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THE HOME FRONT

The process of converting our peace time fat into energy for war moves forward rapidly as the grow greener and the days lengthen. Last week brought many changes by governmental act, and requisitioned many more.

The WEB this week is stepping up production in the defense plants through a series of management-labor conferences. The more it is stepped up the more materials and supplies and services the war machine will eat up, and the more the civilians on the "Home Front" will have to conserve and skimp and substitute.

War Production Board Chairman Donald M. Nelson is demanding more and more faster and faster production. The February monthly shipping record for steel is still not enough.

Office of Price Administration cracked down on a Chicago auto junk yard operator, who refused to sell his scrap cars for the Government price of \$18.75 a ton. He wanted \$22.00. Bureau of Industrial Sanitation simply issued a requisition order, sent a squad of U. S. Marshals and some trucker and took Dealer Frank Schumaker's one hundred fifty tons of cars away. He'll get the Government price, no more.

The first tire "antagonizing" case belongs to Albany, N. Y., where a dealer was caught selling tires to unauthorized persons. After hearing held publicly, an order was issued preventing him from purchasing any tires until June 30. "There is no reason for persons of this calibre in the business life of a nation united to win a war," Acting Price Administrator John E. Hamm, commented.

In Ohio OPA is conducting a probe of tire bootleggers and profiteers. New fuel oil burning equipment is being discouraged by Government order. If you have other heating facilities and are not using them to the limit, you can't get oil, unless it is gas and electrical equipment. Order affects seven-hundred sixteen cities (including West Virginia) and Washington and Oregon.

These states now have a twenty percent restriction in the use of gasoline. During the week the service

In the last two years alone approximately a third of the entire total examined and treated in the past seventeen years. Since its creation in 1924 the commission has treated 8,619 cases representing children from every county.

Due to wide publicity given the commission's work and the fact that many cases must be kept under supervision for a long period of time, the waiting list has increased in the last two years and many of the cases are urgent.

"As the campaign enters its final week, committees throughout the state are urged to redouble their efforts in order to reach our goal," said Neil Dalton, State Campaign Chairman. The campaign officially ends, Easter Sunday, April 5.
