MOREHEAD, Ky.--Kentucky schools and communities are experiencing a shortage of counselors, and that need is expected to increase with the development of community programs and the retirement of current counselors.

To help reduce those shortages, a state professional organization is offering scholarship assistance in cooperation with Morehead State University and six other institutions of higher learning.

Through the Kentucky Counseling Association (KCA), MSU will provide one tuition waiver to a qualified student who is interested in becoming a school counselor. The scholarship, to be used in a summer 2004 academic session, includes a \$100 textbook grant.

Potential scholarship recipients must already have earned an undergraduate degree, and must include a letter of recommendation with their application. They must also provide documentation of acceptance into the participating university.

Preference will be granted to beginning master's degree students who have earned fewer than 15 hours. The deadline for submitting materials is April 15.

In addition to MSU, the cooperating colleges or universities include: Eastern Kentucky University, Lindsey Wilson College, University of Louisville, Murray State University, Western Kentucky University and Xavier University.

KCA is a group of counseling professionals who work in educational, health care, residential, private practice, community agency, government, business and industrial settings. The organization is a state branch of the American Counseling Association. KCA has more than 1,400 members statewide.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The accounting students in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistant (VITA) program at Morehead State University will continue to offer free income tax assistance to students and low-income families through the tax filing season.

Since the program began in early February, the students have prepared hundreds of forms on consecutive Tuesdays. During March, the students will be taking two breaks.

The Vita Program will not be offered on March 9 as classes in Combs Building will be dismissed while the University hosts Future Business Leaders of America. Students will enjoy another break on March 23 when MSU enjoys spring break (March 22-26).

Sponsored by the IRS and MSU's Department of Accounting, Economics and Finance, the Vita Program provides free assistance for families with an income of less than \$35,000. The service is not available for those whose returns involve self-employment income, rental income, or capital gains and losses. Individuals are encouraged to check with a VITA volunteer for details.

The income tax returns are prepared by the University's accounting students, under the supervision of Sharon T. Walters, CPA and associate professor of accounting.

The VITA site, located in 311 Combs Building, is open on Tuesdays, 3-5:30 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

Taxpayers should bring all tax documents for 2003 and a copy of their 2002 tax return. Students also should bring information regarding scholarships, tuition, fees and books for the 2003 calendar year.

International students may contact Pam Jaisingh, international student services coordinator, 329 Allie Young Hall, for information sheets and scheduled dates.

In accordance with new Internal Revenue Service rules, VITA will require that taxpayers provide photo identification. Social Security cards for the taxpayer(s) and any dependents will be required. Copies cannot be accepted.

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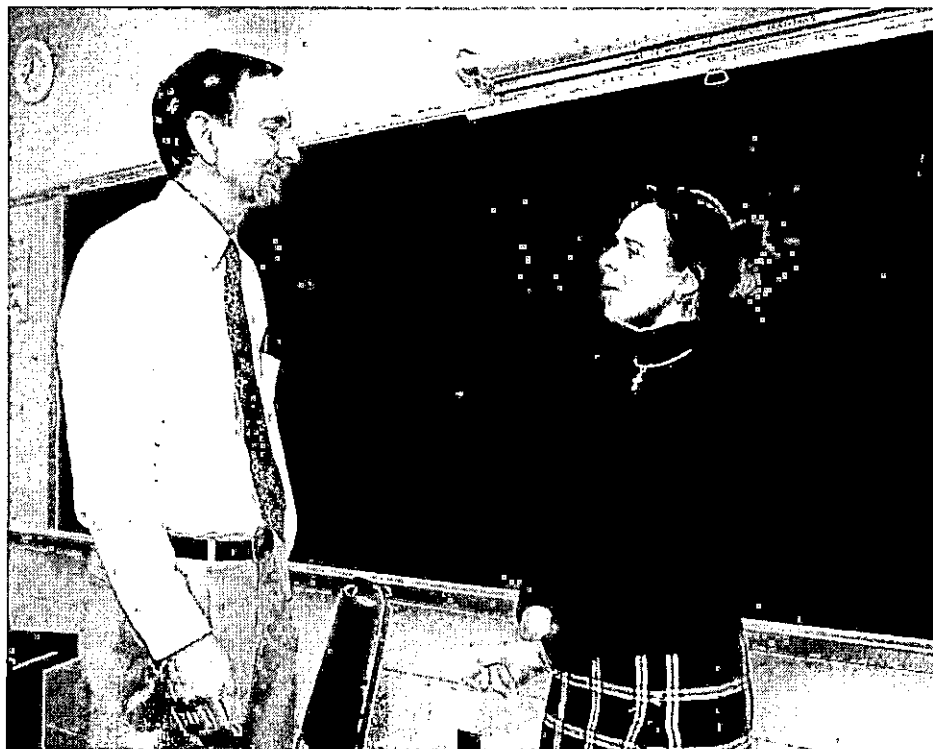

