## Individuals Will Register For Sugar Ration, May 4, 5, 6, 7

### Ration Board Designates 14 Registration Places in County

Provided with figures showing the amount of sugar they had bought, sold or consumed the past year, hundreds of retailers, wholesalers, and institutions registered for sugar rationing Monday.

The ordinary consumer will register for his sugar allotment May 4, 5, 6, and 7, at fourteen designated places throughout Rowan county. In the meantime, many a cup of sugar will be borrowed from the neighbors since retail sales of sugar were stopped midnight on Monday. Sales will be resumed when the stores open next Tuesday morning.

"This will give the dealers time to raise their stocks before rationing begins," the ration board explained.

Generally, the registration, Monday, went forward smoothly as restaurant owners, heads of institutions, bakers, boarding houses and others who have been prepared with the necessary statistics regarding sales, etc. Certificates, entitling the registrants to supplies for May, June and July, were issued. Certificates for the succeeding months will be obtained through the ration board.

The registration of individuals, next week, it is emphasized that every member of a household must be registered in order to obtain ration books; however, any member of a family unit, who is eighteen years of age or older, may register for his family. But, this person must be able to report accurately the amount of sugar owned by the family unit or any other identification which is familiar with the age, weight, the height, color of hair and eyes of each member of the family, all of which identification will appear on the face of the ration book.

The following registration places will be open for registration, from 8:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. on each of the four days mentioned above:

- Morehead and vicinity—Martin-Miller building, next door to the Mills Theatre.
- Haldeman—Haldeman high school gymnasium (new building).
- Farmers—high school gymnasium.
- Elliottsville—Elliottsville high school.
- Foreign store.
- Ramey—Ramey school house.
- McKenzie—McKenzie living.

## Radio Teachers For Signal Corps Schools Urgently Needed

Radio teachers for signal corps school are needed immediately by the Teacher Placement Service of the War Relocation Authority. Service to fill an order for 350 jobs received, according to W. H. Frayser, director for Kentucky. Mr. Frayser explained that requirements to fill the teaching positions are: High school graduates or equivalent and three years war experience either as operator or repairman. U. S. Army or Air Corps, or college degree in physics or engineering and one year experience in radio either as operator or repairman. Salary range is \$18.00 to \$27.00 per month depending on experience and qualifications; Age range is eighteen to fifty. All persons qualified will be employed immediately. Frayser has been in Kentucky for two months. Qualified persons may get further information by writing full details to E. Jones, Teacher Placement Representative, U. S. ## Morehead Eagles May Scrimmage Against U. S. Navy

### Training Unit Here Will Have Full Athletic Program, Johnson Says

Despite the fact that the United States Navy has never made it an established practice to "rescue" distressed sportsmen, it is about what it amounts to in the case of Ellis Johnson, genial, hard-driving director of athletics at Morehead College. Walking to lead his high divers, during spring training, that the army and navy were just despoiling his grid squad so much that he had to find enough players to make a decent showing in scrimmage, now finds himself in the position of having the armed forces come to his "rescue," at least in this respect.

Those who observe the Eagles in practice, daily, will fully witness them in scrimmage against a group of Uncle Sam's Bluejackets. Officers who made the inspection for the placing of the Navy Training unit from Great Lakes, stated that the Morehead unit would in all probability have a football, baseball, tennis and basketball team, and possibly a baseball team next year. Two physical education and sports instruction operating under the Green Tanneer program, will accompany the six hundred Naval electrician trainees here. Later, the number of engineers will likely be increased to one thousand men.

Jayne Memorial Stadium, with its two full size fields, will be used jointly by the college grid squad and the Naval unit. One

## Hunters Pay Total Of \$14,465,000 For Licenses In 1941

Retail Sales of Sporting Arms, Ammunition, and Bait, \$70,000,000

Sportsmen paid \$14,465,000 for 7,825,000 hunting licenses during the year ending June 30, 1941, according to a complete report from the Fish and Game Wildlife Service, United States Department of the Interior, received by S. A. Wakefield, Director of the Kentucky Division of Game and Fish today.

The compilation indicates increases over the 1939-40 season, when sportsmen paid out about \$13,000,000 for more than 7,600,000 licenses. The "big ten" in the list of states with 178,281 licenses, followed by Pennsylvania with 678,868; New York, 568,713; Indiana, 386,104; Minnesota, 354,852; Illinois, 326,013; Wisconsin, 299,534; California, 285,123; and Washington with 227,399.

As urged by hunters, Pennsylvania topped all other states with a total of \$15,222,840. Those in New York amounted to \$1,058,790.

