question—Is there any Scripture to support the practice of paying a preacher to preach?

Answer—No, none whatever. You couldn't pay a man, God called preacher to preach. In the first place, he wouldn't take the money for preaching, and in the second place, if he preached the Gospel, there isn't enough money in the world to pay his worth.

However, let my reader follow me a little further. There is a vast difference in the idea of "paying a preacher to preach". Paul reasons, "should not an ox of supporting a preacher in the field be as much as the ox that plows?"

But if by special gifts from individuals direct to the preacher, or by a salary through some things, it is a great thing if we church, whatever the system, shall reap our carnal things, true Christians are willing to pro-

vide the expenses of a true preacher, in order that he may preach the Gospel. The idea of "paying a preacher to preach" is in many cases a slanderous misrepresentation of the whole matter by people who don't want to part with their money for the glory of God.

Nobody could give a real, goodly preacher enough money to equal the good his preaching may do. If his preaching brought one nearly as much as there isn't enough money in the world to pay him for his service. God himself will reward the preacher that the whole idea in the financial support of the ministry is to provide those whom God calls for this special service with money in order that they may not have to give time to tasks of securing support and enable them to do more effective service for the Lord. All this talk about "men preaching for money" is plain foolishness. A man could make more money doing nearly anything else than he can preaching. The average salary of preachers is about \$800.00 a year. It is said, and who could not make more than that if he could give his much support preaching.

God's Word endorses the support of preaching the Gospel in unmistakable language. Read what Paul says in I Corinthians 9:17. In that chapter he tells us that the law provided that an ox who was used for treading out grain in the world to pay his worth. tom of threshing, could not be sold.
