 courage and tenacity of purpose at your station in the face of falling bombs and strafing—your cool command at successful attacking operations and your ability to contribute to the destruction of (1) Japanese planes, and (2) the accuracy of their attack as to materially assist in the protection and prosperity of this city for important air operations. (Signed) O. A. Weller, Captain U. S. Navy.

Past received a letter of commendation from the commanding officer. This was presented by Robert E. Wenzell, at Wilmington, North Carolina, via the Chief of Naval Personnel. It was awarded him for being instrumental in the saving of many lives as a time of emergency at a time when he was stationed and bleeding from injuries received because of explosion midship caused by enemy action. His efforts were exacted only when the ship was not easily abandoned for further rescue work. For injuries sustained, he was awarded the Purple Heart.

The letter of commendation follows: "You are commended upon the efficient and faithful manner in which you performed your duties as Second Division and Deck Watch Officer of the MANTON-OVERMAN COAST GUARD, near Le Harve, France. Your work in evacuating seriously injured personnel from the ship undoubtedly resulted in saving many lives. I take this opportunity to thank you for your cooperation and the meticulous manner in which you performed all duties assigned you while under my command. The next class will be admitted September 27, 1941. Only one class is enrolled each year. Basic entrance requirements are intelligence, aptitude for nursing and character. The academic requirements are 16 units of High School and at least one semester each of College Chemistry and Biology or Zoology. Annual tuition cost is \$100 and covers the cost of instruction and maintenance. Duke University School of Nursing offers the B.S. in Nursing upon completion of the 3-year nursing course and 60 semester hours of acceptable College credits.

Duke University School of Nursing also participates in the U. S. Nurse Cadet Corps program. Those who plan to continue in nursing throughout the war, receive free tuition, uniforms and a small monthly stipend. Application forms and catalogue can be obtained from Dean, Duke University School of Nursing, Duke Hospital, Durham, North Carolina.

## THE O. P. A. AND RATIONING

(Ed. Note: This column is being published in co-operation with the Committee for Service Plans of O.P.A. in Rowan County.)

Question: Who has the authority to ration?

Answer: The authority to ration was delegated by Congress to the President under the War Powers Act and delegated by the President to the supply agencies.

Question: What are these "supply agencies"?

Answer: They are WPB, WFA, and PAN. When they find that consumer rationing is necessary to insure fair distribution of goods, OPA is directed to ration.

Question: How long has rationing been in effect?

Answer: For almost three years.

Question: Is rationing working?

Answer: Decidedly so. Both military and civilian needs for scarce essential goods are being adequately met. The civilian supply is being divided in such a way as to provide a fair share for each consumer.

Question: If gasoline is scarce, where does black market gasoline come from?

Answer: It comes from the common supply, leaving less rationed gasoline for the own black market. Some individuals pay counterfeit or stolen coupons that depriving the honest motorist of his fair share.

Question: Why is also rationing necessary?

Answer: War's great demand for leather made also rationing necessary. Leather production has increased greatly during the war, but almost half goes to meet war needs.

Question: How is leather made?
