MOREHEAD, Ky.---In an accomplishment that illustrates Morehead State University's commitment to quality education, all of the University's spring radiologic technology graduates have passed the national licensure exam on their first attempt.

This 100 percent pass rate of the 32 students on the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) exam reflects well not only on them, but also on everyone involved with their education, according to Barbara Dehner, coordinator of radiologic sciences programs.

"I congratulate the graduates and the faculty for their hard work and accomplishments," she said. "And I also appreciate the support and dedication our clinical education professionals provide. Passing this exam certifies our graduates to work as a radiologic technologist in any state in the U.S."

Students in radiologic sciences begin by taking a year of general education and additional prerequisite courses on campus. They then complete program-specific courses, participate in simulated laboratory practice, and gain clinical practical experience in radiology departments of medical facilities.

Upon completion of their degree, they are eligible to take the board exams through ARRT. They may select one of two bachelor's degree advanced imaging options, in either sonography or computed tomography/magnetic resonance imaging. Twenty members of this spring's class have elected to pursue an advanced option, according to Dehner.

"Their success is indicative of the quality of our students, our program resources and our faculty," she said.

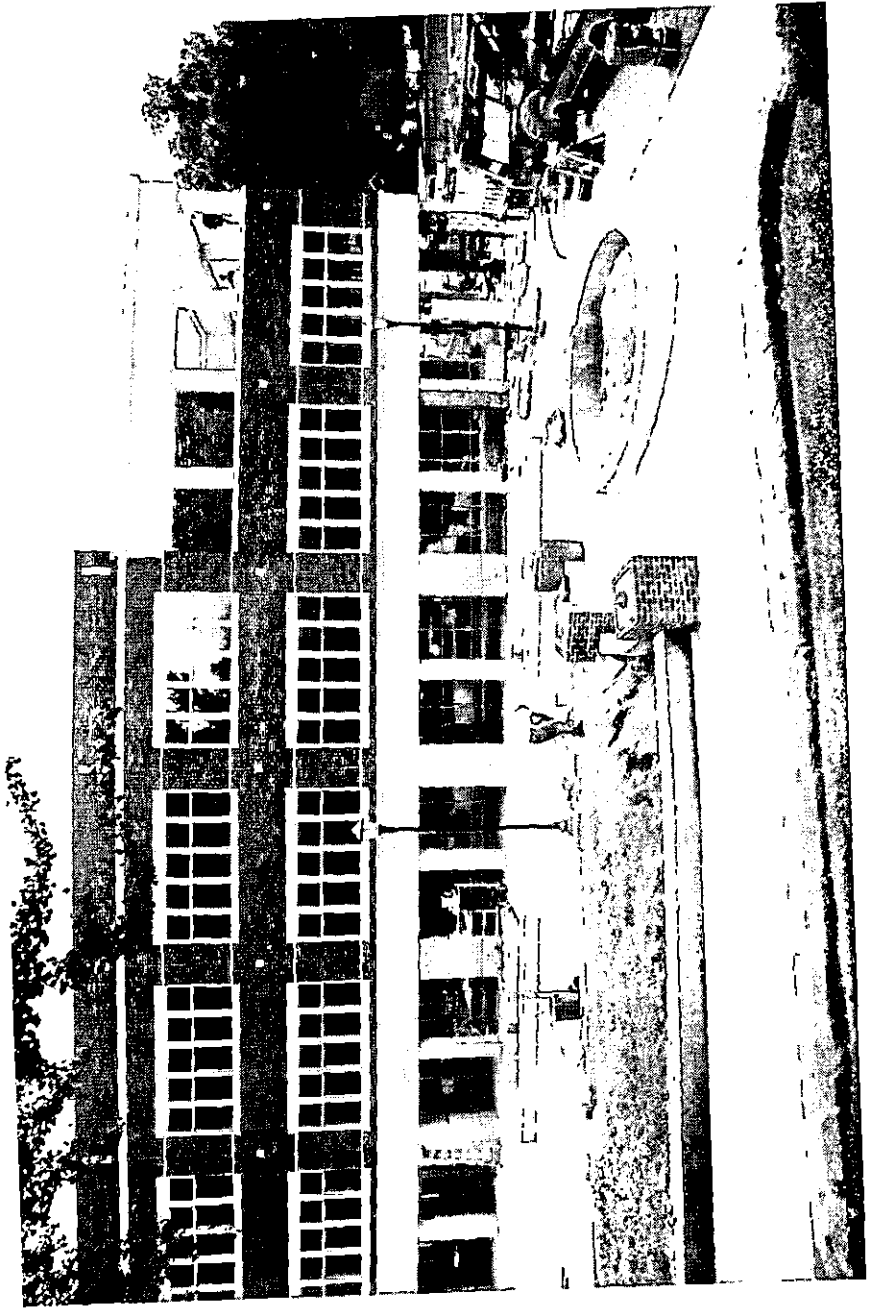

A variety of options to suit one's taste is available to get an education—the traditional classroom setting, via the Internet, by Compressed Video (ITV), or through Kentucky Educational Television (KET) or correspondence study courses.

From MSU's Web site, current students may view the 2004 Class Directory and Business Guide to register for classes, pay fees and holds, order textbooks and view transcripts, grades, official academic checksheets, transfer course equivalencies and academic policies.

Class registration and Business Days will be held Thursday and Friday, Aug. 19 and 20, on the main campus or online. Students may register for classes online at the University's homepage at www.moreheadstate.edu and select current students, then online services. Class scheduling also will be held according to classification from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. each day in the academic departments.

Other than financial arrangements and EagleCard services, all other business may be completed during regular office hours after business days.

Textbooks for classes are available from the University Bookstore, located in the Adron Doran University Center. Orders may be placed by calling (888) STORE-05 or via the Internet at www.bookstore.moreheadstate.edu.

