captured the Professional Women's Bowling Association 2003 Women's U.S. Open.

"I'm speechless right now," Kulick said. "I've been so close to winning a title several times and to do it in a major is just a fantasy come true."

In the finals, Kulick defeated Carolyn Dorin-Ballard, 261-195.

Kulick's road to the championship wasn't easy. The 1997 and 1998 Collegiate Bowler of the Year was pushed to the limit right away in her opening match with Leanne Barrette. The two finished 12 frames with a score of 213; however, Kulick won a two-frame rolloff, 39-35.

The 26-year-old former three-time college All-American had an easier time in her second bout as she eliminated the Bowler of the Decade for the 1990s, Wendy Macpherson, 221-179.

"After the second match I think I settled down a lot," Kulick said. "The four women I had to beat are some of the best bowlers of all-time. Once the game with Wendy ended, I think I started to enjoy what I was doing and just let it fly."

In the semi-finals, Kulick, who help guide MSU to National Championship in 1998, continued to strike with ease as she defeated Michelle Feldman, 256-174.

In the finals, Dorin-Ballard gave Kulick a run for her money. The six-time Women's International Bowling Congress All-American spared in the opening frame and then strung together a four-bagger. Kulick responded to Dorin-Ballard's pressure by striking in six straight.

"Kelly put on a show today," said Dorin-Ballard. "It was her time to win. I had a little trouble finding a consistent line to play in the later frames but in the first half of the match she never wilted."

The capacity crowd on hand gave the teary-eyed Kulick a series of standing ovations thru the 9th and 10th frames.

"Kelly is a fantastic pro and a great person," said Dorin-Ballard. "Obviously I'm disappointed I couldn't win but I'm also very happy for her. She's worked hard for this."

For her efforts Kulick, the PWBA 2001 Rookie of the Year, took home a first place check worth \$30,000.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State Public Radio's broadcast antenna, severely damaged in the February ice storm, is scheduled for repair beginning Tuesday, June 3. The antenna, which is more than 450 feet from the base of Kentucky Educational Television's tower on Triangle Hill, will be repaired by Central Tower of Indiana. The work will likely render MSPR unable to broadcast for a couple of days.

WMKY (90.3 FM), the flagship station of the MSPR network, has been operating at reduced power since the storm briefly knocked it off the air Feb. 16. The station resumed broadcasting the next day but has not been able to operate at its authorized power of 50,000 watts because of impairment to the antenna.

MSPR's ordeal, which has lasted more than four months, was prolonged by structural damage to the KET tower and heavy rains this spring. The tower needed to be stabilized before it could be declared safe for a crew to climb and work on the radio package. A contractor was in Morehead recently to adjust tension on guy wires and pave the way for the antenna repairs. However, significant and sustained precipitation in the region since then has delayed work on the MSPR antenna.

Morehead State Public Radio will be going off the air about 9:35 a.m., Tuesday, June 3, and will be down until repairs are completed. Once the antenna is repaired, the network's signal is expected to be louder, stronger and clearer than ever before.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Nashville Bluegrass Band, Larry Sparks and the Lonesome Ramblers, Ronnie Reno and the Reno Tradition and the Isaacs will be among the Bluegrass music headliners performing this weekend at Bluegrass 'n More, A Celebration of Appalachian Heritage, in downtown Morehead.

Free and open to the public, the music on the Main Stage on First Street goes from 4 to 11 p.m. on Friday, from noon to 11 p.m. on Saturday, and from 1 to 6 p.m. on Sunday. Free shuttle buses will run to and from festival venues and free parking areas on the U.S. 60 bypass.

“We have some of the greatest individual musicians in Bluegrass, folk and gospel music doing live shows again this year as we continue to build Bluegrass 'n More into one of the best music festivals in the country,” said Don Rigsby, festival co-chair and director of Morehead State University’s Kentucky Center for Traditional Music.

Also performing during the weekend will be the Dowden Sisters, Dave Evans, Pete and Joan Wernick, Darrell Scott, Melvin Goins and Windy Mountain, Michael Jonathan, Mark Johnson and Emory Lester, Billy Blues, Paul Smith, Endless Highway, Ford MacNeill, Mount Pisgah and the Primitive Quartet.

