MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has joined the ranks of Embry-Riddle, Florida Institute of Technology and City University of New York as the only universities in the United States to offer a Bachelor of Science degree in space science.

The new program was approved by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education earlier this year.

“Without a doubt, the Space Science Center will be the most exciting and influential program in East Kentucky,” said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. “Space is the future and being able to prepare students for work in this field will be challenging, but the accomplishment will make others become aware of this campus and its educators.”

The curriculum will make a positive impact on the state's economy by preparing Kentuckians for careers in physics, astrophysics, satellite telecommunications, electrical engineering, mathematics, computer science and wireless technology.

Morehead's Space Science Center was established in January 2001 after a Space Act Agreement was signed with NASA. The Space Science Center will operate a 21 Meter Space Tracking Antenna for research and student training that is expected to come online in December.

MSU's Space Science Center will provide a research and educational facility with state-of-the art laboratories for undergraduate students in space science. Space science is an extremely interdisciplinary and technology-intensive discipline that encompasses physics, astrophysics, satellite telecommunications, electrical engineering, mathematics and computer sciences.

New degree programs to be offered will include: B.S. in Space Science, and B.S. in Physics with an Area of Concentration in Astrophysics and a Minor in Astronomy. Morehead State University has received significant funding from NASA, the Kentucky Science and Engineering Foundation, National Science Foundation and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Morehead State University professor recently led a group of fellow geologists on a field trip to explore the remains of old volcanoes off the coast of Maine.

Dr. Marshall Chapman, associate professor of geology, was among 16 world-class volcanologists participating in the Fifth Bostok Conference on Layered Intrusions, held June 13-19 in the Coastal Maine Magmatic Province.

Originally convened by professor emeritus Alex R. McBirney of the University of Oregon, the Bostok conference is an assembly of the best researchers in deep-seated magma chambers from around the world. The invitation-only event included scientists from Finland, Scotland, England, Canada and the U.S.

Dr. Chapman completed his doctoral dissertation on the igneous rock of the island when he was a student working under Professor J. Michael Rhodes of the University of Massachusetts. Last year, he and Rhodes were approached by Dr. McBirney to serve as facilitators for this conference.

“The astonishing thing about these rocks is that the exposure is so pristine, and 420 million years of erosion has brought the igneous rock to the surface,” Dr. Chapman said. “As such, walking along the rocky coast on these islands allows one to explore and examine the plumbing system of a volcano. The rocks that I uncovered here clearly show what was happening in the magma chamber a couple of miles beneath the volcano.”

The conference was held aboard the Grace Bailey, an authentically-restored schooner built in 1880. The vessel is listed as a National Historic Landmark. The scientists explored the island by day and met in the evenings aboard ship to discuss their findings and to present their current research.

“All of the researchers on this trip have modeled what they think is going on in the magma chamber,” Dr. Chapman said. “The rocks I studied either confirm, reject, or modify their theories.”

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has announced that Boneal Inc., a local engineering and manufacturing solutions company, will support a four-year ROTC scholarship for the Eagle Battalion.

The company, headquartered in Means, sponsors scholarships at universities and colleges throughout the state and region.

Candidates for the Boneal Leadership Scholarship must complete a degree in science, math, computer science or industrial technology. Following their senior year, the student will be commissioned in the Army as a second lieutenant and have the opportunity to serve in the Army National Guard, Reserves or Active duty.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A Kentucky attorney has been selected to lead an economic development center whose mission is to assist technology-based entrepreneurs in an eight-county region.

Johnathan Gay is the new director of the West Liberty Area Innovation Center, a cooperative service of Morehead State University's College of Business and Eastern Kentucky University's Center for Economic Development, Entrepreneurship and Technology.

His responsibilities will include finding technology-based entrepreneurs in Bath, Lee, Magoffin, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Powell and Wolfe counties. Businesses eligible for assistance through the center include manufacturers (small and large-scale), computer-based business, medical technology and more.

Once the entrepreneurs are located, he will then assist them with issues and concerns about their companies, including conducting research, finding access to capital and offering general business advice.

