

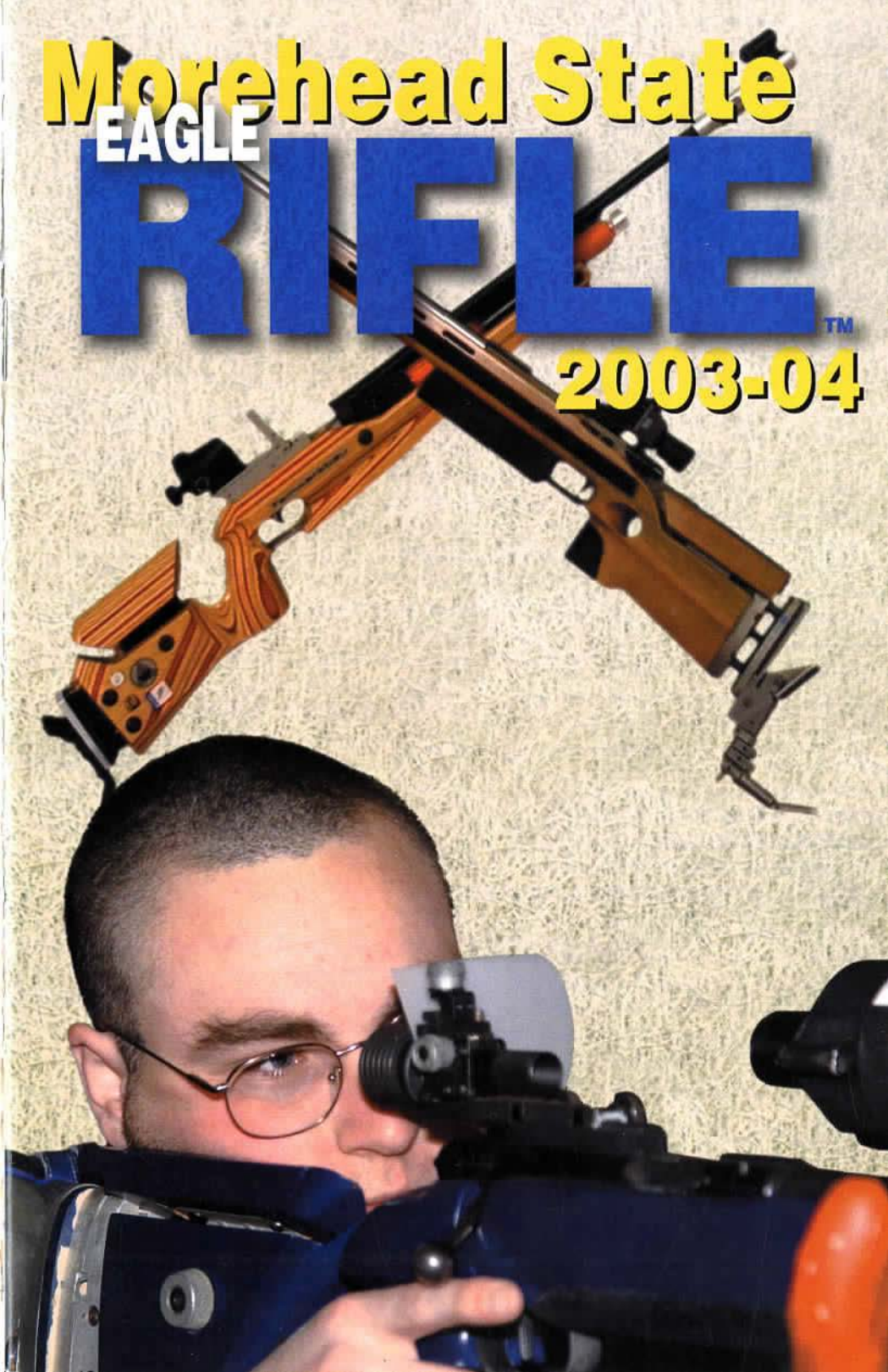

OVC Coach of the Year

Now in his ninth year heading up the Morehead State men's and women's rifle program, Walt Rybka is an accomplished and respected member of the shooting community who has been involved with MSU rifle since the program began competing in the NCAA. A two-time Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year (1997-98 and 1999-2000), he has guided MSU to a

top-25 national ranking each year he has been at the helm of the program.

