MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Office of Continuing Education offers motorcycle riding classes for the beginner and the advanced rider.

The Basic Motorcycle Rider Safety Course (BRC) is for non-riders, new riders, or someone wanting a refresher course. During the course, instruction includes how to maneuver and operate a motorcycle in a controlled, off-street environment.

Upon successful completion of the course, the rider will receive a waiver for the skills test to obtain a motorcycle license. Some insurance agencies offer discounts to persons completing the course.

Motorcycles and helmets are provided for each student. The course is a minimum of 15 hours. All classes meet on Friday, from 6-10 p.m., and Saturday and Sunday from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. All classroom and skills hours must be attended in order to successfully complete course requirements.

The Experienced Rider Course (ERC) is designed for individuals who have a current motorcycle license, have access to a street legal cycle, and have riding experience. On-cycle maneuvers are practiced in a controlled, off-street environment and are specifically geared to reinforce safe riding strategies. The course meets a minimum of four hours on Saturday, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Proof of insurance and registration are required.

Registration for the BRC class is \$110 per person and \$60 for the ERC class. Class size is limited to 12 students per class.

For the basic class, one free slot per class is allocated to a Kentucky resident, 16 - 17 years of age who meets specific requirements. Prior parental signatures must be submitted before class participation is allowed.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University will mark another historic milestone on Friday, May 13, when Dr. Wayne D. Andrews is formally installed as the institution's 13th president.

Staged as an investiture rather than an inauguration, the one-day event will be highlighted by presentation of the presidential medallion, symbol of his office, to President Andrews by James H. Booth of Inez, chair of the Board of Regents, during an 11 a.m. ceremony at the Adron Doran University Center.

"This is an important event in the life of the University and offers a fitting opportunity to celebrate the appointment of our new president," said Booth.

He noted that limited seating would restrict admission to the investiture but that the ceremony would be available on live, closed-circuit television and the Internet.

About 900 invited delegates and guests are expected to witness MSU's first formal transfer of presidential authority since 1987. The event will include an academic procession of delegates from other institutions and organizations, as well as MSU faculty, staff, students and alumni. State Education Secretary Virginia Fox, a former member of the MSU Board of Regents, will be among the delegates.

Following the ceremony, President Andrews and his wife, Sue, will host a private luncheon for family, friends and delegates.

The observance goes public at 3 p.m. when Dr. and Mrs. Andrews greet faculty, staff and students in a reception at the University Center. Alumni and the general public are invited between 4:30 p.m. and 6 p.m.

"Our goals for the day are a simple but elegant investiture ceremony and an abundance of gracious hospitality for guests of Dr. and Mrs. Andrews and the University," said Keith Kappes, vice president for university relations and coordinator of the day's events.

A formal ceremony traditionally marks the transfer of authority to a new chief executive of an institution of higher education. Like the wearing of colorful academic regalia, the practice evolved from European universities. Dr. Andrews began his term of office on January 1.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Morehead State University campus is operating without Button Auditorium and its adjoining drill room while the building undergoes repairs.

The contract has been awarded to Midwest Maintenance Inc. of Piqua, Ohio. Work on the \$307,324 project began in early April and is scheduled for completion in September.

"We will address the structural and safety concerns that have been identified," said Mike Walters, vice president for administration and fiscal services. "Lack of funding will keep us from doing everything needed, but this will result in a major facelift for this historic building."

Issues to be addressed include replacement of broken stone on the exterior; cleaning and sealing all exterior stone; replacement of exterior doors and frames; replacement of roof over the entry; installation of new crown molding in the entry hall; repair of interior plaster and repainting of selected areas; and repair and reglazing windows.

In addition, the University is replacing seats in the auditorium through a \$185,470 contract with American Seating Company. This work will be completed this summer.

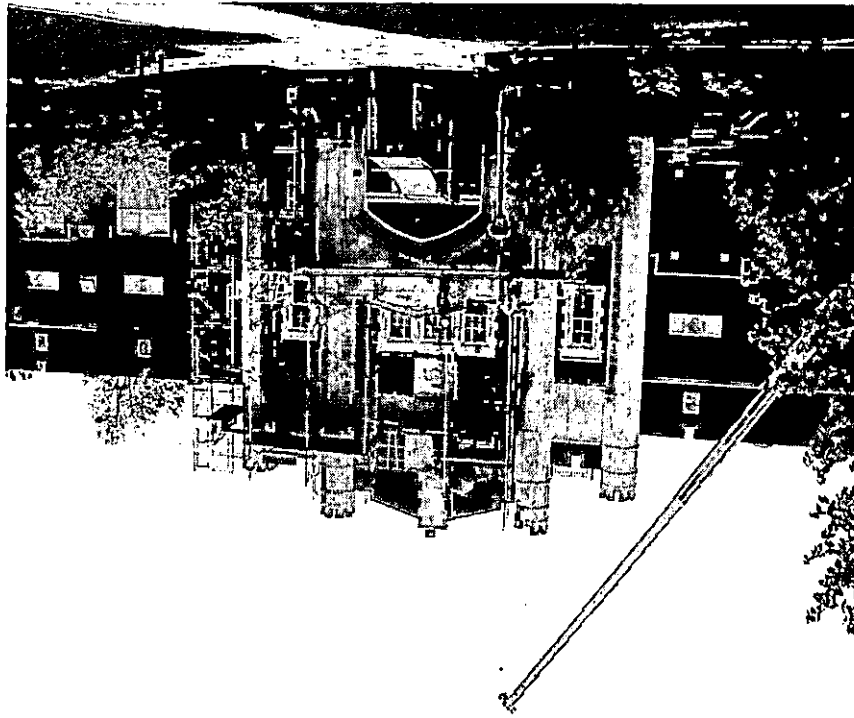
Button Auditorium, named for Frank C. Button, the school's first president, was completed in 1928. The building served as the center for campus activities with a gymnasium and a 1,300-seat auditorium which was used for theatrical performances, convocations and commencement. The gymnasium was retrofitted in 1968 to house offices and classrooms of the Department of Military Science.