Gay will work closely with MSU, the Area Development Districts (ADDs), University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension agents and others to help the business owners.

"We are attempting to nurture and grow a new type of economy and to take advantage of our intellectual ability in a way that brings jobs and dollars into this region," Gay said. "I look forward to sitting down with aspiring entrepreneurs to see what we can do to help them turn a dream into a reality."

A graduate of ECU and the University of Kentucky's College of Law, Gay previously worked as an attorney in a general practice firm in London. He now lives in Hazel Green with his wife and son.

His new office is located in the Morgan County Regional Technology Center in West Liberty, where new startup businesses are being encouraged to locate.

"Ultimately, our goal is to assist these entrepreneurs in creating wealth and jobs in Eastern and Central Kentucky," he said. "Whether these entrepreneurs are working out of their garage creating special machine parts or creating software, I'm here to assist."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University at Prestonsburg will honor its former director with the "Second Annual Margaret Lewis Motorcycle Ride" on Sunday, Aug. 1.

Dr. Lewis, who served as director of the regional campus center for more than 10 years, was killed in an automobile accident in December 2002. Money from the motorcycle ride fundraiser will assist students attending classes at MSU Prestonsburg.

Several individuals and businesses have offered support for the activity, both in monetary donations and in-kind contributions. "Having Morehead State University here in Prestonsburg provides a wonderful opportunity for our community and its citizens," said Ned Pillersdorf, a local attorney. "Educating our people helps our economy grow and prosper and we need to do all we can to make getting an education possible."

To assist in the effort, Pillersdorf has made a \$100 pledge to the scholarship fund and challenged all local attorneys to match or exceed his gift.

The ride will begin at 10 a.m. in the parking lot of MSU Prestonsburg. There will be refreshment stops as the procession journeys to the main campus. During the lunch break, field games will be held on the east parking lot of MSU's Academic-Athletic Center.

"This is a logical location for the MSU at Ashland campus," said Greg Adkins, ACTC president & CEO. "Many of MSU's students in Ashland are former ACTC students. This allows them to continue their higher education at the same campus with the same benefits they are accustomed to."

"We are delighted by the prospect of becoming the permanent guests of President Adkins and his campus family," said MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin. "This change will allow for a much more efficient operation of MSU at Ashland in these difficult budgetary times and, as a bonus, will free up resources that can be used for expansion of academic programs."

MSU will transfer its distance learning classrooms and other equipment and furniture to ACTC for use by students at both institutions.

Beginning with fall classes, MSU students will take classes in Ashland at the College Drive Campus. Classes also may be offered at the Roberts Drive Campus, and the new Technology Drive Campus at EastPark, as necessary.

Jack Webb, director of MSU at Ashland, said the move would be beneficial to students because they can enroll at ACTC, a two-year college, then go on to finish a bachelor's or master's degree at MSU without ever having to switch to another campus. MSU has the same arrangement at the Prestonsburg campus of Big Sandy Community and Technical College.

"It will be more of a college atmosphere for our students as well as the faculty with all of us in the same location," said Webb. "I think it's a better opportunity for students. That's who we're doing this for more than anyone, for our students."

He added that MSU and ACTC will be able to interchange faculty more easily.

