MOREHEAD, Ky.---Dr. Bob Willenbrink, chair of Morehead State University's Department of Communication and Theatre, has been named the first W. Paul and Lucille Caudill Little Endowed Chair in the Caudill College of Humanities.

The college was recently awarded \$1 million through a proposal submitted to the W. Paul and Lucille Caudill Little Foundation which was matched by another \$1 million through the state's Regional University Excellence Trust Fund.

"The \$2 million total endowment will assist us in continually honoring the memory of Lucille who provided so much support to our visual and performing arts programs on campus," said Dr. Michael Seelig, dean of the college. "It is also the result of excellent collaboration between Dr. Willenbrink, our development staff and the Little Foundation"

The annual endowment interest will be used to implement a "Theatre in the Schools" program. The department will create a theatre troupe called, "The Little Company," that will tour the Commonwealth, providing theatre performances and arts education activities and materials to elementary, middle, and high school students and teachers.

"Currently, there is no similar project in the region and there is a great unmet need for live performances, workshops, and arts-related educational activities," Dr. Willenbrink said. It is anticipated that the Company will visit up to 50 schools, reach as many as 25,000 students and bring many other students and teachers to campus for theatrical productions. "Student participants will view performances, participate in creative activities, gain an understanding of the nature of the arts, learn the basic elements of production and develop fundamental performance skills," he said.

The broad initiative will forge alliances and partnerships between the University and regional public schools. Educators from both systems will meet annually to collaborate with the Company and provide guidance for the development of plays, workshops and educational activities for the coming year.

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Educational activities, such as Web resource pages, study guides, workshops and historical research will be formulated to extend the experience into the classroom and connect the performance to traditional knowledge areas while addressing KERA core content areas. An annual Arts and Humanities Festival will bring students to campus for classroom instruction and hands-on experience in staging full-scale theatre performance.

“These experiences will not only benefit public school teachers and students, but will provide exciting and invaluable experiences for University faculty and students involved,” Dr. Willenbrink continued.

“Dr. Willenbrink’s broad training, background and experience in all phases of theatre make him the logical selection for the honor of being named to this position,” said Dr. Seelig.

Dr. Willenbrink received his Ph.D. degree in theatre from Bowling Green State University after receiving graduate and undergraduate degrees from MSU. He served for several years as director of theatre and chair of the Department of Speech, Theatre and Mass Communication at the University of Central Arkansas.

An officer with the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival and the Arc of Arkansas Performance Institute for Disabled Artists, Dr. Willenbrink founded and directed theatre companies and programs for disabled actors and youth, wrote several screenplays and received other substantial grant awards and private gifts.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Morehead State University Police Department is encouraging everyone on the campus to take extra precaution to avoid personal injury or the loss of property.

Because of an increase in the number of reports of theft and vandalism, students, as well as faculty and staff, are urged to take all necessary measures to secure and protect personal belongings in residence halls, offices and vehicles, in addition to office equipment and vulnerable areas.

"We are asking that you take a little extra time to secure items in the trunk or under the seat before leaving your automobile," said MSU Police Chief Joseph S. Cline. "If your belongings are out of sight, that reduces the risk of a vehicle break-in."

University police remind students to also practice safety in the residence halls:

- ✓ Lock your door, even when you intend to return shortly or even if you are just going next door. It takes only 10 seconds or less for a thief to enter an open room and steal your property. Lock your vehicle before leaving it in the parking area.
- ✓ Do not leave visible messages, indicating when you will be away or when you expect to return. When going out at night, arrange to go with friends/roommates.
- ✓ Do not leave valuables or property (purses, backpacks, books, personal identification, etc.) visible in or around the office, living area.
- ✓ Keep emergency numbers by the phone.
- ✓ Call 911 to report any suspicious person or activity.

Everyone should take the time to be aware of their surroundings and any unusual activity. On the campus, University Police should be notified to investigate anything that might lead to theft and/or vandalism.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has announced plans to honor its veteran golf coach, Dr. Rex Chaney, by creating a golf instructional complex in his name to host a community-based chapter of "The First Tee" program for young golfers.

The Rex Chaney Golf Academy will include a three-hole "real experience area," a driving range, an indoor learning center and other facilities. In addition to teaching golf skills, The First Tee emphasizes nine core values of responsibility, honesty, respect, courtesy, integrity, judgment, confidence, perseverance and sportsmanship.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin and Morehead businessman Tommy Griffith are heading a campaign through the MSU Foundation to raise funds to build and equip the complex on University land adjacent to Sunny Brook Golf Course, east of Morehead on U.S. 60.

Those funds will be combined with grants to establish a local unit of The First Tee to serve youngsters from Rowan and surrounding counties. Partnering with MSU in The First Tee program will be several local, youth-related organizations.