Classes for the fall term, at all on- and off-campus locations, begin Monday, Aug. 23.

New students will need to contact the Office of Admissions, 100 Admissions Center, for undergraduates and the Graduate Office, 701 Ginger Hall, for graduate students.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has initiated "Eagle Express Lane," an online guide with step-by-step instructions, to assist with the registration process without students visiting the campus.

"From any location where they have computer access, students may register for classes, pay fees, check the status of their financial accounts and defer payments and books," said Jim Fluty, director of accounting and budgetary control. "The online access allows them to accept responsibility for their financial affairs while preserving their privacy, things that should be very important to students."

"Everything you need to do is on this one page with Eagle Express Lane," said Andrea Sharp, a junior from Knoxville, Tenn. "It's easy, fast and convenient."

The "Eagle Express Lane" site (www.moreheadstate.edu/eagleexpress) includes nine steps that will assist students in the completion of the registration process. The steps contain information on housing, dining/meal plans and textbooks. The students may view their online account to pay bills or defer tuition and fees as well as to purchase a parking pass.

The site also has important announcements and reminders.

Currently enrolled students who have pre-registered for the fall term may view their financial accounts online. A reminder will be sent to the student, via their University e-mail account, instead of the traditional paper bill. Earlier this year, the University stopped mailing billing statements to currently enrolled students to ensure student privacy.

To avoid delays with financial aid, Carol Becker, director of financial aid, reminds students to file all papers in the appropriate time frame. Because of federally mandated software, MSU's Office of Financial Aid may no longer electronically file the Free Application for Student Aid (FAFSA) paperwork on behalf of the student. Forms may be filed online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

"We strive to provide assistance to students, however, we cannot help them with their financial aid needs if we don't have the FAFSA results," Becker said.

Refund checks without holds will be mailed on Aug. 13 for the fall term. Any student that receives a refund check in the mail does not need to attend business days. The federal government mandates that federal direct loan disbursements to first year, first time borrowers may not be released until 30 days after classes begin.