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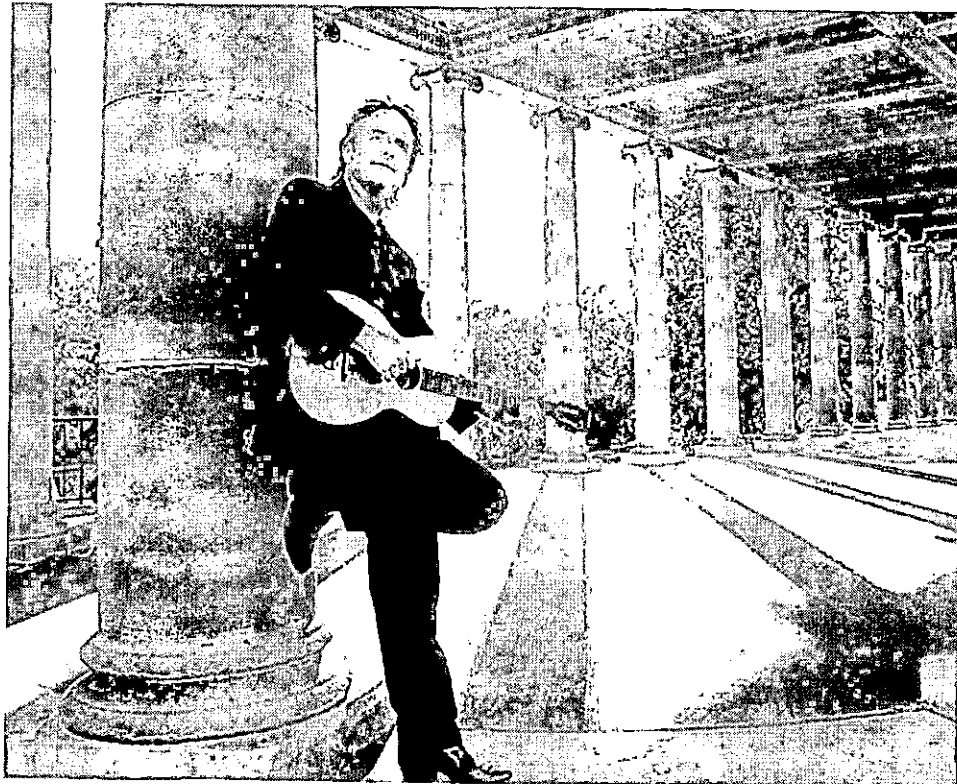

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A former Morehead State University student will be in Athens, Greece, as a member of the Olympic Fencing team. Sean Shumate has triumphed over many difficulties to be one of the select few. The following is a report that aired on Louisville station WAVE-TV on Shumate and his quest for a gold medal.

The material, reported by Connie Leonard of WAVE-TV, is reprinted with permission:

A local man will represent Louisville in Athens, Greece, this September as he goes for the Olympic Gold in fencing. Getting to the games is tough for every athlete, but this competitor is all about overcoming obstacles.

As sporting competitions go, fencing is one of the oldest around. "It kind of faded from glory for awhile, then came back in," says 33-year-old Sean Shumate.

And this year, the quick and aggressive game of fencing finds its roots in Athens, the birthplace of the Olympics. "I guess if there was a time to make the Olympic team, it was now," Sean says.

Hard work has paid off for Sean. The Louisvillian is going to Greece, and he's come a long way to get there. Thirteen years ago, a car accident paralyzed Sean from the waist down. "I slid through an S-curve and went over a cliff," he says.

After the crash, Sean says he wanted to pursue sports, even in his wheelchair. "I tried basketball and other disabled sports," he says, "and I always felt like it was a disabled sport."

That changed when Sean discovered fencing a few years ago. Both his mind and body were put to the test in what's known as a physical game of chess. "You're sort of thinking above your opponent, you're two moves ahead of what you're actually doing at the time."

Another plus for Sean is that the rules for fencing in a wheelchair are nearly identical to normal fencing. In able-bodied fencing, the legs can be a target, but in disabled fencing it's only the chest, head and arms.

And while able-bodied fencers can jump back from the blade if they're not ready, wheelchair fencers can't move.

"They have to be ready immediately after the referee says 'Fence!'" says Leszck "Maestro" Stawicki, Sean's coach from the Louisville Fencing Center.

Sean says his friends at the center helped him make the April cut in Atlanta for the U.S. Para-Olympic team, and no one more so than Les, who has also led able-bodied fencers to the Olympics. "Everything that I've gotten, I've gotten from my coach and the people that I fence with and train me that were Olympians before I was."

With a dream nearly fulfilled, it is a proud time for both student and instructor. "If he will be in the top four, in the middle, I will be the happiest person in Louisville."

Sean says competing on this level is awe inspiring. "To be recognized as one of the premier wheelchair athletes in the United States is ... I kind of look in the mirror and say 'is that really you?' sometimes."