In addition to 25 hours of music, the festival’s weekend schedule includes two performances of “Miss Cora”, a play about Rowan County native Cora Wilson Stewart, the founder of adult education. Saturday’s daytime events include the Appalachian Arts and Crafts Fair at MSU’s Laughlin Health Building and A Day in The Country Folk Art Show in a tent near the Kentucky Folk Art Center. Food and merchandise will be available throughout the festival from vendors in tents on First Street. The Moonlight Schoolhouse will serve as an information center and the offices of WIKO Radio will be festival headquarters.

Photo and art exhibitions will be displayed Friday and Saturday at the Morehead Depot, CoffeeTree Books and the Kentucky Folk Art Center. A woodcarving event is set for Sunday in the KFAC tent.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Jamie Nichole Blair, **Oil Springs** senior, captured the prestigious title as she was crowned the 2003 Kentucky Mountain Laurel Festival Queen during the 73<sup>rd</sup> annual event held in Pineville.

The Kentucky Mountain Laurel Festival, the oldest known festival of its kind in the United States, draws thousands of visitors from around the state and nation to celebrate the blooming of the Mountain Laurel in Southeastern Kentucky.

"I was shocked," said Blair of winning the title. "It's a very big honor, not only to represent Morehead State, but also to win the pageant. It was a wonderful experience and the people treated me great."

Blair, the daughter of James R. and Nancy Blair, represented the University in the pageant after being named the 2002 MSU Homecoming Queen.

The festival began as an event to honor Dr. Thomas Walker, pioneer explorer and surveyor. In 1931, then Gov. Flem D. Sampson suggested that each college in Kentucky have a contest and select a girl to be its representative in the festival to vie for Mountain Laurel Queen.

The festival has been an annual event since its inception, except for the World War II years, 1942-1947

"The young ladies that we see here today represent thousands of other young Kentuckians, male and female, that aspire to greatness, that understand that greatness can only come through education and hard work and that beauty is much more than skin deep," Gov. Paul Patton said.

Blair, a radiological sciences major, joined Sharon Lu Goldsberry (1975) and Kelly Michele Holdren (1982) as MSU winners of the Kentucky Mountain Laurel Festival Pageant.

If you are interested in becoming an entrepreneur then, you will want to attend the "Starting and Financing Your Business" workshop which will be held from 5:30-7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 17, at 310 Combs building on the MSU campus.

The seminar will focus on a variety of issues dealing with the start-up of a business. Topics will include financial considerations, business planning, business selection, sources of loans, permits and licenses, and advertising and marketing issues.

Additionally, the workshop will focus on financing opportunities for businesses, with emphasis on the Small Business Administration. There is no charge to attend the seminar, but advanced registration is necessary due to limited seating.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Timber Academy for Secondary Science and Social Studies Teachers will host a workshop, titled "The Studying the Economic and Environmental Importance of Forests for Eastern Kentucky," June 23-27 at Morehead State University.

This workshop is funded by a \$57,725 grant from the Kentucky Department of Education for MSU's teacher academy program.

As part of the residential program, room, lodging and teaching materials will be provided. Thirty participants will receive a \$500 stipend.

The Timber Academy for Secondary Science and Social Studies Teachers is focused on the environmental and economic importance of forests for Eastern Kentucky. As schools spend more time with standardized tests, they are beginning to realize the limits of these instruments for teaching students.

The Timber Academy program will offer teachers training that will supplement their classroom requirements. Teachers will receive training on writing in the content areas and techniques to aid in portfolio production. The State Division of Forestry personnel will offer instruction in a curriculum called "Project Learning Tree."

Also, teachers will take part in a problem-based learning scenario, a task that requires teamwork to put content knowledge to work.

Science teachers will work with MSU biologists that are studying the migratory birds that include Eastern Kentucky in their itinerary and as well as observation of an MSU bird banding project.

Social studies teachers will benefit from conversations with workers in the regional timber industry. The group will visit local mills and timber cutting sites, discuss international trade, and the importance of forests to the economy of this region.

