NOTE—THE READERS OF THIS COLUMN ARE REQUESTED TO SEND IN QUESTIONS TO REV. HAZEN.

Question—If a Christian (child of God) sins and should instead of seeking forgiveness of God, will he be lost?

Answer—No, I think you can get this forth so it will be easily seen. They who believe that the child of God is lost because he sins are basing their theory on the theory that forgiveness of sins brings salvation. And that is not true in scripture.

A man is not saved because his sins are forgiven; his sins are forgiven because he is saved and has become a child of God. God never forgives the sins of those who are not saved.

God only forgives the sins of those who are saved. He forgives never his own children's sins. And He does it, not for our sake, nor because we promise to quit sinning, but for Christ's sake and because Christ has died for our sins. "God for Christ's sake forgave our sins, according to the Scriptures."

A man is not a child of God because his sins are forgiven; his sins are forgiven because it is the privilege of God's children to be forgiven "for Christ's sake" who died for our sins.

God never forgives sin until we have trusted and accepted a Saviour who has died for our sins. This, God can take our sins and put them to the account of our Saviour. In no other way can God put away sin.

Let us see it this way: There are two relationships between God and His child. One is sonship; the other is His fellowship. Sonship depends on birth; fellow ship depends on conversion. Birth depends on what Christ has done for us; we live for Him. We are not responsible for maintaining our sonship that is God's business, and He does it by the fixed relationship of the new birth. But our fellowship is dependent on us, and we must keep it by obedience. We may be out of fellowship, since it depends on our sin; but it depends only on God's grace since that depends only on God's grace. A child of God may sin, but he does not sin because he loves the Father through weakness or blindness or error. A man may sin and loves Him. A Christian hates sin and fights it; a man who loves sin and embraces it. A Christian has the precious privilege of right to confess his sins and have them forgiven "for Christ's sake." This is the privilege of God's children. But it does not follow that if one of God's children died without forgiveness that he would be lost. He would die without a faith in fellowship with God, but his sonship remains unchanged. Forgiveness does not bring salvation, nor does it maintain it. Forgiveness (or one is saved) does bring fellowship. In other words, when one is saved, he is justified from all sin. When one is in fellowship with God it is when he is forgiven of all sin. Many Christians—people who have been saved—think they are now lost because of sin, when they are merely out of fellowship with God and have not confessed their sin nor had them forgiven.

According to the gracious privilege, God extends to His children. Thus, to die without forgiveness would not change the relationship of sonship.

Instead of this privilege being an incentive to make one want to sin, it is so gracious and loving of God as to make us want to refrain from sin.

Graduates May Obtain Social Security Numbers

Plans Made To Permit Them To Apply For Numbers After School

Students who will be graduated from high school or college this year may obtain social security account numbers before completing their courses. This year, but never after, will be the last time that students can apply for their social security numbers before graduation. Applications for account numbers may be filed in person at the Social Security Board field office in Ashland, Ky., or may be mailed. The application forms are obtainable at any post office.

Persons who will work in summer resort, hotels, amusement parks and similar places are covered by the Social Security Act and must have account numbers. These should be obtained in ample time to give the number to the employer at the beginning of the job. It is reported in a statement issued today by James A. Chaney, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Ashland, Kentucky.

He said that school teachers, students and many other persons who have not previously been covered by the Social Security Act will work in covered