Sean is among five men and three women on the U.S. team competing in Athens September 20th through September 23rd. Sean says he is not worried about security threats in Greece -- he's just happy to be going.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Morehead State University graduate Clive Liew has been awarded the Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowship in Uzbek for the 2004-05 academic year at Columbia University.

The FLAS grant, designed to bolster performance-based modern foreign language training, is funded by the U.S. Department of Education and Columbia, with \$22,000 provided for tuition and a stipend of \$14,000.

Liew also has been selected to attend the 2004 Baltic Studies Summer Institute to study Estonian. The Baltic Studies Summer Institute (BALSSI) offers intensive Estonian, Latvian and Lithuanian language courses. The Eleventh Annual BALSSSI will be hosted by the University of Washington, June 21 to Aug. 20.

Liew earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from MSU in 1998 and his Master of Arts degree from Columbia where he is currently a Ph.D. degree candidate in politics and education.

He was the first recipient of the Henry Clay Internship in Public Policy Scholarship, a \$3,000 scholarship to perform public policy work for a member of Kentucky's Congressional delegation.

"Politics is my life's calling. Ever since doing my internship in Senator (Mitch) McConnell's office, I knew that I wanted to be involved in some aspect of this fascinating work," said Liew.

After graduating from MSU, he went to work on Capitol Hill where he was a legislative assistant/legislative correspondent for Rep. Helen Chenoweth-Hage, a Republican representative from Idaho.

When Chenoweth-Hage decided not to run for re-election, Liew spent time back in Kentucky before deciding to attend Columbia University, which offered a unique program that allowed him to combine his two main interests - politics and education.

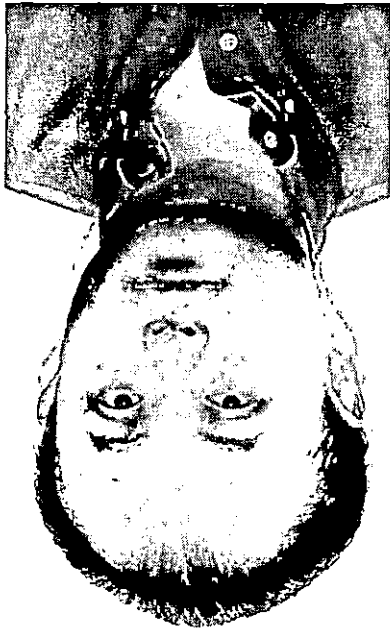
How will Liew's foreign language skills help him?

Presentation of the award was made at the annual Caudill College of the Humanities Honors Luncheon, a part of the Academic Awards Week activities.

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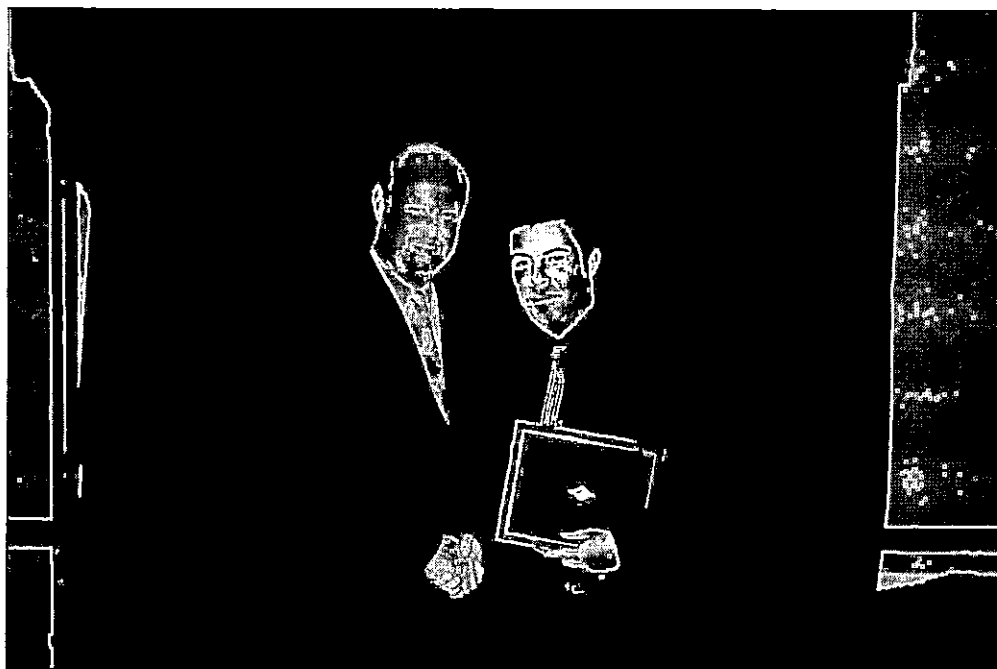