Through the years, Button has seen many minor changes with the building undergoing major changes in 1968. The exterior was left intact but the interior was redesigned to house the Department of Military Science. Today, the auditorium seats 1,367 and the 8,900 sq. ft. gymnasium now serves as a drill room.

Button is listed on the National Register of Historic Places by the U.S. Department of Interior and Kentucky Heritage Council.

The auditorium is expected to reopen soon after the start of the fall semester. However, the Department of Military Science will continue its operations during the project.

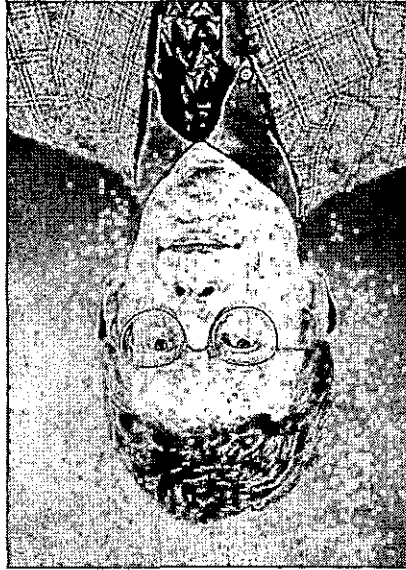

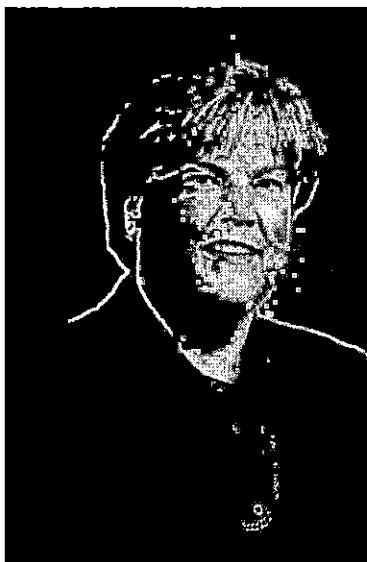

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University Police Chief Joseph S. Cline was one of nearly 50 of Kentucky's top law enforcement executives and professional association leaders appointed by Lt. Gov. Stephen Pence to the newly created Kentucky Law Enforcement Issues Consortium (KLIC).

KLIC, a collaborative effort between the Department of Criminal Justice Training and the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, is comprised of top leaders of Kentucky's five professional law enforcement associations. The consortium also includes additional chiefs and sheriffs, as well as other law enforcement executives from across the state, for the purpose of assisting and advising the administration on identifying and examining top issues, proposing action plans and providing support for implementation of items critical to public safety throughout the Commonwealth.

Cline, a 20-year veteran of law enforcement, joined the MSU Police Department in 2001 and assumed his current position in 2003. He came to the University after serving as a patrolman for 10 years and a detective for six years with the Morehead Police Department.

He also has been a dispatcher/patrolman with the Olive Hill Police Department and a clerk/dispatcher in the Kentucky Army National Guard.

The lieutenant governor, who also serves as secretary of the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, charged KLIC with the task of addressing and finding solutions to the issues that are facing Kentucky's law enforcement community and praised them for their commitment and willingness to serve the Commonwealth.

The consortium met in Frankfort in mid-April to begin an open dialogue between law enforcement officers from across the state. The lieutenant governor said that the meeting offered insight into important issues and concerns facing Kentucky's law enforcement agencies.

Among those attending the meeting was J. Patrick McCreary, associate deputy director of the Bureau of Justice Assistance in the Office of Justice Programs, Washington D. C. His presentation focused on the current technology trends in law enforcement across the nation and the importance of information sharing and collaboration.

KLIC will meet twice a year to discuss issues that effect Kentucky law enforcement and bring their concerns before the governor through legislative proposals each year. The group's next meeting is scheduled for September.