Federal migratory bird hunting stamps, commonly called duck stamps, were issued to 1,260,810 sportsmen in the 1940-41 season, an increase of 149,249 over the previous year. The Federal stamps, which are required of all waterfowl hunters over sixteen years old, in addition to State licenses.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, 60-year-old veteran of World War No. 1, Monday, joined the nation-wide group of men registering for the fourth draft of the Second World War.

While local draft board No. 9 stood by, the commander-in-chief of the army and navy and the President of the United States cheerfully filled out a registration card, ascertaining for posterity that:

The three-elected Chief Executive stands six feet two inches, weighs 186 pounds, has blue eyes, gray hair, ruddy complexion, is employed by the people of the United States, works at the "White House" and has wife named Eleanor who "will always give him his address."

Wisconsiners to hold swelling pride and embarrassment like many another over-age scrapper, Roosevelt complied up in the non-combatant category on the cabinet table under the veteran direction of Draft Board Chairman Robert Sherwood, War veteran and lawyer.

Just outside the cabinet room, waiting their turn, peered the famous faces of executive confidants and staff members, William D. Hasset, Harry Hopkins, Judge Samuel Rosenman, and Playwright Robert Sherwood. With a fleeting grin at his friends and fellow drafters, the President took the card quakingly handed to him by one of his aides.

## Ligon Kesler In Army Air Corps

Taking the first step toward winning his wings as a pilot, navigator, or bombardier, Ligon Kesler, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude E. Kesler, of Morehead, has been an Aviator Cadet at the Air Force Recruit Training Center, according to Army officials at Santa Ana, California. During his stay, the replacement cadet, Kesler will undergo various physical and aptitude tests designed to determine the specific branch of the Air Force for which he is best suited.

Also included in the Aviator Cadet program are "refresher courses" in subjects that Kesler will master before "checking" his wings toward 2nd Lieutenant commission.

## Sugar Rationing Periods Announced By Ration Board

### Rowan County Rationing Board The first four ration periods for sugar and weight values of stamps valid therein.

The information follows: Ration period No. 1 valid, good for one pound of sugar; ration period No. 2—May 10 to May 30, stamp No. 2 valid, good for one pound; ration period No. 3—May 31 to June 13, stamp No. 3 valid, good for one pound and ration period No. 4—June 14 to June 27, stamp No. 4 valid, good for one pound.

Ration periods thereafter, the number of stamps valid during that particular period and the weight value of each stamp will be publicly announced by Ration Board No. 10, and all information pertaining to these announcements will be carried in The Morehead Independent as it is released.

The Board reminds consumers that dealers can accept only those stamps now in circulation during a specified ration period.

## Mail Service To Foreign Countries Regulated By U. S.

### Affects All Mail Addressed To Armed Services Outside United States

Acting on orders from the Army and Navy, the Postmaster General today issued special orders concerning the mailing of parcels to members of the United States Armed forces on foreign soil, Washington, Morehead Postmaster announced.

To assure to our armed forces that all available ocean and air transportation space is devoted to war essentials and to prevent congestion at ports of embarkation and disembarkation, the War and Navy departments are directing and supervising shipping facilities used in ocean and air transportation to land from our territories and bases and to foreign countries. The new regulations as laid down to become effective immediately are:

- 1. No parcel or package of any class of mail, including air mail addressed for delivery outside the continental United States shall be accepted for mailing if it exceeds eleven pounds in weight or eighteen inches in length or forty-two inches in length and girth combined; provided that these restrictions shall not apply to mail matter addressed to Canada or Mexico, nor to official matter of the United States government.
- 2. Not more than one such parcel or package of any class shall be mailed for mailing in any one week either on or behalf of the same person or concern or to for the same addressee.
- 3. Perishable matter regardless of weight or size shall not be accepted.

Governor Asks Citizens To Assist In Preventing Fires

In recent weeks there have been a great number of destructive forest fires in the wooded section of this state. In nearly all such instances the suppression of these fires required men to be summoned from mines, sawmills, and other industries whose labor is sorely needed in the production of goods for war purposes.

Today the Governor of Kentucky has issued a proclamation calling upon every patriotic citizen to do his utmost to prevent these fires to assist the State and Federal governments in extinguishing them. Every one of you as an active member of your Council is urged to become interested and to take an active part in the prevention effort.

It is expected that the Director of the State Division of Forestry will at an early date establish contact with many of you to outline a definite program of assistance to his division. You are requested to cooperate with him fully in: 1. Educating the people of your community in the importance of this matter.

