## Morehead Backs the Armament Program

After hearing most of the citizens of this community express their sympathies and their feelings, with regard to the European situation, there can be little or no doubt in anybody's mind what Morehead and Rowan county think of Hitler, and of the tragic situation in which the Allies find themselves. Equally true, there can be no mistaking the overwhelming determination and desire of the people of this community, to do all in their power to aid the Allies, to give them every material aid, to back them to the limit, to help them overcome the power of might which has almost overpowered them.

This is no idle discussion. The words of President Roosevelt and the almost incessant argument over the radio has brought the importance of this war in Europe to our very doors. There is not one thinking man or woman in this community who does not realize what a German victory, a Hitler victory will mean to this our own country and to the world. There is not one thinking man or woman, who is not anxious that this country do all in its power to aid the Allies in their defense, of not only their own liberties, but in defense of our liberties as well.

This is not war mongering, for we, like President Roosevelt hate war. Facing a reality is not war mongering. The tragedy is that America until the past month was not ready to face it.

We have heard some criticism of our lack of preparedness for the condition that has arisen. Yet the very same persons who are now criticizing our lack of preparedness, are the same persons, who, if the Federal Government had proposed even two months ago, what they have now proposed and accomplished, would have cried the loudest that we were plunging into war. The American people like the French and British are dependent on public sentiment. That is at the same time the strength and the weakness of our form of government. The government itself is of, by and for the people. But because of that very fact, it is impossible for the Federal Government to push through measures, until and unless the people are prepared for it.

Now, in our opinion is not the time for recrimination ever what in the final analysis is the failure of the American people to realize what the war in Europe would mean to us. It is not a time for discussion of the pros and cons of the matter. It is not a time for the introduction of politics into the sentiment that has united the American people behind the cause of the Allies. It is not the time for Lindberghs to abstract. Rather this is the time for deep and sincere prayer and at the same time for action. This country should go "all out" in its efforts to aid the Allies. It is the only possible course left us, if we would prevent the debacle of Europe from repeating itself on our shores. We go not want, war, and in the present state of our preparedness, war would be out of the question. But we must be ready for the time will come and at no distant date, judging from developments in France and Europe in the past week, when we will be forced to intervene, and intervention means war. Personally we are ready now, as we were in 1917 to contribute our bit.

Between the two Mussolinis more nearly fits the Bible description of the anti-Christ than does Hitler. It is my opinion that neither one of them is he, though I certainly could be wrong about it. They are doubtless types of that world-dictator and messianic figure, are becoming more and more the world ruler, which points to the final world rule of the anti-Christ. Things are happening too rapidly, and orders are changing too constantly for us to be dogmatic about who is who. But let us watch, as our Master bids us, for surely His coming draweth nigh.

### 905 Persons In State

### Receive Auto Insurance

Mr. James A. Chaney, manager of the Ashland, Ky., field office of the Social Security Board announced today that 905 persons in Kentucky are receiving monthly old age and survivors insurance payments as of April 30. The monthly payments for April amounted to \$122. It will be noted Mr. Chaney said, that the number of claims from retired workers over 65 years of age and from their wives past 65 is exceeding advance estimates by nearly 20 per cent. Claims from widows, orphan children, and other dependents in the case of the death of the breadwinner are lagging behind estimates.

For the country as a whole, Mr. Chaney stated, 21,150 persons were added to the old-age and survivors insurance rolls in April, bringing the total number of persons in the United States now awarded regular monthly benefits to 62,364. April awards added \$377,516 to the level of monthly payments bringing the

national figure to \$1,733,933 a month.

These insurance payments, Mr. Chaney explained, go to any "qualified" commercial or industrial worker at age 65 or over to his wife at age 65, to his child under 18 years of age, or to his widow at age 65, or if she has young children in her care, to his children under 18 years of age, or in some cases to his dependent parents over 65. Wage earners and their employers share the cost of paying social taxes, and monthly benefits are paid as a right no matter what other income the family may have.

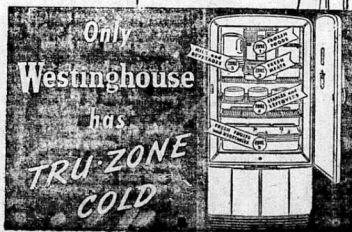