A life member of the National Rifle Association (NRA), and the Kentucky State Rifle and Pistol Association, and an associate member of USA Shooting, Rybka has been involved with shooting sports virtually his entire life, including participating with the Kentucky Long Rifles. His achievements include earning the Distinguished in Pistol Honor, one of a few civilians in history to receive the accolade, and he is a Master Instructor for Hunter Education in Rowan County. In 1999, the governor appointed him as a member of the State Board for Forestry Best Management Practices.

He first began competing in pistol and rifle shooting when he was 13 at the Plymouth Police Youth League in Plymouth, Mich. For over 30 years, he has competed off and on in pistol competition at Camp Perry in Ohio. In 1997, he was crowned the Kentucky State Air Pistol Champion. He also has been a member of the Kentucky State Pistol Team for many years.

A 1971 graduate of Eastern Michigan with a bachelor's degree in industrial education/secondary education, Rybka is a master of many trades. He earned his master's degree in education in 1974 also from Eastern Michigan, before relocating to Kentucky in 1980. He has held a variety of positions, including performing contract work for the U.S. Forest Service, woodworking, running a shrimp ranch and a sawmill, farming and teaching high school industrial arts.

The original MSU rifle coach, Capt. Hank Patton, brought Rybka in as an assistant during the first two years of the program's rebirth in 1993-94. When Patton left, Rybka took over the program in the 1995-96 year. Since then, he has guided the Eagles and Lady Eagles to numerous top finishes in the multiple conferences in which MSU competes. Several of his athletes have been recognized both for their athletic abilities and named to all-conference teams. In addition, to his role at MSU, he also serves as the coordinator and CEO of the Western Intercollegiate Rifle Conference (WIRC).

Under Rybka's guidance, the Collegiate Rifle Coaches Association (CRCA) also has recognized Morehead State for its academic achievements. His 1998-99 squad was honored by the CRCA as owning the highest GPA among all collegiate rifle teams. Several Eagle and Lady Eagle shooters also have been individually recognized by the CRCA on its All-Academic Team and by the Ohio Valley Conference on its Commissioner's Honor Roll and as Medal of Honor recipients.

Rybka and his wife, C.J. Bergelin, reside in Morehead, Ky.

Werkman concluded her career last year and will serve as the team's student assistant coach this fall. Over the last several years, she has served as the team's office manager and statistician. Werkman also was a squad representative to the Student Athlete Advisory Committee for three years.

As a senior, the biology major placed 19th at the OVC Championships in air rifle, and was 21st in air rifle and 29th in smallbore at the WIRC Championships.

During her career, she earned Most Improved air rifle honors in 2000-01 and Most Improved women's team accolades in 1999-2000. She also earned a WIRC smallbore handicap award in 2000.

An outstanding student, she collected All-Academic honors from the Collegiate Rifle Coaches Association all four years and was named to the MSU Dean's List in four semesters, posting a perfect 4.0 GPA in three. She also earned the OVC Academic Medal of Honor as a freshman and a spot on the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll as a freshman and a sophomore.

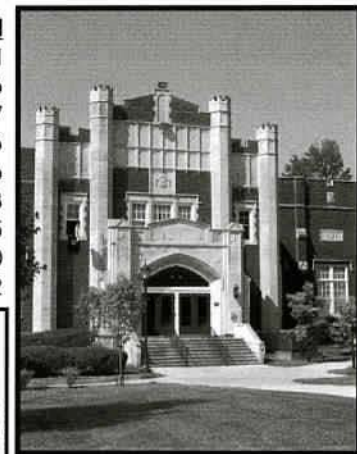

The Ohio Valley Conference

Entering its 56th year, the Ohio Valley Conference embarks on a new era while continuing to build on the success that has made it the nation's eighth-oldest NCAA Division I conference. In 2003, the OVC extends its geographical footprint into Alabama for the first time, expanding the league's membership to a record 11 institutions.

The OVC's proud past dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles (Turkey) Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but remerged Feb. 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950's, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958, Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961, Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football.

In the late 1970's, women's athletics began somewhat of a rebirth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977, with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years.

Over its 55 years, OVC teams have garnered national championships and bowl games in football, along with national team or individual titles in the sports of rifle, cross country, track and golf.