2. In putting your police and fire auxiliaries and your air raid wardens to the greatest possible extent at the disposal of the Division of Forestry in preventing these fires and fighting them when they occur.

There are indications that a number of these fires are wilfully and maliciously started by persons who either wish to impede the progress war efforts or who put themselves and their own property above those of the national mid state interests. The Governor's proclamation describes acts starting of fires as "deliberate acts of sabotage."

In addition to the activities above mentioned, you are earnestly requested to report to the Division of Forestry and/or to the prosecuting attorneys of your counties any information which may lead to the detection, prosecution, and conviction of deliberate forest fire starters under the severe penalties of the sabotage act recently enacted by the 1942 session of the legislature.

Wheat Loans And Quotas To Be Made This Week

"A decision of wheat loans as well as wheat quotas will be made this week during the national wheat marketing quota referendum on May 2." M. D. Royse, State AAA chairman, says in a statement this week urging all eligible farmers to cast their ballots.

"Although the vote is on quotas only," Royse explains, "the law provides that loans cannot be made on the 1942 crop if the wheat quotas are rejected." A favorable vote of two-thirds is required to make the quotas effective. "In the three years that the wheat loan program has been in operation in Kentucky, thousands of growers have benefited directly by it," the State AAA Chairman asserts. "In addition," he says, "virtually all Kentucky farmers have benefited indirectly from the floor which the loan program placed under loan by 2,468 Kentucky wheat farmers, Royse states. Many farmers, he adds, have realized profits of eight cents or more per bushel by placing their wheat under loan and holding it for a better market.

The 1942 wheat quotas, if approved, will apply to all farms with as much as fifteen acres of wheat except those with a normal production of the planted acreage of less than two hundred bushels. All growers sharing in wheat crops to which quotas apply are eligible to vote in the referendum. Royse estimates that approximately 12,500 Kentucky wheat farmers in twenty counties are eligible to vote on quotas.

### Poultry Printers Advanced By U. K. Agriculture College

The demand for fresh eggs will be good throughout the coming summer. Flock owners should therefore keep laying hens at least two months longer than usual and maintain high average production by: (1) continuing the feeding of a good laying mash; (2) keeping the flock supplied with clean, fresh water at all times; (3) controlling lice and mites and (4) culling all hens that have quit laying.

Too many farm flock owners do not know how to cull for production but to all and should learn. Extension circular number 530 is supplied without cost by your county agent or the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station. Save valuable feed and increase your profits by keeping only the laying hens.

Worms will spoil unless farmers give them better care than they have in past summers. It is our patriotic duty to prevent this loss. Sell all roosters as soon as the hatching season is over. Gather the eggs more often and hold them in the coolest place available until they are sold.

**Coccidiosis**

For the next two months one of the greatest hazards to marketing fryers on time and having good pullets for fall and winter layers is coccidiosis. Prevent coccidiosis if possible. Recognize it quickly and control it if it appears.

The organisms causing coccidiosis are passing in the droppings and must be in the presence of warm air and moisture for a day or more to become dangerous. They enter the bird with the feed and water from contaminated feeders, water fountains, floors and ground and are carried into the intestinal tract where they thrive, multiply and cause severe damage. They may or may not be bloody droppings. Affected birds become pale, droopy, weak and dull real quickly. Death losses may be high in broods under ten-twelve weeks of age.

causes coccidiosis and other chick diseases may be carried long distances on shoes or by flies, rats, and mice. Don't visit other brooder houses or poultry flocks and don't permit visitors in yours.

Treatment of sick birds is not satisfactory but many effective birds recover and outbreaks of the disease can be checked real quickly if the birds are prevented from picking up additional supplies of the infective organism.

Confine the birds to the house and avoid dampness. Don't spray or scrub but dry clean the house and scrub and seal the feeders and fountains each day for eight or ten days. Put down clean litter after each cleaning and burn the soiled litter or take it to a part of the farm never used by poultry.

**Select Cockerels Now**

Rapid feathering and quick growth are inherited. Don't eat or sell all the better cockerels and leave the culls for next year's breeders. The time to begin selecting breeding males is before they reach frying size. Select and mark at least three times the number you expect to use.