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Teacher Recruitment Program in the College of Education is working with nine high schools and four members of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System to implement the "College Cadet Dual Credit Course," (formerly known as Teacher Cadet) for high school juniors and seniors.

MSU has partnerships with four members of KCTCS - Ashland Community and Technical College, Maysville Community and Technical College, Big Sandy Community and Technical College in Prestonsburg and Southeast Community and Technical College in Middlesboro - to provide successful students with three hours of college credit free of charge.

The nine high schools involved are East Ridge, Fleming County, Johnson Central, Letcher, Magoffin County, Mason County, Shelby Valley, West Carter and Whitesburg.

A fourth unit was added in 2003 to the curriculum to ensure that students meet the requirements as outlined in the course "Foundations of Education." The class will require students to observe for 16 hours in a school setting (elementary, middle, high), work alongside a mentor teacher, attend school based decision making council (SBDM) and board of education meetings, write a philosophy of education statement, and participate in a "student-teaching" situation along with other assignments.

The Teacher Recruitment Program is involved in assisting with the implementation of Future Educator of America (FEA) chapters within area high schools. These students meet and interact with teachers and administrators to learn more about the field of education.

In Sept. 2003, Morehead State University held its first Regional Future Educator Conference. Students from several of the program counties attended and entered competition events.

The conference winners advanced to Kentucky's first state competition. Fleming County High School received two awards for essay and chapter display and moved ahead to the National FEA Conference in Dallas.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's College of Science and Technology has announced that 100 percent of students who completed the dietetic internship in 2002-03 have passed the dietetic registration examination.

The MSU dietetic internship is a 10-month program with an emphasis in general dietetics which begins in the fall semester and concludes at the end of summer school. The internship is designed to accept up to 10 interns per year.

Upon completion of the internship program, students are eligible to take the national dietetic certification test, accredited by the American Dietetic Association. After passing the exam, students receive a certificate of completion and are then qualified to work in health care organizations.

Minimum requirements for students wishing to apply to the dietetics program include: baccalaureate degree from a U.S. regionally accredited college/university or a foreign degree equivalent to at least a U.S. baccalaureate degree with a minimum of 2.75 grade point average on a 4.0 scale. The degree must meet requirements as identified in the current edition of the Directory of Dietetic Programs of the American Dietetic Association.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- The only known survivor of the infamous "Railroad Killer" Angel Maturino Resendiz will share her story with the students, faculty and staff of Morehead State University along with the citizens of Rowan County.

Holly K. Dunn survived the attack by Resendiz in 1997. A notorious serial killer, Resendiz took at least nine lives in Kentucky, Texas and Illinois. Dunn and her boyfriend, Chris Maier, were attacked on August 28, 1997, in Lexington. At the time, both were students at the University of Kentucky. He was killed. She was raped, beaten and left for dead.

Though Dunn's life has been dramatically affected and changed by the attack, she prides herself on living as a survivor, not a victim. She survived and later testified at trial against her attacker. Even though her physical and emotional scars remain, she wants to share her story with others.

"It makes me feel good to know that I can help other people and that I have something that can inspire them and can tell them something that will make them more aware," said the 27-year-old Dunn.

Her talk will be part of "Face to Face with Sexual Assault" that will be held on Tuesday, March 16, at 7 p.m. in Duncan Recital Hall in Baird Music Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

Immediately following Dunn's presentation, there will be a brief panel discussion with professionals on campus and in the Rowan County community - counselors, nurses, victim advocates, attorneys, police, etc. - that a victim might come in contact with after a sexual assault.