The OVC has also produced several Olympic athletes (including Morehead State's gold-medal bobsledder Brian Shimer), while some of the greatest players in professional sports were educated at OVC institutions. The list includes present-day standouts like basketball players Popeye Jones (Murray State) and Trenton Hassell (Austin Peay), football players Chad Bratzke (Eastern Kentucky), Chris Watson (Eastern Illinois) and Brent Alexander (Tennessee State), baseball players Kirk Reuter (Murray State) and Kerry Robinson (Southeast Missouri) and professional golfer Jeff Sluman (Tennessee Tech).

The playing field isn't the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. The prestigious

OVC Academic Achievement Banner is awarded annually to the league school whose athletes produce the highest grade point average when compared to the general student body. Also, six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes. Additionally, the Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award, in honor of the former Morehead State student-athlete, coach and athletics director, is presented annually to a junior or senior student-athlete with significant athletic contributions who best exemplifies the characteristics of sportsmanship and citizenship.

The Ohio Valley Conference sponsors the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field for men, and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball for women. In addition, the OVC also sponsors the combined men's and women's sport of rifle.

Over the last decade, the league has grown, not only in the number of athletics opportunities it provides for students, but in terms of the number of institutions in the conference. In 2003, Jacksonville State University and Samford University became the newest members of the OVC, joining charter members Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University and Murray State University, along with Austin Peay State

University, Eastern Illinois University, Southeast Missouri State University, the University of Tennessee at Martin, Tennessee State University and Tennessee Technological University.

The University

In 116 years, the sweep of history has carried Morehead State University and its predecessor institution, the Morehead Normal School, from one makeshift classroom to the high-tech world of Internet-based classes and a radio telescope which reaches from a campus hillside literally to the stars.

One student appeared on the first day of class in October, 1887, in a little, rented cottage where the Adron Doran University Center now stands. Tens of thousands of students have come from the foothills and mountains, the river towns and the hillside farms of East Kentucky and beyond to seek the means to a better life in this beautiful, forested valley. Our first president, Frank Button, and his widowed mother, Phebe, literally spent their lives bringing "a light to the mountains" by founding a church-sponsored school to train teachers. The institution came under state control in 1922 and achieved University status in 1966.

Today, Morehead State University has more than 9,500 students from 100 Kentucky counties, 42 states and 37 nations. They are enrolled on campus, at extended campus centers in Ashland, Jackson, Mt. Sterling, Prestonsburg and West Liberty, and several other locations in East Kentucky and across the globe through the World Wide Web. MSU has the state's best computer-student ratio in its computer laboratories and the campus is ranked among the safest in the nation.

Nearly 50,000 persons have received degrees from MSU. Nearly 80 degree programs are available on the two-year, four-year and graduate levels through four colleges (Caudill College of Humanities, College of Business, College of Education, and College of Science and Technology) and the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy. Two-thirds of the faculty hold doctoral degrees.

MSU supports its missions of teaching, applied research and public service through an annual budget of more than \$92 million. Additionally, grants and contracts from external sources for research, service and academic/student support projects generate more than \$15 million each year. Private donations to the University, mainly through the MSU Foundation Inc., have exceeded two million.

Morehead State was the first institution in Kentucky to offer a complete degree program, the

Master of Business Administration (MBA), totally through the World Wide Web. In addition, the University hosts graduate-level programs for nurse practitioners and physicians assistants through the University of Kentucky. The University is acquiring a satellite tracking system in partnership with NASA in the ongoing development of the new Space Science Center.

Also, the University has the statewide mission of preparing adult educators through the newly-established Adult Education Academy for Professional Development. Preserving the region's cultural heritage is the primary responsibility of MSU's Kentucky Folk Art Center and Kentucky Center for Traditional Music.

The nearly 500-acre main campus within the city limits of Morehead includes more than 50 major structures with a total replacement value of more than \$150 million. Beyond the city, the University's real estate holdings include the 320-acre Derricksen Agricultural Complex and a nine-hole public golf course. The instructional plant includes 120 classrooms and 112 laboratories. Housing facilities include space for approximately 3,400 single students and 138 student families.

Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin took office July 1, 1992, as the 12th president of the University. He previously served as chancellor of Coastal Carolina University and vice chancellor of the University of South Carolina at Spartanburg. Dr. Eaglin currently serves on the Division I Board of Directors of the NCAA and is the senior state university president in Kentucky.

The University is located in the foothills of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Rowan County, midway between Lexington, Ky., and Huntington, W.Va., on Interstate 64.