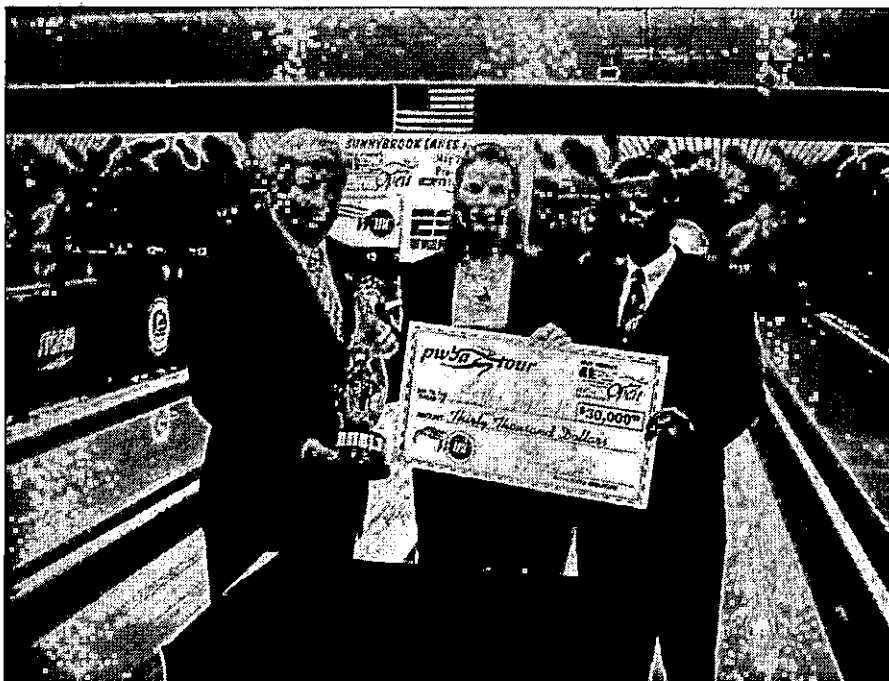

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has partnered with Southeast Community College, Hazard Community College and Eastern Kentucky University to expand the area served by the Commonwealth Educational Opportunity Centers.

This spring, three new CEOC centers began assisting adults in Bell, Clay, Harlan, Leslie, Letcher, Perry, Knott, and Knox counties to become enrolled in a technical, community college or university.

The Commonwealth Educational Opportunity Center was founded by Morehead State University in 1991 to serve 20 counties in eastern and northeastern Kentucky (Bath, Boyd, Breathitt, Carter, Elliott, Estill, Fleming, Floyd, Greenup, Johnson, Lawrence, Lee, Lewis, Magoffin, Martin, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Owsley, Pike, Powell, Rowan, and Wolfe). An additional four counties (Estill, Lee, Powell, Owsley) were added in 1999.

The centers, funded by the U.S. Department of Education through Title IV of the Higher Education Act and sponsored by MSU, address the needs of adults who have expressed an interest in enrolling into a program of postsecondary education at any institution of high education. The field staff of seven College Access Counselors and three Educational Outreach Specialists travel each week to the 32 counties in the target area providing information about educational programs and financial aid availability and providing assistance with completing college applications and the Free Application for Financial Student Aid (FAFSA). The CEOC also provides small group workshops on study skills, financial aid, career decision-making, computer literacy and other topics

The newest centers that serve the expanded area are on the campus of Hazard Community College in Hazard, the Middlesboro Campus of Southeast Community College, and at the Eastern Kentucky University Center in Corbin. CEOC centers are located on the campus of Morehead State University in Morehead, and at the MSU campuses in Ashland, Jackson, Prestonsburg and West Liberty and at the Department for Employment Services in Pikeville.

The centers provide services to more than 3,000 persons each year and assists more than 1,100 to become enrolled.

By furthering their education and completing a college degree, adults in these 32 counties will have improved job skills and career options, thus increasing their employability. "All services are free of charge to potential students," said Dail Howard, CEOC project director.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Industrial Education and Technology (IET) has added two new courses in Digital Signal Processing (DSP) for the fall term.

Digital Signal Processing techniques are being widely used in many areas of science, technology and engineering. Application of DSP methods range from image, voice, data and video processing to pattern recognition, classification, optimization and compression.

The new courses, with descriptions, are:

**\*EET 500 – Digital Signal Processing I.** Prerequisite: EET 344 or permission of instructor. This course provides an introduction to digital signal processing. Upon completion of the course, students will be familiar with the fundamentals of DSP methods and applications using the interactive MATLAB signal processing toolbox.

**\*EET 550 – Digital Signal Processing II.** Prerequisite: EET 500 or permission of instructor. This course provides an introduction to advance topics in digital signal processing, such as linear estimation and prediction analysis, signal modeling, lattice filters, spectral estimation and adaptive filters; signal processing algorithms and techniques used in a broad range of applications.

A lab will accompany each course.

