phosphate and potash frozen at the prices charged at retail during February 15-20 inclusive. Mr. Henderson also announced that retail market prices for nitrate of soda, sulphate of ammonia, cyanamid and other leading fertilizers will be taken within a few days.

"Fertilizer prices have advanced considerably, as compared with a year ago," Mr. Henderson stated. "Our farmers are being called upon to produce as never before the vital commodities and foodstuffs that will play so important a part in winning this war. In making this effort, farmers have a right to expect that supplies of fertilizer shall be placed at their disposal at uninflated prices. Higher fertilizer prices at this time can only serve to hinder our national food production program."

If one undertakes to remodel his home this spring he will find that certain things have happened to plumbing and heating equipment. His supply and regulation. His plumbing contracts were advanced now did fancy installations, but will suggest repairs, in compliance with the WPB's metal conservation policy just announced. There won't be the variety of fittings because WPB has cut down the types from 8,500 to 3,000 for the same reason. Fancy radiators and concealed piping will now disappear for the duration.

The war has caused rug manufacturers to be warned by the Bureau of Industry Branches to get into the manufacture of essential war materials. The WPB is asking that it might be necessary to "freeze" all jute yarns used in rugs, but which, unappreciably must be shipped from India. "Indestructible" carpets are not essential to the winning of the war," the rug men were told.

New tire quotas for March are out. They are a little easier due to adjustments to spring traveling, substantially above the February quota. The nation's passenger-motorcycle and light truck owners are getting 134,701 new tires and 84,365 new tubes this month as compared with 80,784 tires and 67,616 tubes they were given in February.

The new passenger car quota for March, April and May are forty-three percent of the 349,000 to be released to essential users over the twelve months. There are now, it was announced, some 480,000 1942 models in the hands of the auto industry. Difference between these figures represents the "makeup" for rationing in 1943 and thereafter.

After May 31, there will be no oil for beer and coffee. You'll get them the old-fashioned way. Deliveries of tin cans for home use will go on, because WPB is encouraging home canning. Incidentally, it is announced that the forthcoming sugar rationing program will contain provision that housewives may obtain additional sugar for home canning without sacrificing her daily family quota.

The familiar 12-gauge shotgun which custom has always pointed at rabbits and squirrels, will from now on be aimed only at spees and subotters, if any new ones are made this year. There will be no manufacture of such guns for any use except by local and federal governments, lease lend countries, to supply a demand for guarding war industries. Sporting arms manufacturers have also been asked by the Office of Price Administration to stop making prices of guns and accessories where they were January 10, Administrator Henderson said: "There is no excuse."

Laundries which use chlorine for bleaching must stop. A vital war chemical, it can still be used to purify water supply and swimming pool water.

All coal dealers were asked by Mr. Henderson to maintain prices no higher than those prevailing December 15-31, 1941.

N.Y.A. Program Is Geared To All-Out War Production

48,700 Youth Being Trained Throughout The Nation

Geared to the nation's effort for all-out war production, the National Youth Administration in Kentucky is now preparing 4,500 out-of-school youth for essential jobs as part of a nation-wide total of 122,000 it was reported today by Robert K. Solvers, State Youth Administrator.

Production of planes, guns, ships, tanks and munitions of all kinds for the armed forces is urgent and by preparing young people for jobs in factories, shipyards and armaments plants the N.Y.A. Kentucky and throughout the country is making its most important contribution to the war program, Solvers said.

N.Y.A. mechanical shop and production projects give giving on the job training to more than 2,000 Kentucky and 83,700 nationally. In workshops organized along industrial lines these young men and women are getting practical experience through the production of goods and learning their job through doing a job. The types of work carried on in the N.Y.A. shops includes metal and mechanical work, radio and electrical work, woodworking and industrial sewing. The shops are located at Mayfield, Bowling Green, Ashland, Covington, Providence, Louisville, London, Richmond, Vine Grove and Carrollton, you make such articles as gun parts, tools, desks and cabinets for the army, postal address systems,

and army field kitchens. In Kentucky 774 youths are employed as N.Y.A. professional and clerical projects, which are giving experience to 48,700 young people throughout the nation. Closely related to the war program, these projects include such activities as the training of hospital attendants, some of them to become registered nurses, and the performance of clerical services for such defense agencies as Fort Knox, the Selective Service and Tire Rationing Board. The majority of youths engaged in clerical services are girls gaining practical work experience in typing, shorthand and general office work. Other N.Y.A. girls plan, prepare and serve lunches to thousands of Kentucky school children.