MSU is a charter member of the Ohio Valley Conference in NCAA Division I and sponsors 18 intercollegiate sports for men and women. They include football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, rifle, golf and tennis for men, and volleyball, soccer, basketball, softball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, rifle and tennis for women. The football Eagles compete in the Pioneer Football League. Our coed cheerleading squad has won 14 national championships and the all-girl squad has four national titles.

PRESIDENT--DR. RONALD G. EAGLIN

Dr. Ronald G. Eaglin, an outspoken proponent of student success strategies in college administration, has served since July 1, 1992, as the 12th president of Morehead State University in Morehead, Ky. Responsible for serving Kentucky's 22 easternmost counties, MSU was founded in 1887 and currently enrolls over 9,500 students on its main campus and five regional campus centers.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., President Eaglin came to Kentucky from the chancellorship of Coastal South Carolina University in Conway, S.C. Previously, he was vice chancellor for academic affairs at the University of South Carolina at Spartanburg. Earlier, he was the southeast regional director of the American College Testing Program (ACT).

A former chair of Kentucky's Conference of University Presidents, Dr. Eaglin holds a bachelor's degree in biology and mathematics from Southeast Missouri State University, a master's degree in student personnel administration from Southern Illinois University, and a doctoral degree in educational psychology from the University of Utah. At SEMO, he was a member of the varsity tennis team before graduating in 1962.

President Eaglin's expertise in student retention has been highlighted in a research report he wrote for the American Association of Colleges and Universities (AACSC) on the role of campus chief executives in helping students be successful in college. Dr. Eaglin initiated a study of the teacher education program on the MSU campus that led to a review and improvement of the University's program. In addition, he was involved in the formation of a P-16+ Regional Council which is based at MSU and brings together representatives from the public and private colleges in the area, school superintendents, local government leaders, members of state agencies and CEOs of regional businesses and industry.

The University's CEO has made presentations across the country on student retention and the role of the president in accomplishing this goal. Involved with numerous publications on this topic, he edited the book "Five Habits of Successful Students" published by the International Organization for Student Success.

Dr. Eaglin was a member of the AACSC Board of Directors and has had the distinction of representing two different institutions on the NCAA Presidents Commission. He currently serves on the NCAA Executive Committee and the Division I Board of Directors and is a past president of the Ohio Valley Conference.

President Eaglin is active in economic development matters in East Kentucky, serving presently by appointment of former Gov. Paul Patton on the Kentucky Appalachian Commission. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Eaglin and his wife, Bonnie, have four children and six grandchildren.



DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS--CHIP SMITH

Chip Smith enters his second year as the Director of Athletics at Morehead State University. The former Director of Athletics at Eastern Kentucky, he became the eighth Director of Athletics at MSU in August of 2002.

A highly-organized professional with extensive knowledge in NCAA Division I athletic programs, Smith has nearly 20 years experience in athletics administration with a background in the internal and external workings of intercollegiate athletics, including development, compliance, alumni relations, trademark licensing, marketing and sponsorships, personnel management, support services and financial operations. He is responsible for the leadership, management and supervision of the University's 17 NCAA Division I programs. Smith also recognizes the importance of building strong relationships within the University, with the community and among MSU alumni, and has made a commitment to providing a quality, academically-oriented athletics program for the University.

Prior to Morehead State, Smith was hired as Associate Athletic Director at EKV by current University of Pittsburgh AD Jeff Long and was later named director of the program in 2001. As Director of Athletics, Smith supervised the administrative and coaching staffs, and created the position of assistant compliance coordinator. In restructuring the department, he initiated the position of assistant athletic director for development to strengthen relations with student-athletes and enhance fund-raising efforts. He also initiated the Coaches Council to improve communications with the coaching staff. He coordinated the development and implementation of the athletic Web site, and supervised the completion of several team and support facilities, including the athletic-academic center.

Smith came to EKV from Virginia Military Institute, where he was the Associate Athletics Director. His responsibilities encompassed sport administration, NCAA compliance, finances, and game operations, as well as the development and implementation of the school's trademark licensing program. During his tenure, VMI hosted several conference championships, as well as the NCAA National Rifle Championships. He also was the Assistant Athletic Director for three years.

Prior to VMI, Smith's career includes positions at the Universities of North Carolina at Charlotte and Chapel Hill, and the Durham Bulls minor league baseball team. Smith received his bachelor's degree from UNC Chapel Hill, where he was a letterman for the Tar Heel football squad and a member of the 1974 Sun Bowl and 1976 Peach Bowl teams. After a brief time teaching and coaching high school athletic teams, Smith returned to Chapel Hill to earn a master's degree in athletic administration and has been named as a Distinguished Alumnus of that program.

