BIBLE STUDY

By Rev. E. M. Knapf

Question—Can just anyone be saved, no matter what they have done? For instance, can a murderer be saved?

Answer—To the first question, I would say, as to the possibility, yes; but as to the actuality, no. That is, none can be saved except those who want to be. Jesus has fixed it so that God is not responsible if anyone is lost, but He put His invitation on the lips of "whosoever will."

Only those who will be saved can be saved. God does not save any man against his will. The will to be saved must be exercised in God's direction. It is all in the will, Jesus said, "Ye will not come unto me that ye might have life." Here He shows that men have the will to be saved or will to reject.

Now, as to what they have done, that does not matter, unless it be the unpardonable sin. This sin is rejecting God willfully in full knowledge and light of the Holy Spirit, in full agreement when the Spirit of God enlightens us as to our spiritual need and God's willingness to meet it and we reject Him in full light, deciding against God, this is an insult to the Holy Spirit, of blaspheming His holy work, and rejecting it insultingly. This cannot be forgiven.

But all other sins, including murder, adultery, and every other kind of sin, can be forgiven. Yes, a murderer can be saved if he will be. Paul was, and David was, and they were both murderers. So were others of the Bible characters. Jesus starts off with the truth that there is murder and envy and hatred in all our hearts, and He says that "He that hateth his brother is a murderer." So, He cannot pick out one sin as more condemning than another, but just groups us all together under one condemnation, and says (through Paul) "For all who have sinned and come short of the glory of God." That fixes us all, and we are all sinners, condemned.

God offers salvation to all of us, not because one of us is better than another, but because we are all sinners. This alone qualifies us as the object of God's mercy. But we cannot have God's mercy without accepting God's Son who died for us, "for there is no other name given under heaven, among men, whereby we must be saved." Unless we have a Saviour to take our sins away from us, when we believe in Him, there is no mercy of God to settle this question. Christ died for the only mercy God has, Helect Him and there is no hope.

Yes, anyone can be saved who will be saved, even murderers. The only question is whether or not they will be saved, in disposition to be saved comes, itself, from God. The preaching of the Gospel or the testimony of God's children to the truth of salvation is awaken within our sense of need to be saved. When this comes, the will to be saved is born within us. If I were lost today, and came to feet, I would need to be saved, I would hurry to God and seek His face. For only those who will and can be saved.

Your Garden: So far we have given the work for January and February and this work has really been done in the garden and now we have the work to do.
March: With the garden broken, all that needs to be done is to cut it thoroughly with the disk, then drag it smooth. The object when making a seedbed is to have the soil particles as fine as the simplest seed to be sown. For example when the tobacco seedling prepares his plant bed he gets his ground in the best of condition and so ought the garden be.
In addition to the manure that was applied to the garden, there is still need to have some more home.

THE FIVE LEADING FIRE HAZARDS
According to the National Bureau of Fire Underwriters, if people would inform themselves about the five leading fire hazards, which are responsible for the majority of our fires, the number of fires in this country could be reduced by a tremendous percentage.
Fire and foremost of the hazards is carelessness with matches and smoking materials. And this is also one of the easiest hazards to eliminate. He absolutely certain that all such materials are extinguished before discarding—and even then don't throw them into wastebasket. Keep plenty of ashtrays handy. Store your matches where they are beyond the reach of children. And never smoke in bed.
Heating plants are another prolific source of fire—and they constitute a hazard which is at its worst this time of year. Chimneys and flues should be checked and cleaned each year. Fine linings of fire clay are essential for maximum safety. Sugging of rusted stovepipes should be repaired, and smokepipes should be a safe distance from combustibles. Over heating of stoves-and furnaces is always a danger. Never force the fire—if your heating plant is not working satisfactorily, call in an expert.

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Asparagus, Martha Washington Cauliflower, etc.
Jan; Rhubarb, Onions, lettuce.
Plant the following: Radishes, (Rapid Red variety); Turnips, Purple Top; Mustard, Southern curled; Spinich, Bloomsdale Savory; Lettuce, Grand Rapids, Peas, Alaska or Radio.
Toward the end of the month Side Dress the cabbage, onions, broccoli, cauliflower and lettuce with nitrate of soda or chicken manure. Remember to give a liberal and plenty to can of those that can be preserved for winter.

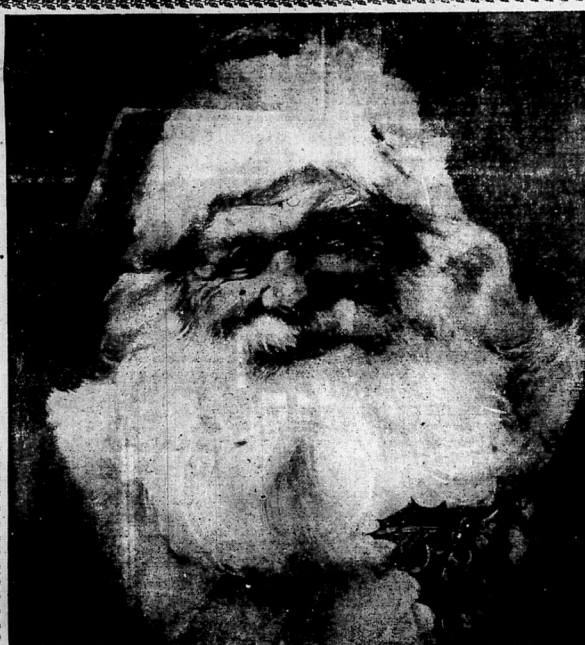