IET currently offers two-year and four-year degrees in industrial technology, as well as a master's degree in industrial technology. Options within the degree programs include: construction/mining, electricity/electronics, computer-aided design and graphics, manufacturing/robotics and telecommunications and computer technology area.

The department also offers a bachelor's degree in industrial education and a master's degree in career and technical education.

IET encourages cooperative education, which allows students to gain valuable work experience and receive college credit. Through chapters on campus, students can choose to participate with nationally recognized organizations such as the Society of Manufacturing Engineers (SME) and the National Association of Industrial Technology (NAIT).

Dr. Hans-Hinrich Thedens, an associate professor of music at the Norwegian Collection of Folk Music at the University of Oslo (Norway), spent a day at KCTM and visited the main campus.

Thedens was on a sabbatical and part of his trip was to compare and study the traditional music of the United States to the situation in Norway.

“His main interest was to study the methods used here at MSU to teach our traditional music classes. He also wanted to explore the KCTM archives of traditional Kentucky fiddle music and see what technology was being used to preserve the collections,” said Jesse R. Wells, KCTM's education coordinator.

Theden’s interest and performing instrument is the Hardanger fiddle, the native traditional string instrument in Norway.

He was interested in American fiddle music, especially from the state of Kentucky, and got to view some of the history collected on the MSU Web site when he visited the Camden-Carroll Library.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents has approved a \$96.3 million budget that includes a 15 percent increase in tuition and mandatory fees for the 2003-2004 fiscal year starting July 1.

The budget reflects a 4.5 percent increase from the last fiscal year and addresses the 2.47 percent reduction in state appropriations. Funding for the budget increase will be generated from enrollment growth, increased student tuition and fees, and higher housing rates.

MSU achieved enrollment growth of 4 percent during the 2002-2003 academic year with a fall student headcount of 9,390. Tuition and fees for the coming year will be \$1,682, an increase of \$219 per semester for an undergraduate resident of Kentucky.

The University is completing the final year of its multi-year plan to install sprinkler systems and upgrade other fire safety systems in student residence halls.

The Regents approved a 5 percent increase in the salary pool for MSU's 1,045 employees, in addition to a \$1,000 annual increase for salaried employees and a 25 cents per hour increase for hourly employees. Another 2 percent was provided for equity adjustments for faculty members. President Ronald G. Eaglin's salary for 2003-2004 will be \$188,000.

The operating budget included a 12.6 percent increase in medical insurance with MSU's contribution increasing to \$4,296 per person.

In other business, commendations were presented to Dr. Charles M. Rhodes of Ashland for his distinctive service as a Regent since 1992, and Jason Rainey of Winchester, outgoing president of the Student Government Association who served one year as the student regent.

The Board reviewed the University's Six-Year Capital Plan, which details capital projects with an estimated scope of more than \$400,000 and equipment purchases of more than \$100,000. High on the list of priorities is the construction of the Space Science Center Classroom Building, Phase II of the renovation and expansion of the Student Center, and renovation and expansion of Camden-Carroll Library.

He also completed a three-year course in the University of Kentucky's College of Business Management Institute and is a graduate of APPA Institute for Facilities Management.

Caudill was the 1996 recipient of MSU's Distinguished Service Award, which is given to a University employee who exemplifies the highest ideals of citizenship and service.

Her very long work history is one of diversity, progressive responsibility and serving as confidant to executives in several varied industries."

Buchanan entered the workforce in 1940 when she accepted a position as an administrative secretary with Cabin Crafts in Dalton, Ga. She next worked with the Farm Security Administration in London, and while her husband was in the armed forces during WWII, she did public stenographic work for wholesale grocery and dry goods companies, coal operators, insurance agents and other businesses.

Buchanan's past employment experience at the University includes working as a secretary for the vice president of research and development from 1973-75. She was the Gateway Area Development District's executive secretary for more than 10 years.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Earth Day celebrations on Morehead State University's campus have been declared a great success, with hundreds of pounds of trash removed from campus grounds, and tens of thousands of cigarette butts collected.

Students for Environmental Awareness (SEA) Club kicked off the programs with a campus cleanup. The nine volunteers collected 10,422 cigarette butts and much more litter. The SEA displayed the trash at its "One Mother (Earth) of a Concert," which featured live music, an environmental skit, local speakers, displays and a tree giveaway.