N.Y.A. construction projects employ 17,500 youth, of whom 486 are Kentucky youth. N.Y.A. construction has been devoted largely to the building of public facilities, such as farms (for the repair of farm machinery) school buildings and defense training shops.

N.Y.A. resident projects where young people live and work at the job site employ eight hundred thousand youth in resident centers. 32,100. These centers were established primarily to give work experience and training to youths from rural areas and from small communities where job training facilities do not exist. The types of work done on resident projects include all of the major activities in the N.Y.A. program with emphasis on a production shop work. Shops at Richmond, Vine Grove and Carrollton centers have adequate modern equipment for training youth for war jobs. The Richmond and Vine Grove centers concentrate on training for jobs in machine shop, sheet metal and welding, while Carrollton is devoted to woodwork, mechanics, and radio.

The evening classes for farmers of Elliottsville area are to be continued by Woodrow Wilson, new vocational agriculture teacher, it was announced this week. The classes were inaugurated by J. F. Newman prior to his induction into the armed services last month.

The classes are devoted to the study and discussion of better farming practices, and will continue to meet each Thursday evening, beginning March 12, at the Elliottsville school building. Discussion is scheduled to begin at 7:30. Every farmer in the Elliottsville area is invited to attend.

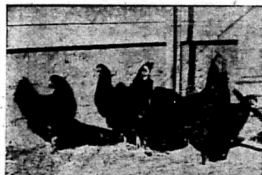

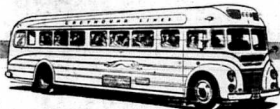

Question Of Selling Cream Or Whole Milk Discussed

Factors Listed Below Should Help Dairymen Decide

Many farmers who have milk cows are questioned which they should sell this year—cream or whole milk. The following factors should help in deciding.

The price for butterfat in whole milk is definitely higher than for butterfat in cream, at the present time. Also the price of feeds, for which skim milk will substitute, are higher than normal.

In feeding poultry and swine one hundred pounds of skim milk (nearly twelve gallons) is worth the value of approximately eleven pounds of corn combined with seven and one-fourth pounds of tankage (or meat scraps). By applying the local price of these feeds anyone can determine what value to place on skim milk for feed. As the prices of these feeds rise, so does the value of skim milk. For example, if tankage is worth four cents per pound and corn is worth eighty-four cents per bushel (one and one-half cents per pound) then one gallon of skim milk (8.6 pounds) is worth nearly ten cents or forty-six cents per one hundred pounds.

Our government definitely wants more whole milk produced, and more pork and eggs are also called for. Therefore, each farmer should plan his production so that he will serve his country and himself best. If thirty-three to forty percent cream is sold from milk that tests four to five percent butterfat than about eighty-eight pounds of skim milk is left from each one hundred pounds of whole milk. The feeding value of this skim milk should be added to the value in the cream in comparing that income with the next income from one hundred pounds of whole milk (total income less cost of handling). Next, consider the added labor and equipment cost involved in separating the cream and in delivering it to market. Consider the type of separator used and whether some butterfat may be left in the skim milk. From five to ten percent of the total butterfat is usually lost by the hand skimming or cold water type of separator.

Regardless of whether whole milk or cream is sold, the cost of dairy feeding is important. Of all farm products, good pasture is definitely the cheapest in cost. As the cost of labor rises good pasture may become cheaper relative to grain because so much more labor is required to produce a given feed value in grain than to produce the same feed value in legume hay. Small grain pasture is very effective in producing a large flow of milk at low cost. The successful management of a farm for profit requires the control of costs, and abundant good pasture and hay goes a long way in saving on purchased feeds. Also the time of harvesting hay has much to do with its value. Do not allow it to become over-ripe and thus lose feeding value.

Here are some suggested rations to increase milk production at low cost: A good grain mixture to be fed with good legume hay—(1) Four to five pounds of crushed corn and cob mixture plus one pound of soybean oil meal. A good mixture to be fed with grass hay, corn fodder, etc. (1) Three to four pounds of crushed corn and cob mixture plus one pound of soy bean oil meal. If butterfat is worth only thirty cents per pound, it may be advisable to leave out soybean meal and feed only home grown grains.

