MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University Police have arrested the 18<sup>th</sup> suspect in a campus-wide drug round-up.

Brandon Jolly, 18, of Carlisle, was arrested Wednesday morning on the campus. He was charged with trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school, two counts.

Twenty-one arrest warrants were issued in the initial sweep on Nov. 22 in a drug round-up which was coordinated by Kentucky State Police, Morehead city police, Rowan County Sheriff Department, Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment & Education) officers and MSU Police.

Of those arrested, fifteen students were charged with trafficking in marijuana and/or prescription drugs, trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school, and trafficking in a controlled substance second and third degree. Two other students were arrested on misdemeanor charges.

"The investigation began early in the fall semester as the result of several student complaints," said MSU Police Chief Joe Cline. "The operation will continue until all warrants have been served."

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Kentucky Folk Art Center has received the second of two grants that will be used to support a new educational outreach service for children in the Morehead State University region.

The MetLife Foundation in New York recently announced that KFAC was awarded a \$50,000 grant from the foundation's Museum Connections Program. According to Matt Collinsworth, director of KFAC, the funding, along with a previously awarded \$46,000 grant from the Steele-Reese Foundation, will provide a portion of the salary and benefits for a new museum educator position, as well as funding for expanded arts education programming.

"This is a position we've needed for many years," he said. "I'm exceedingly pleased that the Steele-Reese Foundation and MetLife recognize KFAC's ability to enhance arts and cultural education in this region."

KFAC staff and the new museum educator will collaborate with the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music to "engage students, educators and community groups in a dialog about the region's rich indigenous arts and culture through a range of outreach programs that will reach 20,000 students and community residents in rural Appalachia," according to a report from MetLife.

The educational program, "Down from the Mountain," will consist of four main activities. First, an oral history project to enable middle school students to learn about their family and community histories will be implemented, coordinated by teachers who will be trained at KFAC. Second, the "Sounds of Our Heritage" program will be expanded to introduce students to traditional music.

According to the grant proposal, the third component of the program will involve the production of a comprehensive teacher's guide that will detail how the study of folk art, traditional music and Appalachian culture can help teachers meet state-mandated curriculum requirements. The guide will detail educational outreach services provided by KFAC and KCTM, and will be distributed to educators throughout MSU's service region.

For the final phase of the program, KFAC will develop two traveling tabletop exhibitions, to be used in schools, libraries and community centers. It will use text panels, visuals and pieces from KFAC's permanent collection to present the folk artists' work to a broader audience. A second companion exhibit, developed with KCTM, will feature various visual aids, instruments and audio clips to showcase the musical heritage of the region.

The entire program is scheduled to continue for two years, ending in January 2007.

KFAC is a cultural, educational and economic development service of MSU. The center is open Monday-Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sundays, 1-5 p.m.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---An experienced educator and administrator has been named to an interim dean post at Morehead State University.

Dr. Wayne Willis, professor of education, will be interim dean of the College of Education from January through June 2005. He will serve in this capacity while the search is conducted for a permanent successor to Dr. Dan Branham, who is retiring later this month.

Dr. Willis' service to MSU has been both in the classroom as a faculty member in the Department of Elementary, Reading and Special Education and as an administrator. He has served as either assistant dean or as assistant to four deans.

Instrumental in MSU's teacher education reform efforts for the past five years, he played a central role in the establishment of the Professors in the Schools initiative. Additionally, he has been active in the development of the sculpture concourse on campus.

A published author, Dr. Willis wrote and illustrated a children's picture book, "This Is How We Became a Family," and has done author/illustrator presentations for students in schools across the state.

He is the co-author of two scholarly books currently under contract. One is an international study of schools in Russia, England and America, and the other is a study of the philosophical and psychological foundations of moral education. Dr. Willis also has several other books in progress.

"Given Wayne's long history of service to the College and his recent administrative role as assistant dean, I am confident he will insure continuity in the operation and continued progress of the College," said Dr. Michael Moore, provost.

Dr. Willis earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from Louisiana Tech University and a master's degree in theological studies from Wheaton College. He holds a Ph.D. degree in the historical, philosophical and social foundations of education from the University of Oklahoma.