In early May, volunteers turned out for another cleanup, the annual Earth Day Challenge. A total of 187 volunteers collected cigarette butts and other trash, removed exotic plants and participated in native plant landscaping throughout MSU's campus. Their lunch waste was recycled as much as possible, with only 1.5 garbage can bags (33-gallon capacity) going to the landfill – the remaining waste was composted or recycled.

The final count for the cleanup projects was 53,498 butts collected, 320 pounds of recyclable items and 400 pounds of non-recyclable litter. Total volunteer hours were 782.25.

A trainer for the Kentucky Teacher Internship since its inception in 1982, Blair was appointed to its advisory board, which serves to revise and update the program and its assessments.

Blair was named director of student teaching in 1988. When the Educational Service Unit was established, she assumed additional responsibilities for teacher education program admissions, field experience scheduling, certification application processing and the internship program. She also serves as faculty adviser for the Kentucky Education Association Student Program.

An active participant in state, national and international professional organizations and events, Blair has presented at both the Kentucky Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education annual conferences. She has served as an editor for the Appalachian Educational Laboratory and as a project reviewer for Phi Delta Kappa District VII.

During the past two years, she has served on the Scholastic Audit Review Committees for schools identified as level two or three. She has been a member of the Kentucky Leadership Academy which worked on education reform issues with public school administrators within MSU's service region. Blair was among the original writers of the proposal which led to the University's receipt of a \$1.5 million federal grant, Preparing Tomorrow's Teacher in Technology (PT3), to improve technology skills for preservice teachers.

Through contacts made by Blair, MSU and the University of Sunderland in Sunderland, England, initiated a Student Teacher Exchange Program in 1990. Since its inception, 126 students have participated in the exchange program.

Research generated by the program also has provided opportunities for public school and MSU education faculty to travel, collaborate and publish internationally. Fifteen classroom teachers from Sunderland's public schools and 18 MSU and public school faculty from East Kentucky worked in classrooms outside their country as participants in the Technology Research Project. Children in each country used computers in their classrooms.

Another program, the PACE Research Project, focused on Time on Task in Classrooms in Kentucky and Great Britain. A third project, Student Motivation and Cultural Differences, included educators and students from England, St. Petersburg, Russia, and Kentucky.

While visiting schools in Russia, a principal and teacher expressed a desire to bring their students to America. Blair solicited and coordinated support from MSU and the Morehead community to accomplish the venture. Nine Russian students, their teacher and principal spent two weeks in Rowan County, living with local families while visiting classes at the University, public school classrooms, local industries/businesses as well participating in cultural/recreational activities.

Blair has held numerous positions in the Morehead community. She served as president of the MSU Women's Club, and as a member of the Executive Board of Habitat for Humanity and Executive Committee for Sister Cities. She is a long time member of the First Baptist Church.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Gary Mesa-Gaido, associate professor of art at Morehead State University, was one of 12 artists whose decorated dinosaurs were unveiled to officially launch Carnegie Museum of Natural History's "DinoMite Days" held in Pittsburgh.

Hand-decorated by talented artists throughout the country, the project will be distributed to Pittsburgh's parks, plazas and public streets. A colorful combination of Tyrannosaurus Rex, Stegosaurus and Torosaurus dinosaur replicas paraded into the museum's Hall of Architecture accompanied by their artists and school children, some of who also created and painted the reptiles.

Mesa-Gaido's "Philipsaurus" was named after its inspiration, Philip Johnson's PPG building. It was composed entirely of reflective glass and mirrors.

Cutting the mirrors into different shapes, Mesa-Gaido then stuck each individual piece to the dinosaur's fiberglass shell to create what was described as a "glittering masterpiece."

Mesa-Gaido and his wife, Elizabeth, associate professor of art, were both selected to produce exhibits for the event, which combines individual artistry with dinosaur replicas that are as scientifically accurate as possible.

The projects were made of fiberglass and then adorned or decorated by the regional artists. There were three types of dinosaurs featured in the exhibit, which is free to the public,

Those are the T.rex (7 feet tall and 10 feet long), Torosaurus: (4 feet 7 inches high by 10 feet) and the Stegosaurus (5 feet .75 inches by 9 feet 5 inches)

An art jury comprised of representatives from Pittsburgh art organizations selected the artists. Each received a \$2,500 honorarium.

Donna Panazzi, vice president of the Laurel Foundation, said "This exhibition is a wonderful opportunity for businesses and individuals to come together to support the many organizations that have a tremendous impact on our region. We believe DinoMite Days will unite our region like never before."