Four units were combined into three as a result of the reorganization: Academic Advising and Career Services, First Year Programs and Student Retention, and Academic Services. Dr. Dan Connell, associate vice president of academic outreach and support, has oversight of the division.

The merger of the Center for Academic Advising and the Office of Career Services is in harmony with national developments, and provides an opportunity for students to receive seamless integration of high quality academic advising and comprehensive career services as they make academic decisions and future career plans.

This model will result in greater satisfaction and service to undeclared, provisional, university studies, special students and developmental students, and improved retention and graduation rates. The adviser and career counseling positions were modified to incorporate academic advising and career services. This office will monitor the placement of students in developmental education courses and the Pre-College Curriculum.

Personnel working in the Office of Academic Advising and Career Services, located on the second floor of Allie Young Hall, are: Dr. Mike Hopper, director of academic advising and career services; Patty Little, provisional studies coordinator; Peggy Overly, career adviser; Alvin Madden-Grider, general studies adviser; Rhonda Crisp, administrative secretary; and Janie Porter, secretary specialist.

The Office of First Year Programs and Student Retention will coordinate a seamless retention plan for undergraduate students from the freshmen to senior year. The office will coordinate MSU 101, peer advising, the fall and spring New Student Orientation program and co-coordinate the Summer Orientation, Advising, and Registration (SOAR) program and parent initiatives. This office will support the campus-wide Retention Task Force and will work with the Office of Institutional Research and Computer Applications to analyze and report retention data and trends in all student classifications.

Data analysis will include tracking students to determine at-risk as well as success indicators for all classifications. In addition to data analysis, the office will organize staff, faculty, and administrators to address problems found through the data analysis. The office will administer the Early Alert System.

"We couldn't be happier," said Ray Magliozzi. "Doing the NPR show is absolutely the high point of my week. Of course, the rest of my week consists of having transmissions fall on my chest, but still...."

The negotiations were not entirely easy. "We drove a tough bargain," says Tom Magliozzi.

"When we told them we wouldn't sign unless we got stock options, you could see their jaws drop. They kind of shook their heads and played dumb," said Ray. "But you can't play dumb with us. We wrote the book on playing dumb!"

Kevin Klose, NPR's president and CEO, admitted to being surprised by the brothers' demands. "We didn't know quite how to respond to the whole stock options thing. At first we thought we would just explain to them that non-profit organizations don't have stock. But they got so belligerent about it, I finally turned to (executive vice president) Ken (Stern) and told him, if they want stock options, go upstairs to my computer and print them some."

NPR has distributed Car Talk since 1987. The current agreement will take the brothers "well past our 20th year of nationally syndicated bad car advice," says Tom. "What do you get for your 20th?" asks Ray. "Is that the carburetor, or the fuel pump anniversary?"

Dr. Hopper, who has been with the University since 1985 and was previously director of career services, indicated that several colleges and universities across the United States also have joined the two departments in recent years.

"This is a good point in time for the merger. It will allow us to keep the services both offices have provided to MSU students and develop new services," Dr. Hopper said. Technology courses will be based at the MCRTC and general education courses will be taught at MSU at West Liberty, both on University Drive.

The degree requires 64 semester hours of credit, all of which will be available in West Liberty on a rotating schedule, either live or via distance learning.