Deliberate Firing Of U. S. Forests Is Act Of Sabotage

Incendiarism is Sabotage, announced a Federal Judge in West Virginia, a few weeks ago when a forest fire came before him.

This information was given to District Ranger Earl M. Stoller, by Educational Advisor Campbell of CCC Camp F-9. Mr. Campbell had been to West Virginia a few weeks ago when the case was brought to trial.

Possibly the reason for the severe penalty is due to the emphasis on timber by the Office of Production Management and other Defense Bureau; timber being a key product of the war effort.

Some Kentuckians in the past have deliberately set wood fires. These people know that every forest fire not only costs the Government money which is needed for guns and bullets, but also destroys timber badly needed for ships, barracks, and factories. They also should know how law makers feel toward deliberately setting the woods on fire.

Selective Service Heads Say Farmers Vital To Defense

Men Who Cannot Be Replaced On Farms Should Be Deferred

Selective Service regulations state that a registrant shall be considered a necessary man in an agricultural enterprise if he cannot be replaced because of a shortage of persons with his qualifications or skill in such activity, and provided of effectiveness in such activity. Upon the Local Boards in Kentucky falls the responsibility of determining whether or not a person is a necessary man in his activity.

The increased war effort since Pearl Harbor has made it extremely important that the production of certain farm products be expanded and production of certain farm products is of vital importance to the National Defense production program. Among the most important commodities, and those in which tremendous expansion must be made, are: Milk and Dairy Products, Eggs and Egg products, poultry and meat products, hogs and land products.

In general it has been found that a shortage exists in persons qualified as farm managers. A determination must be made, however, in each particular case to determine whether or not the registrant can be successfully replaced. The availability of men in the community or county who could replace the registrant must be considered by the Local Board. State headquarters of selective service

will urge occupational deferment for farm managers found to be necessary men.

The state determination must be made in the case of farm laborers and it must be shown that he cannot be replaced in his activity. As long as farm labor can be replaced, no deferment may be allowed. It must be borne in mind that deferment of agricultural workers will be considered on the basis of each individual's occupation or avocation and such deferment will be granted only when in the opinion of draft officials his position renders him absolutely essential to the war effort.

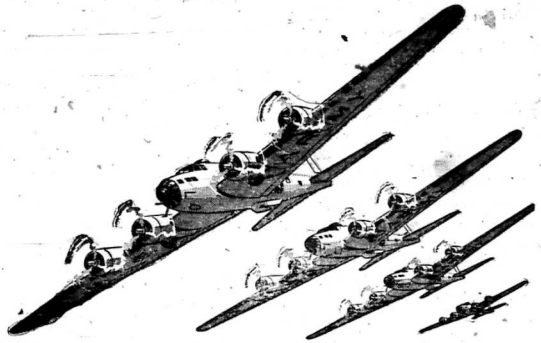

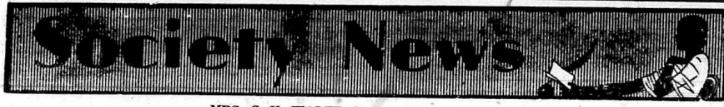

Morehead College Adopts New Plan

Provides For A 12-Week Quarters For Each School Year

The adoption of the quarter system at Morehead College will make no noticeable change in the period of time during which the school will be in session," stated Dean Laugin, in a recent interview. "It has been the policy of Morehead as a teachers college, to continue through the summer to accommodate teachers who could not attend any other time."

The new plan provides for four twelve-week quarters for each school year, instead of two semesters of eighteen-weeks and two summer terms.

The change was brought about by the national emergency war-time program to help a victory-minded people provide shorter quarters for young men and women who are rapidly being called into service.

The plan will go into effect with the summer school this year, which will be divided into two sessions, the first beginning June 10th and ending July 18th; the second beginning July 20th and ending August 26th. Students may enroll for the entire quarter or for one-half the first or second half of the quarter.

Mid-semester enrollment will begin Monday, April 6, and the spring session will be from April 16th to 19th inclusive.