The dinosaurs will then be sold to the highest bidder at a fund-raising gala auction on Oct. 4.

"Through the generous support of the Laurel Foundation and sponsors, the exhibit and auction will raise funds for nonprofit organizations that ensure that knowledge, art and science never become extinct," said Ted Hermann, director of marketing for Carnegie Museum of Natural History.

The sponsor of each dinosaur will select a nonprofit organization to receive half of the proceeds from the auctioned dinosaur. The other half of the proceeds will benefit programming related to the renovation and expansion of Carnegie Museum of Natural History's dinosaur exhibits.

Each dinosaur will feature a plaque with the names of the sponsor and artist.

The Pittsburgh Art Commission, which has approved the public art project, will work with the museum and the city of Pittsburgh to select public sites across the city for the "DinoMite Days" dinosaurs.

The exhibit is scheduled to conclude in late September.

Founded in 1895, Carnegie Museum of Natural History ranks among the six largest natural history museums in the United States, with more than 20 million specimens, objects and artifacts.

The museum is the world's third-largest repository of dinosaur fossils and contains one of the world's greatest collections of publicly displayed dinosaur skeletons, as well as one of the foremost collections of gems and minerals. The museum is a distinguished research institution and a dynamic, family-friendly destination.

At the end of the public display period, sponsors will donate their dinosaurs back to "DinoMite Days" for auction. These dinosaurs will join several other pre-selected dinosaurs that will be auctioned on Oct. 18, at 7 p.m. at the Pittsburgh Convention Center.

Fifty percent of the proceeds raised at the final auction will be donated to a charity of the sponsor's choosing, while the remaining 50 percent will go toward the rebuilding of Carnegie Museum of Natural History's Dinosaur Hall.

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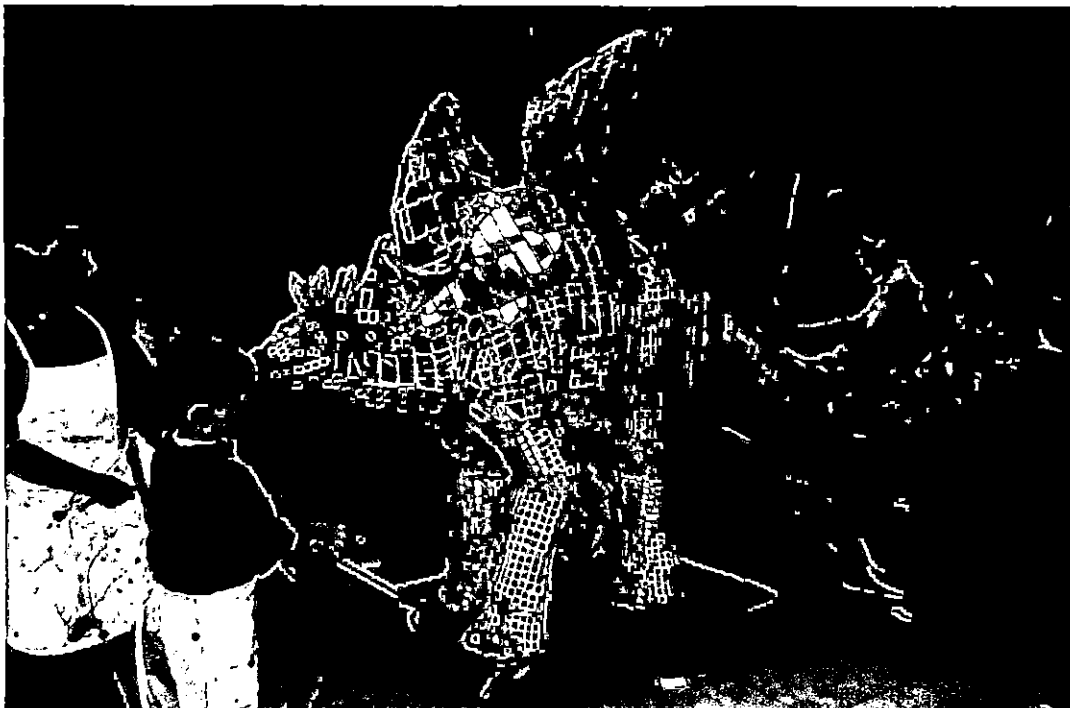