On MSU's faculty since 1988, he regularly teaches courses in education foundations and in the history and philosophy of education. His wife, Dr. Melinda Willis, is an associate professor of education at MSU. The Willises have a daughter, Suzannah, who is a seventh grader at Rowan County Middle School.

MOUNT STERLING, Ky.---U.S. Rep. Ben Chandler and Montgomery County Judge Executive B.D. Wilson announced Thursday that \$121,250 in federal funds has been appropriated to help expand facilities used by Morehead State University's Mount Sterling regional campus.

Chandler secured the money in the FY 2005 Omnibus Appropriations bill that passed Congress earlier this month.

The congressman said the new funds would assist in enlarging the Clay Community Center to accommodate increased enrollment at MSU at Mount Sterling. It has been forecast that 1,000 students could be enrolled at the Mount Sterling campus by the fall of 2007. Plans are being prepared to construct eight new classrooms and additional administrative space.

"We appreciate Congressman Chandler's support of the local effort to help us better serve our students in the Mount Sterling area," said MSU President Ronald Eaglin. "Judge Wilson and other community leaders are deeply committed to this partnership which has a bright future."

More than 400 students currently are enrolled at MSU at Mount Sterling. Dr. Janet Kenney directs the regional campus.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Fresh hydroponic lettuce is now being offered for sale at the Morehead State University campus greenhouse, adjacent to Reed Hall.

The lettuce, produced by students, is prewashed, graded and packed into plastic bags. Because the lettuce is produced with hydroponics, it has never been touched by soil, according to Mike Petitt, horticulture supervisor.

"The lettuce is freshly harvested and the quality is second to none," Petitt said.

Mixed lettuce, "Ruby" and "Salad Bowl" are packed into one-quart bags and may be purchased for \$1 per bag, with gallon-sized bags selling for \$5.

Continued harvests are expected this winter and spring. According to Petitt, the students' goal is to offer for sale market salad greens of some type each week.

In addition to the lettuce, poinsettia sales will continue at the greenhouse through Dec. 17. Sale hours are 1-6 p.m. weekdays, and prices are \$6 for a 6-inch pot, and \$4 for a 4-inch pot. Foiled pots are available for \$1 extra per plant.

All sale proceeds will benefit student educational activities.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Office of International Education is requesting course proposals from faculty who would like to teach abroad. Associate Dean of International Education Dr. Robert Frank can provide information and answer questions on any of the programs that MSU offers.

The programs include:

**Kentucky Institute for International Studies:** KIIS is accepting proposals for courses to be taught in its 20 programs abroad. In the spring, faculty from all of the consortium schools are selected to teach courses in a wide variety of academic areas. Most programs have a special character or focus, although a few are very general. Programs are five to six weeks in length, with a few lasting two to four weeks. In most programs, each faculty member teaches two courses and has all living and travel expenses paid, plus a stipend. All non-language courses will be instructed in English, however will be taught in non-English speaking settings. The deadline is Feb. 1 for Summer 2006 classes.

**Cooperative Center Study Aboard:** The emphasis in all CCSA courses is on experiential learning. While time is set aside for lectures and class meetings, it is assumed that students will have to budget time for reading the required books. The goal of the instructor should be to utilize the unique opportunities available in traveling. CCSA programs are two to three weeks in duration and are taught in English speaking settings. Faculty members have all living and travel expenses paid. It may be possible to have a class counted toward a regular semester teaching load. The deadline is Feb. 1 for Summer 2006 classes.

**Magellan Exchange Program:** The Magellan Exchange Program's faculty exchange is intended to strengthen the international development of faculty members. Through sharing knowledge, the program is usually a two-week visit to a European member institution where the faculty member will lecture or conduct research. Also the faculty will encourage greater student participation in the Magellan Exchange Program. Lecture or research will be in English. The host institution provides housing.

**China Programs:** This Morehead State University program offers faculty an opportunity to visit Guangxi University from two weeks to two months. Faculty members will lecture in their discipline, conduct research, and/or learn about Chinese culture and the educational system. Faculty members also may apply to the Summer English Teaching program, which provides instruction in oral English for secondary school students and faculty. Except for travel to and from China, all expenses are covered and there is a stipend for the Summer English Teaching program.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's distance learning programs have seen a dramatic increase over the past few years. During the fall term, the University's Office of Distance Learning offered 174 courses to students at regional centers or satellite campuses throughout the East Kentucky region.