Besides registering for classes and paying tuition, MSU students may pay rent, library fines and parking tickets online, as well as defer payments for tuition or make changes in their meal plan.

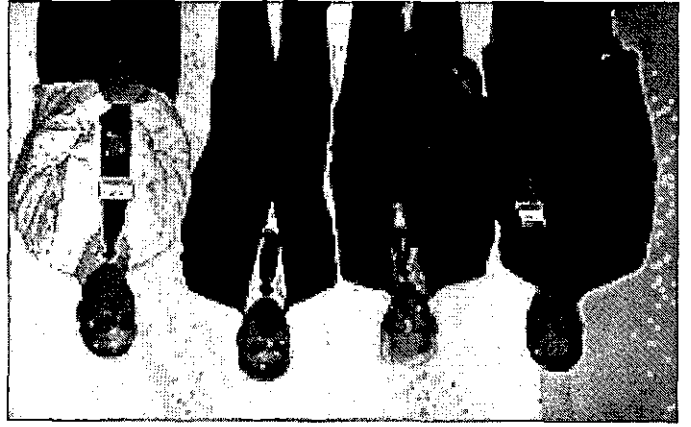
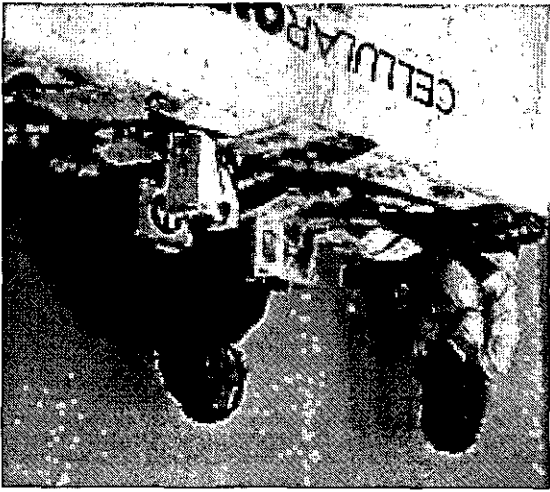

