With the passing of June 15, 1940, a new phase of the year has been brought to maturity before us. These are green, turning and Chinese cabbages. Chinese Cabbage—These gardeners who tried this new crop this spring, and who have little real seedlings to show for their trouble, should now try again for the cooler weather of autumn which does the leaves to roll into crisp, succulent heads. Chinese cabbage may follow any early vegetable except those akin to cabbage. Such rotation would give early Chinese cabbage needs heavy feeding, particularly with poultry manure or nitrogenous fertilizer. The best way to start it is to sow the seed in groups of three or four, thinning to one, to six inches in the row is 12 to 15 inches, and the rows should be at least 24 inches from any other. Peas is an early variety of seed sows easily 200 feet. The Greens—Of these there are several in variety of flavor among the first symptoms of rot. Rotone is the control. Later, the plant lice may come but their control is rotenone. Or, the shogun or Japan foliage turnip may be used in place of Seven-Top to have loose free turnip greens. The cabbage worm, which may come on all the plants, is best stopped with rotenone, the insecticide harmful to all insects. Dullness and lack of thrift are among the first symptoms of stomach-worm infestation in sheep. The skin loses its pink color and becomes pale, and the mouth and eyelids present a pale appearance due to an impoverished condition of the blood. An important part of the canning equipment is the rubber

ring which seals the jar. It is considered poor economy to buy cheap, inferior jar rubbers or use old ones, because they may not make a perfect seal and the products canned may spoil. Salt is the principal mineral needed by livestock. Most good stock raisers keep salt before cattle, sheep, hogs and work stock in boxes protected from the rain. Many farmers favor granulated salt over rock salt. To make at home a dry paper to catch flies, heat one pound of rosin and a pint of castor oil. While hot, spread this combination with a brush or ordinary paper. Such paper also may be purchased at most stores.

In making jelly, some housewives prefer to use a fourth to a half slightly under-ripe fruit, so as to be sure the jelly will set. Ripen fruit to four fourths well ripened fruit to furnish flavor and color. All fruit should be sound and firm. Prices of average-quality eggs have been higher this year than 3 years ago, while best-quality grades have sold lower. This means that the range of price between top and bottom grades is narrower this year than last year.

THE BANKS ARE READY Financing of the national defense program can and should be carried on through the normal existing channels without the creation of new agencies, mechanism or devices. According to the president of the American Bankers Association: "The banks of the country have the resources," the statement continued, "the trained personnel and the knowledge of their own communities which equip them, along with the investment markets, to handle a very large part of the necessary financing. This financing can be carried out in such ways as will enable the banks to provide an adequate volume of loans and to safeguard and maintain the funds of their depositors. "All banks should be actively and energetically soliciting every source in their communities. Especially it is true that they should try in every possible way to make every loan that has anything to do with the defense program." It would be a tragic mistake if the defense program was to be accompanied by a widespread extension of government bureaus and departments. Inevitably the cost of the program would be unnecessarily increased. Defense work is unavoidable. Retardation would run rampant, at the expense of speed and efficiency and economy. Political considerations would in many cases be paramount, and thus public interest would be secondary. Pol-

tics cannot be eliminated, but it must be minimized. It is a question whether the people of the world can survive this era of so-called civilization and the perverse uses of science and invention. It is a sorry record for the human race which was given the ability to reason, supposedly to enable it to live on a plane above brute beasts.

MORE DEADLY THAN

BOMBERS

When a bomber of a warring nation destroys important industries and kills helpless people, it blazes in the headlines across causes public consternation and the determination to correct the evil.

Minor news items in Oregon cannot replace the 10,000 lives in two days reported death and destruction by fire which puts the average bomber to shame. For instance, three children were trapped and burned to death in an upstairs bedroom in their home and a neighbor was injured in attempting their rescue. Fire swept through a munition destroyed a logging camp abandoned sawmill. Another plant and you have an idea of what the enemy. Fire is costing this nation. If bombers caused as much damage, the loss would be blazoned in the headlines across causes public consternation and the determination to correct the evil.

If bombers caused as much damage, the loss would be blazoned in the headlines across causes public consternation and the determination to correct the evil.

FIRE PREVENTION

Today, all important American industry is cooperating in an effort to expedite the defense program. And the service industries, no less than the manufacturing industries, are doing their part. A particularly salient example of this is provided by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, representative organization of the country's fire insurance companies.

In 1917, the National Board conducted a nation-wide conservation campaign for the reduction of fire loss in American industry. Grain, cotton and other vital commodities were safeguarded from destruction. Plans were developed for the swift and efficient installation of fire fighting facilities for army cantonments, the Navy Department, the Emergency Fleet Corporation, and other departments. A fire prevention bureau was established by the Board in the War Department at Washington, which inspected all buildings turning to military use, and submitted recommendations for lessening hazards. On top of this, a wide public campaign to instruct the public in fire prevention was carried on.

Now the National Board has again offered its services to the government. It will provide the government all the vast information in its possession. It is prepared to use all its facilities to help reduce fire loss during the present emergency.

The importance of this is clear. The greatest need now in the national defense program is speed—speed in manufacture, speed in assembling, speed in transportation, speed in all phases of the complicated industrial line that will produce the airplanes and ships and other arms necessary to American defense. On top of this, the slow-down in production would be felt throughout the industrial structure. Fire is thus the enemy of our national security.

The Board's offer marks a definite and essential contribution to defense. It is typical of the kinds of public services we have come to expect from our great American industries of all kinds.