MSU has received a \$499,153 award from the Distance Learning and Telemedicine Grants Program to help continue to provide more educational opportunities to students in the University's service region.

The money will be used to replace the existing videoconferencing equipment, bringing it into compliance and allowing MSU to continue providing and expanding its education and professional development opportunities for four satellite campuses (Mount Sterling, Jackson, West Liberty and Hindman) located in East Kentucky.

MSU at Ashland also will be upgraded, but with budgeted University funds that will count as an in-kind contribution via the grant.

"This is critical to our rural residents who rely on MSU programming for the provisions of education, professional development, training and content," said Michael Judge, MSU director of distance learning.

The work to install the new equipment should begin in early 2005.

The types of courses offered by the MSU distance learning programs are: Telecourse, Correspondence, Interactive TV (ITV), Online, Hybrid and Web-Enhanced.

During the fall semester, online classes saw a 79.3 percent increase (compared to fall 2003), a total of 1,456 students were enrolled. The ITV courses rose 65 percent or 1,129 students this term.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Board of Regents will award honorary degrees to its First Couple during Winter Commencement exercises on Saturday, Dec. 18.

MSU President Ronald G. Eaglin and Bonnie M. Eaglin will each receive the honorary Doctor of Public Service degree in ceremonies that begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center.

Dr. Eaglin, who is retiring at the end of the month, has served since July 1, 1992, as MSU's 12<sup>th</sup> president and is the senior public university president in Kentucky. A former chair of Kentucky's Conference of University Presidents, he also served as president of the Ohio Valley Conference and as a member of the NCAA Presidents Commission and Division I Board of Directors and Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Among his principal achievements at MSU are creation of the Space Science Center, reaccreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, accreditation of the College of Business, highest enrollments in history, recognition of MSU as one of the top 25 public regional universities in the South by "U.S. News and World Report," a 5,000 percent increase in endowment value from \$500,000 to more than \$25 million, completion of \$75 million worth of renovation and construction projects, expansion of regional campuses from three to five, establishment of the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy as the University's first program of distinction, and founding of the Kentucky Folk Art Center and the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music.

In addition to her untiring service as MSU's First Lady, Mrs. Eaglin has built her own reputation in Kentucky as a caring, compassionate citizen who has worked tirelessly on behalf of the visual and performing arts, international students, women and children. She founded the Morehead area PAVE (Partnership Against Violent Environment), the Gateway Child Advocacy Center for the benefit of children victimized by sexual abuse which was recently named in her honor, and the Rowan County Council on Domestic Violence. MOREHEAD, Ky.---It was all smiles, blue sky and bright sunshine Thursday (Dec. 16) as Morehead State University commissioned its new, \$3.5 million space tracking system on a campus ridgetop.

President Ronald G. Eaglin downloaded the first printout of data and Board of Regents Chair James H. Booth of Inez demonstrated the "joy stick" movement controls of the 125-ton antenna which is eight stories high.

"This is an exciting day and the fulfillment of a dream which began four years ago," Dr. Eaglin told an audience of university officials, contractors and staff assembled at the base of the massive instrument. "We are deeply grateful to Congressman Hal Rogers, Sen. Mitch McConnell, State Rep. Rocky Adkins, Dean Gerald DeMoss, Professor Ben Malphrus, members of the Board of Regents and others who embraced our vision of bringing space age technology to East Kentucky."

The antenna system is the first phase of MSU's space science center which earlier in the day was named for President Eaglin who is retiring at the end of December. The second phase is a \$15 million support building which has been recommended by Gov. Ernie Fletcher for funding in the next state budget.

MSU also hopes to receive \$5 million in additional federal funding for a space technology park to attract private companies to create jobs by commercializing streaming data from the antenna system.

Dr. Malphrus, director of the space science center, said the antenna system will be used for deep space research in radio astrophysics as part of MSU's space science degree program and for tracking satellites.

