## Nine Rowan County Men In Training

### January Quota Of Trainees Leaves For Fort Thomas For Years Work

Rowan County's January quota of trainees—those men called through the action of the Selective Service Board to spend 2 years in training in the United States Army, left Wednesday noon for Fort Thomas, where they will be inducted into the service. Later in the week they will be sent to other points in the Fifth Corps area in the January call. Nine men were taken from Rowan county with one additional Rowan County man being sent by the Canton, Ohio Selective Service Board.

All the men taken in the January call were volunteers. Those who had offered their services and waived any kind of deferment. Several of them would have come far down in the list if taken in their regular order. However, the majority of the volunteers were taken up in the present call so that the possibilities are that in their future men will be taken in their regular turn.

Elbert Gordon Sparks of Haldeman was also called. Mr. Sparks was registered in Canton, Ohio where he was 207 on the list. Through an oversight on the part of the local board his number was not transferred to Rowan county as requested, so he was called by that board in the January call.

### Fire Boys Respond To Three Calls

Two fire alarms last week called the Morehead Fire Department into action during the past few days, one of them to the Noah Hall building, where almost \$5000 of damage. The fire was due to a defective fuse.

Early Monday morning of this week the alarm again called out the fire ladders, this time to the Toars Lunch Box. In spite of the quick response of the department, the interior of the building, owned by the Morehead Women's Club, was completely gutted together with all the equipment of the Lunch Box, owned and operated by Elwood Dillon. The prompt action of the fire department, however, succeeded in confining the flames to the building and prevented its spread to the West building next door, housing the West Liquor Store, the Dats Grill, and Wilson's Barber Shop. The fire was discovered by Mr. Russell who slept next to the window opening toward the Lunch Box. The Women's Club carried insurance to the amount of \$700 on the building while Dillon was partially covered by insurance.

The department, composed of five volunteers, responded to the alarm in 10 minutes. The entire department was on the scene within three minutes after the alarm was sounded, making some kind of a speed record.

## City Council Signs Lease For Apparatus

### Mentioned Decision Reached At Meeting Tuesday, Contract Signed

The Morehead City Council at their regular meeting Tuesday night of this week, took what is unquestionably one of the most important steps it has ever taken toward the continued progress of the city of Morehead. The council voted unanimously to enter into a contract to lease the fire equipment required by the Fire Department to give Morehead the fire protection necessary to maintain its present rating with the Insurance Bureau. The contract for the leasing of the equipment was given by the Mayor of the city, Clarence Allen Wednesday afternoon.

Thus was brought to a climax a drive engineered almost entirely by Fire Chief H. B. McCutcheon for the past two years worked untiringly to furnish the city with equipment that would meet these requirements.

The terms of the lease call for the leasing of \$85,000 worth of fire fighting equipment for a one year period at a rental cost of \$1000.00 for the first year. The lease is subject to annual renewals for as long as the city desires at a rental for succeeding years of \$116.67. If at any time the city desires to purchase the equipment outright, they may do so for \$2000.00 with the understanding that any rentals paid will be applied to the purchase price, less 6 per cent interest.

The lease includes the following equipment: One Chevrolet fire truck, one 500 gallon per minute Triple Combination Pump, 150 gallon booster tank, 200 feet booster tank with fog nozzle, 1500 feet two and one half inch hose, ax, pike pole, extension and roof ladders, body to hold 120 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose, one 1 1/2 inch fog nozzle, one 1 1/2 inch fog nozzle, soda acid, and foam tanks, and other necessary accessories to meet Kentucky Actural Bureau requirements.