Cline, a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University's Police Academy, earned his Bachelor of Science degree in criminal justice from Columbia Southern University. He is a certified firearms instructor with the Department of Criminal Justice Training and the National Rifle Association.

The Morehead Optimist Club gave him its Police Officer of the Year Award in 1987 and 1999. A past president and chaplain of the Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #35, Cline is a Kentucky Law Enforcement Council certified police instructor.

In 2004, he graduated from the FBI National Academy Program at Quantico, Va. He was one of 257 law enforcement officers from across the U.S. to attend the program that allows law enforcement officers to share information and network with each other.

Cline lives in Rowan County with his wife, Robin, and two children, Jarad and Brittany.

“Unquiet Graves” is a sonically-rich, half-hour essay. It includes: a battlefield tour, memorials, dreams of the dead and voices of the living – a view of the world as seen from over there. The program, written by Marjorie Van Halteren, begins at 9 a.m.

Van Halteren, who moved to France in 1992, reflects on the quiet life she sought in Northern France. As time passes, she becomes more and more disturbed by the media reports from “Over There” and her growing understanding of the ground beneath her own feet.

Little by little, she discovers her adopted home, first scratching the surface, then delving into the backstory of a region ravaged by two world wars and filled with the bodies of young men and many other citizens. In fact, all the lives of those now living are touched by the unquiet graves. – this is a quiet place where war is part of the fabric of daily life.

The program was produced in Flanders by Helen Engelhardt and Van Halteren.

“NPR's National Memorial Day Concert 2005” will be broadcast at 1 p.m.

Erich Kunzel leads the National Symphony Orchestra and special guest artists, singers, and speakers, including opera singer Harolyn Blackwell, and actors Charles Durning, Gary Sinise (star of the television series CSI), and Joe Mantegna. Also appearing will be Gen. Colin Powell, the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, and color guards from each of the armed forces.

The National Memorial Day Concert will bring to life the moving stories of the young men who fought on Iwo Jima, commemorating the 60th anniversary of the battle for the small but strategically vital Pacific Island. The concert also will pay special tribute to the troops in Iraq and Afghanistan, and the sacrifices of the widows, widowers and children left behind.

This year also marks the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II, six years of bitter and bloody warfare with more than one million U.S. service men and women either killed or wounded.

Army Pvt. Peter Rubino, 29th Infantry Division, faced a hellish sight when his boat unloaded off Omaha Beach. His officer in charge said, "We've got two choices: Stay here and get killed or run up the hill and get killed."

Racial discrimination was rampant during World War II, but some found opportunities to break new ground. Charles McGee trained to be one of America's first black pilots. Known as the Tuskegee Airmen, they were highly skilled at escorting bombers to safety, and theirs are among the war's most successful missions.

World War II produced innumerable acts of courage. Floating in the Pacific after his ship sunk, U.S. Marine Pfc. Giles McCoy made a life decision. "I promised God that if he got me out of this, I would not kill any more of his people. I would become a doctor and that's what I did."

"Lest We Forget" focuses on the experiences and raw feelings that veterans remember from diverse theaters of war.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University at West Liberty's Adult Education and Career Center was one of only 40 adult education programs in the commonwealth to surpass its performance goal for the last four years.

The center, which is located on Highway 1084, Route 7, in West Liberty, is open Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., and on Fridays from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Nearly 300 adult educators, superintendents, college presidents, federal and state education officials and Kentucky Adult Education staff joined together for a festive Recognition Luncheon in Louisville in April to celebrate the system's shared accomplishments over the past four years.

Special guests included Susan Scalfani, assistant secretary for vocational and adult education at the U.S. Department of Education; Ron Greenberg, chair of the Council on Postsecondary Education; Dr. Tom Layzell, president of the Council on Postsecondary Education; and Sue Hodges Moore, executive vice president of the Council on Postsecondary Education.

Since 2000, enrollment in adult education programs has grown by 135 percent, increasing from 51,177 to 120,051 in 2004. Workplace education enrollment has climbed from 8,724 to 51,388 in the last four years and family literacy enrollment has grown from 1,357 to 4,397 since 2001.

In 2004, the Morgan County program served 486 people, 20 more than its goal, to which it received \$7,745 in performance incentives.

"I am so proud of Linda Nickel, coordinator of the Adult Education and Career Center, and the rest of the staff. They continue to work hard to meet the goals set by KYAE. This year they have already served more than 850 people and will be on target for reward funding in 2005," said Dr. Jonell Tobin, director at MSU West Liberty, who has oversight of the center.

Adult education providers representing 101 counties attended the event and were recognized for their role.

“When (adult education) enrollment goals were set in 2000, many people said enrolling 100,000 adult education students seemed nearly impossible, much less going beyond the 100,000 mark,” said Dr. Layzell, as he addressed adult educators in the audience. “Yet in 2004, you touched the lives of more than 120,000 Kentucky adults. Because of your dedication, your hard work and your determination, you achieved what many said was impossible.

“We often talk about accomplishments by quoting numbers, but the real story is not in the statistics but in the lives of the people you have reached, one by one, a day at a time,” he added.