"We have looked forward to this day for a long time and it is thrilling to see it become a reality," said Dr. Malphrus, the astronomer who first proposed the project in 2000.

The antenna's installation was completed earlier this week by VertexRSI of Richardson, Texas. It is expected to be fully operational in early January and is being controlled from temporary facilities until the support building is available.

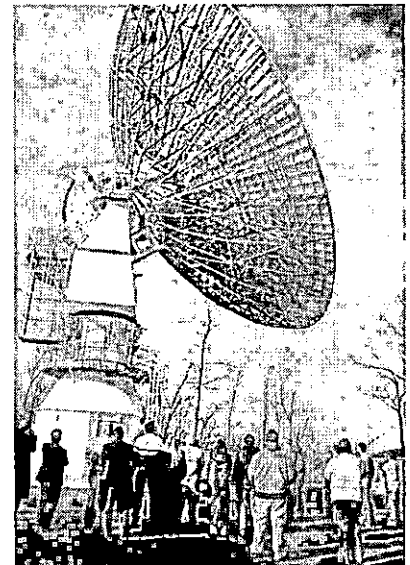
MSU's bachelor's degree in space science was approved earlier this year as the fourth such program in the U.S.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---It might have been a cold December morning, but one would never have known that at Morehead State University today as graduates participated in Winter Commencement, beginning the next chapter of their lives.

The University's First Couple, Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin and Bonnie M. Eaglin, were celebrating an historical event as well. In the ceremony marking Dr. Eaglin's last official appearance as president, the pair would each receive an honorary Doctor of Public Service degree for their dedication, support of higher education and community involvement.

Coming to MSU on July 1, 1992, Dr. Eaglin is the senior public university president in Kentucky. “Since coming to Morehead State, I have been involved in volunteer work and the benefit has been immeasurable,” Mrs. Eaglin said. “Everyone gave of their time and talents. We have fond memories. I encourage you (the graduates) to get involved in your community.”

The student speaker, Danna Lynn Aeschliman of Mukwonago, Wis., said she knew she was different from her classmates because she was not from Kentucky, did not start college at MSU and would not begin her career in Kentucky.

“We have taken different paths to get here, but in the end we are all equal,” she said. “While we all reflect back on the different paths we chose to get and stay here, we can all feel united in our common goal of graduation and of receiving a degree that years of hard work and dedication have entitled us to.”

Aeschliman, an education major, will join her husband in Texas, where he is stationed in the U.S. Army. She plans to begin her teaching career there while furthering her education by working toward a master’s degree in school administration.

She encouraged her fellow graduates to grow from their experiences. “We have individually encountered struggles, triumphs, and a sense of accomplishment. Yet, through everything, here we are. We are the newest group of professionals, ready to take on the world. So branch off today and lead the future down a path that is risky, enjoyable and worthwhile. Start now, for the journey of a thousand miles not only begins with a single step, it begins with you.”

More than 400 graduates and undergraduates were degree candidates at MSU’s Winter Commencement exercises.

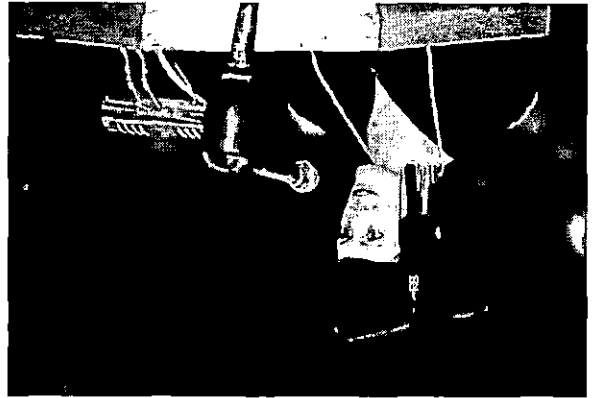
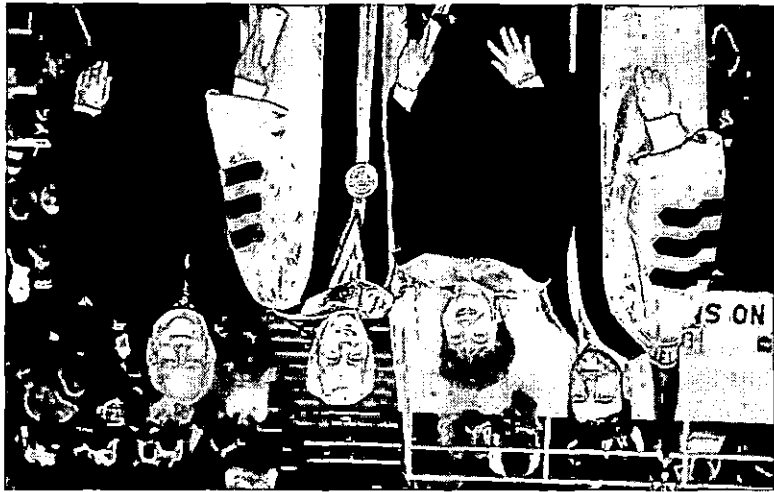

