Students Asked To Participate In Salvage Drive

Committee Organized
To Supervise Work
In Collecting Paper

All Morehead college students have been requested to participate in the Morehead county salvage drive which was organized at a meeting Tuesday, February 22. A salvage committee has been organized which will have complete charge of all pieces of salvage including waste paper, old newspapers, old books, old papers, collection of tin, copper, brass, and other articles needed.

Members of the committee are: Mr. Charles R. Dietz, chairman, W. J. Campbell, vice-chairman, J. J. Corbett, Elaine Hall, and Mrs. G. E. Smith.

Due to the urgent need now for waste paper, the committee would like to turn immediate attention to that phase of salvage work first, namely, the collection of waste paper from the Morehead campus for the national salvage drive. In this regard, the girls in Fields Hall have been requested to place their collections in a large box designated for that purpose.

The committee would also like for the various departments of the college to turn in their waste paper to the county department and the library place a large box at convenient places for the collection of the waste paper.

To facilitate the salvaging work, students are asked to place their waste paper in a large box, in the basement of the building, which has been provided for that purpose. This would be the place where the waste paper is sorted for use in the national salvage drive. All newspapers, magazines, old books, old papers, and old newspapers should be placed in this box. The collection of waste paper should be continued until the end of the month. The committee will classify the waste paper into two groups, namely, newspapers, magazines, and old books, and old newspapers, and old magazines.

The R. M. Capital building of Fairbanks avenue is being used as a collecting place for waste paper. Large quantities of waste paper two large trucks are being used to transport to large boxes for its removal.

Education Journal Publishes Article By Dr. R. L. Hoke

February Issue Carries
Article Titled "Living
Intellect Emphasis"

The February 1944 issue of "The Journal of Higher Education," a magazine published monthly as the professional journal of the National Association of American Professors, contains an article by Dr. R. L. Hoke, professor at Morehead State College, titled "Living Intellect Emphasis."

Dr. Hoke stresses the importance of an educational system which is not only a source of knowledge, but also a source of intellectual development. He argues that the current educational system is too much concerned with the transmission of knowledge and not enough with the development of the intellect.

Dr. Hoke also discusses the importance of the teacher in the educational process. He argues that the teacher should not only be a transmitter of knowledge, but also a guide in the development of the student's intellect.

Dr. Hoke concludes by stating that the educational system should be reformed so that it is more concerned with the development of the intellect and less concerned with the transmission of knowledge.

Dr. Hoke's article is a contribution to the current discussion on the reform of the educational system. It is a well-written and thought-provoking article that should be read by all who are interested in education.
