Questions, which aliens are required to answer include the following: name; name under which they entered the United States; date of birth; date of arrival in United States; name of vessels or means by which they entered the United States; time expected to remain in the United States; usual and present occupation; employer's name and address; activities engaged in during the past five years; military or naval record; date of application for citizenship, if such citizenship has been sought; relatives living in the United States; record of arrests and convictions, if any; record of any organization devoted in whole or in part to influencing or furthering the political activities, public relations or foreign policy of a foreign government.

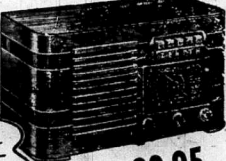

reason that the above named Council of the defendant, City, is not legally constituted by reason of two of its members holding other incompatible public offices and two others and other members not the owners of real estate in the City of Morehead; that the said ordinance is unlawful for the further reason that it constitutes an effort to levy and collect a tax when no necessity existed therefor; and after the budget for the year had already been prepared and ample revenue provided for the legitimate expenses of the defendant, City; that the defendant, City, has an ample income from other sources already provided to defray its legitimate expenses and the money derived from the enforcement of this ordinance, if collected, would be wasted and misapplied to the employment of numerous unnecessary employees, and officers and the purchase of other things not essential to the proper operation of the government of the City of the 5th Class; that they have employed and carry on the payroll a number of persons as peace officers, when in fact the police officers of said City are limited by public statutes to a Marshal and Policeman; that the defendant, City, has failed and refused to make any financial statement as required by law under Section 3627 Kentucky Statutes; that the Council of said City has employed and maintains in office the defendant, Lester Hogg, as City Attorney, who has back for a five year period. This is an improper and incompetent legal advice causing the passage of this and other improper ordinances; that said ordinance is restrictive and injurious to the normal expansion and development of the commercial welfare of the city; that the defendant, City, together with all of its other officers made parties herein are threatening to enforce said ordinance and will do so without employ violence and arms to accomplish their purpose and to prohibit and it would be at the same time by the orders of this Court; that

they can have no adequate remedy at law and are by law, suit forced to resort to the Chancellor for relief; that irreparable injury would result to plaintiffs and other citizens from the necessary and incident to giving notice of the application for a temporary injunction herein; that no application for an injunction or restraining order has been granted or refused by the Court or any officer authorized to grant one.

During the past six months the present council has spent over \$1,500 in repairing flood damage of last year and other street repair work.

Water bonds come due regularly and with a steady increase in the payments were as low as \$500. The city now reach approximately the \$1,500 each.

The city a few years ago obligated itself for the installation of a gas system, borrowing the money to cover the cost of installation. The present council is paying that borrowed money the sale of gas.

This money is all being used back out of the receipts from for permanent improvements and repairs, and it is money that must be raised, whether we as citizens like it or not.

Last spring the Kentucky Accrual Bureau notified the City Council that, if they wished to retain the low insurance premium now in force, they would be required to purchase a new fire pump that would be capable of throwing water over the highest building in Morehead. Such an engine and pumper together with necessary equipment will cost the city in the neighborhood of \$4,000, money which the city does not have and which they cannot raise except by taxation.

The Council debates the matter, looking at it from every angle. There were, it is true, other methods by which the money could be raised. The proposition is that the city could be doubled, and in many instances this would be entirely justified, as most property has been given in far too low. The council did this, it would place the entire burden of additional taxation on the real estate owner, and would, in their opinion be unfair to these property owners.

They could collect the 25 cent water bond tax that was voted but which has never been collected, and they could collect it back for a five year period. This again would be a burden placed on the property owner and would prove a real burden.

Speaking for myself and for the members of the City Council, I wish to say that neither they nor I ask for the jobs. They were forced upon us. You, the people of Morehead elected the council, and I was elected by them to serve as Mayor until such time as another Mayor can be elected by your vote.

We have read the petition submitted to the Circuit Court, and we feel that it is unjustified and insulting in the extreme. No member of the Council intends to force collection of this tax either by violence or arms. No member of the council expects or intends or would accept a penny of money from the treasury of the City. Every cent of tax collected by this council will be accounted for and none of it will be spent in extravagant or wasteful expenditures. Morehead is a city of 2,000 inhabitants. In 1930 it was a village of a trifle over 800. The expenses of a city almost three times the size of this city of ten years ago are much larger. More lights installed, more sewers constructed, more water mains laid. Of course the expense is greater and when the expense is greater the taxes are bound to be higher.

The Occupational Tax idea is not a new one. It was proposed about eight years ago, but was not passed, because at that time it had not yet been tried out in the Court of Appeals. To avoid the expense of long and tedious lawsuits, it was decided not to pass it until later. Since that time it has not yet been tried out in the Court of Appeals. The city has adopted the published ordinance.

Not one member of the council feels that the Ordinance is perfect, for the perfect tax bill has not yet been passed. We all realize that there are some inequalities in the measure that will require adjustment as experience shows them to be unfair. Every member of the council is aware of this and is pledged to help iron out such inequalities.

The Council invites the citizens who feel that they have been unfairly dealt with to air their grievances and their pledges of utmost in aiding them in getting any such inequalities ironed out.

The councilmen are not citizens of Morehead but who operate their places of business. In other towns to bear a fair share of the tax burden and up keep for the streets they help to wear out. In our estimation after several months study, we believed, and we still believe, that the Occupational Tax is the most painless method of collecting taxes, and a method that will produce sufficient revenue to take care of the additional operating expenses of the city.

They do not feel that they should be condemned unheard. They feel that they in common with the lowest criminal are entitled to have their side of the case studied before the average citizen condemns them.

The Council has prepared for the first time in five years a head and gentlemen for whom financial statement, and have the majority of you voted, else Let me call your attention to the fact that the present council has only been serving since January 1, 1930 and can in no way be held responsible for the failure to publish a statement in previous years. This council is ready and willing and has already made provision for the publication of the financial statement of the City in the near future.