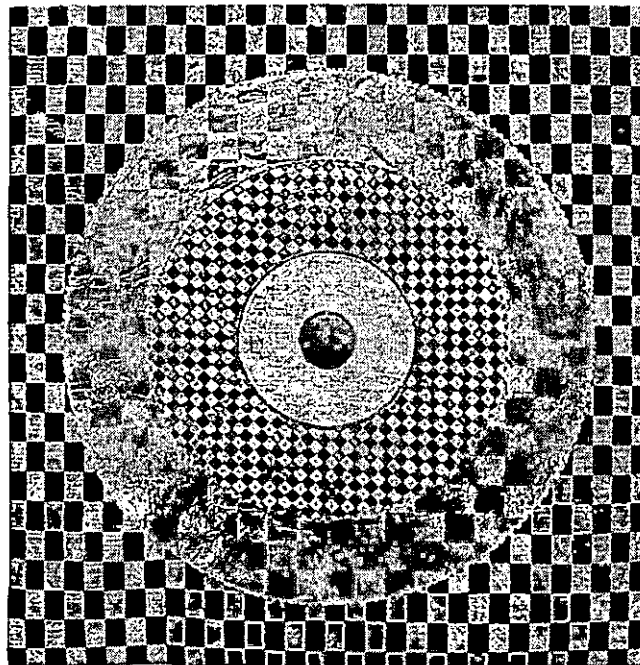

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AN OLD SAYING DEPICTED IN FABRIC

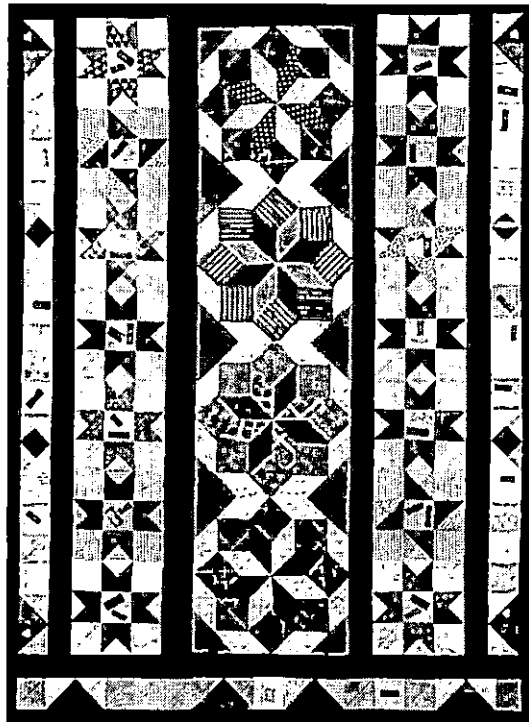

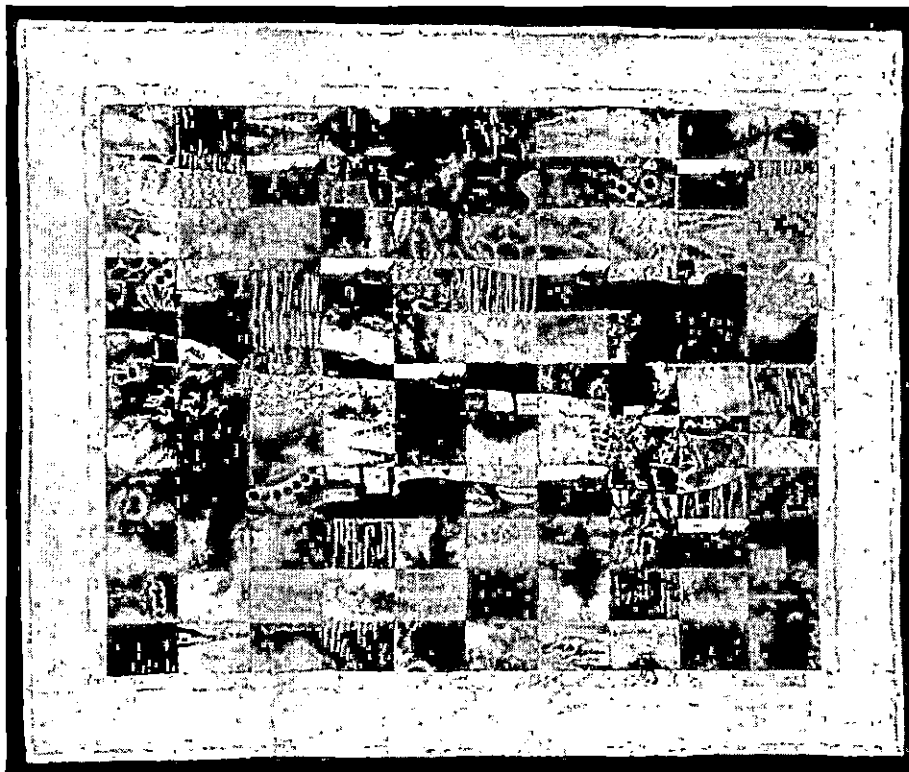

MOREHEAD, Ky.---A former Morehead State University professor has returned to the campus after a 15-year absence to serve as chair of the Department of Management, Marketing and Real Estate in the College of Business.

