### Army Recruiting Records In Area During August

4,964 Men Enlist In Fifth Corp Area During Month Just Past

Kentuckians who have been enlisted in the regular army of other states, now are offered an opportunity by the War Department to take training as army aviators pilots.

"The movement is part of the expansion of National Defense," said former Kentucky Adjutant General G. Lee McClain, Kentucky chairman of the civilian committee. "I believe there are hundreds of virile young Kentuckians who had rather be fliers than who can meet the qualifications, which includes two years of college work."

## Learners Must Obtain Permits From Frankfort

### Employers Urged To Con Form To Law In Employing Youth To Learn

The necessity for Morehead employers to apply for special certificates from the Department of Industrial Relations if they wish to employ inexperienced youths under the provisions of the Minimum Wage Law was cited by William C. Burrow, Commissioner of the department, today.

At present, there are two hundred certificates in force in Morehead.

A "learner" is defined in the Minimum Wage Law as an "employee whom the Commissioner of Industrial Relations permits, through the issuance of a certificate, to work for less than the minimum wage in consideration of the employer furnishing reasonable facilities to train such individual in his occupation. The term "learner" shall be construed with being synonymous with the term "inexperienced worker" Morehead is in Zone Three under the Minimum Wage Law. He Order has a learner certificate for 16 cents per hour for the first 20 hours per week and 24 cents thereafter. The learner period may extend for 90 days or for 720 hours, and the certificate may be issued for that length of time.

The department reserves the right to withdraw a certificate if it should become convinced in its opinion makes a practice of dismissing learners when they reach their promotional period.

The men will be paid while in training and the army requires that applicants be American citizens, unmarried, of sound mind and excellent character, 20 to 27 years old, inclusive, and must have birth certificates.

Lieutenant Hamilton has been sent to the army recruiting station in Louisville to aid in the recruiting, but applicants may apply at the nearest recruiting station at Bowling Green, Cincinnati, Jackson, Lexington, Louisville, Middletown, Owensboro, Paducah, Paintsville, Somerset or Portsmouth, Ohio.

"Those who have not completed 20 years in college," he added, "may be allowed to take a written examination in subjects covered by that work."

The same civilian committee which McClain heads in Kentucky has been requested to aid in obtaining applicants for naval training.

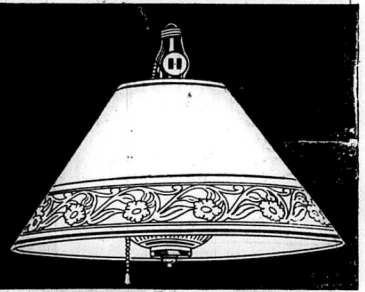
