Enlistments Open For 2000 In Fifth Corp Area Now

Young Men Of This County May Enlist In Army At Lexington

According to information received here, from officers commanding 200 additional enlistments will be called for in the United States Army in the Fifth Corp Area, which includes this county and community, as well as surrounding counties. In all fifteen thousand additional recruits will be enlisted, across the nation while this area will be called on for 21,000 new soldiers.

Young men between the ages of 18 and 25 are wanted to enroll. Recruiting offices for this purpose are now open in the Federal Post Office Building in Lexington, Kentucky. It is not known yet whether or not a local office will be opened as it was last fall.

Sergeant Robert Love will be in charge of the recruiting office, according to the announcement. Any young men who wish to join the army at this time and are urged to see him at his office in the Federal Building, Lexington, Ky.

Question—What do you mean when you say we are all lost? Isn't it true that a man is not lost until he commits some sin?

Answer—A man is not lost because he commits sin; he is lost because he is lost. To be lost means to be off the right road. It means not to be able to find God. All men are born lost. Of course, if any die in infancy they are saved. God's grace just like any other is not earned. God does not let dying infants go to eternal punishment. But God has to give them a new nature before they can be saved. This He does by the provisions of His own Grace through the death of Christ.

But we are not born with a godly nature in us at all. It is the nature of the devil, and the lusts of your father will you do. We are born with the nature of sin within us, just as we may be born with the germ of some dread disease in us. When the disease develops we have the resulting sores and physical pain and affliction. Sin, when sin, which is the nature of sin, just as the apple tree produces apples, so does sin produce sins. But the apple can grow only on an apple tree where the nature of the apple is already there. And sin can come only from a heart where the nature of sin is already there.

The tendency to sin is manifested in a child long before it is responsible for sin. They will lie long before they know of God. They will steal long before they can understand about God and Christ. They get mad and fight and say mean things long before they are responsible. They are sinners in nature, just as rattlesnakes are rattle snakes in nature, even when they are born.

What does this mean? It means that we are lost, off the right road, even in our birth; for our fathers and mothers were of the same nature. David said, "In iniquity was I born and in sin did my mother conceive me. Psalm 58:3 says, 'The wicked are estranged from the womb. We are off the right road to start with.

There are savage tribes born in the jungles where they know nothing of civilization. They know nothing of good and leads to them out they will never know. We are all born in the wilderness of sin. We have never known God in our hearts. Jesus came to lead us to Him. We could not know which way to go, or how to find God. We could not know what is right and what is wrong. So, unless Jesus had come we would have had no guide home. We were lost, and all men are lost who have not found Jesus the Way, the Truth and the Life.

The natural thing for a lost man to do is to commit sin, to take the wrong path, for he can not know the right path until it is shown to him. Many Uses For Bluestone. There are no less than 1,000 uses of using dirty products—all making for good health, says Miss Florence Imlay, food specialist for the Kentucky College of Agriculture, Kentucky's second largest industry is dairying. So the state has rich stores of what is dirt cheap, bluestone. Milk is high in calcium, vitamin A and phosphorus. Ways of using it are as follows: Cream soups, Creamed Vegetables, Creamed meat and greens, Scalloped vegetables, Grapes, Cereals cooked in milk, or served with milk and cream, custards, puddings, ice Creams, Cream cheese or cottage cheese.