Dr. Gregory R. Russell, an assistant professor of electronics/robotics technology at MSU from 1986-1988, assumed the chair position earlier this year.

Dr. Russell earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering in 1982 from the University of Kentucky where he completed his master's degree two years later. In 1994, he received his Ph.D. degree from the University of South Carolina.

He had worked as production engineer supervisor for Celwave Technologies in Elizabethtown, before joining the MSU faculty in the late 1980s. Entrepreneurship: Are you ready to run your own business?

Identifying professional strengths and weaknesses help determine if ownership is appropriate

Ninety percent of restaurants fail in the first year. Fifty percent of small businesses fail or close their doors within five years of opening. Everyone has heard these frightening statistics about small business ownership. Unfortunately, a lot of small businesses do fail, but the actual statistics are relative to the study that collected them. Entrepreneurship is an extremely taxing profession. However, with proper research, relentless dedication and a burning passion for the business, success can be achieved.

Proper planning is imperative to opening a successful start-up business. The first step is a careful self-examination to determine if you have the personality and passion to become an entrepreneur. This includes determining the reasons for wanting to go into business. Many people believe business ownership will provide the opportunity for personal freedom and financial independence and allow them to utilize personal skills. In many situations these reasons can become actualities, but the responsibility and pressure of entrepreneurship should be heavily weighed. Is it possible to meet these professional and personal needs by working for someone else? Do the benefits of business ownership outweigh the risks? These questions should be seriously contemplated before plunging into business.

Next, a potential entrepreneur should examine the qualities they possess and whether they are compatible with business ownership or the type of business the person is interested in starting. For example, a talented baker may have the ability to make sinfully delicious éclairs, but if that person does not enjoy going to work in the middle of the night, then opening a doughnut shop is not a feasible idea. Another personal issue that needs to be considered is financial flexibility. Small business owners do not always make a profit each month and those that do often have to reinvest the money in the business to get it established. People requiring a certain amount of money to maintain a particular lifestyle may want to create a nest egg before starting a business or considering if ownership is the best option.

The final and possibly most important traits for a person to consider before diving into business ownership are passion, dedication and determination. A business owner must love his or her job, because business ownership requires working around the clock to get started, maintain and grow the business. An entrepreneur must be fully committed to the business and realize there is no job description for entrepreneurship. An entrepreneur must sell the product or services, manage the financial accounts, oversee employees, deal with vendors and interact with clients. Also, these qualities and willingness to work are important, because the business owner's name and reputation is on the line and that person must be willing to do whatever is necessary to build and maintain that reputation.

As a business consultant, I strongly recommend discussing personal traits and business ideas with an objective third party. It is often very difficult for personal friends to provide an accurate evaluation. It is also important to discuss the type of business being considered and see if there is a need in the community for this service or product. 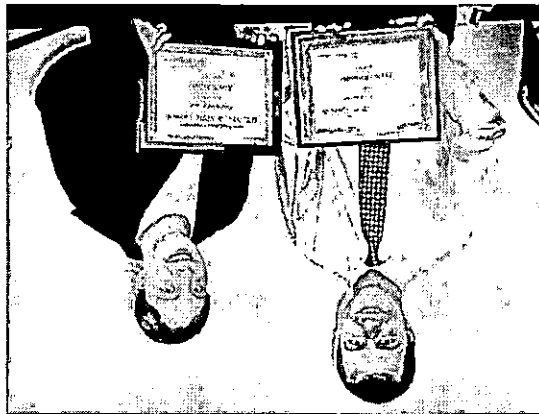

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Several Morehead State University students made a trip to Washington to lobby Congress for their professional interests.

In April, a group of eight senior advanced imaging students enrolled in MSU's computed tomography/magnetic resonance track participated in lobbying efforts in support of the federal CARE Bill.

CARE (Consumer Assurance of Radiologic Excellence) was introduced by delegates from the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT) during the 1999-2000 and 2001-02 congressional sessions, but never made it past Congress. If passed into law, the bill would mandate minimum standards in the imaging sciences professions.

"What we are trying to get the federal government to do is to legislate general education standards for people practicing radiography, nuclear medicine and radiation therapy," said Cyndi Gibbs, associate professor of radiologic sciences and MSU's only CT/MR instructor. "We want them to regulate it and set licensing and minimal education levels for practitioners."

According to Gibbs, 1981s Radiation Health and Safety Act requires minimal health and safety standards for imaging practitioners, but left it up to states to set most of the specific regulations. Kentucky is one of the states that does regulate the profession, and has since 1979, Gibbs said. "We in Kentucky realized the importance of people being regulated, but many other states do not, and we want consistency throughout the United States."

As an example, Gibbs cited one person living in a southeastern state who had been working at a fast food chain, but attended a one-day training session on how to take X-rays.

