N. Y. A. Adds Four New Training Shops In State This Month

Increase Training Of Youths In Defense Classes By Over Five Hundred

With new defense training shop opening at Prestonsburg, West Liberty, Somerset, and Hazard, the National Youth Administration in Kentucky is increasing the number of youth being trained for war jobs by approximately five hundred, according to Robert K. Salyers, State Youth Administrator.

These new shops will not only enable us to at least partially meet the pressing demand of war industries for more N.Y.A. workers with experience in machine shop, sheet metal, welding, and foundry, but they will make possible the production of greater quantities of essential equipment for the Army, Mr. Salyers said.

With training and production as the dual aim of the National Youth Administration today, N.Y.A. youth are trained for war jobs by actually producing equipment necessary to the war effort. Young men and women in Kentucky's eighteen-N.Y.A. shops are producing gun parts, anti-aircraft pellets, machine gun pins, tools, field kitchens, metal machine gun racks, ammunition containers, machine parts and many other essential items for the United States Army Post at Fort Knox.

More than five hundred trained youth each month are going from N.Y.A. shops into war industry. Seventy-one hundred of these youth have been sent to eastern war industries in Connecticut, Maryland, and New Jersey. They were transferred under the N.Y.A. interstate transfer plan to send trained workers to war production areas where they are most urgently needed. Fifty more Kentucky youth are scheduled to be transferred to Connecticut the early part of next week.

More than 15,000 life insurance agents, the equivalent of an entire army division, are now taking part in the drive to sell National Defense Bonds for the government, as a contribution to the war effort, and these agents have set up regular purchase plans for Defense Bonds with more than 4,000,000 workings since the first of the year.

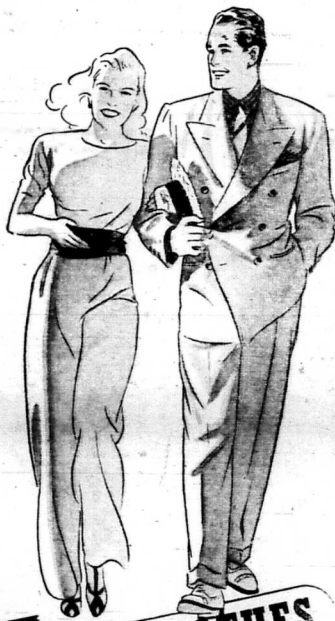

The Project Management is proud of the success of the success it has obtained in the past four years as a going concern; therefore, we urge all members to attend the Annual meeting and hear the reports that will be given on the success of the Cooperative.

Farmers Urged To Buy High Analysis Fertilizer

Attention has been brought to the necessity of farmers buying high analysis fertilizer instead of low analysis. Instead of buying a complete fertilizer with the following formula, it is recommended that farmers buy a fertilizer with a higher formula, such as 8-16-12 or 10-16-12. The higher analysis fertilizer is the cheapest, comparing the plant food pound per pound. Also, buying the higher analysis fertilizer would save bags, transportation, and labor in spreading and bagging. Since it is important that these items should be conserved as much as possible at this time it is hoped the farmers will buy only the higher analysis fertilizers.