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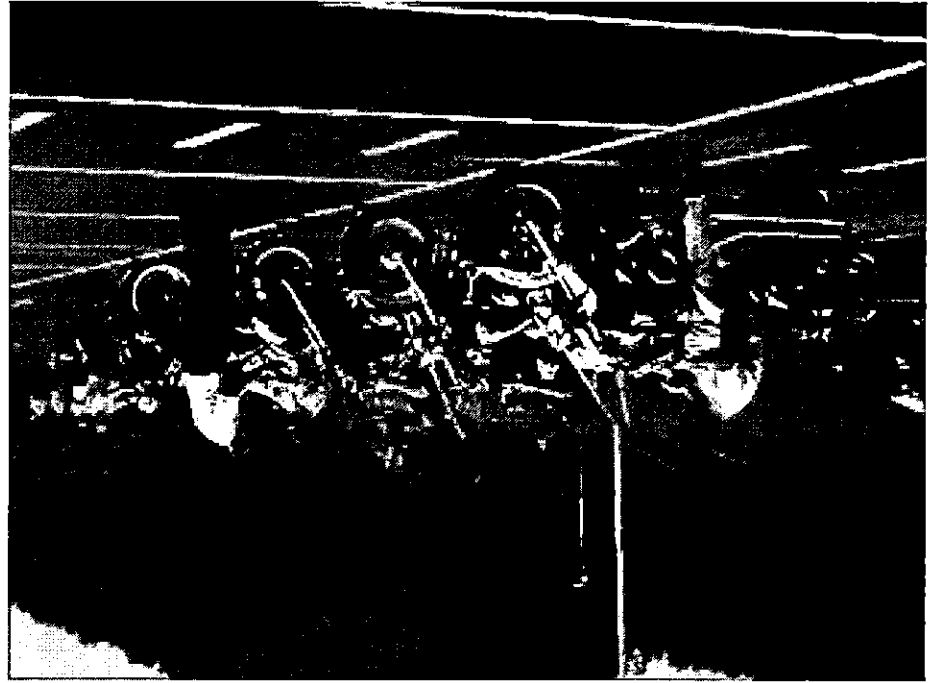
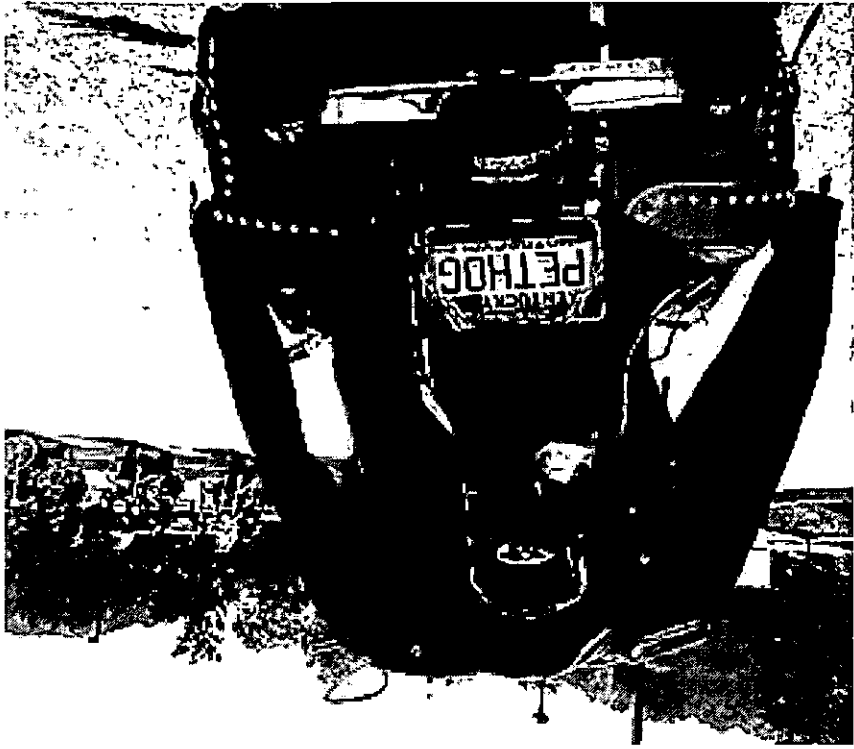

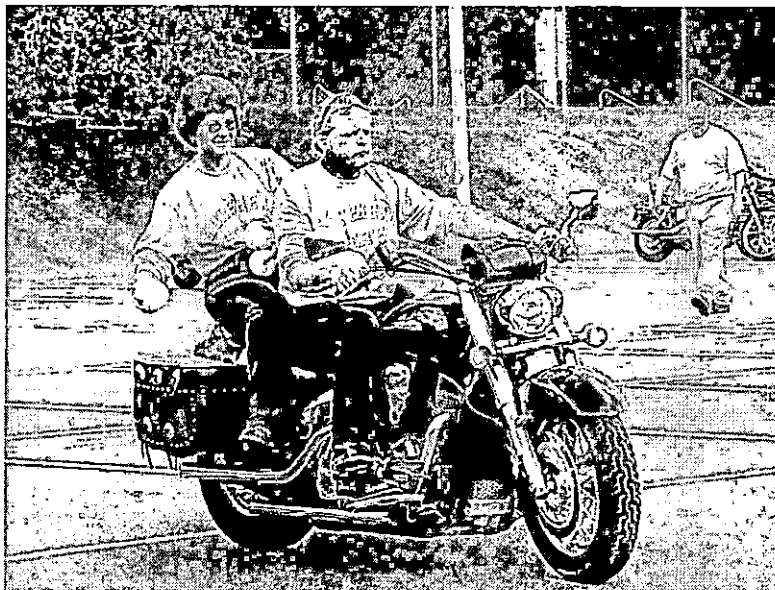