A native of Siler City, N.C., Smith and his wife, Gale, have two children, daughter, Chesley, and son, Cort.

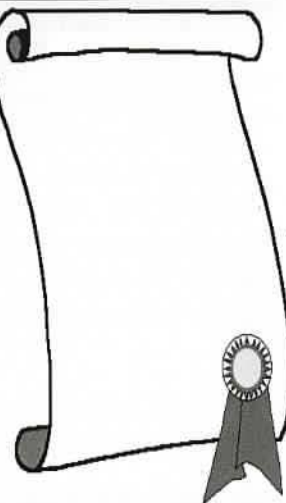
Academic Success

The Eagles and Lady Eagles have a history of being successful away from the field, especially in their academic endeavors. In 1998-99, the College Rifle Coaches Association (CRCA) recognized Morehead State for having the highest team GPA among all collegiate rifle teams.



Numerous Eagles and Lady Eagles also have been recognized by the CRCA on its All-Academic Team. That honor is awarded to any individual who is a varsity letterwinner, has completed at least 12 hours during the fall semester and enrolled in at least 12 hours during the spring semester, and has a fall semester grade point average of 3.2 or higher or a cumulative GPA of at least 3.2.

In 2003, **Garry Garrett** became the first rifle team member in school history to earn Verizon Academic All-American honors, after being named to the Men's At-Large Third Team.



OVC ACADEMIC MEDAL OF HONOR

For the past 14 years, the Ohio Valley Conference has recognized student-athletes for their academic achievements with its Academic Medal of Honor. The award is presented to the student-athlete who has the highest GPA (above 3.00) in each sport sponsored by the OVC. In case of ties, each student-athlete is given a Medal of Honor. **Garry Garrett** in 2001-02 and 2002-03, **Meg Gill** in 2000-01, **Erica Werkman** in 1999-2000 and **Martin Wheeldon** in 1997-98, have been Morehead State's previous winners since rifle became a conference-sponsored sport in 1993-94.

OVC COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

The OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll has been in existence for 12 years and recognizes student-athletes who have a GPA of 3.25 or higher with not less than 24 hours of credit during the previous two semesters. Athletic Facilities

Morehead State has at its disposal modern and well-equipped facilities for the use of its athletic teams. Included among those are the William LeGrande Jayne Stadium, the Academic-Athletic Center (AAC), the George A. Sadler Tennis Courts, the John E. "Sonny" Allen Field, the Lawrence B. Wetherby Gym and the University Softball Field. Among the facilities used for purposes other than competition is the Phil Simms Weight Training Facility, a building dedicated by the former Morehead State and New York Giants' football star, which allows MSU athletes every opportunity to enhance their strength and conditioning. In addition, there is a spacious athletic training facility in Jayne Stadium complete with all of the resources needed to enhance the training of MSU athletes, and allowing them to rehabilitate and recover from injuries quickly and safely.



Athletic Training

One of the major support services offered to the athletes at Morehead State is the main athletic training center located at Jayne Stadium. This facility provides a wide range of options for the treatment and rehabilitation of sports injuries. It contains four whirlpools, four electric stimulators, two ultrasound units and nine treatment tables, along with a wide range of exercise and rehabilitation equipment. Morehead State also staffs two remote athletic training rooms located at the AAC and Wetherby Gym. The athletic

training staff includes the head athletic trainer Richard Fletcher, ATC; assistant athletic trainer Jamey Carver, ATC; and graduate assistant athletic trainers, Sara Larson, ATC; Jennifer Miller, ATC; and BJ Geasa, ATC. In addition, several students provide ancillary support. Other vitally important members of the medical staff include, orthopedic surgeons Tom Fossett MD, Pat Serey MD, Jim Rollins MD and Anup Chatta MD; team dentist, Jim Bendixen DMD; and team optometrist, Thomas McHugh OD. The athletic training staff also utilizes the University health clinic located on campus in Allie Young Hall. The University Clinic staffs four Certified Physicians' Assistants and contracts with a local clinic to provide coverage during the afternoon by family practice physicians. In addition, Saint Claire Regional Medical Center, located in Morehead, is a full-spectrum medical service provider.

