

Rowan County Has 1531 Registrants

Morehead 10 Has Greatest Number of Registrants As Men Answer

Fifteen hundred, thirty-one Rowan county young men between the ages of 21 and 36 poured into the various localities of the county which had been set up for their convenience, and registered with Uncle Sam, in the first peace time selective service draft in the history of the United States. Not one of them faltered, 99.4 per cent of them expressed themselves as willing and ready to go at the call of their country, and several of them stated that they were only waiting until after the registration to volunteer.

Young men, married men, single men, men with blue eyes, brown eyes, grey eyes, and hazel eyes, men with brown, black, blonde, and grey hair passed before the registrars and gave the information required by the registration cards. But whether the eyes were hazel, brown, grey or blue, whether the hair was blonde, brown, black or grey, whether the complexion was light, dark, very dark or ruddy, the attitude was always the same. Young America ready to go if need be for the service of their country.

Rowan county registered 1531 men during the day last Wednesday. The unofficial prediction had been for a registration of approximately 1200. The registration by precincts was as follows:

The law could not be obeyed by man who had broken it before the law was given. Then, why was the law given to condemn, not to save. Obedience to law does not save, because law does not save anyone. The Arahamic covenant (See Galatians 3:13-29) was given four hundred and thirty years before the law was given, and it is through this covenant that Christ and salvation are promised. The law, which came later, was to condemn man in his sin in order to drive him to Christ to be saved.

Now, in another sense, obedience to the law is necessary to be saved. But it was the obedience of Christ that is necessary for us. It was necessary that Christ obeyed the law for us to heal up the breach between us and God. But only Christ could obey the law. That is why he had to die. If we could have obeyed the law, we would not have had to die. It is through Christ that we have had made possible for us through his death to be saved.

Thus, obedience to the law is Jesus Christ. God accepts his obedience for us. After we are born again, and receive the Spirit of Christ, that is, a Spirit living in us makes it possible for us to conform our conduct with the law, and to do many good things, which we could not have otherwise had done. But, while we can render a heart obedience, with a good intention, we can never render a perfect obedience as long as we are in the flesh. We have to have all perfect, Saviour, and in Him is all our hope. All else, even ourselves, is failure.

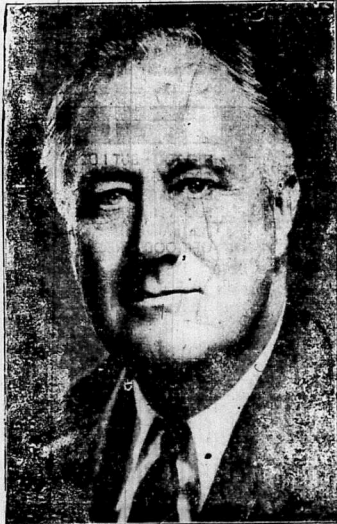

Under Roosevelt, Farm Income has nearly doubled. Farm Mortgage interest charges are 40 per cent less than in 1928. Soil Conservation Program has saved 30,000,000 acres. Farm loans have increased the net worth of borrowers 37 per cent. One fourth of all farms now have access to electricity.

Under Roosevelt, total non-agricultural employment is 9,000,000 greater than 7 years ago. Weekly Payrolls are \$113,000,000 greater than they were 7 years ago. Under Roosevelt 20,000,000 depositors benefited by RFC loans to banks. Loans

have been made to 1,200,000 farmers; 150,000 stockmen; 20,000 disaster sufferers and to 200,000 families for purchasing electrical appliances. Federal Housing Administration has enabled 600,000 families to build or finance homes.

Under Roosevelt in the last 7 years, public works programs have produced \$18,000,000,000 worth of public properties and services. WPA has built 450,000 miles of roads; 53,000 bridges; 88,000 public buildings; 12,000 miles of water lines. WPA has served 386,000,000 lunches to undernourished children. PWA financed work since 1933 has constituted 70 per cent of all educational construction. PWA has accounted for more than \$3,200,000,000 in orders for materials.

Under Roosevelt, the U. S. Navy, destroyed under Republican administrations, has become the most powerful in the world. The Army, which had been reduced and neglected, is being brought up to an authorized strength of 500,000 officers and men. Air forces already increased can now expand easily to a strength of 50,000 planes. When defense program is complete the United States will have a two ocean Navy or 733 fighting ships.