### Peratt Releases--Special Courses In College Work Urged By Navy Dept.

M. S. T. C. Curriculum Is Approved Course Of Study

In order to secure an adequate supply of officer material for the expanding navy the authorities have arranged for a special course of college training for young men between the ages of seventeen and twenty. Briefly stated, young men who wish to avail themselves of this opportunity enlist in the navy and are assigned to the V-1 training program. They then enter college at their own expense and take two calendar years of college work. During the latter half of the second year an examination is given by the navy and on the basis of these examination results individuals are selected for Cadet and also the V-3 program (Reserve Midshipmen). If selected as an Aviation Cadet the student is certain to complete two calendar years of college work if he is chosen for the V-7 program he is permitted to complete the average required for the baccalaureate degree.

three months of advanced flight training.

Commissions as Ensigns in the U. S. Naval Reserve or Second Lieutenants in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve await the candidates who successfully complete the course and win their "Navy Wings of Gold."

Throughout the entire training period candidates will be paid in accordance with their ratings. Aviation Cadets are paid \$75.00 a month, plus subsistence and uniforms. Upon completion of training and appointment as Ensign in the Naval Reserve or Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve they will receive \$205.00 a month, plus allowances.

High School graduates desiring to enroll in Class V-5 may obtain additional information at any Navy Recruiting station.

You may get a record showing how much money is now credited to your social security account. As this record is the basis of future benefits you or your survivors may receive in years to come, it is important that you make sure you have received all the credits to which you are entitled under the plan. Past cards which are used to request these wage statements may be obtained by writing to and calling Elbert M. Bohon, manager, social security office, in Ashland, Kentucky.

Kentucky. The only charge for your individual report is one cent for postage on the card which Mr. Bohon, will supply.

Married women who are returning to work in war employment may obtain new social security cards bearing their married names, if their original cards were issued in the maiden names of such individuals. The new card will bear the married name but will have the same number as the original card. Applications for cards showing change of name may be obtained by the Ashland, Kentucky, field office of the Social Security Board. The office is in the Second National Bank building, in Ashland, Kentucky. Address your requests to the manager of the office, Mr. Elbert M. Bohon.

After-school and Saturday work in stores and other business houses is covered by the Social Security Act, regardless of the age of the worker. Boys who deliver groceries, girls who work as clerks are examples of part-time employees whose services are covered by the Social Security Act. All such workers must have account numbers. These may be obtained in this area by applying to Elbert M. Bohon, manager, social security office, Second National Bank building, Ashland, Kentucky.

4. The above regulations affect all mail from Alaska, the Canal Zone, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the island possessions of the United States. It also covers all mail addressed to army postoffices (A. P. O.'s) in care of the postmaster at New York or San Francisco, and all international mail except for Canada and Mexico.

In issuing these regulations the Army and Navy departments advised the postoffice department that large quantities of second, third and fourth class mail matter addressed outside the continental United States, are seriously interfering with the movement of vital war supplies.

### High School Grads Now Eligible For Navy Commissions

(Continued from Page 1)

Commissions As Ensigns In U. S. Navy Awarded Qualified Candidates

A new plan of recruiting under which high school graduates may qualify to become aviation officers with the rank of Ensign in the U. S. Naval Reserve, or Second Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps Reserve, has been approved by the Navy department.

It marks the first time the Navy has offered young men with only a secondary education the opportunity to apply for flight training leading to commissioned officer status.

Recruiting will be begun in every section of the United States on Monday, April 27, and candidates between their eighteen and twenty-seventh birthdays who have graduated from high school may apply.

Recruiting officials said the new plan will not interfere in any way with the Class V-1 program under which college students may enlist now to become aviation, deck or engineering officers and continue their education, at least until the end of the second calendar year.

Both the recruiting and training of the candidates will be carried out under Class V-5, heretofore limited to men with not less than two year's college credits.



"The Navy needs men, fly the finest, the fastest, the most powerful warplanes in the world--the Navy planes that strike first, strike the hardest wherever they are found," a Navy Department spokesman said. "The Navy needs them urgently--now--to-day. It wants men of officer caliber; men who are practically fit and mentally alert; men trained to act, to command, to be leaders.

"Here's a challenge to every young American of courage and daring who is burning to fight for his country. A challenge to every man who is itching to see action against the enemy in the air--America's first line of attack! It's a young man's first opportunity to be commissioned as a flying officer of the Navy."

Qualified candidates are to be sent to one of the new aviation production centers--located at the Universities of Iowa, Georgia, N. Carolina and at St. Mary's college, California--for three to four months of training devoted primarily to "housekeeping" them for their place in the Navy.

Following this will come three months of flight training at a Naval Reserve Aviation base. Successful completion of this six-month phase of their Navy education, the candidates will be sent on to the great Naval Air stations at either Pensacola, Florida, or Corpus Christi, Texas, for approximately

the steam heat that has made possible a third shift at a Lester, Pennsylvania, plant participating in the War Production drive.