"We are pleased to make our new technical facilities available to MSU students pursuing this associate degree," said Porter Dailey, director of the MCRTC. "This program is designed especially for students in Morgan and neighboring counties who want to qualify for jobs in the information age economy."

Dailey added that the program's hands-on nature will enable students to learn advanced technical skills such as computer networking, telecommunications, fiber optic systems, wireless communications, and satellite communications. The degree will qualify graduates for jobs in the areas of computer technology, satellite operations, system administration, network security, and network management.

Those who complete the two-year degree may apply all of their course work to a four-degree program in the same field, according to Dr. Gerald DeMoss, dean of MSU's College of Science and Technology.

"This degree can help us be more effective in assisting MCRTC and other organizations in preparing a new technology workforce in East Kentucky," Dr. DeMoss stated. "We are looking forward to utilizing the new laboratories and classrooms at the Morgan County Regional Technology Center."

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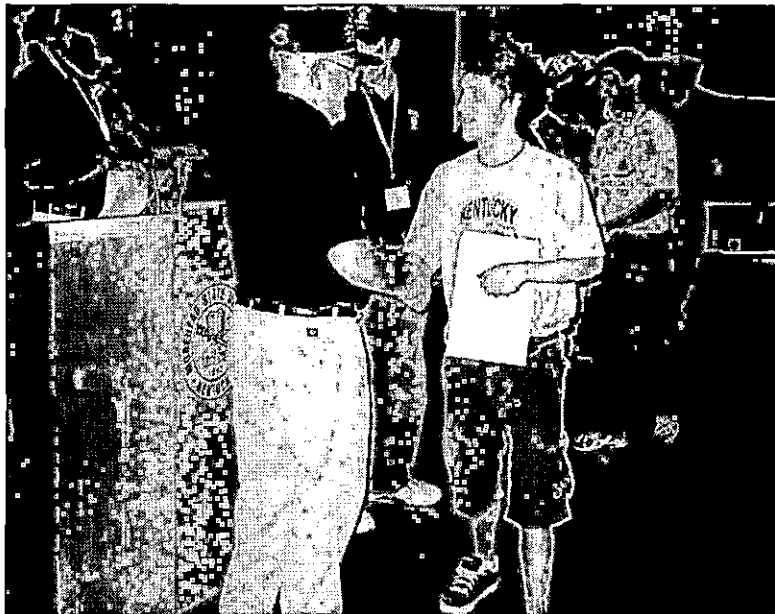

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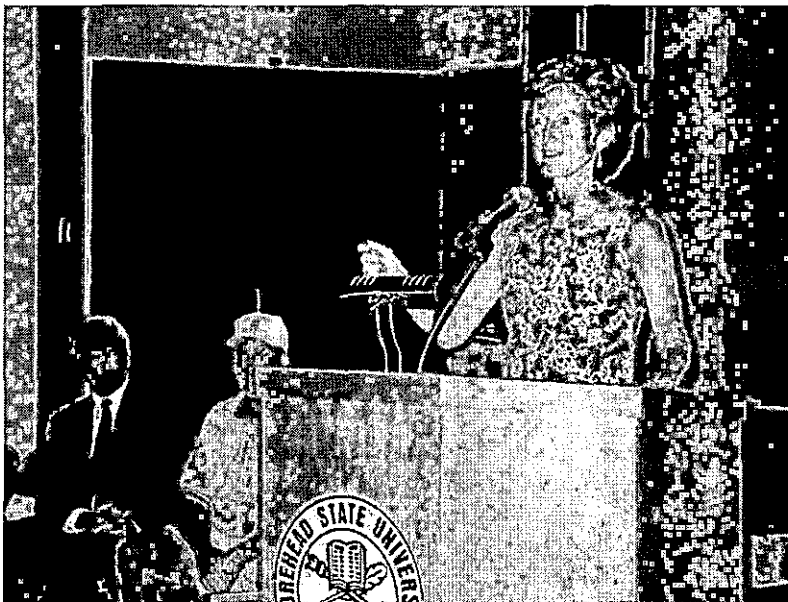
