Bales And Chandler Carry County

Bates Rolls Up 738 Majority Carrying All But One Precinct In County

Making a clean sweep of all twenty counties in the Eighth Congressional District, including Boyd County, home of both his opponents, piling up huge majorities in each county, in spite of the unusually tight vote cast, Hon. Joe B. Bates was nominated on the Democratic ticket to succeed himself by one of the highest of year election majorities on record. Mr. Bates swept the district clean, so clean that his vote was more than five to one over his nearest opponent, L. C. Fielder, and his majority over Fielder was over three to one.

The election itself was one in which the voters, feeling apparently that this was one sided, remained at home. Rowan county had scarcely given a third vote out in the Democratic primary and far less in the Republican. H. Clay Hayes won the nomination in the district for the office of Congressman, carrying Rowan county as well other counties to make it unanimous.

Rowan county gave Mr. Bates a vote that exceeded 85 per cent of the total vote cast, with 738. Fielder received in the county a total of only 90 votes, while Caudill received 60. Bates majority in the county was 756 votes.

Present War Pageant At Schools In Neighborhood To Make R. C. Fund

A committee of women composed of Mrs. Beulah Bironne, Mrs. W. H. Johnson of Farmers and Mrs. J. W. Jones of Bluestone, decided to do something about raising funds for the relief of European children in the war torn countries of Europe, recently, and arranged a War Pageant which was held at several of the schools nearby with a small admission being charged. The sums thus raised totaling \$100 has already been forwarded to Red Cross headquarters at 1355 South 3rd Street, Louisville. The amount raised was distributed among the schools as follows: Farmers, \$4.08; Carey, \$3.85; Slaty Point, \$2.07.

Employment At Brick Co. Is High

The Kentucky Fire Brick Co., continuing to operate at the virtual capacity rate which has been in effect since last September is understood also to have reached a high point in employment at the present time.

The number of employees now total approximately 370 people or more than were ever employed by the company. Although the plants operate on a six day schedule the work week of employees is five days or forty hours. Inquiries made at the plant disclose that there were no vacancies existing and no additional men needed or being hired even though plant employees are receiving vacations this year.

Dick Maze Free Under \$2000 Bond

Farmers Man Charged With Murder Released Under Bond At Trial

The preliminary hearing and examining trial of Dick Maze, Farmers, Ky., was held in Owensville last Wednesday. Maze had been arrested the previous Monday on a warrant charging him with the murder of Ed Barnes, Owensville undertaker. The following article is from the South County News- Outlook.

Richard Maze, operator of a soft drink stand at Farmers, Rowan county, was held to the grand jury under \$2,000 bond at his examining trial before County Judge Walter Shrovet here Wednesday afternoon.

The arrest of Maze last Monday on a warrant sworn to by Mrs. Bertha Barnes, charging him with the murder of Ed Barnes, who was found fatally shot at his home here last February, resurrected all the elements of mystery connected with Mr. Barnes' death. The preliminary hearing attracted a large crowd that filled the main court room to overflowing.

At the trial, Mrs. Barnes, the star witness for the Commonwealth, testified that on the afternoon of the day Mr. Barnes was shot, she was in her presence and the presence of three other witnesses, Clyde Wright, Beverly Omohondro and a boy by the name of Cassidy, that he was going to kill Mr. Barnes. The testimony of Wright, Omohondro and Cassidy however, failed to corroborate the statements made by Mrs. Barnes. When called to the stand both Cassidy and Omohondro denied that they heard Maze make such a threat and amount of questioning on the part of Commonwealth lawyers (Continued on Page Two)

Drivers Licenses Lag Behind Last Year

Over 1,900 Issued Last Year While Only 1,300 Have Been Issued

Thirteen hundred drivers licenses have been issued to date, according to Joe McKinny, Circuit Court Clerk, as against 1,900 for the year from August 1, 1939 to August 1, 1940. Mr. McKinny stated that those who apply for licenses must present their previous license or they will be required to take the regular examination which is held each Thursday afternoon from 1 to 4 o'clock.

District Vote Gives Bates Big Majority

Over-17,000 Majority In Twenty Counties As Votes Roll In From District

The Eighth District turned in a huge majority for Congressman Joe B. Bates, who was up for renomination in the primary on Saturday of last week. Mr. Bates carried every county in the district, piling up a total majority of 17,000. His total vote in the district was 22,458 as against 5,134 for L. C. Fielder and 1,897 for Caudill, who was running on the Townsend plan platform.

In Rowan county Bates lost only one precinct, McKenzies in which Caudill beat him out by two votes. In that precinct Caudill received 12 votes, Bates, 10, and Fielder 4.

Breathitt and Morgan counties turned in the largest majorities for Bates, with 2,129 in Morgan and 2,100 in Breathitt. Fleming gave him the biggest percentage vote.