Ten companies having millions of dollars in war contracts are directed to cease discriminating against available workers because of race and religion in "findings and directions" of the President's Committee on Fair Employment Practice. Several of the companies in help-wanted ads has specified "Gentile" or "Protestant" or

White. Companies are directed to cease giving employment agencies such discriminatory specifications, and are required to file a monthly report to show non-discrimination.

From now on it's going to be harder to purchase many household and kitchen utensils of the same quality and material to which we have been accustomed. WPB has restricted use of iron, steel and zinc in their manufacture. Three groups of articles are affected: (1) Pots, pans, cooking utensils using much metal; iron and steel cut ten percent; (2) Secondary articles such as garbage cans, galvanized tubs and pails, can-openers; iron and steel cut thirty percent; zinc cut fifty percent; (3) Non-essentials like flyswatters, curtain rods, clothes pins, cake colors and such gadgets; all three metals cut fifty percent.

Emergency war agencies are cracking down on chiselers and cheaters. In Boonville, Indiana, two officers of a motor sales company face possible \$10,000 fines and ten years imprisonment for violating tire rationing. Wallace Brass Company of Cleveland and Aluminum Borize Powder Company of Bedford, Ohio, are forbidden to use the metal three months for violating priorities orders. Mills Novelty Company, Chicago, slot machine makers violated priority regulations and can't get material till July 10, after illegally diverting critical metals, from the war program.

There's enough steel in one set of sixty-pound bedsprings to make two four-inch shells for a 148-mm gun, a 250-pound kitchen stove contains enough iron to make a single 500-pound aerial bomb, and a man's wooden suit uses enough material for two army blankets.

A man in Asheville, North Carolina, has invented a machine which he says will pull up trolley tracks as easily as a dentist pulls a tooth. He wants to use it in the salvage for Victory campaign.

The Michigan State Highway Commission made a survey to discover just how fast America's auto tires are wearing out and found that the average tire was using up its rubber at the rate of three and one-half percent a month.

Why we are collecting scrap for war: All the metal needed to make a .30 calibre machine gun could be obtained from the following collection—a pair of roller skis, two door hinges, one door lock, one old spade, one trash

burner, one trash basket.

A single domestic hot water boiler would yield enough steel for a .37 mm gun.

One broken five-pound flat iron contains enough iron to make four hand grenades.

The cotton that goes into a medium-priced auto would make four uniforms for soldiers.

Many of the men who have been making golf clubs soon will be building antennae for army radios.

### Social Security Board Offers Free Booklet

Do you want to receive training for a job in a war plant, making munitions or serving your country in some other useful capacity? The Ashland, Kentucky, field office of the Social Security Board offers a free booklet entitled "How to Get Free Training for Defense Jobs." Copies may be obtained by writing to Elbert M. Bohm, manager, Social Security Board field office, Second National Bank building, Ashland, Kentucky.

There are no age limits for coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance program, which is part of the social security plan. Workers over sixty-five, as well as young folks under voting age, must have social security account numbers and their wages are subject to old-age insurance taxes, if they are employed in commerce or industry. Keep this in mind if you take a new job, and obtain your social security account card from the Ashland, Kentucky, field office of the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance. Your local postmaster will give you an application and will tell you where to send it.

Women who work this year in canning factories and preserving establishments must have social security account cards. Work of this kind is covered by the Social Security Act. If you are going to work in any food preserving plant you may get your social security card by applying to Elbert M. Bohm, manager, Ashland, Kentucky, field office, Social Security Board. The office is in the Second National Bank building.

# War and Building

There has been much confusion in the minds of everyone since the recent order of the War Production Board prohibiting certain types of building. This order ended rumors that all building and repair work were to be prohibited and similar stories that had troubled home owners for the past three months.

The order reads as follows:

- (1) Repair and Maintenance of homes and farm buildings for their protection, and to maintain them in sound working condition, is NOT restricted.
- (2) Construction of farm buildings not to exceed \$1,000 in cost requires no permit.
- (3) Residential building in town and on the farm is not restricted up to \$500.
- (4) Remodeling is permitted up to \$500.
- (5) Other buildings such as commercial, industrial, recreational and institutional, are permitted up to \$5,000.

Construction work started prior to April 9 can be completed.

With repair and maintenance permitted, as well as reasonable remodeling and new construction allowed, we must cooperate wholeheartedly. For the duration, we must make definite plans to preserve and maintain our homes and farms at the highest point of efficiency.