"Building and naming the golf academy and starting a chapter of The First Tee represent great opportunities to recognize this dedicated teacher and coach who has devoted his entire career to the young people of East Kentucky," Dr. Eaglin said. "We hope all whose lives he has touched so positively will join us in this tribute."

A native of Perry County, Dr. Chaney was an MSU faculty member for nearly 40 years and holds the distinction of being an Ohio Valley Conference coach of the year in two sports, golf and baseball.

He has coached the MSU golf squad for 27 years. Under his leadership, the Eagles captured the 1977, 1981, 1993 and 1999 OVC golf titles, earning him "Coach of the Year" honors for those seasons. He was head baseball coach from 1961 through 1967 and his Eagles won OVC East Division championships in 1961, 1962, 1963 and 1964. He was the OVC's baseball "coach of the year" in 1963. He also served four years as assistant basketball coach under former head coach Bobby Laughlin.

Dr. Chaney holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Morehead State and a doctorate from Indiana University. He joined the MSU faculty in 1961 and retired from full-time teaching in 1977.

Starting a chapter of The First Tee has been under consideration for the last year or so, according to Dan Cornett, manager of Sunny Brook.

“The First Tee is a great program that enables kids from all types of backgrounds to learn a game that teaches values for life and which can be played for a lifetime,” Cornett said. “We are in the midst of the application process for a chapter and are eager to move ahead with the golf academy.”

The First Tee was started in 1997 under sponsorship of golf's major organizations, including the Professional Golf Association (PGA), Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA), Augusta National Golf Club and U.S. Golf Association (USGA).

Now a division of the World Golf Foundation, The First Tee's mission is “to impact the lives of young people around the world by creating affordable and accessible golf facilities to primarily serve those who have not previously had exposure to the game and its positive values.” The First Tee has more than 150 local facilities with two operating in Kentucky and three others being developed. Its objective is to serve 500,000 youth by the end of 2005.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Student Government Association will present an academic debate on one of the most controversial topics today: stem cell research and human cloning.

Dr. Gregory Pence and Dr. Nigel Cameron will debate the subject on Wednesday, Sept. 15, in Button Auditorium, beginning at 8 p.m.

Dr. Pence, a faculty member at the University of Alabama at Birmingham since 1976, is a professor of philosophy and bioethics and is in favor of human cloning.

When he attended his first major conference on human cloning, the pro-cloning position was not defended in any way. After the conference, he chastised bioethicists for their condemnation of cloning and their failure to examine both sides of the issue before forming opinions.

Dr. Pence is the author of "Who's Afraid of Human Cloning."

Dr. Cameron chairs the International Advisory Board for The Center for Bioethics and Human Dignity, serves as dean of the Wilberforce Forum and is president of Strategic Futures Group, LLC, which specializes in higher education consulting in the areas of strategic planning and institutional change.

The former provost and professor at Trinity International University has written widely on issues of bioethics. Dr. Cameron served as founding editor of the international journal, "Ethics and Medicine" and has been a frequent guest commentator on ABC Nightline, PBS Frontline and CNN.

He also testified at the congressional hearings on human cloning as he opposes human stem cell research on Christian moral and ethical grounds: "At the heart of our conception of civilization lies the principle of restraint: that there are things we shall not do, shall never do, even though they may bring us benefit; some things we shall never do, though the heavens fall," said Dr. Cameron.

The campus and Rowan County communities are invited to attend the free program. A question and answer session will conclude the debate.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University is collaborating with Maxim Health Systems to offer the meningitis vaccine for one day only on the campus.

Maxim Health Systems will immunize students with the bacterial meningitis vaccine on Tuesday, Sept. 21, from 11 a.m.-7 p.m., in room 312 of the Adron Doran University Center.

Each year, the disease strikes approximately 3,000 people and is responsible for 300 deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. It is estimated that 100-125 cases of meningococcal disease occur annually on college campuses and 5 to 15 die as a result.

Since 1999, the CDC has been recommending that all college students be given information about the disease. To date, 14 states have made vaccination a requirement for its higher education population.

Statistics indicate that college students are among those at greater risk of contracting the disease because they live and work in close proximity to each other in residence halls and classrooms, said Kenitha King, nurse administrator in the Office of Counseling and Health Services. "Students behavior and social aspects increase their risk factors."

Meningitis, which affects the brain and spinal cord, is spread by direct contact with infected individuals, through the air via droplets of respiratory secretions as coughing and sneezing, sharing a glass or cigarette, and kissing. For college students, the risk is greater for those exposed to active and passive smoking, sharing beverages and high traffic areas.

The fee for the vaccine is \$90, payable by cash, money order, personal check or major credit card to Maxim Health Systems, LLC, on the day of the service

Roger Barker, director of human resources, has written "The Mark of the BEISTE: A Secular View of the End Times," and says he has been working on the project for a long period of time.

