Texts Of Addresses By Vaughan and Walker At Dedicatory Services

At the dedicatory service June 1, President William H. Vaughan officially presented to Lieutenant Commander George Walker for the U. S. N. two dormitories and special class laboratories in the science building for the training of naval cadets.

Text of President Vaughan's talk follows:

"War always works a severe hardship on colleges and higher education in general. Indeed, some people have said that the first casualty in a war is higher education. This is true for several reasons, namely:

1. The thinking of the people is directed toward the military pursuits followed on the college campus.
2. The men of college age are those in the greatest demand by the war machine.
3. College faculty members are equipped to render a distinct service to their country in time of war. Their service to the college is often interrupted to provide for the common safety of the nation with no exception. This war has taken a severe toll in students, faculty and interest. Morehead is proud of this however, because our purpose is to train for complete living. John Milton said a century ago that education must equip a man to serve his country in time of peace and war. The sons and daughters of Morehead are applying this formula in a magnificent fashion.

"Now the college has taken one more step. We are not content that the former students of the college should fight and work for the common defense, but the college enlists for the duration. We are now job with all our enthusiasm at our command, believing that we are not only educating people for civilian life, but also training men for war. The public schools must continue and they must be staffed with scholarly, patriotic teachers. It is our duty as the teachers from the college to the schools continuing in an uninterrupted stream. The light of liberty is lighted in the school room of the nation must not grow dim. The need for good teachers and efficient schools was never greater than it is today. Our responsibility placed upon the schools is greater than before. Morehead feels called upon to rededicate itself to its primary purpose of teacher training.

"So, it is that this college girls here for its greatest responsibility of military and civilian needs of a great people. We accept the challenge with full knowledge of its magnitude and genuine determination to pursue to the end. Dear you, Commander Walker, and your associates, we welcome

Surplus Agency Aids Strawberry Growers

Yields of two hundred to three hundred crates of strawberries to the acre were common in Marshall county, Kentucky, according to the Blakmore variety secured additional cash by capping berries and selling them to the Surplus Marketing Administration for eight cents a pound. C. I. Reid sold one hundred fifty-nine crates for a net return of \$100, and other growers took in \$50.00 to \$75.00 a day for berries that could not have been sold in the regular way, because of the size of the fruit, reports county agent H. E. Rothwell.

The Kentucky State USDA War Board has been requested that the next two weeks, beginning June 15, be considered the scrap rubber cleanup period, and dealers to make scrap rubber they may have about their homes, their farms or their places of business, and the oil companies throughout the country have agreed to cooperate with this program, and all service stations will be receiving points and a two cent per pound for all such scrap rubber.
