What Lincoln Means

 There is no more beautiful story than that of the rise of a struggling youth from poverty and penury to a position of affluence and power. The successful fight against adversity and hardships, the victory over early defeats and disappointments, the patient but firm faith in his future were mile-

stones along the way that the boy Lincoln traveled as he sought his destiny. No gifted literary genius has ever conceived of more romantic character than Lincoln was.

The story of Lincoln is a strange and mysterious one. Patient seekers after truth have tramped over the fields Lincoln traversed as a boy and later as a young man; they have studied the records in court-houses and in archives in Springfield, Indiana, and in Washington; they have brought from hiding places the musty volumes of old newspapers from Kentucky, Indiana, and Illinois; they have invaded the privacy of personal letters written by Lincoln, to Lincoln, about Lincoln, and they have sought out acquaintances of Lincoln. By all these means they have tried to learn more about this man of mystery and destiny. Lincoln was strangely silent on this matter. If we would find the truth, we must seek elsewhere.

He said that if ever was an orphan to be was due to his angel mother. She lived but eight years after he was born and there must have been something powerful passing between mother and son during the brief years they were together. The world will probably never know what that mysterious something was. After 130 years Lincoln is still the man of mystery. The more scholars seek to learn about him, the more thoroughly are they baffled in their efforts to find the real truth. But even though we cannot understand all that we can learn great lessons from his life and it is fitting that we study them together for a while today.

The first great lesson that we learn from Lincoln is that we must have faith in our democracy. Where else but in a democracy could a character such as Lincoln have been produced? This is the peculiar quality of a democracy. Genius is no respecter of person. It plays no favorites. It anoints the heads of children in the homes of the rich and poor alike. Genius sometimes seeks its habitation on the prairie, in the wild mountain fastnesses, or in college and university halls. But wherever genius resides in an atmosphere of freedom, it reaches great heights and becomes indispensable to society. It is a mistaken idea that to the aristocracy and the so-called best families belong the greatest intellects and these most capable of leadership. We no longer subscribe

to the "Divine Right of Kings" or favored few but in a democracy, we believe the door of every home, both humble and proud, should be left ajar so that out of it may come those who are to carry on the work of leadership so vital to the wellbeing of the nation.