Rifle Range

The rifle team's home facility is an eight-point range in the basement of Button Auditorium. Opened in 1929, Button Auditorium is one of the first buildings on the MSU campus. It served as the original home of the Eagle basketball teams until 1956, before changing to its more modern uses



as a performance theatre and multi-purpose ballroom. The range was added to Button

Auditorium in 1972 and the rifle team has been its primary user since MSU instituted rifle as an intercollegiate sport in 1994. In addition to the range, the coach's office and a supply room, the team shares the building's basement with the MSU ROTC program.

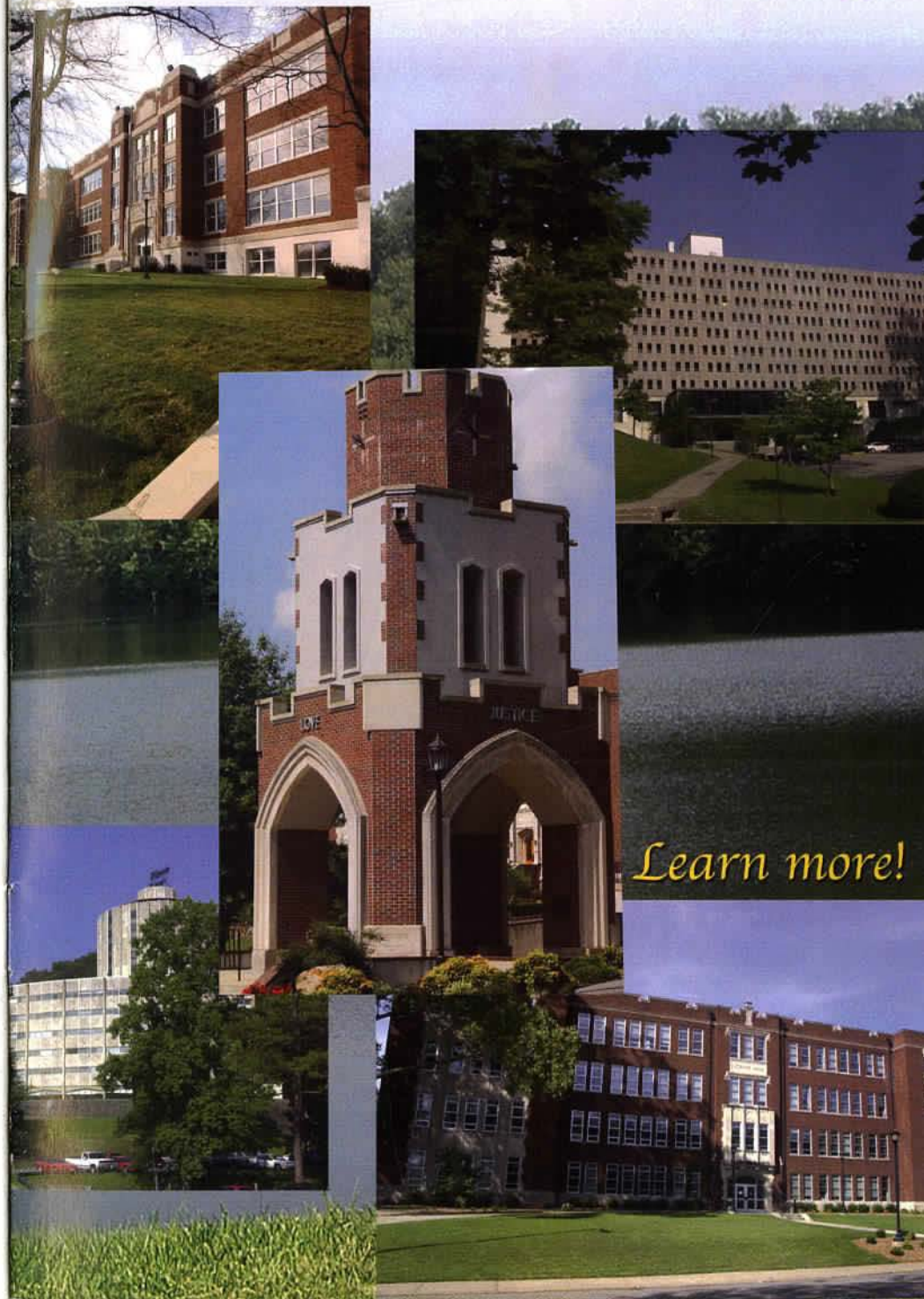