For three young people diagnosed with bipolar disorder, it's a brave journey into uncharged medical and emotional territory.

Morehead State Public Radio will air a special health program on this subject at 7 p.m. on Dec. 29 and repeated on Sunday, Jan. 2. The radio documentary, "The Wild Child: Coping with a Bipolar Youth," follows Erin, Eric and Athena, along with their parents, doctors, teachers and advocates as they navigate puberty and adolescence with a serious mood disorder.

Erin, 17, is a Nirvana fan with a history of substance abuse. Athena is a 10-year-old aspiring cheerleader who lives on disability with her single mom. Eric, 16, is a disciple of Conan O'Brien who holds a record for middle school detentions.

Through these young people's blunt, honest and often humorous voices, we learn about the early signs of the disorder; difficulties getting an accurate diagnosis; the trial and error of treatment; stress on family relationships; working with under-budgeted school systems and hopes for the future.

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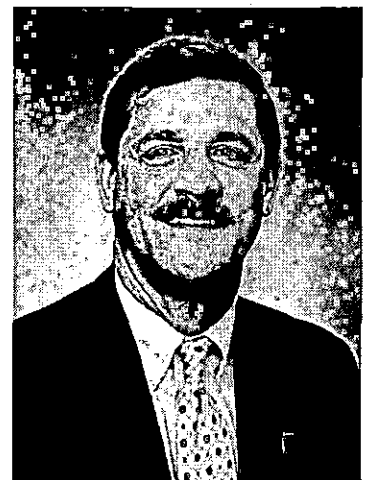

President Ronald G. Eaglin made his last public appearance as president at winter commencement on Dec. 18. He officially leaves office at midnight on Dec. 31 after serving 12 and a half years as MSU's 12th president. Dr. Eaglin and his wife, Bonnie, are relocating to Pawleys Island, S.C., and have vacated their residence on the east end of the campus.

Taking over as the 13th president will be Dr. Wayne D. Andrews, vice president for administration and chief operating officer of East Tennessee State University in Johnson City. His four-year term begins at 12:01 a.m. on Jan. 1. His first day on the job will be Monday, Jan. 3, when MSU reopens after the holiday break.

"Dr. Andrews will make a wonderful president of Morehead State University," said Dr. Eaglin. "I have enjoyed our time together in planning this transition and I am confident that he understands the nature of a regional university and that he will take the institution to greater heights in the years ahead."

In his last official act before leaving the campus, Dr. Eaglin added one day to the holiday break schedule. "I consider it my final gift to the incredible faculty and staff members who have accomplished so much during my tenure at the University," he said.

Dr. Andrews, who is expected to arrive in Morehead on Jan. 2, said of his selection to succeed Eaglin:

"I am delighted that I will be leading a school that cares so much about its students. I am passionate about the mission of Morehead State and excited about what can be done to build on the solid foundation now in place. Sue and I are looking forward to being members of another great university community."

MSU's Board of Regents finalized arrangements for the transfer of presidential authority at its meeting on Dec. 16. The Regents awarded honorary doctoral degrees to both of the Eaglins, named the new Space Science Center for President Eaglin and granted him emeritus status and a sabbatical leave of absence through June 30, 2005.