"They paid a \$10 licensing fee and were taking X-rays the next day," she said.

There are numerous dangers when non-certified practitioners operate imaging equipment, both to the patient and the operator. Radiography machines in particular emit high levels of radiation, which can be hazardous if not used correctly.

The students, accompanied by Gibbs and Jacklynn Darling, associate professor of radiologic sciences, were representing both MSU and the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT).

The MSU students also are members of the campus organization SPECTMR (Students Pursuing Education in Computed Tomography and Magnetic Resonance). They raised about half of the money for the Washington trip in club functions, and the other half came from their own personal funds. Gibbs is the club's adviser.

They were eight of only 20 students nationally to attend the lobbying session, where they had several appointments with legislators. The eight students are: Jill Black of **Flemingsburg**; Danny Blanton of **Greenup**; Brett Bryan of **Chillicothe, Ohio**; Jill Daniels of **Ashland**; Brandon Hughes of **Vanceburg**; Becca Mason of **Morehead**; Erin Montgomery of **Morehead**; and Amy Weaver of **Pickerington, Ohio**.

"One of the reasons we wanted to take the students because this, as far as active involvement in their profession, is the most important thing in their career," Gibbs said. "It's kind of intimidating at first, but we trained with lobbyists on how to most effectively talk to legislators. It was a wonderful educational experience for the students, and also a wonderful professional experience."

A limited number of scholarships, funded by the Kentucky Advanced Placement Incentive Program (KAPIP), are available to Kentucky residents on a first come, first serve basis. Additional scholarship information is available by calling Jim Beward at the Kentucky Department of Education at (502) 564-4772, ext. 4537.

The week-long institute offers intensive subject-specific training on the content and methods of teaching AP courses, and they serve as an environment for exchanging ideas about AP. Participating in an AP institute is generally one of the first steps to becoming a successful AP teacher. Advanced programs give students an opportunity to enhance their studies by taking college level courses and exams while in high school.

Participants may choose instruction in 18 subjects at MSU's Summer Institute. These include biology, calculus, chemistry, English language, English literature, environmental science, European history, French language, German language, human geography, music theory, physics, psychology, Spanish language, statistics, U.S. government and politics, U.S. history, and world history. Participants may enroll in one course.

APSI is now in its fifth year at MSU. Last year, more than 200 educators from the eastern part of the U.S. attended the institute.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---In a ceremony steeped in ancient academic ritual and tradition, Dr. Wayne D. Andrews today was installed as the 13th president of Morehead State University.

Responding to his investiture of the presidential medallion, the new president challenged MSU to become the best such institution in the 12-state area defined as the South by U.S. News and World Report magazine. MSU was named late last year to the magazine's top 25 list in the South.

Saying that he wants to move the 118-year-old regional university from "a good institution to greatness," Dr. Andrews said he had learned in just over four months on the job that MSU is solid in its teaching and learning missions but must continue to expand its research related to economic development and seek new partnerships in the public and private sectors.

"As president, I give you my solemn vow that I will do my best to know the way, go the way and to show the way," said Dr. Andrews, a former vice president at East Tennessee State University who was selected in late 2004 from a field of more than 100 applicants to succeed Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin who retired after 12 years in the post.

Witnessing the investiture were delegates from other colleges and universities, and state and local government agencies, faculty, staff, students, alumni and volunteers. Board of Regents Chair James H. Booth, assisted by State Education Secretary Virginia Fox, presented the Presidential Medallion, prime symbol of the authority and responsibilities of the office.

The Andrews Medallion, made of solid, polished bronze, incorporates The Great Seal of the University and measures 3.5 inches in diameter. It will be worn at academic and ceremonial functions during the Andrews presidency.

Secretary Fox, who represented Gov. Ernie Fletcher, advised the new president that the commonwealth was looking to him to make a difference because all citizens need to achieve a good education and increase economic development in the region.

"Be bold; don't be timid. Be bold and dream big dreams, not small ones. Now more than ever, local communities are looking to you to guide them as our world becomes more global and more competitive," she said.

The higher education community was represented by Dr. Paul E. Stanton Jr., president of East Tennessee State University, who nominated Dr. Andrews for the MSU presidency. He said that he would have the support of educational associations but having known him for 18 years, it was the personal side where he wished to comment.

"I have never seen this man fail. I have always seen him be highly successful and I can pledge to you that this man will be one of the greatest presidents that has ever led this institution."

Other program participants included: Jason Marion, president of the Student Government Association; David Jessie, chair of Staff Congress; Dr. Terry L. Irons, chair of Faculty Senate; and Chuck D. Charles of Ashland, president of the MSU Alumni Association.

The procession in colorful academic regalia entered to the "Morehead State University Presidential Fanfare," a solo for trumpet written for the occasion by Greg Wing, assistant professor of music.

Dr. Andrews is the first MSU president to be installed in a formal ceremony since the inauguration of Dr. C. Nelson Grote in 1987. President Eaglin chose not to have a ceremony when he assumed office in 1992. Dr. Grote and two other former presidents, Dr. A.D. Albright and Dr. Morris L. Norfleet, attended today's ceremony.

