But more than that, the Ten Commandments were not given for the purpose of saving anyone. They were given, just as all law is made, for the purpose of defining and revealing our sin.

You see, a law is never made until a crime is committed. The act of sin is not wrong because it violates a written law.

So, law does not save any body for it is not a saving institution. It is a condemnation institution, and that is all it can do.

Furthermore, obedience on the part of man doesn't ever save. The obedience of Christ saves. God could not accept our "filthy rags" of righteousness.

He could accept the righteousness of Christ for us. He who obeyed the law perfectly did not have to die for himself, therefore He could die for us.

He was the only one who could do it for He alone had not sinned. Our obedience to the law, then, is rejected to start with, and Christ alone is accepted.

Social Security Claims May Be Figured Without Expense Say Authorities

Workers who wish to check the accuracy of their social security records for old-age and survivors insurance, or those past 65 who wish to file a claim for insurance payments, do not need to pay anyone to assist them, Mr. James A. Chaney, Manager of the Social Security Field Office in Ashland, Ky., pointed out today.

Recent inquiries received by the field office, Mr. Chaney said, indicated a belief on the part of some workers that they need to pay for the services of an outside person in order to be sure that their rights are protected. He explained that the Social Security Board must keep accurate wage records and pay insurance benefits to all eligible persons and that it has established a system to carry out these duties fully.

**GUILTY AS CHARGED**—and for the same period in 1939 when property valued at \$87,000 went up in smoke and fire—the great destroyer—during the first three months of the year, it turned \$100,430,700 worth of property into ash and number of lives taken by fire debris. It thus exceeded its record in the first quarter, but, going

by past precedents, it took more than 2,000. That many people met one of the most horrible of deaths.

It's only human when we read figures like this, to shrug, shake our heads, say "Too bad" and promptly forget them. And that human weakness is the main reason why fire is such a "glowing success." Fire waxes fat on human lethargy and laziness—even as it prospers on human forgetfulness and ignorance. Few men ever start a destructive fire deliberately—but it's a rare man who hasn't carelessly taken a chance or overlooked a hazard that made fire more probable.

And so it is up to you whether fire continues its inexorable ravages. Don't try to console yourself with the thought that fires are inevitable—less than two in ten fall into that category. And don't argue that fire prevention is the other fellow's business—it's your own personal business, and everybody else's business too.

The fact that fire destroys around \$100,000,000 worth of property and 10,000 lives each year in this country is a severe indictment of the American people. The only possible plea is "Guilty as charged." Will we permit fire's ravages to continue?

Do your window screens have safety locks or hooks so children can't open them?

**ACCIDENTS IN THE HOME**

Since many home accidents are caused by defective furnishings and poor household management, the following check list is suggested for detecting the most common causes of home accident.

**MORE SORGHUM SYRUP**

**THE SWEET TREAT**

Soil treated with 200 pounds of nitrate, 300 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate and 50 pounds of potash to the acre head produced the most sorghum molasses, in seven years of tests at the Robinson, Experiment Station in Breathitt county, Ky. Use of barroward manure not only did not increase yields above those obtained from nitrate, phosphate and potash, but usually resulted in molasses of poor color, and some times adversely affected flavor.

A local variety of cane called Williams usually has produced the best quality of syrup, and generally has excelled in yields, in tests at the experiment station in Eastern Kentucky. The Williams variety has showed resistance. Sugaring was not a problem in syrup producing from the Williams cane when cutting was done at the proper time.

Untreated land averaged 154 10-pounding pails of syrup to the acre, and the land treated with nitrate and phosphate only produced 200 pails.

Adding limestone to the nitrate, phosphate and potash treatment did not increase yields.

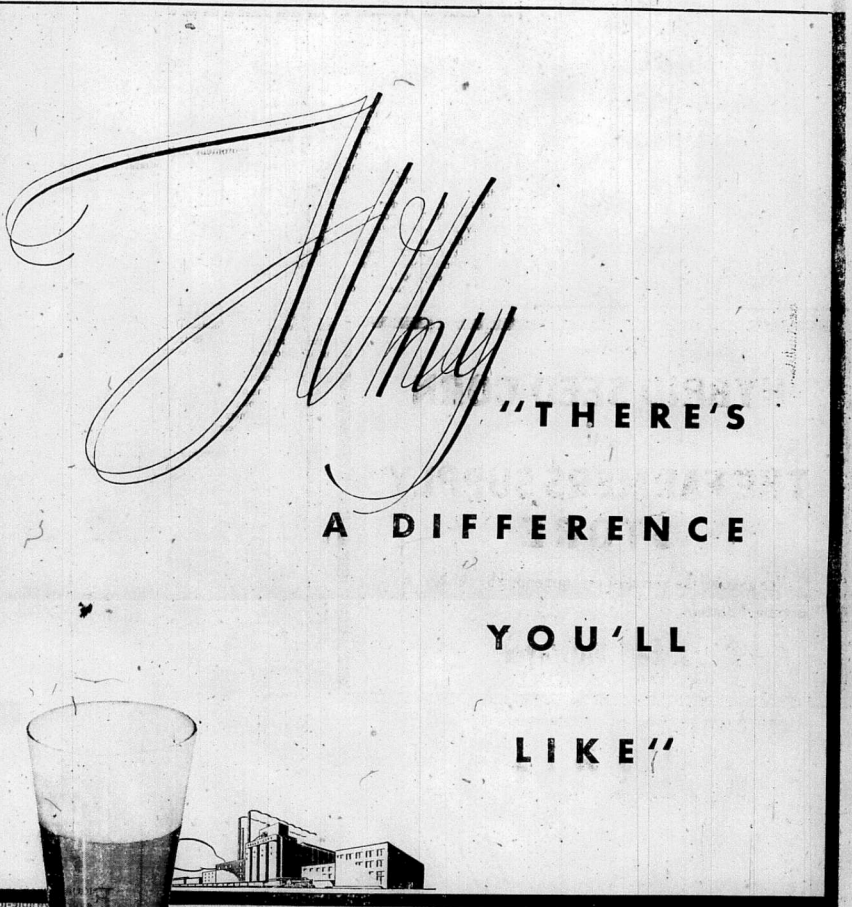