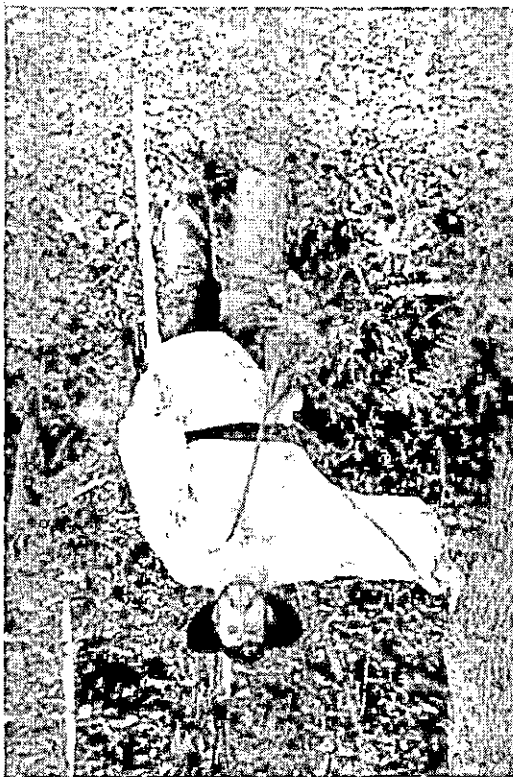
Sparks' next book length project is a biography of "Raccoon John" Smith, the most famous and flamboyant preacher in Eastern Kentucky during the frontier era.

The event is presented by the Cave Run Storytelling Festival and Morehead State Public Radio. Doors open at 6:30 p.m.

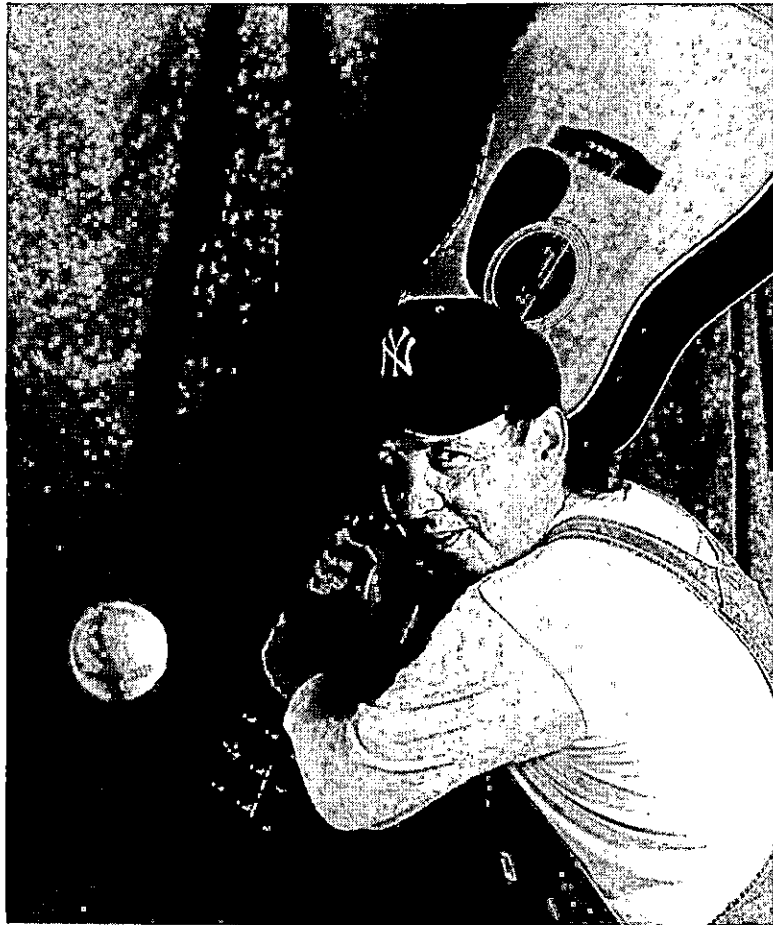