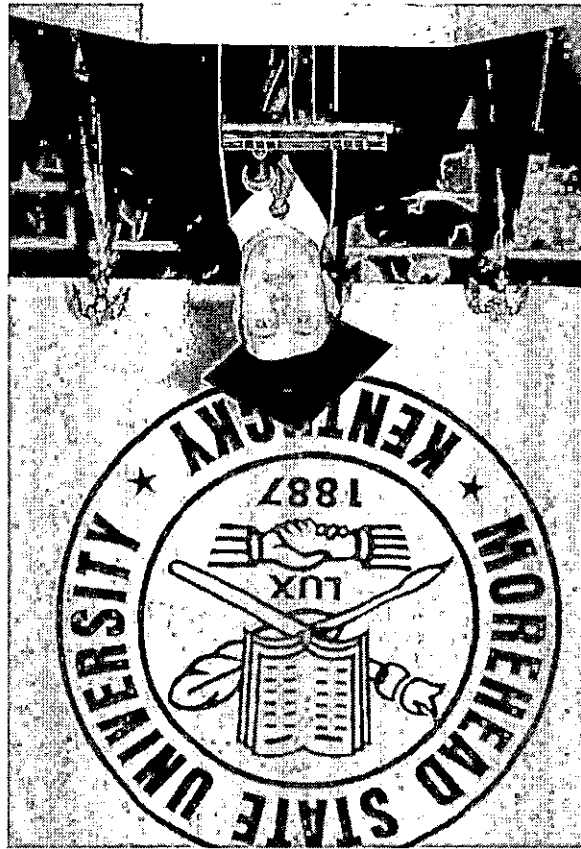
"Things will never be simple again, but remembering the simple will help us in a complex world," he said.

"We like to say in our household, teaching is more than a job; it is a calling," President Bush told the crowd. "You know what I'm talking about. You wouldn't be sitting here if you had not heard the calling. By helping every child realize his or her potential, our teachers show their students that dreams can become reality.

"What a fantastic job, isn't it, to help somebody realize a dream can become a reality. All who answer the call to teach deserve our support, our respect, and our affection," the president added.

Travis was the first of her family to get a chance of a college degree. She didn't have it easy. Like many students, she had to work but always knew that she wanted to teach.

And after 25 years, she still loves her job.

After obtaining her teaching degree from MSU, Travis went back to her home county to begin her education career. For the past 23 years, she has been shaping student's lives at GMS.

On one of her visits to the MSU campus, the seventh-grade math teacher imparted some advice for the future educators.

Active in various professional organizations, she holds education memberships in The National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the Kentucky Council of Teachers of Mathematics, and the National Middle School Association.

Travis was regional board director for the Kentucky Middle School Association and has been named to Who's Who Among America's Teachers and is a past recipient of the Ashland Inc. Golden Apple Achievement Award.

“Teaching is very rewarding. Don’t let people discourage you,” Travis added to the group. “Think of that teacher who inspired you. The one that made you want to become a teacher, and think of inspiring another generation.”

The Chaffin award presentation and book signing are part of Bluegrass 'n More, A Celebration of American Music. More than 30 hours of Bluegrass, gospel, acoustic and other American music will be highlighted during the three-day event that runs June 3-5 in Morehead. Appalachian literature and the authors who create it will be featured on June 3.

Rash, the 10th recipient of the Chaffin award, holds the John Parris Chair in Appalachian Studies at Western Carolina University. His most recent publication is a novel, titled "Saints at the River," which was published last year.

The primary focus of Rash's works is the southern Appalachian mountains where his family has lived since the mid-1700s. He grew up in Boiling Springs, N.C., and graduated from Gardner-Webb College and Clemson University.

He has earned numerous awards for his works. He received an NEA Poetry Fellowship in 1994; won the Sherwood Anderson Prize in 1996; was presented the Novella Festival Novel Award in 2001; and was awarded Foreword Magazine's Gold Medal in Literary Fiction in 2002 for his novel "One Foot in Eden." The novel also was named Appalachian Book of the Year.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University was recently honored by a state organization for efforts toward conserving energy.

The Kentucky Energy Services Coalition presented an award to MSU for the University's campus wide lighting retrofit project.

"The award is in recognition of the fact that we are about 90 percent completed with this project, and we'll probably see an energy savings of about \$175,000 to \$200,000 annually," said April Haight, energy conservation manager.

According to Haight, the lighting project has involved, in most cases, removing existing lamps and ballasts, and replacing them with more energy efficient lamps.

"Many of the old incandescent ones are being replaced with the 4-foot fluorescent lamps," she said. "By doing this, we'll be able to modernize the look of the buildings and save energy at the same time."

The initial capital cost of the lighting project will be paid back to the University in terms of energy savings, Haight added. "The neat thing about this project is that it is paying for itself, and will be paid off in about 15 years, thanks to Kentucky's generally low utility costs," she said.

