## New Mayor Is Inducted Tuesday Night

Clarence Allen Installed As Head Of City Government By Judge Stewart

Mayor C. B. Daugherty stepped down from the office of Mayor of the city of Morehead at the meeting of the city fathers on Tuesday night, after serving for the past year, and Clarence Allen elected to the office last week was sworn in by Police Judge Stewart and assumed the title and emoluments of office at the same meeting. Mayor Allen took charge of the meeting.

Outside of the installation of the new mayor, and the allowing of claims, little other business took place. On motion of Austin Riddle seconded by J. W. Holbrook, it was voted to suspend the closing ordinance for one night, Saturday, November 16, in view of the fact that Saturday is Home Coming Day at the Morehead State Teachers College.

## Old House Creek Has First School Lunches

The first experiment in serving hot lunches to the rural school children of Rowan county has been inaugurated by Mrs. Effie Cecil, teacher at Old House Creek, and is proving to be one of the most successful, as well as one of the most popular institutions yet started in the county. Lunches are served free of charge to the children of the school, hot lunches, that are well prepared and savory.

Mrs. Cecil learned that, if she could build and equip a kitchen, that would pass government inspection, she could obtain the services of a cook from the House Keeping Aid W. P. A. project, and could obtain commodities from the WPA Commodity department.

## Tobacco Allotments To Be Same

## 635 Growers In County Limit Production In Build Up Cash Profits

No reduction in burley tobacco allotments will be required in 1941 if burley growers vote for marketing quotas for three years in the referendum on Nov. 23. C. P. Turner, chairman of the Rowan county Agricultural Conservation Association announced today.

Mr. Turner also pointed out that under marketing quota regulations no allotment can be reduced by more than 10 percent during the three year period, 1941, 1942, 1943, if two-thirds of the burley producers approve the plan. No allotment can be reduced at all during the next three years if three year quotas are approved.

Because of the large carrying of burley tobacco from the 1939 crop, Mr. Turner said, some reduction in allotments for 1941 may be required if three years are voted for only one year. The supply of burley tobacco on Oct. 1, this year was estimated at 1,001,800,000 lbs., only a little below the total supply of 1,000,000,000 lbs. (Continued On Page Three)

In order to protect their investments in equipment burley growers in Rowan county in other counties of Kentucky and in other States of the burley zone are to themselves to control the spread of burley production by supporting the three-year marketing quota plan on which they will vote November 23.

THE NEW TRAPS AND HOW TO GET THEM

Farm boys are inquiring how to get the new traps named in the Trapping Regulations so permitted under the new law. Here is the way. Special attention is called to the rules providing that every trap set must be visited every day; that no trap shall be set on the land of another without written permit; that the Trapping season opens November 24th and closes January 9th, except for red fox, which is from December 15th to December 31st; and that there is a fine of ten to fifty dollars for every violation of the trapping law.

To Be Same Tobacco Allotments

By a vote of 1,078,800 on October 1, 1939, in spite of reduced acreage and lower production per acre this year.

The amount of burley tobacco used during 1939 was estimated at 28,800,000 pounds, or approximately the same as the amount used in 1938. This indicates that the program to be adopted which is below the two-thirds majority required to make quotas effective. With no quota in effect last year, acreage went up to 422,000. Production rose to 284,800,000 pounds, or 60,000,000 pounds more than the amount of burley tobacco used during the past year.

Last November burley growers voted a quota on 1940 marketing by a vote of more than 8 to 1. The burley acreage has been reduced this year to 380,800 and it now appears that production will be around 312,000,000 pounds according to Department of Agriculture reports. While this production probably will be below the amount used during 1939, it is only a little less than last year's supply of 1,078,800,000 pounds. This will be very large because burley is a very large because of last year's surplus the prospect of a big crop in 1941 might have a disastrous effect on prices for the 1940 crop.

What can growers do about this situation to protect their investments in equipment and to protect the market? Farmers who have been growing burley tobacco for a number of years recognize the need for keeping their crops about the same size as the amount of tobacco that is used each year, but what is to be done about those who increase their acreage and take advantage of these growers acreage reductions? And what protection have old growers against the spread of production into new areas?

For each two farmers who were growing burley tobacco in 1935, one new grower has entered the field since that time. The total number of burley growers in the fifteen States producing this type of tobacco increased from 205,000 in 1935 to 310,000 in 1940. In Kentucky alone the number of burley growers increased in those five years, from 117,000 to 160,000.

And most of those increases came in 1937 and 1939 when no marketing quotas were in effect. Although these 105,000 new growers are producing only 12 per cent of the total burley crop they are taking advantage of a market strengthened by acreage

years at least 90 percent as large as they were this year, but will also assure these growers that they will receive full benefits from their acreage reductions of the past few years by preventing the spread of burley production into new areas, Mr. Turner said. He also pointed out that if production is stabilized at or near the 1940 level by voting three year quotas, it may be possible to make a uniform increase in acreage allotments within the next few years.

The quota vote will be held in community voting places and will be in charge of three local persons, Mr. Turner said. Any person who shares in the proceeds of the 1940 burley crop as owner, tenant or sharecropper will be eligible to vote in the referendum, but no farmer (whether an individual, partnership, corporation, association or other legal entity) shall be entitled to more than one vote, even though he produced tobacco in more than one community or state. A list of eligible voters will be prepared for each community voting place, Mr. Turner said, and each farmer can cast his ballot.

A two thirds majority of votes cast must favor the quota to make it effective, and this decision of the growers is final.

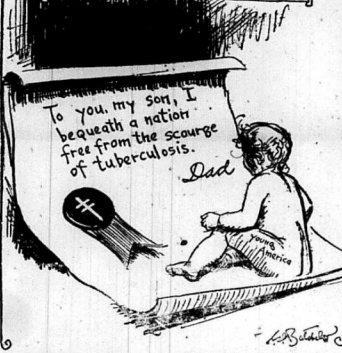
