## The UPWARD LOOK

By Rev. B. H. Kaeze  
Question—Will there be more people in Heaven or in Hell?  
Answer—Of course, on questions like this, we can only take what the Scriptures reveal. In the first place, let me say, that we are taking the terms "Heaven" and "Hell" to represent the two general ideas of how many will be saved and how many will be lost. There are some technical matters to consider about the present Heaven and Hell and the final doom of the wicked.  
We have in the Bible, the general statement: "Enter ye in at the strait (narrow) gate; for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction; and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." Matt. 7:13, 14.

In my own view of interpretation, this seems to be rather conclusive, since it is the words of Jesus Himself. It is a sad picture, but it seems to be borne out of experience. If you will read the first Psalm you will see the difference between a "righteous man and the unrighteous man" and the Lord plainly says, through the Psalm, that "the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous."

In the days of Jesus, it seems, only the few gave heed to the way of life. That has been true all through the centuries that have followed. And if my judgment is terribly wrong it is the same way today. God lays down the specific terms by which we can be saved. He says: "Except a man be born again he cannot see the Kingdom of God." He that believeth not is condemned already. "He that believeth on the Son, hath everlasting life; he that believeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him." "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." "The wicked shall be turned into hell with all nations that forgets God."

Many other passages could be quoted to show that unless we turn from sin to the Saviour, and exercise personal, saving faith in Him, there is not the slightest hope that we shall ever gain moment in Heaven. Men who do not repent are just lost, and when our opportunities of repentance are over at death, there is no more chance. After death it is judgment.

Now, in view of this teaching, how many of the people living today do you save? Certainly not the majority. And if that is the way it has been all the time of recorded history, and if that is

the way it is today, as all can plainly see, then we are forced to conclude that there will be more people lost than saved.

This ought to make men think, and repent. We they are not so "doped" by the deadness and sin of the world that they can't think.

PLANTING IRISH POTATOES

To control scab and various other diseases I always treat my Irish potato seed before planting.

In cutting Irish potatoes for planting, I want a good blocky piece, say 1 1/2 to 2 ounces. This is far better than trying to economize and cutting into small pieces.

MANURE STEPS UP TOBACCO YIELDS

Manure has been found an effective tobacco fertilizer at the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station. Ten tons per acre of average farm manure should be sufficient on soils in fair condition, and for this soil the amount may well be increased to 15 tons per acre.

Outside the central Bluegrass counties, manure should be supplemented by about 200 pounds per acre of superphosphate drill in the rows. Manure may be slightly more effective if used as a top dressing after the ground is plowed.

Chicken manure, especially if fully dried and free from straw or other bedding material, contains much more plant food than ordinary stable manure and less is needed.

Tamales make delicious hot appetizers. Cut them in one inch lengths, wrap with a small strip of bacon, skewer with a toothpick and broil until bacon is crisp. Serve on the toothpicks.

Without coddliver oil, so as to remove any fish flavor from the egg, is strictly a community affair, and it will benefit every one.

"How much does it cost to raise a chick from the time it is hatched until 2 lbs. in weight asked the reporter. Mr. Haggan stated that it varied, and this particular lot raised almost entirely on Kroger feeds) had cost him a total of 21 cents each which included the cost of the eggs, hatching, brooding and feeding. As the market price is now around 21 cents per lb., he said, these birds now have a value of 42 cents each, thus clearing 21 cents per bird, which is far above the average."

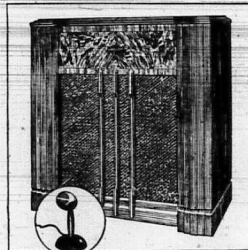

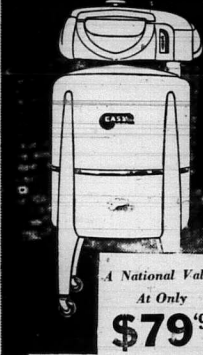

German food rationing, German diet is reported still on the downgrade. Europe will be a mighty hungry place when the war ends.