This would mean an initial capital cost of approximately \$1.8 million and an estimated energy cost savings of more than \$157,000 annually. The quality of lighting would be improved and the payback period of 10.61 years could be financed over a 15-year period.

Mike Walters, vice president for administration and fiscal services, Gene Caudill, physical plant director, and Haight accepted the award on behalf of MSU at a Frankfort luncheon held during the spring semester.

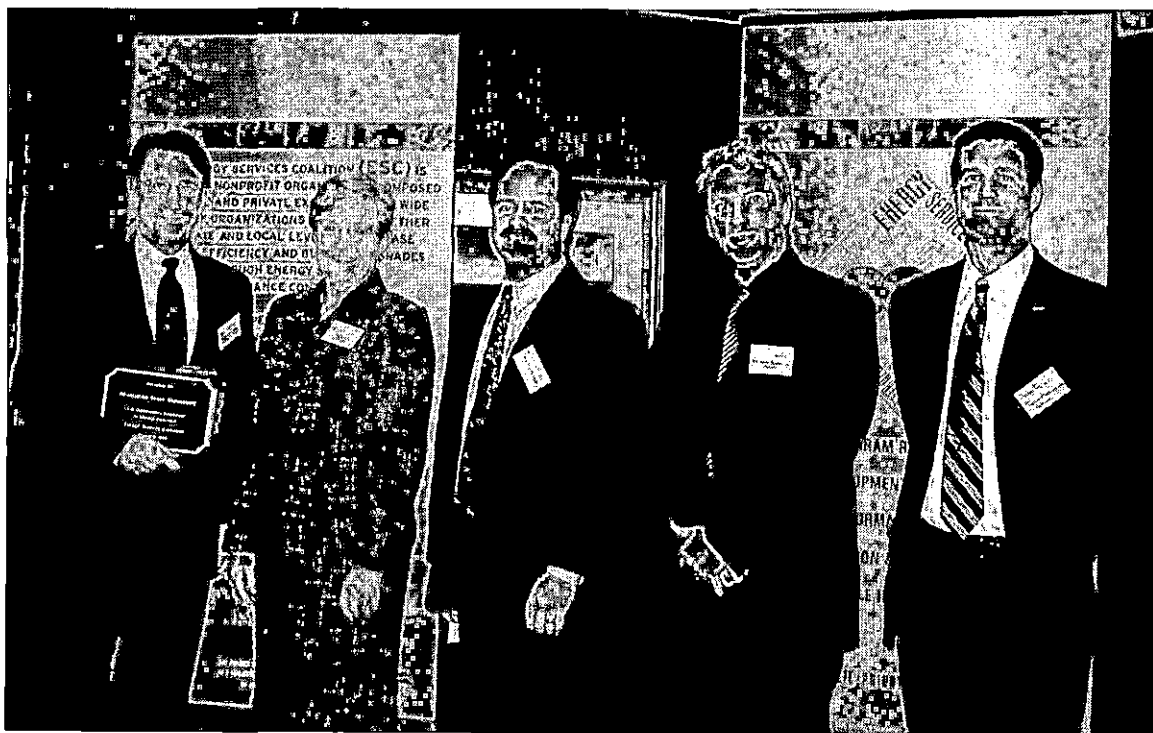

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University has announced that Blanche Coldiron of Grant County is 2005 Appalachian Treasure Award recipient.

She is being recognized for her decades of valuable contributions to traditional Kentucky music. The award presentation will be held in Morehead on Saturday, June 4, at 7 p.m., as part of Bluegrass 'n More, A Celebration of American Music.

Coldiron, born Blanche Hurt in Wolfe County in April 1922, moved with her family to Powell County when she was six years old. At the age of nine, she began playing banjo with her family and others from her community. By the age of 15, she and her brother were playing for Asa Martin's Kentucky Hillbillies where she was known as "Blanche, The Mountain Girl."

In an interview with John Harrod and Mark Wilson, Coldiron spoke of playing music in East Kentucky in the 1930s. "We played mostly in these old hewed-stone schoolhouses back up through Jackson and Clay counties... where we had to walk across a swinging bridge," she said. "You ought to seen that thing a-rolling and us trying to get our instruments across it!"

At 17, the Great Depression led Coldiron's family to move from the mountains to Grant County in northern Kentucky. When she was 21, she married Earl Coldiron and began her family. While she gave up regular performing after her marriage, Coldiron continued to perform locally, to write songs, and to serve as an inspiration to other musicians. In addition to the banjo, for which she is most widely known, she also plays fiddle, guitar, mandolin and Dobro.

Past recipients of the "Appalachian Treasure" award include Tom T. Hall, Ronald and Jessie Cooper, Loyal Jones, James Still, Gurney Norman, Minnie Adkins and Jean Ritchie.

Other events taking place that day, as part of the Bluegrass 'n More festival, include A Day in the Country Folk Art show and performances by Ralph Stanley, Tim O'Brien and numerous other musicians.
