Kentucky ranked No. 1 in nation for improvement on key higher education metrics

Over the past decade, Kentucky has improved faster than any state in the nation on key higher education performance measures, according to a report issued by the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems of Boulder, Colo.

Realizing Kentucky's Educational Attainment Goal: A Look in the Rear View Mirror and Down the Road Ahead measures Kentucky's rate of improvement on key metrics from 2000 to 2009. The report found that Kentucky ranked first among all states on three metrics, including the rate of improvement in the percent of working-age adults with college degrees, six-year graduation rates at four-year colleges and universities, and the number of undergraduate credentials awarded relative to the population with no college degree.

Kentucky ranked second in the nation in the rate of improvement in the percentage of younger adults, ages 25 to 44, with college degrees, as well as in the rate of improvement in the three-year graduation rates at two-year institutions. Further, total undergraduate credentials produced in the Commonwealth increased at a rate that surpassed all but four states.

The announcement was made at a news conference attended by Gov. Steve Beshear and other dignitaries instrumental in the passage of the Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997 (House Bill 1). The landmark legislation was signed into law by former Gov. Paul E. Patton who now serves as the chair of the Council on Postsecondary Education.

"We are here today to acknowledge and celebrate the tremendous progress that has been made by Kentucky's postsecondary system on key measures of educational performance. This kind of success would not be possible without the dedication of many leaders, educators and volunteers who made higher education improvement a priority," Gov. Steve Beshear said. "Better education – and better access to education – are keys to sustained economic growth for our state. Investing in higher education is not only an investment in our students, but also an investment in our economy and future economic competitiveness."

Council President Bob King said, "This progress validates the vision of HB1, which created a new set of expectations for postsecondary education tied to higher levels of degree production, economic growth and greater opportunity for all citizens.

"While we are improving at a faster rate than other states on these measures, Kentucky still faces challenges that we will focus on over the next several years, including college and career readiness, achievement gaps, and better connecting the work of higher education with the state's economic needs," added King.

The report's key findings are described below.

- Since the year 2000, Kentucky's college attainment rate for associate degrees and higher among adults age 25 to 64 has improved by six percentage points – from 24.5 to 30.5 percent. The actual percentage change from 2000-09 was the largest of any state in the nation.
- The percentage of college degree-holders among younger adults has improved by more than six percentage points from 27.3 to 33.7. The most notable change is in Kentucky's state ranking from 44th in 2000 to 36th in 2009. Over this time period, Kentucky moved more positions in the positive direction than any state in the U.S.
- The six-year graduation rates at four-year institutions, both public and private, improved nearly nine percentage points from 2000 -09. This is the largest percentage change of any state in the U.S., and Kentucky moved nine positions among the states – from 44th to 35th.
- The three-year graduation rates at two-year institutions increased by roughly the same amount. It was the third highest percentage point change in the nation, and Kentucky moved from 38th among states to 16th.
- Kentucky had the fifth highest percentage point change in total undergraduate credential and degree production (one year or more in length) of any state in the country. This is even more impressive considering that the states ahead of Kentucky (Arkansas, Florida, Nevada and Virginia) benefited on this measure largely because of shifting demographics.
- The percentage change in the number of undergraduate credentials awarded per 1,000 adults with no college degree is the largest in the nation. This is a measure of market penetration and shows how well states are awarding college credentials relative to the population in need. On this metric, Kentucky jumped nine positions from 45th among states in 2000 to 36th in 2009.

MSU shares in ARC dentistry grant

Gov. Steve Beshear today (Wednesday, Sept. 7) announced a new Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) and higher education partnership to enhance sustainable, collaborative dental health education and care in eastern Kentucky. Morehead State University (MSU), the University of Pikeville (UPIKE), and the University of Kentucky (UK) through its College of Dentistry, will partner in the design of the Appalachian Rural Dental Educational Partnership Plan.

The goal: to train more dentists to practice in rural areas and give them the tools necessary to set up thriving dental practices in eastern Kentucky. ([View photo gallery](#))

MSU President Wayne D. Andrews, UK President Eli Capilouto, and UPIKE President Paul Patton will take part in a ceremony at the Mountain Arts Center in Prestonsburg.

“Maintaining proper dental care is a fundamental health matter that affects every Kentuckian, yet not every Kentuckian has access to adequate dental treatment,” Gov. Beshear said. “Implementing this planning project is an essential step toward recruiting and educating more dentists in Appalachia who can provide the quality care our citizens need. Thanks to ARC and each university involved in taking the lead on this worthy and important project for our state.”

The Appalachian Rural Dental Educational Partnership Plan is funded by a \$400,000 ARC grant, as well as \$127,293 from UK, \$82,035 from UPIKE and \$47,873 from MSU.