"For several years, I have been somewhat concerned about our escalating movement toward a cash-free society, with such heavy reliance on electronics in our financial infrastructure," he said, and various global events have not alleviated his concerns.

"And then about six years ago, I was at a workshop held by the U.S. Secret Service, where we learned that about 95 percent of all financial transactions are done electronically," Barker said. "That sort of sped me up and I decided I would tell a story of how, perhaps, events could evolve that lead us to a cash-free society and how that might not be such a good thing for us."

In the book, a main character, a Carter County man, takes issue with and steps against the policies of the a group known as BEISTE (Bringing Everyone's Individual Strengths Together Electronically).

Barker, raised in a United Baptist home, has for years read about and heard church teachings on the Biblical prophecies concerning the "mark of the beast." The Book of Revelations describes how, in the last days of time, a certain mark on the forehead or hand will be required of anyone who buys or sells goods.

He says that Revelations was like a "road map" for him as he wrote the book. "But I tried to strip away the mystical components of Revelations, and I try to get to the point of why the mark of the beast will take place – for control."

The Danville native gained worldwide recognition for his percussion writing and teaching with the Cavaliers Drum & Bugle Corps and the Phantom Regiment Drum & Bugle Corps, claiming numerous awards and honors with both organizations during his tenure.

Mason received his M.M. degree from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, and is pursuing his D.M.A. degree at the University of Kentucky, where he received his bachelor's degree. He is a member of the Vic Firth Education Committee, the Percussive Arts Society Marching Percussion Committee, and the Percussive Arts Society Health and Wellness Committee.

He has published articles in "Percussive Notes," has been interviewed in "Modern Drummer" and "Band and Orchestra Magazine," and was a contributing editor for "Stick It" magazine. Mason co-authored the 2000 Modern Drummer Readers Poll's "No. 1 Drum Set Method Book, The Commandments of R&B Drumming," (Warner Brothers), and his original works are published through Row-Loff Productions.

Mason endorses Vic Firth sticks and mallets, makers of his signature line of mallets and drumsticks, as well as Zildjian Cymbals, Evans drumheads, Pearl drums, and Adams musical instruments.

Tomatoes, peppers, eggplant and broccoli are available for picking while supplies last. Sales will be held from 10 a.m. – 6 p.m. weekdays in the greenhouse area of the farm.

The tomatoes have been staked and trained upright, and most of the fruit has never touched the ground, according to Mike Petitt, horticulture supervisor. "Walk right down our rows and pick with little effort," he said. "We have an array of varieties, types and colors – great for home canners." Tomatoes will be sold for 50 cents per pound.

Numerous varieties of peppers, including hot, mild, bell, jalapeno and cayenne, also are available for sale at 50 cents per pound. Petitt said the peppers are "excellent for freezing for winter."

Other produce sold at that price includes eggplant and a limited number of harvested apples. Customers are asked to bring their own bags for picking.

Pumpkins, gourds, cabbage, spinach, kale, salad greens and other vegetables will be available for sale in the coming weeks, Petitt said.

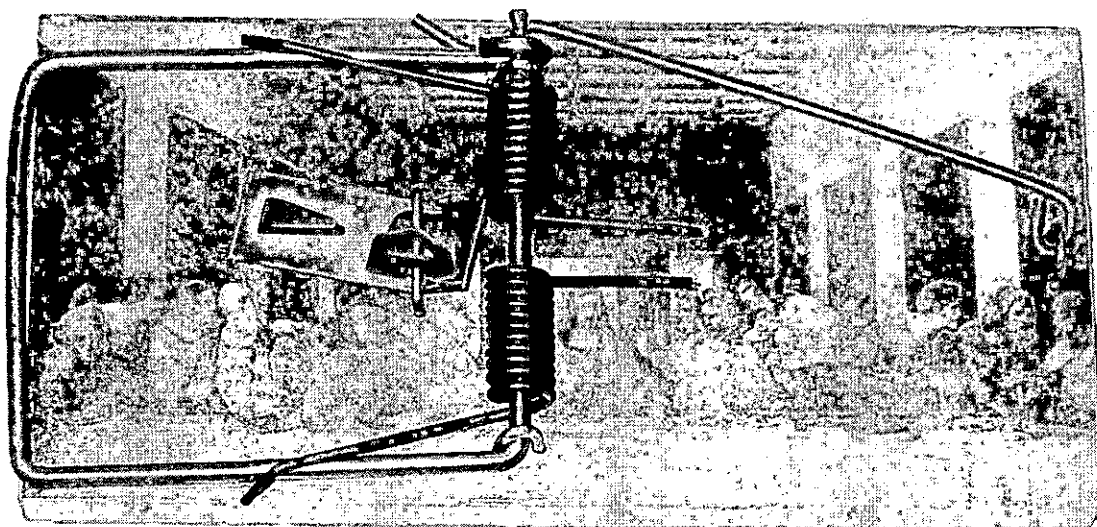