In his home county of Greenup, in which he has never lost a precinct in a primary election the votes ran true to form. Bates received a clear majority of 1,672 in Greenup. In every district his opponents advertised how unpopular he is in his own county, but each year he proves afresh that they are definitely misinformed.

Boyd county, the home of both Fielder and Caudill proved the biggest upset. Fielder's friends were freely predicting that he would roll up a majority variously estimated at from 1,500 to 2,500. The final tally gave Bates a clear majority in Boyd county of 441. Mr. Bates himself had conceded Boyd to (Continued on Page Two)

Each local FFA chapter in Kentucky will be represented by its voting delegates, Kentucky or American Farmer Delegates and candidates and by boys participating in the various events and contests.

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PEOPLE WANT DEFENSE, NOT WAR

A financial authority recently made this significant observation: "Let us be on guard against the building of war hysteria. Let us keep it clearly in mind that what we are talking about is defense and not going to war. This is the time for clear thinking rather than emotional thinking."

The standard polls indicate that while the American people are almost unanimously in favor of adequate preparation, they are also overwhelmingly opposed to belligerent participation in the European slaughter. Industry does not want war bargain only if it is needed. No because, if for no higher reason, it knows from its experience in

the last World War that it results in ruinous taxation and depression. It will do all in its power to avoid war—even while it does all in its power to make our defense strong that all aggressors will hesitate at bringing war to us.

CHEAP SHOES MAY NOT BE BARGAINS

The following suggestions on buying shoes are valid in mid-summer or in winter, says Miss Frances Seeds, clothing specialist in the Kentucky College of Agricultural's home economics department.

1. A shoe at a low price is a bargain only if it is needed. No matter how little they cost, shoes that don't go well with

one's clothes, and fit one's feet, are not bargains.

2. The foot lengthens when the person stands on it, be sure always to get a shoe long enough. While few buyers seem to realize it, the correct length from the heel to the ball of the foot is as important as the right size in other respects. Remember—"heel to ball" length must be adequate.
3. Watch the inside line of the shoe. The straighter it is, the better the shoe for one's foot.
4. Especially for walking or working shoes, watch the fit. Feet take a lot of punishment anyway. Never sacrifice comfort to fashion on the everyday shoes.
5. In general, good leather and good construction are costly. The better quality shoes are made up in many sizes, while the inexpensive shoes in only a few. Anyone not having average sized feet should buy fewer but

better shoes.

It is difficult to find the "all-purpose" shoe. Walking or working calls for one kind of shoe—while "dress-up" occasions call for another. Today's varied activities call for several kinds of shoes.

COVER WEEDS WITH PAPER

When all other methods failed to check the spread of Johnson grass, farmers in Hancock county, Kentucky, tried covering the weed with paper. Eight carloads of superphosphate came to the county in paper bags. The happy thought struck the farmers, "Why not cover the Johnson grass area with the empty bags? Now it looks as though the paper bags would smother the weed says County Agent Baker Atterbury.

HIGHER FERTILITY KEY TO BIG CROPS ON KENTUCKY FARMS

CHICAGO—It's the extra bushels per acre a Kentucky farmer harvests that spell the difference between making a profit, breaking even on his season's work, or finishing "in the red."

This is true whether he is growing corn or wheat—potatoes or oats—or any other crop.

"All things considered," says a statement, "the cost of plowing, striking the soil, and cultivating a field is more than the sun's rays, the substance of the crop yield be large or small."

SUMMER SUN GIVES VITAMIN D SUPPLIES

Mid summer is the time to get in the sun and stock up on the bodily supply of vitamin D. From May to October every year, people get freely and naturally what it costs money to buy during the winter months.

During the summertime, the sun's rays have "ultra-violet" rays which are "short waves" and, when these "short waves" strike the skin, vitamin D is probably the best way. During winter, it may be necessary to supplement the form the vitamin. Now, during diet with cod liver oil to get ready in the skin would not the vitamin one can supply naturally during summer.

Slowly getting used to sunlight is the best way.

SOIL TESTS TELL WHAT FERTILIZERS ARE MOST NEEDED

CHICAGO—"Growing crops are just like dairy cows. To produce their best they must be well fed," says an agricultural report.

"If the supply of plant food is insufficient or depleted through years of continued cropping," says the report, "the crops are underfed and the farmer harvests an unprofitable yield. Poorly nourished plants, moreover, are more likely to be infested with certain fungous diseases than healthy ones."

"Fortunately the average farmer can take inventory of the fertility of his soil before spring planting time by means of tests which state agricultural colleges, experiment stations and county agents are glad to make. These tests will tell whether the soil is deficient in nitrogen, phosphorus and potash and what analyses and amounts of commercial fertilizer are required to restore the fertility of the soil, which leads to profitable crop production."