The partnership’s main goal is to design and implement a program to increase the number of practicing dentists in Appalachia through enhanced training, recruitment and educational assistance. Through the program’s implementation, potential dental care providers will not only have access to high-quality oral health education, but will also learn how to operate financially sound rural dental practices. The participating universities will assess national dental education models with similar objectives before designing and developing dental programs and DMD degree options for eastern Kentucky.

“The majority of eastern Kentuckians have struggled to sustain quality dental health, and one of the barriers to maintaining good dental health is poor access of quality dental care,” said Department for Local Government (DLG) Commissioner Tony Wilder. “I commend Gov. Beshear, ARC and the universities for creating and expanding opportunities for dentists to provide much-needed quality care for our Appalachian communities.”

The most recent Kentucky Dental Provider Workforce Analysis estimated there will be 2,064 practicing dentists in 2016, a loss of 286 dentists from the state total in 2006. This study also documented the uneven distribution of dentists – with the lowest numbers of dentists per population in the rural eastern and western counties. A January 2010 re-licensure data analysis found that of Kentucky's 2,348 practicing dentists, 40 percent were age 55 or older.

"This is another example of how collaboration between educational institutions can benefit citizens of Kentucky," Dr. Andrews said. "A lot of hard work by each university went into this and we are extremely proud to be able to offer this program. Dental health is very important to overall health and we know that many people are struggling to afford dental treatment at the moment, so the program will undoubtedly improve access to dental care."

"We know that if we can break a cycle of poor health, we can begin to break cycles of poverty. Cycles of despair can become legacies of hope," said Dr. Capilouto. "We also, increasingly, know that partnerships and greater collaboration are the best – and, perhaps, only – way to address major challenges. Against the backdrop of a still challenged national economy, it is even more important that we engage in strategic alliances and partnerships. Uncommon resolve can be utilized to tackle common concerns and address commonly held challenges. Today's announcement represents a unique partnership: Federal funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission; leadership at the state level from the Governor and his team; a commitment of resources from the state's flagship institution, Kentucky's public institution dedicated to serving the people of Eastern Kentucky, and a critically important college with deep roots in Eastern Kentucky."

"Poor oral health is a serious problem in Eastern Kentucky," said Patton. "The University of Pikeville is pleased to join in this partnership with the University of Kentucky and Morehead State University to address the issue. This effort will be a part of our continued programs of service to the people of Central Appalachia."

"During the membership drive, MSPR is especially seeking new listeners and first-time supporters," said Hitchcock.



Diversity Spotlight:: Yan enjoys Haiti mission

Morehead State University continues to grow by leaps and bounds. With the opening of the Center for Health, Education and Research (CHER), the nursing program is shining in the spotlight.

Many nursing students are awed by the beauty of the facility and impressed with opportunities that are presented. Connie Yan of San Francisco a spring 2011 nursing graduate, had an opportunity to travel to Haiti to participate in mission work.

Yan was inspired by a group of her peers who traveled with the mission group, Children International Lifeline to Haiti in the summer of 2010 after a 7.0 earthquake ravaged the country earlier in the year. She saved up enough money to travel to Haiti to participate in another mission trip during spring break 2011.

"Knowing that the country has had bad luck with hurricanes and now an earthquake, I wanted to do something good," she said.

The first stop for the mission group in Haiti was Port-Au-Prince International Airport. The monstrous earthquake took its toll on Haiti and the capital city was affected as well.

"I was hit with the magnitude of the damage; cracks and broken glass were still seen a year later," said Yan.

She participated in work at tent cities (as they are locally called). People were living without walls or even a roof. Blue tarps were used to provide basic coverage for Haitians and their possessions that remained.

The group also traveled outside the tent cities to reach as many people as they could. They were well received by the Haitians who appreciated the work that was being done. "Children would come up to you and not want

anything but to just hold your hand," Yan said.

After climbing a 2,100-foot mountain to reach Haitians in a remote area, the mission group saw more than 500 patients.

"I'm very proud of the work that we done," Yan said.

She emphasized that the week spent in Haiti hammered in how much she loved the nursing field and being able to help people. She also stated that there is still much more work that needs to be done.

Yan said she was very fortunate to have been able to help in Haiti and describes it as a humbling experience. She vows to return and continue mission work, but this time as a certified nurse instead of a nursing student.

She remembers a saying from a T-shirt "Suffering doesn't stop just because the media coverage does."

'Williams: Rhythm in Relief' opens Sept. 16 at KFAC satellite gallery

Morehead State University's Kentucky Folk Art Center announces a new exhibition at the KFAC satellite gallery at The Mall at Lexington Green. "LaVon Williams: Rhythm in Relief" will open on Friday, Sept. 16.

The satellite gallery is a partnership between KFAC and Artique. It is sponsored by The Mall at Lexington Green. The exhibition will draw from KFAC's permanent collection to present 17 works by Williams, one of Kentucky's most important contemporary folk artists.

The exhibition will close on Nov. 15.

Williams was born July 10, 1958, in Lakeland, Fla. He moved with his family to Denver in 1968, where he finished his schooling in 1976 and was a high school All-American basketball star. He attended the University of Kentucky on an athletic scholarship, playing on the UK basketball team that won the NCAA championship in 1978. In 1980, he graduated from UK with a degree in sociology, and left to play pro ball in Italy and Japan before returning to the U.S. In the mid-1980s, he returned to Lexington where he continues to live with his family.

He was introduced to carving as a child. In Sanford, Fla., Williams' great uncle, Luke Wright (1893-1979), was a woodcarver. His older half-brother, Dave Wright, was inspired to begin carving after watching Luke at work. Dave, in turn, taught his brother LaVon how to carve. LaVon dedicated himself to carving after the conclusion of his basketball career. For more than 20 years, Williams has maintained his own studio, separate from the family's home, in a small house located in a transitional neighborhood. Working with hammers and chisels, Williams has become one of America's pre-eminent wood carvers.

The Kentucky Folk Art Center recently concluded a two-year exhibition tour of Williams' work, that included a stop at the Lyric Theatre Gallery.

In his conclusion to the essay for that exhibition catalog, KFAC's Artistic Director Adrian Swain wrote, "Now in his early 50s, LaVon Van Williams is at the top of his creative game. There is greater fluency in how he presents his subject, more economy in his physical touch ... We are led to wonder whether certain people were not in fact put on this earth to bear witness through art."

The system consists of three speakers that use an alert tone as well as voice messages to warn the campus during an emergency.


The high powered amplifiers are located on Ginger and Cartmell halls along with Jayne Stadium.

Allen Lake, a retired professor of biological sciences at Morehead State University, died Saturday, Sept. 10.

In 1966, Lake along with fellow faculty member James Chaplin discovered a tree fossil in Elliott County, which is still on display under its own shelter in front of Lappin Hall. This fossilized remnant of a swamp tree is estimated to be more than 300 million years old.

In May 2000, the Allen Lake Endowment for Biological Science was established to fund a professorship in biological sciences in the College of Science and Technology in his honor.

He is survived by his wife, Betty Phillips Lake, five children, and seven grandchildren.

Visitation will be Wednesday, Sept. 14, from 5-8 p.m. at Northcutt and Son Home for Funerals. Services will be conducted Thursday, Sept. 15, at 11 a.m. at Northcutt and Son Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Kathy Riley and the Rev. Mary Lake Dillensnyder officiating.

A graveside ceremony will follow at Forest Lawn Memorial Gardens with full military honors conducted by the Morehead American Legion Post 126.

Morehead State University has been recognized for the eighth consecutive year as one of the foremost public universities in the South in the 2012 edition of "America's Best Colleges" by U.S. News & World Report.

"We are very pleased to be recognized again this year as one of the outstanding regional public universities by this widely-popular college guide," said MSU President Wayne D. Andrews. "We have experienced record enrollment and retention this year. Our campus remains one of the safest in the region and we continue to improve the quality of life for our students."

The newest rankings include MSU as 21st in the Top Public University-Master's/South division.

"Our faculty and staff are deeply committed to making Morehead State the best public regional university in the South, all for the benefit of our students and their families," Dr. Andrews said.

The rankings place emphasis on acceptance rates, graduation rates, admissions selectivity, and small class sizes. MSU has consistently been recognized for relatively small classes and a high percentage of full-time faculty members, which are two important factors of student success.

The rankings include public and private institutions which grant bachelor's and master's degrees in 12 states of the South, including Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Initially, MSU appeared in the magazine's top tier of ranked institutions in the 2005 edition of "America's Best Colleges." The rankings are based on research of more than 1,400 institutions nationally.

"Our students are accepted into professional schools, including medical, dental and pharmacy programs, at rates well above state and national averages. This is one indicator of the high-quality education that students receive at MSU. We are elated that others recognize Morehead State's academic quality," Dr. Andrews noted.

At MSU, students can choose between various programs in the arts, education, business, and the sciences, including the space science program, one of only five in the nation.

The rankings will be published in the magazine's September issue. The 2012 America's Best College's guidebook will be available later this month.

MSU was founded in 1887 as a private college, became a public institution in 1922, and gained university status in 1966.
